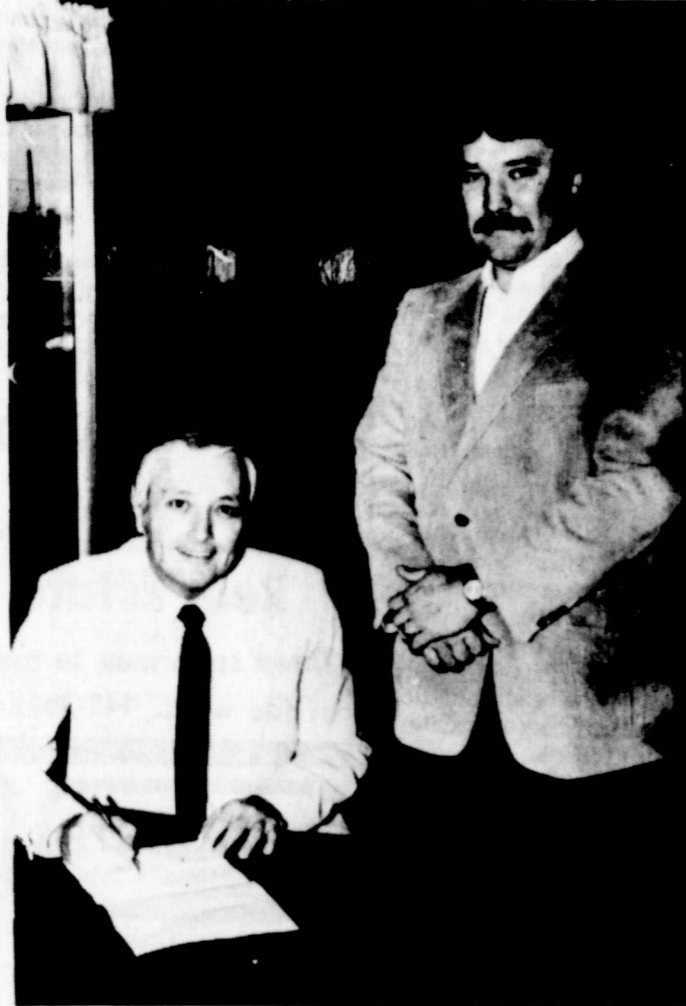

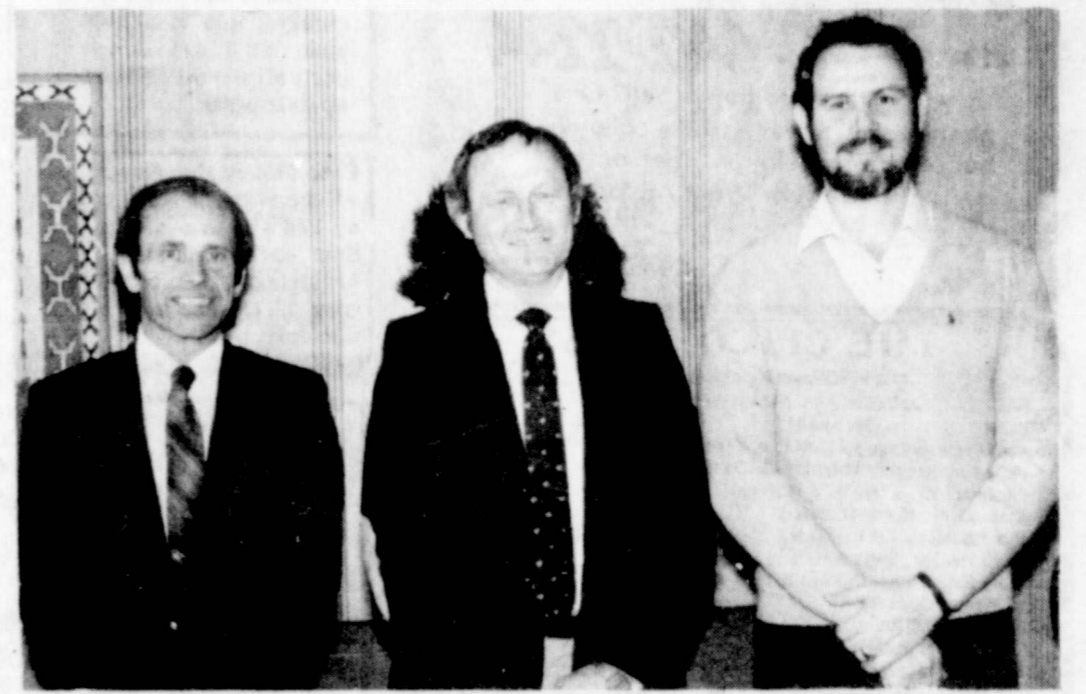
band at Stephenville. They are members of the Church of Christ and live on a small farm at Nimrod.

