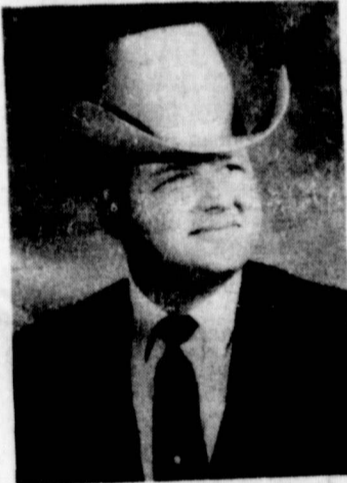

He will be at the Ranger Times office to tell of his race in the Democratic Primary for the U.S. Senate spot to be vacated by incumbent Republican John Tower.

Hance gained national recognition when, as a Democrat, he sponsored Republican President Ronald Reagan's tax-cut

legislation in the House of Representatives. That caused some concern, naturally, among Democratic party loyalists.

"I'm proud to be a Democrat," Hance said. "But, I'm also a conservative Democrat. When I think the President is right,

In the same breath, Hance said, "We're going to win this race. And I'm going to be the next United States Senator from Texas."

Several Election Contests Develop For County Posts

Several contests will be settled by the voters of Eastland County in the May 5th primary election as two or more candidates had filed for two county commissioners' places, the sheriff's office and three constable posts as the deadline passed Monday, Feb. 6.

Four other offices had uncontested candidates as no opponents filed for ballot places.

In the sheriff's race, incumbent Johnnie Morren is being opposed for re-election by Don Underwood of Eastland and Albert C. Biggs of Eastland. Mr. Morren is serving his first elective term, having been appointed to the office to fill a vacancy. Mr. Underwood, a former Nolan County sheriff and Eastland police chief, was the first to announce for the office. Mr. Biggs is a deputy sheriff serving under Mr. Morren.

In the Eastland precinct (1) county commissioners' race are incumbent Richard A. Robinson and Danny Woods, a former commissioner from that precinct. Both live in Eastland.

Incumbent L.T. Owen of Rising Star is being opposed by Aubrey G. Lawrence, Rising Star farmer, for the Precinct 3 commissioners' office.

In Precinct 1, incumbent Constable Wm. A. (Bill) Hunter of Eastland is opposed by Edgar Squiers, Jr., a farm implement dealer in Eastland.

The Precinct 2 constable's job is being sought by Jesse Brown of Ranger, who was appointed to serve an unexpired term, and Alford Bush,

If a second primary is needed, it will be held on June 2nd.

Mexico Missionary Will Speak At FEMC Revival

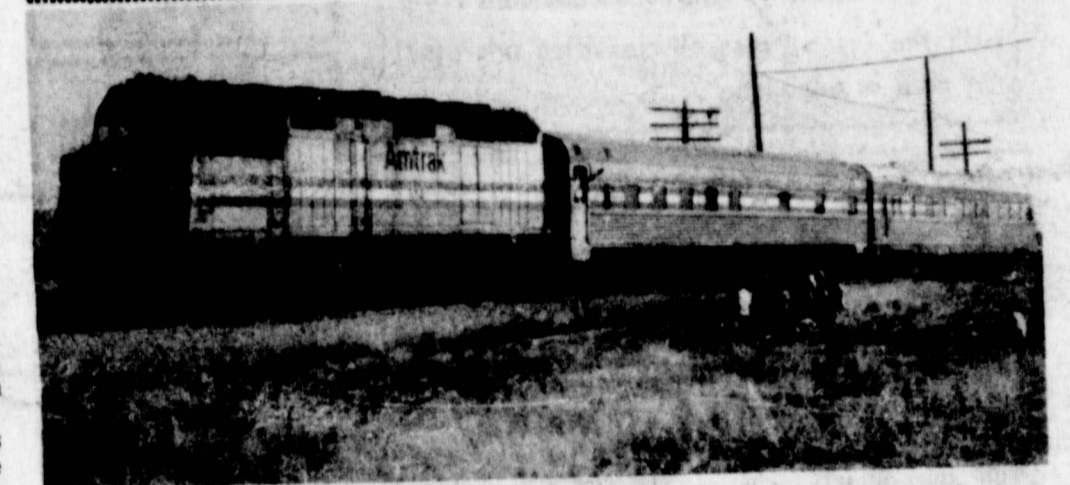

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Is It Cold Or Flu?

