AARP Tax-Aide Counselors Training Course At CJC

The 1984 AARP Tax-Aide training course was set up by Walter Knowlden, Eastland County Coordinator and instructors who have been certified by the IRS. They are Paul Reynolds, North Texas Overall Coordinator and Harold Rummel, both from Dallas, Texas.

The counselors receiving certification to be tax-aid counselors were: Walter Knowlden, Sarah Taylor, Johnnie Jeffcoat, Louise Allison and Josephine Cleveland of Cisco, Jane Swift and Wynell Brown of Eastland, Irma Miller of Cross Plains, Sybil Offield and Minnie Hellinghausen of Breckenridge, Ruby Lee and Edward E. Sudath of Stamford and Charles Garrett of Gorman.

Tax-Aide is a free income tax counseling service for older persons sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons in cooperation with the IRS. The Tax-Aide service is designed to help older taxpayers understand the various tax forms and take advantage of special provisions in the tax laws for retirement income.

The primary purpose of tax-aid is to provide assistance to the community in the preparation of federal income tax returns during filing season. Tax-aid counseling will be available at the Cisco Senior Center on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays or call 442-2263 or 442-1715 for appointments. Tax counseling will be available in Eastland by calling the Eastland Senior Center, 629-1382 or 629-1484. In Cross Plains Tax-Aide counseling will be available at the Multi-Purpose Center or calling 725-7696. Charles Garrett will be counseling in Gorman at the Gorman Senior Center or by calling 734-2573.

Past experience has indicated that many older persons are unaware of special benefits they are entitled to claim. Some may not even be required to file a return because of their limited income. Persons should bring with them copies of their last tax returns and forms for the current tax year and other material showing income and expenses for the 1983 year to help counselors prepare their income tax.

As vegetable gardeners in Eastland County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled.

For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied

as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is not formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. Remove on square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an

average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.

One of the first vegetables to plant in the garden is onions. Several people have recently asked about varieties and availability of onion plants. I don't think the severe freeze in December hurt the onion transplants very much since they can stand temperatures well below freezing, but it may have reduced the supply in some areas.

Onion varieties are divided into three classes - yellow, white, and red or purple. The yellow varieties that do best here Excel, granex and Grano 502. Some people prefer the white onions. These include Eclipse, Majesty and White Grano. The red or purple varieties are Burgandy, Tropicana and Red Grano. The term green onion describes an immature onion. Even the large bulb onions such as

Grano or Granex can be harvested immature and used as green onions.

Fertilize soil by spreading 2-3 pound of a fertilizer such as 13-13-13 over 100 square-foot area. Measure and spread the fertilizer, then mix it with the top 3-4 inches of soil.

When purchasing onions you may buy sets which are small bulbs with no top. Or you may purchase transplants. You can also plant seed, but this has to be done in the fall.

If you use sets or transplants, plant them 3 inches deep and 3 inches apart. Do not transplant onions more than 1 inch deep.

After they are planted water once each week. But you may need to water more often during dry, windy weather. Water slowly and deeply to help grow strong, healthy roots.