The Lobos lost in the quarterfinals of the Interscholastic League playoffs, being among the top eight teams in Class AA competition. "We're certainly not ashamed of our season," he said.

"We realize the importance of the Community Chest and the big part it plays in our city, and we are pleased with the opportunity to support the fund drive," Secretary Jasper Cook said. The Chest drive is currently being conducted to raise

The coach, in his first year at Cisco High School, told Lions that work has already started for next year. An "off season" program has been worked out in which squad members devote some time almost every day to weight lifting, physical conditioning and studying football.

Cisco Nets \$9,093 In Playoff Money

The Cisco Public Schools received the sum of \$9,093.44 as its net share of gate proceeds from the four football playoff games in which the Lobos participated, Supt. James Couch reported Thursday. The gross gate receipts amounted to \$23,141 and competing schools divided the money after paying game expenses.

Gross gate receipts for the four games were listed by Mr. Couch as follows: San Saba (Comanche), \$4,136; Archer City (Weatherford), \$5,328; Frisco (Azle), \$7,471; and, Boyd (Stephenville),

\$6,156.

The University Interscholastic League received a percentage of each gate, totaling \$2,892 for the four games. Game officials, also based on a percentage of the gate, amounted to \$1,287 for four games.

Use of stadiums cost the competing teams as follows: Comanche, \$294; Weatherford, none; Azle, \$200; and, Stephenville, \$280.

Cisco's net share per game amounted to the following: San Saba, \$1,527; Archer City, \$2,185; Frisco, \$3,000; and, Boyd, \$2,379.

amount of powdered sugar and cream to achieve desired spreading consistency. Add food coloring slowly to achieve the shade of green desired. Spread on cake.

 2 teaspoons green food coloring diluted with water to make 1/2 cup
 Cinnamon red hots

CAPITOL UPDATE

As the second part of a four part series on our court system, I would like to talk to you on constitutional County Courts. Each of our 254 counties has a constitutional county court presided over by a county judge, who may or may not be an attorney, who is elected by you as a citizen of the county. The County Judge sits in the

dual capacity of law judge and head of the Commissioner's Court, which is really not a court at all in the usual sense of the word, but is, in fact, the governing body of the county. That's another story and I want to concentrate on the county court and county judge as an entity and individual applying our state laws.

The County judge has criminal jurisdiction of Class A and B misdemeanors and Class C misdemeanors that may have been appealed from justice court. The county court also has jurisdiction over D.W.I. cases which are not part of our criminal code but are, for reasons totally unfathomable to me, a part of the statute dealing with highways. The maximum sentence that the county court can levy would be in a Class A misdemeanor range which could be a fine up to \$2,000 and jail time up to one year in county jail or both. A county court cannot sentence an individual to the penitentiary and D.W.I. punishment, as of January 1, 1984, can be not less than 72 hours nor more than 2 years in county jail.

The County Court also has initial jurisdiction over all probate and guardianship proceedings.

From the standpoint of public interest, the County Courts most controversial role, at least in the recent past, has been in assessment of sentences for D.W.I. and what would appear to be the public's impressing of extremely lax sentences. In all due defense of our county judges, I must say, in my experience, they do an extremely good job in reflecting the general public's attitude about harshness of sentence and, of course, they are in a position to better view mitigating circumstances and to handle defendants on an individual basis.

