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Merry Christmas Seen For Area Despite Freezing Wintry Blast

A white Christmas was in prospect for this region for the first time in many years Friday as a record cold wave sent temperatures tumbling to near zero during the final days of yuletide prepara-

Despite the cold weather, which produced a chill factor in the minus 20s, Cisco area residents were completing plans for Santa's annual visit and there was every indication that this year's would be a Merry Christmas.

The week's low reading was recorded about 5 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 22, when thermometers registered between zero and three degrees. As of midnight Friday, Dec. 23, local temperatures had been below the freezing mark for some 140 continuous hours. The low reading for Friday was reported at nine

Cold and flu season is here and that makes this a good time to review the contents of your medicine chest.

The food and drug administration suggests checking out the medicine stock twice a year to get rid of items that are out of date.

Many medicines lose their potency on the shelf, so the agency suggests stocking no more than a six to 12 month supply of medications. And, the FDA notes, the

medicine chest may not be the best place to keep supplies. The warm, humid bathroom atmosphere may cause some items to deteriorate. Plus, children may become curious about the contents of the chest and get into medications that could be dangerous for them.

Most medicines should be stored in a cool dry place away from children, the FDA suggests. So let January be the

month that you take inventory of your medicines in the medicine chest. As each of you know, the

Firemen Go To **Nursing Center**

Firemen were called to the Cisco Nursing Center at 3 p.m. Wednesday after equipment in a heating furnace closet caught fire, Chief C.W. Guthrie reported. The small fire was confined to the closet and was put out with virtually no loss, he

Mr. Gathrie complimented nursing center personnel for their prompt action in moving patients from the north wing where the furnace is located as a precautionary measure.

The blaze started in an expansion joint between the furnace and the duct system, Mr. Guthrie said. The usually high demand for heat probably caused the fire, he added. The furnace was back in operation within a few hours.

The E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital's emergency room handled a number of broken bones and injuries that resulted from sidewalk spills and minor auto mishaps. (See story elsewhere.)

Local motels were full Wednesday and Thursday nights as travelers stopped early due to the cold weather. I-20 was ice coated Wednesday and motels filled up before 5 p.m. Travel resumed Thursday at near normal rates.

The First Baptist Church took in 12 stranded motorists who couldn't find motel rooms Wednesday night. The Rev. and Mrs. Buddy Sipe, Revis Gregg and Paula Collier of the church staff provided cots for the 12 visitors in the church's fellowship hall, served supper to them and gave them breakfast before they departed Thursday morning.

Cisco Junior College completed first semester exams during the week despite the ice that made College Hill difficult to navigate. College officials with four-wheel vehicles and cars with chains assisted faculty and some students get to the campus.

Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, said that in cases where students were unable to get to exam classes on schedule their instructors arranged for them to take tests at convenient times. He believed that all exams were completed Friday.

Guthrie Truck Harbor was literally surrounded by parked truck rigs Wednesday night after I-20 icing began slowing traffic and making travel dangerous. There were three jack-knife mishaps near the truck stop in southwest Cisco, and numerous rigs were halted along I-20 in this area for a time. Local wrecker services were on the job most of

Wednesday night. City Manager Mike Moore reported that the City of Cisco's water department responded to some 50 calls Thursday to turn off water at residences where pipes froze and needed to be repaired. Leaks in the city water lines weren't expected to begin showing up until thawing weather began, Mr. Moore said.

The city water storage

reservoir at College Hill had a frozen gauge that failed to trip switches to activate pumps at Lake Cisco, Mr. Moore said. Workers discovered the problem before the reservoir was too low and made corrections.

The city manager said that contractors for the city's water improvement program shut down their operations early in the week due to the extreme cold.

City police reported that there was little activity, and the Cisco Fire Department had only one alarm (Cisco Nursing Center, see story elsewhere).

Despite the extreme cold weather and its related problems, "Cisco is going to have a Merry Christmas," CofC Manager Randy Speegle said. "It's in the air and you can feel it."