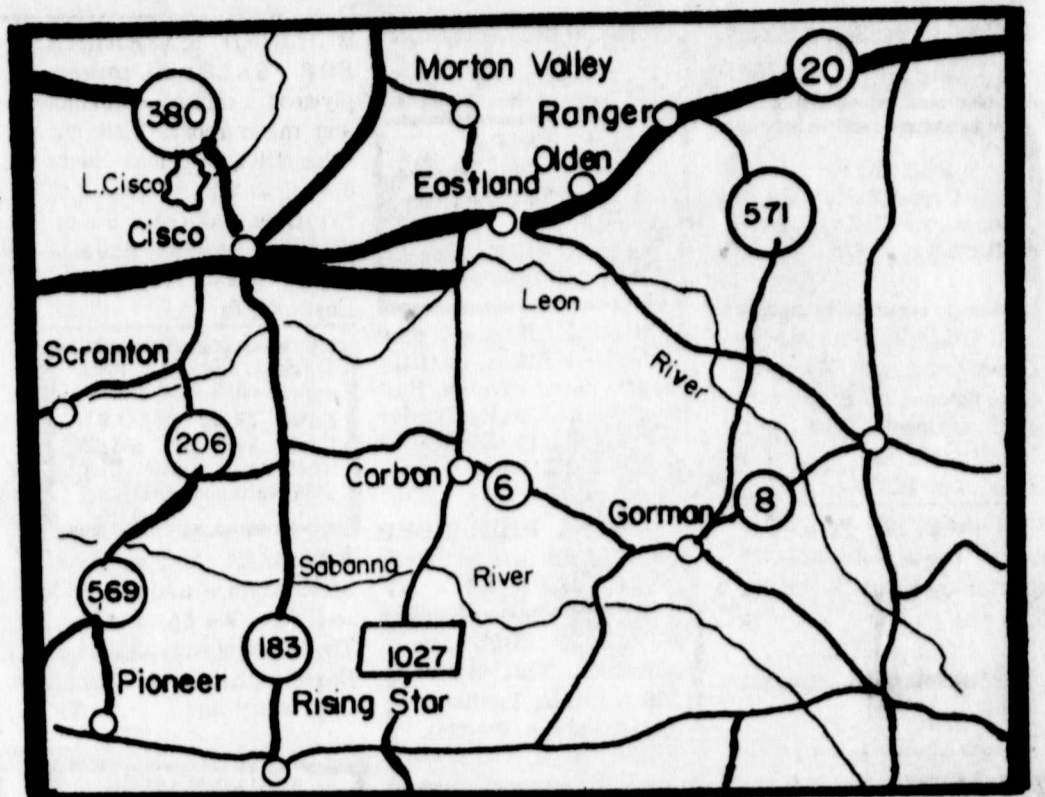

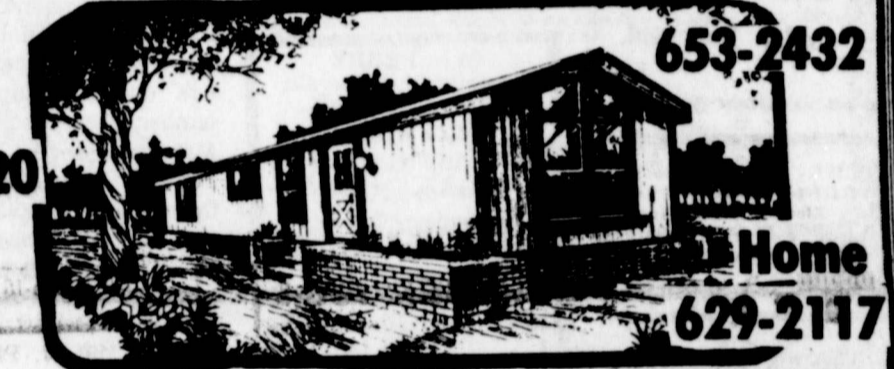

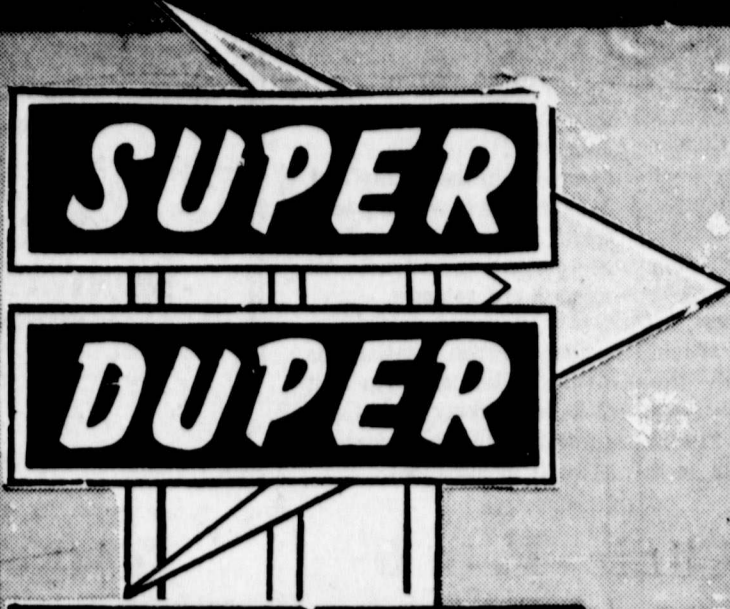
Also, Belle members have to pass 10 hours with 15 grade points to be eligible for a scholarship.