One of my major concerns about our constitutional County Courts is that we may well be asking our county judges to wear too many hats. As current constitutional requirements stand, they must be, to an extent, county manager, familiar with all governmental programs, criteria and requirements, criminal judge, probate and guardianship judge, civil judge, and generally the sounding board and depository of all complaints of the citizenry against all county policy, taxation and other elected county public officials.

We, as a people, I think do not always remember the importance of this office in county government and do not realize the effect a constitutional county judge can

have on everyday existence. As with all our elected officials, myself included, it is important that you know what we should be doing so you can judge better how well we will be doing it.

Homemaking Hints

Mail-order gift packages of smoked cured ham, bacon, sausage or turkey are increasingly popular holiday gifts. But those receiving smoked meats may wonder about its quality and edibility after weeks in storage and transit.

Mail-order gift packages from reputable deals are safe for consumption, so you need not worry about giving them as gifts or using them yourself. The products are highly processed and contain preservatives, allowing them to be mailed without refrigeration. But the meats should still be inspected before eating. After opening the package, look for signs of spoilage such as a rotten or putrid smell. Foods with a questionable odor should not be used or even tasted.

Also inspect the food for signs of surface mold growth. Mold this type is not poisonous but must be removed before the meat is used. You can trim off any mold and the meat directly under it, or scrub the mold with a brush and vinegar wash. A vinegar wash can be made by mixing one part vinegar to three parts water. Rinse the wash off with plain water.

For maximum flavor from smoked cured meat you should use the meat production soon. Bacon can be stored in a refrigerator at 35 to 40 degrees for seven days. A whole ham can be refrigerated for seven days, a half for three to five days and slices for three days. Smoked sausage keeps well when refrigerated for up to seven days and dry or semi-dry sausage and cured turkey will keep for two to three weeks.

Since frozen cured meat loses quality rapidly, you should not plan on long freezer storage. Bacon should be frozen at zero degrees F for one month or less and ham for only one to two months. Turkey can be frozen for three to six months, but refreezing is not recommended for sausage.

Cured meats are safe when frozen for longer periods of time, but there may be a drop-off in taste that makes the gift less enjoyable.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
This is the season when many of you are busy with your holiday baking. So many of the recipes for these special holiday goodies requires sweetened condensed milk. You might like to use the following recipe to make your own which is much cheaper than bought sweetened condensed milk.

SWEETENED CONDENSED MILK
1 cup non-fat dry milk
2/3 cup sugar
1/2 cup boiling water
3 Tablespoons butter, melted

Combine all ingredients in food processor or blender. Process until thoroughly mixed. Refrigerate in a sealed container until ready to use.

MINI FRUITCAKES (Makes about 7 dozen)
1/2 cup unsifted flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 (28 oz.) jar of ready to use mincemeat

1 (14 oz.) can of sweeten condensed milk (or you may wish to make the above recipe in proper amount)
2 cup graham cracker crumbs
1 cup chopped nuts
3 eggs, beaten
Candied cherries, halved

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. In a large bowl, sift or stir together flour and baking soda. Add remaining ingredients except cherries; mix well. Line 1 1/4 inch muffin cups with paper liners or grease lightly. Spoon 1 level measuring tablespoon batter into each cup. Top each with a cherry half. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

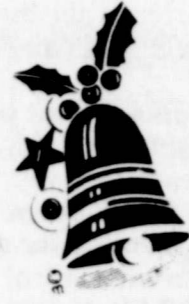

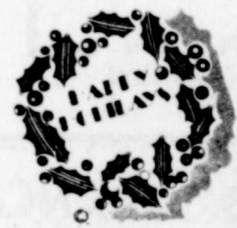

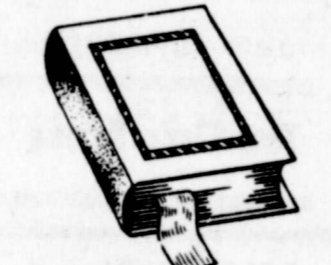