Church Parlor Project Honors Pioneer Family

"Our Heritage" Parlor, a 15x30 room used for receptions and assorted gatherings at the First Baptist Church, has been redecorated and re-furnished by Miss Louise Karkalits of Cisco as a memorial to her late parents and an aunt.

The room honors the memory of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clyde S. Karkalits and the late Norman Patterson Carlton, all members of pioneer Cisco families families who were also pioneer members of the First Baptist Church.

The parlor, given the new name of Miss Karkalits, was re-carpeted and re-painted. Two large couches along with six chairs, tables and lamps, two attractive chandeliers and wall pictures were purchased new for the room. Miss Karkalits was assisted by Mrs. Wm. E. Austin in supervising the project, which represented an outlay of some \$7,500.

The late Mr. Karkalits, like his wife, was born and raised in Cisco. They were married at the home of her parents, the Pattersons, in 1905. Mr. Karkalits was a deacon of the First Baptist Church for some 50 years and he served as a Sunday School superintendent, the church's treasurer, and sang in the choir for many years. He was a Cisco business and civic leader most of his life. The family lived at Midland some 15 years while ho managed a Rockwell Bros. Lumber Yard and, later, operated an automobile

Mrs. Carlton, the former Norma Patterson, was the daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. B.W. Patterson of Cisco. Her father was a lawyer and a former district judge in Eastland County. Mrs. Carlton left the First Baptist Churches of Cisco and Eastland gifts valued at some \$330,000 when she passed away a few years ago. She had previously given the two churches oil company stock

Miss Karkalits has long been active in the church and in community affairs.

"The church is justly proud of Our Heritage Parlor," the Rev. Buddy Sipe, pastor, said. "It is a fine memorial to a fine family of pioneer Baptists and Cisco citizens. The parlor has many useful purposes. Our members are very appreciative to Miss Karkalits for this project and for her long-time dedication to our church and to our community."

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



Economic Emergency Loans To Be Reinstated

The Farmers Administration (FmHA) will resume making economic emergency loans by the beginning of next year, according to FmHA County Supervisor Jack S. Phillips.

Economic emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a costprice squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control," Phillips said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981 but was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to larmers who are suffering an economic emergency through no fault of their own. They must show that they have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA and thay they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can

to the government of borrowing money. The interest rates for guarnteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, are negotiated between borrower and the lender.

The infamous robbery of the First National Bank on Dec. 23, 1927, was an occasion that earned for Cisco the dubious honor of receiving an official marker to commemorate the event. And the marker was the second issued in Eastland County by the Texas State Historical Society as an official land-

This fact was noted by County Judge Scott Bailey in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

Judge Bailey said the first historical landmark marker issued in Eastland County is attached to the Mode 0'Day Store in Eastland - the building that housed the first government in the county.



Judge Bailey told again the story of how Marshall Ratliff, whose parents formerly lived in Cisco, led three accomplices into the bank for a holdup. Ratliff was dressed in a Santa Claus suit and had strolled along the main street to the bank.

How the bandits took hostages and made their getaway was recalled. Woodrow Harris, a 14-year old Rising Star youth, took the keys from his family's car that the bandits commandeered and slowed their progress. They made their way along dirt roads southeast of town until they abandoned their hostages and the car and fled on foot.

Several days and a number of stolen cars later, the bandits were captured north of Breckenridge in the South Bend area. Judge Bailey told of the legal proceedings, including Ratliff's efforts to escape punishment due to insanity. Ratliff, feigning paralysis and insanity, was able to grab a gun and shot Jailer Tom Jones at Eastland County

Judge Bailey said that as far as he can determine the Ratliff lynching in late November, 1929, was the last of a white man in Texas.