Homemaking Hints

Spring is just around the corner which means new styles, colors, and fabrics in women's fashions. What's new for this spring-summer 1984?

As the styles become more simplified, fabric becomes the dominant force offering natural qualities and comfort. The number one fabric is linen in every weight and blend, such as voile, handkerchief linen for tops and dresses and Sportweave yard dyed stripes, checks and tweeds for separates.

What are the popular fashion colors this coming

season? The Olympic year and election year bring red, white and blue into color prominence. The movement is away from last season's intense darks and pastels into a very strong neutral base. Grey is the key new neutral for the season. The strongest darks are indigo, navy, kahki, olive, graphite grey and black. These darks will be accented with hot brights such as lime, orange, yellow and desert rose. The peach and coral tones are taking over the pinks of last year. The new color combination for sportswear is brown and white.

We will see many prints in our spring fashion fabrics. A definite print revival emerges with exotic imagery: African tribal motifs, tie-dyes, authentic camouflage, cargo and military code prints, animal skin prints, jungle and aztec prints, ikats, batik, florals, Japanese kasuri patterns, and madras in mixes of exotic darks and bright florals. Also-focus on the 60's pop art and irregular geometrics, stripes, honeycomb patterns, paint splashed abstracts, stencils, dots, tattersals, calico and patchwork, and checks.

The silhouettes for spring-summer 1984 are simply elegant, primitives, utilitarian, and the olympics.

SIMPLY ELEGANT: For the career market a return to the simplicity of style and the exactness of detail. More masculine in flavor than the Japanese concept, these oversized, simple, square cut pieces have an architectural flavor and softness of design. Some examples we will see in the apparel market are: coats, dresses with dropped waists, cropped boxy tops, pull-on dirndles, collarless shirts, and a return of back interest such as v-necks are the focal point for day and evening, pleating detail, and wedge shapes.

PRIMITIVES: This seasons number one fashion story. Ample, layered, wrapped shapes, with a poor worn look, or a festive island resort. At its extreme it is the essence of the Japanese design influence. Look for smock shapes, long full dirndle skirts, wide cropped tops, long unconstructed cardigan jackets, oversized T and tank tops, pinafore dresses, back emphasis, sweater handknit in leather and torn cotton strips, patches, lacings, drawstrings.

UTILITARIAN: A workwear inspired story with military overtones. Strongest is the Safari look utilizing all the fine quality cotton basics of this season's broad spectrum of neutral colors. This story also takes the form of more commercial presentations of updated weekend wear: military uniform dressing, oriental workers uniforms, and mechanics gear. Look for Safari jackets and pants, overalls, parachute jumpsuits, painters shorts, exposed zippers, multipockets, self-fabric loops, rubber trims, metal fasteners, etc.

THE OLYMPICS: From active to spectator sportswear the olympic mood changes traditional track and gym gear into cuffed sportswear and weekend wear. Body Revealing slim to oversized and comfortable, this fashion mood will bring the ease and sensibility of active sport fabrics into everyone's wardrobe.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK: Need something quick for supper? Then you can't go wrong with this old-time favorite...Texas Hash. Just add a salad and you will have a good, nutritious meal.

TEXAS HASH
2 green peppers, sliced
2 large onions, sliced
3 tablespoons shortening
1 pound hamburger
2 cups tomatoes
1 cup cooked rice
1 tsp. each chili powder, salt and dash of pepper

For many, many years the home gardener's hands were tied as to how the apply fertilizer or insecticide to his lawn. The home gardener could rent, borrow, or buy a spreader from the local nursery where the combination of the granule fertilizer and insecticide for the lawn had been purchased by an adjustment on the discharge. After the application, the fertilizer/insecticide had to depend on Mother Nature for rain or had to be watered in order to convert the granule to a liquid form. Then came along the hose-on sprayer that could be used for applying fertilizer and insecticide to the lawn. This application was in a liquid form and was very slow and could be very messy. There were times that sections of the lawn were missed by this method and there was no assurance of an even application.

