Brenda Gail Andrews, 22, of Rising Star was convicted on charges of criminal conspiracy and given a 10-year probated sentence by Judge Jim Wright in 91st District Court last Friday afternoon in the Garcia murder case.

The woman's trial had been scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the 91st Court but she was permitted to plead "no contest" to second degree felony charges as part of a plea-bargaining agreement worked out by her attorney, Bill Buckner, of Georgetown.

Mrs. Andrews had been indicted by an Eastland County grand jury for capital murder in the death of Debra Jo Garcia, 29, Cisco convenience store worker in November, 1981. Two men, Charles and Thomas Le Flore, had previously been sentenced to terms of 65 and 50 years, respectively, on murder charges in the case.

The original capital charges against Mrs. Andrews was later reduced to murder after she spent several weeks in the county jail. She had been free under \$10,000 bond.

Attorney Buckner told the Press, after the Friday trial, that he would make only one dicted for capital murder and convicted of criminal

The trial began at 3:10 p.m. and Mrs. Andrews appeared subdued and spoke in a soft voice that was barely audible in the court room. The judge and attorneys asked her if she understood each phase of the proceedings and she answered in the affirmative. Only a handful of people attended the trial, which came as a surprise to observers.

Mrs. Andrews was sane and was not under the influence of any type of drugs, her attorney told the court. He said that under the charge of criminal conspiracy, she could receive from two to 20 yers in prison and a fine up to \$10,000 for the second degree felony.

In a stipulation of evidence, which Mrs. Andrews signed, the court was told that she understood that what she was doing was the same as making a confession. The judge informed her that she couldn't appeal the proceedings without his

The document continued quoting Mrs. Andrews, that she aided and abetted in the "unlawful suppression of evidence," such as hiding the gun, which has never been recovered, and disposing of Mrs. Garcia's body.

No Word From Arrest Warrant

Sgt. Lonnie Knight said the warrant had been sent to Abilene police but they had not heard anything further in the case.

Police Chief Billy Rains said the boy's mother, Mrs. Sharon Carlton of Eastland, advised him that the boy was returned to her by his father on Sunday.

Mr. Rains believed the man has returned to Azle where he has been working.

"She stands now in front of the eyes of the community and the state not guilty of murder, but guilty of criminal conspiracy, which is a very serious offense and she is guilty of that.

"This is a poor, ignorant, little girl with two children who, in my opinion, has been hounded, not by the police, courts or prosecutor, but by certain members of the press. If ever, any one of the press alleges this little girl is a murderer, they will be brought into court by me," he concluded.

After the proceedings, Mrs. Andrews left the courtroom and reported to the county probation office.

Both Charles and Thomas LeFlore, who were sentenced after pleading guilty to murder charges in the case, were returned to the Eastland County Jail on Dec. 15th as court authorities prepared for the third case. Sheriff Johnny Morren reported that they would be returned to Huntsville on January 4th.

Court authorities told this newspaper that they were not ready to write "closed" third trial ended. It was indicated that investigations would continue.

Cisco Man Held In Shooting Case

Buford Glen Whitehead, 26-year old Ciscoan, was in the Eastland County jail Tuesday as the result of a shooting incident at 2:05 p.m. Sunday at the Fontaine Apartments, 215 West 8th Street, in Cisco.

Jerral (Bo) Anderson, 22, of Wichita Falls was in stable condition at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene after undergoing surgery Sunday for removal of a bullet from his stomach. He was the victim of the shooting incident, according to Police Sergeant Lonnie Knight.

Whitehead was charged with attempted capital murder and for attempted murder in the incident, and bonds totalling \$65,000 were set by Justice of the Peace R.G. Lyerla of Eastland. Authorities said that bond was also denied on a warrant for the renovation of Whitehead's probation in another case.

Sgt. Knight reported that Anderson and his wife, Margaret, 20, had gone to the apartment to recover belongings of Mrs. Anderson when they discovered Whitehead there. Mrs. Anderson had been living there for some time before reconciling with her husband recently.

The Andersons requested Cisco police to accompany them to the apartment, Sgt. Knight said. When they entered, the officer said that Whitehead grabbed a .22 caliber pistol that was under a couch cushion and shot Anderson.

The gun was then turned on Policeman Lynn Johnson and Policewoman Risa Biggs and it jammed. The police were able to subdue him. Police had a warrant dated Dec. 28 for the arrest of Whitehead on probation violation.