HOUSTON - For the past three days, "Frank" has been suffering from a runny nose and a scratchy throat. "Carol" isn't feeling quite up to par either. She woke up feeling sick with a fever and headache.

Which person has a cold and which person has the flu? Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine's Influenza Research Center say Frank has a cold because symptoms occur in the upper respiratory tract causing a runny or stuffy nose, a sore throat and hoarseness.

Carol has the flu, which has prominent symptoms like weakness, muscle pain, chills and headaches. A dry, hacking cough, sore eyes, flushed face and hot, moist skin will also appear more often in flu victims than cold sufferers.

"A cold will build slowly and will rarely result in a

fever, except in children," Paul Glezen, M.D., a flu researcher at Baylor said. "the flu, on the other hand, begins with a fever and hits quickly to cause serious discomfort."

So far, there is no cure for either a cold or the flu, but researchers at Baylor are testing an anti-viral medication called ribavirin. Preliminary test have shown that giving the drug in aerosol form is an effective treatment for both types of flu viruses.

Baylor researchers are also testing interferon as a possible remedy for the common cold. Interferon is a body chemical that activates the immune system to resist diseases.

Neither treatment is currently approved for use by the public, but prescription drug amantidine can be used to treat influenza A virus in-

fection.

"If the medicine is started within 48 hours after onset of the flu symptoms, it will shorten the course of your discomfort," Glezen said.

He warns that penicillin and other antibiotics won't work against viruses, but a flu vaccine can help prevent the illness. Illness should receive the new flu vaccine which is available this year," Glezen said. "It can provide protection against infections caused by flu viruses called A/Brazil, A/Bangkok, B/Singapore and A/Philippines, which may cause a moderate flu outbreak this winter."

Over-the-counter drugs may give temporary relief for flu and cold symptoms. An antihistamine can help control a runny nose and decongestant can loosen up a stuffy nose, while a cough may be relieved by a suppressant. Glezen says a dry cough may need an expectorant to loosen lung fluids.

Adults can get rid of a headache and the muscle pains that accompany the flu with aspirin. But children with the flu should take an aspirin substitute because aspirin appears to be related to the development of Reye's Syndrome, a serious viral disease that can follow a

case of the flu.

The best advice for getting rid of either ailment is to stay home, drink lots of water and juices, and get plenty of rest. If the cold stays with you longer than 10 days and the flu doesn't clear up within a couple of weeks, see a doctor. Any fever that lasts longer than three days is a cause for concern and a physician should be notified immediately.

Dr. Willis Critically Ill In Colorado

Dr. Leland Willis, former Cisco Junior College President, is reported as being critically ill in a hospital in Colorado.

Willis came to CJC in 1957 as a Basketball Coach, and served in that capacity and as a Dean until he was named President in 1965.

During his years as Athletic Director the Wranglers played outstanding games. During 1964-65 the team ranked No. 3 in the nation, and played in the national Junior College finals. A number of te players went on to be professionals.

In 1974 Dr. Willis left Cisco Junior College, and Dr. Norman Wallace became President.

Dr. Willis and his wife, Rita, have been living in Pueblo, Colorado. He had surgery for cancer about one year ago, and has since been in ill health.

The Willis have a son, Ronnie, who is in the armed services, and a daughter who is married and living in Colorado.

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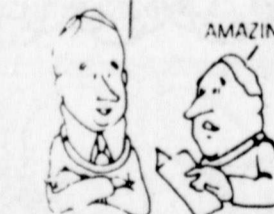
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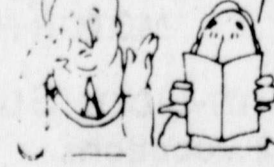
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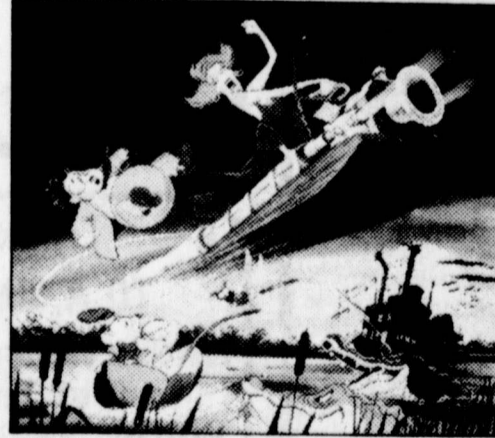
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County News Briefs

Angus Assoc. To Meet Mon.