Now we have a new motorized applicator that insures an even application in a liquid form. When I refer to motorized the "Spreader King" is operated on electricity from a re-chargeable battery. The "Spreader King" is mounted on wheels for easy rolling over the lawn. There is a one gallon plastic reservoir to hold the product being applied. There is an easy finger tip control rod. The "Spreader King" applies a four foot wide spray pattern. You simply push the unit over your lawn as you would a lawn mower being careful not to overlap the same as you do when mowing. You must keep walking for a uniform application. After

using the "Spreader King" a simple flush with clear water cleans the spreader. The "Spreader King" is made of durable plastic and will not rust out as the other type of spreader discussed in this article. The battery should be re-charged after using by simply plugging the charger into an electric outlet for twenty-four hours. We have a spreader here that does not have to depend on Mother Nature to provide rain or for the gardener to have water in the fertilizer in order to convert it to a liquid form. The "Spreader King" has already done this by applying the product in a liquid form. We have needed a spreader like the "Spreader King" for many years. Now that it is AVAILABLE WE SHOULD HAVE HEALTHIER GREENER LAWNS. If you would like more information about the "Spreader King" write to "The Garden Editor" c/o this newspaper. 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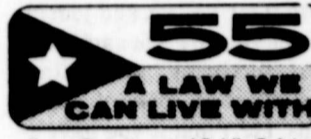

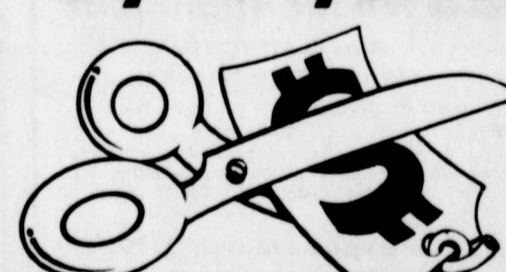

Better Check Tax Office

You may be registered to vote even though you didn't get a voter registration card.

That's the word from Eastland County Tax-Assessor Collector Nancy Trout, who further reports that the tax office is presently "super busy" what with tax deadline and voter registration.

Voter cards were mailed out recently and apparently the Secretary of State's office which furnishes the data had a computer foul-up because they mailed the local office both an alphabetical and numerical list of cards—but they weren't both integrated with each other.

So if you did not receive a voter registration card this

year from the county tax office, you might want to check in person or by phone with the office. You probably are registered and you're name won't be struck from the role unless your card was returned by the Postal Service because of address changes, etc.

Collector Trout reports that there are many new registrations this year, as many from 200 to 300, not all first-time voters either, indicating that there is larger than usual interest in the political races developing, including the presidential election year.

And once you get a voter registration card, keep it and plan to vote with it; do not return it to the tax office.

Nursing Center Upgrading Facilities, Lions Are Told

An improvement program to upgrade facilities and equipment will increase the resident capacity of the Cisco Nursing Center from the present 75 to 92, Administrator Ruth Brewster told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

The nursing center was acquired some six months ago by the Holiday Management Company of Salem, Oregon, and the improvement program was started in late 1983. Mrs. Brewster joined the center as administrator last September.

The nursing center, which operates with an average of

over 70 residents, has 53 employees, who represent one of the community's largest payrolls, Mrs. Brewster reported.

A native of Drumwright, Okla., Mrs. Brewster has been in nursing home work since 1970 and has been an administrator for 11 years, working in that capacity at Victoria, Gonzales and San Antonio before coming to Cisco. She lived with her late husband in Beaumont and southern Louisiana for many years. She is the mother of a son, David Brewster, of Dallas and a daughter, Linda Emadi of San Antonio. She has two grandchildren. She is a graduate of Lamar University and is a Baptist.