One of the bandits, a youngster named Robert Hill, was given a life sentence since he shot no one and appeared to be an unwilling member of the party. Judge Bailey said he learned some years ago that Hill, who was pardoned and changed his name, held annual reunions with Woodrow Harris who had identified him and others of the ban-

Judge Bailey said the first time Cisco appeared on front pages probably was after the April 28, 1893, cyclone struck, killing 23 persons, and injuring dozens more and leveling some 80 per cent of the buildings in the

Three Cisco churches have 100th anniversary historical markers for having served the community, the judge said. These are the First Baptist, the First United Methodist and the First Presbyterian Churches. The Mobley Hotel, which was the first of the internationally famous Conrad Hilton worldwide chain of inns, has another historical marker,

Mr. Bailey noted. Cisco's educational achievements, including the early-day Britton Training School, have been noteworthy, Judge Bailey said. He said it has been recorded that most of the men students of BTS marched in a group to enlist in WWI. The school, which had its beginn-



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ing in Scranton, today is Cisco Junior College, a community college of considerable size and influence, the judge said.

"Ours is an interesting and a proud heritage," Judge Bailey said. "Our community was built on strong foundation stones, and it will endure."



Super Glue May Stick Crooks

as the sticky stuff with 1,001 uses, but Bexar County Sheriff's deputies have found the 1,002nd - raising hidden fingerprints on crime evidence.

The fumes from the adhesive work to show up fingerprints on plastics and other substances often left blank by the conventional dusting method, said Capt. Jesse Pelayo of the department's identification sec-

a couple of months ago," he said. "We raised some fingerprints from a plastic sandwich bag containing marijuana. We couldn't do that before."

The glue also garnered fingerprints from a beer can believed to have been dumped by one of two men who shot a deputy last week, Pelavo said.

Here's how it works: Items gathered as evidence are placed in plastic bags with small amounts of Super Glue. Within five to 10 seconds, the prints appear.

"It started in Japan in 1978 in the Tokyo Metropolitan

(AP)-Super Glue is touted Police Department," Pelayo said. "There was an examiner who noticed a fingerprint on an unopened container of Super Glue.

"It's hard to lift latent prints from plastics, weapons and aluminum foil. We were looking for something to raise the hidden prints that can't be seen by the naked eye," he said. "We could get prints from fountain pens. Things that are smooth."

The conventional methods had been unreliable, though with plastics or non-smooth

surfaces, he said. The technical explanation is that the glue contains a compound - cyanoacrylic ester - that raises the fingerprints when vaporized with the aid of an accelerant like sodium hydroxide, Pelayo

"The glue will make a white fingerprint on whatever is in there," he

In the past, a variety of substances were spread across a surface to show fingerprints, including graphite, earth and rosin, he

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

Texas Dept. Of Public Safety Estimates Death Toll Of 51 During Holidays

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that 51 persons will be killed on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas holidays. The estimate is based upon previous holiday death statistics and the number of hours during which motorists are anticipated to travel.

"Last year, 44 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the actual holiday period. However, persons injured in various accidents across the state brought the final death toll to 52," said Colnel Jim Adams, director of the DPS.

Adams said while Texas is experiencing a significant decrease in traffic death statewide this year, the holidays can reflect a deadly time for motorists.

"As of noon, Friday, December 16, we had 11 per cent reduction in traffic deaths and that is 412 fewer people killed. We attribute the reduction to increased enforcement, DWI widespread attention to the drinking driver and a renewed effort by drivers to obey traffic laws.

The DPS director said that holiday weekends are dangerous times to travel.

"We find the volume of traffic increases. Also, we still have some drivers who insist upon drinking and driving and other who exceed the speed are the two main contributing factors to traffic accidents in Texas.

"We'll have additional available troopers to assist the motorists and to be especially watchful for drunken drivers and those who speed."

Adams praised local police authorities for their work in reducing the traffic death toll and he applauded the various local programs to help keep the drinking driver from getting behind the

Civic clubs, local police agencies and other organizations have begun programs to help prevent drunk driving and this could help tremendously toward accident prevention. However, we will still find a few who will be on the road while drinking or speeding and will be involved in traffic deaths occuring during the holiday in an attempt to increase public awareness of the dangers of holiday driving.