Pioneer Woman Recalls Bad Weather In 1919

This extremely cold weather which started about the 15th or 16th of December, 1983, reminded me of the cold weather we had in

The good people who were at my home to help out were Aunt Sid McClure, a good friend and close neighbor: Mrs. C.H. Akin, another good friend, (she was Mrs. Hiram Foster's mother; the Fosters live two miles east of Cross Plains at the present); and my sister Grace, who had already married. Grace recalls that she and I trudged through the snow to Aunt Sid's house and walked her back home with us before I went to Grandpa's. Friends and neighbors in that day really stood by one another when needed.

Meanwhile, Dr. Dill walked the floor and worried, hour after hour those two days and nights, knowing he could not make it in his car. When he could stand it no longer, he saddled up his big white horse, mounted and started for Pioneer at about three in the afternoon of Nov. 29. He came riding up to our house just before dark.

By that time the hopeless looking situation had been turned into victory. We were

all back home by the fireside when we heard a slight noise outside. Papa went quickly to see what was going on. To his surprise and profound pity, there was poor Dr. Dill on the big white horse,

nearly frozen. Papa gently helped him down from the tired animal and into the house, sat him in a chair by the brightly burning fire, gave him some hot coffee, pulled off his shoes and washed his feet in warm water.

Then Papa tried to tell him how sorry he was that he could not get word to him when he was so sorely needed, but that the good Lord had shown His mercy by sparing both mother and child. Dr. Dill was very happy to learn that all the danger, fear and worry had ended in victory for all concerned.

The doctor spent the night with us and the next day Papa paid him the full amount promised, perhaps more knowing Edd Curry.

Here's hoping there are still good doctors like Dr. Dill and many good fathers like my Papa.







Dangers In 'Nuclear Education'

There is a new scourge in this land. If it weren't organized by seemingly rational people you would assume it was a put-on. But it isn't. We are now living

with something called

Dairy

Journal.

"nuclear education." Nuclear education is to education what lachrymose teenagers are to serious descussion. In fact this analogue explains what this "new" discipline is all about. In a media world made

conscious of weapons there is the perfectly rational adolescent proposition that we must eliminate these tools of destruction. Any other response would

be surprising. Educators, however, have a responsiblity to providee perspective. A classroom is not a place

for emotional catharsis; is is presumed to be a place for learning.

Therefore, if nuclear weapons are discussed they should be part of a lesson in history.

The dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki was not an accident. President Truman could sacrifice one million American soldiers in an assault on the Japanese. But he had to act. Both decisions were unpleasant.

If nuclear weapons are the focus of a class discussion

weapons. They show films on the devastation at Hiroshima, they elicit tears from students, they have teenagers, "talk their hearts

who recently appeared on Ted Koppel's "Nightline" said, "I teach this subject to little kids in the schools and all you have to do is ask them a question and you'll get a lot of responses. They know a lot about this stuff." They

It is interesting that . 10-year-olds understand the difference between intermediate and strategic weapons, that they are sensitive to the meaning of credible deterrance.

One of the gurus in this movement said - after having interviewed some Soviet children - "I find they have the same fear of war as our children do. In fact they beleive you can't survive a nuclear war. All the civil defense won't save you from

nuclear death." Of course he neglected to ask these children if they made Soviet military policy. He seemingly forgot to note that whether the children beleive they can survive a war or not, their leaders believe that civil defense can make a difference. He also didn't point out that these sensitive boys and girls who share the attitudes of our boys and girls, do not live in a system that shares the same view of the world.

Nuclear education is routinely an exercise in unilateral disarmament. For whatever well meaning ideas are expressed for "balance," unless one understands the difference between the Soviet system and ours all the handwriting can accomplish is to weaken our national resolve.

If one believes that the Soviet leadership is like ours - people who merely wish to protect national interests why should we fear them? If Soviet leaders are reasonable as we are, why don't we demonstrate our good will with unilateral gestures to which they will receprocate?

Negotiation on nuclear weapons is taking the form of a "B" Hollywood film with Archie and friends finding soultions with Our Miss Brooks at Hollywood High School.

This scenario is absurdity is made even more ludicrous by the NEA assertion that teachers should be involved in discussing the dangers of nuclear war to their students.

Why don't they teach about the dangers of nuclear blackmail or the danger of a world dominated by the Red Bear? Why isn't historical perspective on the matter of weaponry mandated by school authorities.?


This latest fad is not like its predecessors. Moral naivete now masquerades as easily discovered truth. Presumably if one goes through this antinomian experience you come out singing the sweet hymns of peace and brotherhood without nuclear weapons.

But where is the rigor? What happened to the virtue of dispassionate discussion? And when will we tell our children what the real consequence of unilateral disarmament is?

I'm not particularly hopeful that good sense will prevail on this matter. But as an educator I am appalled by what is now called nuclear education. At the very least why don't these saviors call this exercise what it really is: nuclear handwringing. With the proper labeling we have some chance of knowing what's being bought.