The center's improvement program will be completed in a few weeks, Mrs. Brewster said. The center is inspected every three to six months by a state agency that controls such institutions over the state.

Mrs. Brewster said that the center has a dietary department that seeks to meet the needs of 75 different people three times a day. Food is often prescribed by doctors and, in case where menus are not prescribed, the center considers the health status and welfare of each resident, she

added. A housekeeping department looks after cleanliness in all areas and rooms, handles laundry and performs assorted chores with

the well being of residents in mind, she said.

An activity director has a variety of duties. She looks after social needs of residents, organizes ac-

tivities, arranges regular church services and the like.

"Our residents are interested in community activities and are always grateful for visitors," Mrs. Brewster said. "Visitors help us maintain an active interest in everything around us. The center offers opportunities for people and organizations to get involved."

Mrs. Brewster said that rates charged by the center vary from \$25 to \$36 per day, depending on needs and facilities desired. This includes food, some drugs, and nursing care.

Lion Jerry McBeth, who arranged the program, introduced Mrs. Brewster. Nova George, director of nursing at the center, was a guest.

Secretary Jasper Cook reported that plans for the Lions Talent Show were discussed at a meeting of the club's activities committee last Thursday night. The show will be held in April. Details will be announced soon.

Mrs. Brewster reported that a recent survey showed that 51 per cent of Eastland County's some 20,000 residents were 65 years or

older. National statistics show that 1.9 per cent of people over age 65 are in nursing center, she added. This state's record about 1.4 per cent.

Amtrak Test Train Through Cisco Friday

With all the excitement of Amtrak's test run through the county Friday, and the possibility of re-establishment of passenger rail service through here, many have been thinking about railroad history.

Well, it's a centennial event almost, because it was just over a hundred years

ago that Eastland saw its first train.

According to an Eastland Chronicle, Jan. 25, 1918, article from the Archives of Eastland Centennial Memorial Library.

"Daugherty, Connelley and Ammerman offered the Texas and Pacific Railroad, which was building, one-fourth of the lots in Eastland if they would built through the town, AND IN OCTOBER, 1880, THE FIRST ENGINE ROLLED INTO EASTLAND, which remained the terminus of the T&P for several months."

Rail business was big business in the founding and development of Eastland over the years, but declined, as passenger service ceased.

Historical Markers Are Set At Co. Homes

Eastland County's present revival of oil and gas recovery operations calls to mind the area's first boom, and a newly designated historical marker further helps record that era permanently.

The 1919 oil boom house located at 1201 S. Seaman St., home for the past 23 years of Mr. and Mrs. H.V. O'Brien and family, has been designated an official historical site by the Texas Historical Commission.

The marker titled "Prairie Oil and Gas Company Housing" cites three homes built by the company in 1919 for their officials. The three sites are 1201, 1109 (the home of Retired Judge Earl Conner Jr.) and the lot in between these two, from which one of the original homes has been moved.

The three homes had very similar floor plans and had two-story garages with servants quarters above. The front of the home at 1201 has not been basically changed and appears today much as it originally did.

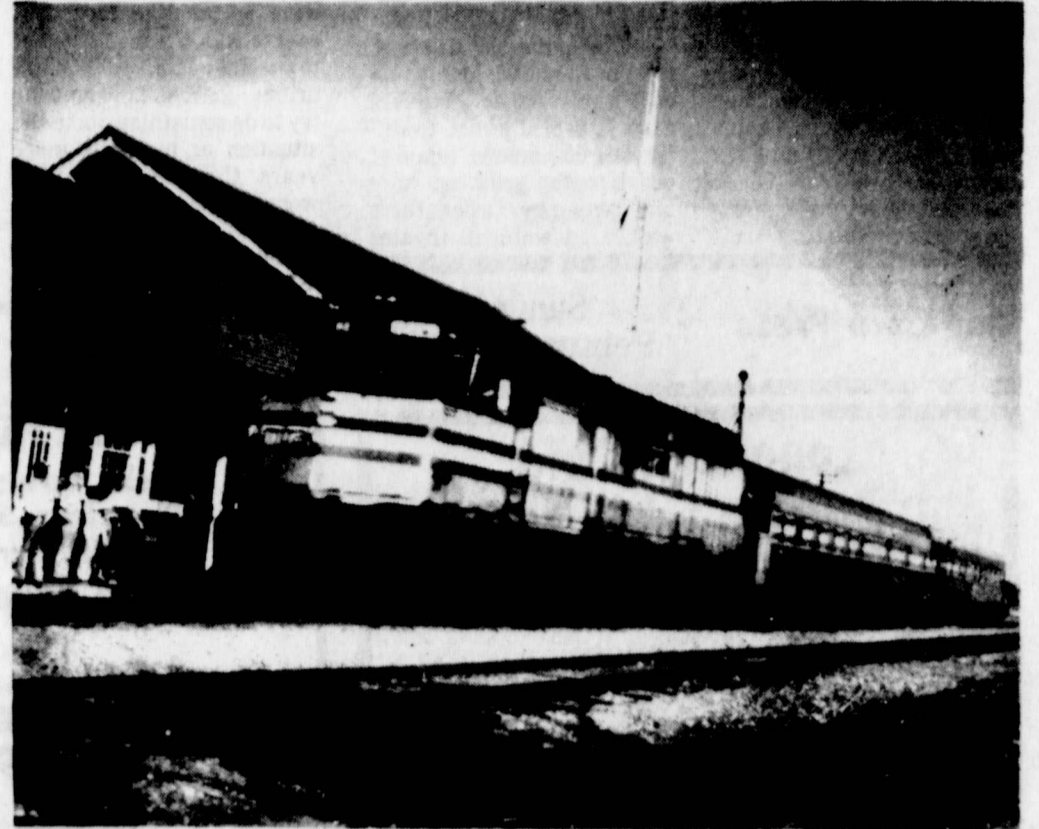
This marker is the 23rd to be awarded to Eastland County historical sites and the second home so designated.

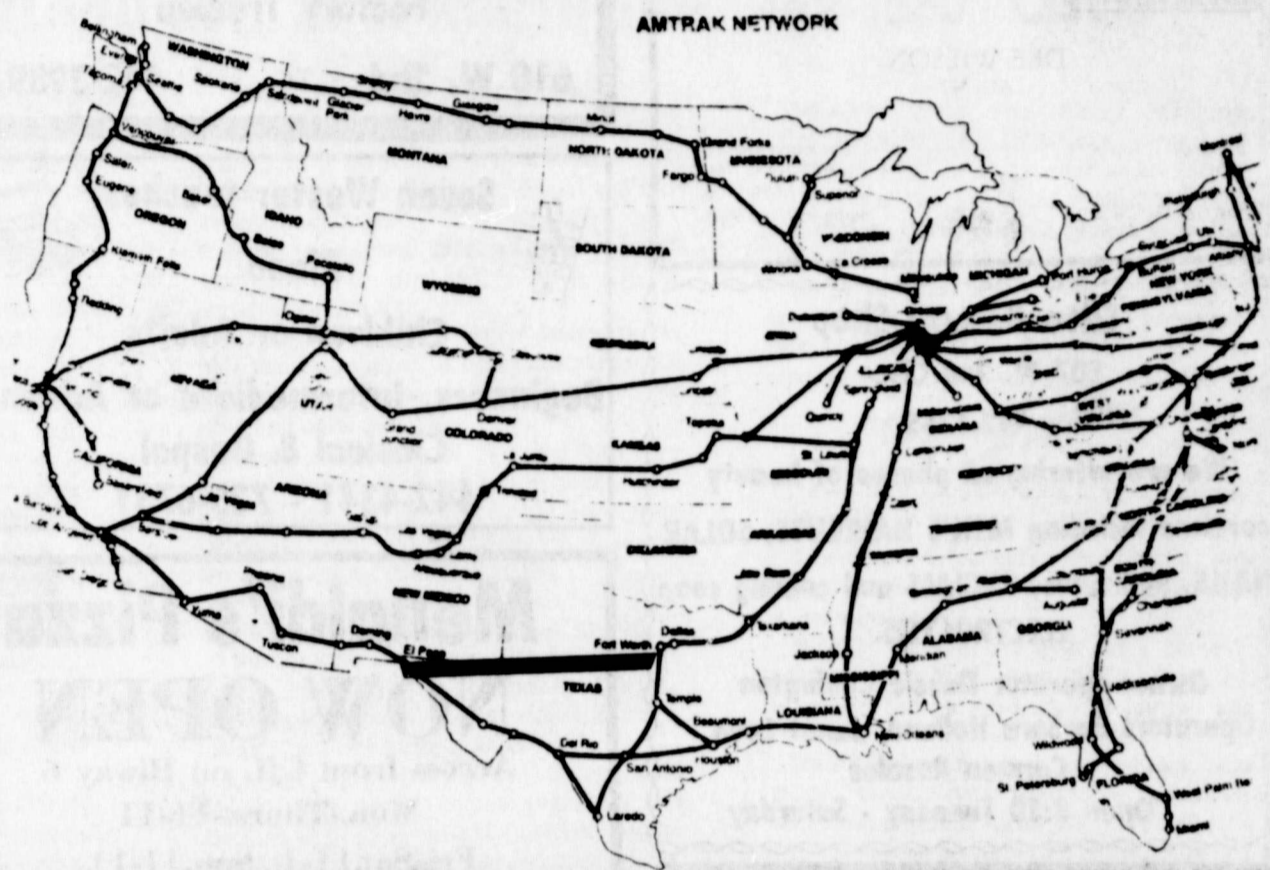


Train in front of Ranger Depot

Morrison Energy Inc. of Abilene has filed first production figures on two new gas wells in the Marsan (Conglomerate) Field. Location is in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's A.C. It would please my vanity immensely to say I read Sunday's paper, but I didn't. I hit more headlines than usual, and I read more first and last paragraphs, but I left an awful lot of type unprocessed by my eyes.

We get a daily paper, and I expect both of us read as much of it as most daily-paper-takers do. I expect we'd even say we consider ourselves generally informed, or misinformed, depending on how you view the accuracy of reporting.

Let's see. Bell Helicopter plans to establish a Canadian industry with subsidies "from the governments of Canada and Quebec." According to my fifth grade geography, Quebec is part of Canada. Have I missed something? I think it's the one that wants(?) independence because most of its people speak/are French, but did I miss a change? I know Europe and Africa are scrambled eggs on place names, but I have depended a lot on the United States,

Canada and Mexico.

The article on "silver bulls" has nothing to do with livestock—notwithstanding the pages devoted to the stock show and rodeo. The message is that investing in silver for polishing is still okay but there's little profit to be made in the silver trade now.

So far, three Democrats and four Republicans have announced as candidates for the 6th Congressional District held by Phil Gramm. This brings to mind that I'm as much against the waste of money on elections as I am against the waste of foreign aid. I wouldn't let anyone file (or announce) until six weeks before the election—a "leak" would automatically disqualify. This hardly scratches the surface of Sunday's news bundle. Efforts to change a neighborhood's image, a "down payment" on government deficit spending, an entire section devoted to real estate, an article on

biotechnology—you may be pleased to note the U.S. has the world edge on biotechnology. It is debatable how pleased you are to know that "the market for biotechnology products, which are typically created by genetically altering certain life forms," is growing

by the same 25% the robotic industry in Japan is averaging. Does "genetically altering" scare you? I can generate a couple or so worries on that.

All these topics, and there're still more: on Lucas' sanity, on the wonderful world of com-

puters, and on a scandal in West Germany. I haven't checked the fashion front, the sports section—what's the current status of the Cowboys?—haven't mentioned the funny papers, nor the magazine, nor the classified ads—oh wow!

I guess the best I can claim is that I have a general knowledge of a goodly number of news items and a terrible suspicion of how much I don't know.

Dear Customer: The City of Cisco during the month of December, 1983, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity.

The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.