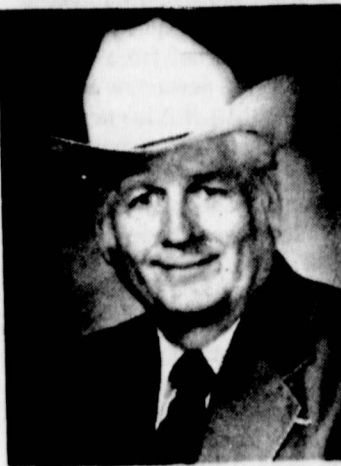

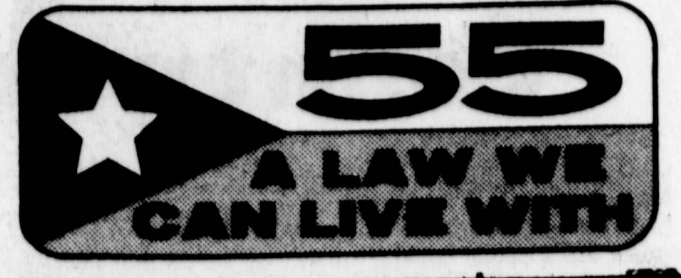

Building Project Underway At Kendrick's Park

Stacks of prefabricated concrete wall sections which have been unloaded from large tractor-trailer trucks now adorn the grounds at the Kendrick Religious Park between Eastland and Cisco, and according to Phil Kendrick, more are on the way.

The precast wall sections which happen to match the wall panels of the Religious Diorama and the reunion facilities now at the park, are to be used to construct three new buildings at the

park.

The first building to rise is to be the Family Room, a lounge area of about 32 ft. by 60 ft. to be used by the family reunions meeting at the park.

Next a cafeteria building, which will double as an identification symbol for the park is to be built.

The cafeteria with its roof visible from the highway, will be located in the foreground of the park where the concession stand

is presently located, and will be built in the shape of the "Star of Bethlehem", which is a star shaped like a cross.

With the appearance of the "star" with its tail pointed toward the highway, the roof will be higher in elevation away from the highway to make it more visible to highway travelers.

To be used by family reunions and during the

religious pageants, the cafeteria will also be available for banquets and other events.

The final building in this project is to be a large, about 60 ft. by 105 ft., auditorium to be built on the back of and behind the Religious Diorama building, so that the lobby can serve the new building as well as the existing one.

Concerts and drama performances of a religious nature or where a Christian atmosphere will prevail are planned for the auditorium, and groups are to be brought in for some of the performances.

Sleeping facilities for the reunions will be enlarged to accommodate the hundred people when the Family Room is added onto the back of the west end of the present building, adjoining the present reunion facilities.

The summer reunion

schedule is already booked except for one weekend each in the months of July, August and September.

Reunions may prepare their own meals or have them catered by the Kendricks, who have also made their private swimming pool available to the groups.

A miniature golf course, to be built with greens in the shape of Christian symbols and placed under shade trees is also projected for completion this summer.

But before all of this can become a reality and an asset to the area, the precast wall sections, each weighting in the area of six thousand pounds and to have an upper row of smoked glass windows and a lower row of louvered windows must be purchased, hauled to the park, then erected.

An opportunity was presented to the Kendricks which was just too good to be

turned down even though money to finance the project is a problem.

A company had built the precast wall sections for a building that was under construction in Dallas at a cost of \$600,000. The design of the building was changed and the sections became surplus.

The company had the Kendrick Park on their list of non-profit organizations that they had done business with as they had rented the Kendrick's camel for a birthday party just after they received a multi-million dollar deal with an Arab nation.

Sugar, the camel, had impressed the companies 3000 employees with her ability to consume an enormous amount of cake and soda pop.

After being contacted by the company which offered the \$600,000 in building materials to the Kendrick Park for only \$5,000, Phil

Kendrick told them that they couldn't pass the offer up and that they would raise the money somehow.

The park has already received \$2000 of the needed money in donations, but \$3000 more is needed.

Donations of any size, which are tax deductible, are welcomed, and anyone wishing to can purchase a wall section for \$50 for one of the buildings. Donations may be made to the Kendrick Religious Pageant, Route 2, Box 46, Cisco, and listed for building materials.

With the donated help of Bill and Phil Harrison's H.T.H. Trucking, R.H. (Hank) Smith's East Tex. Pipe Sales, and J.J. Finley's Construction Co., half of the wall sections have been hauled to the park. Four more loads are yet to be transported.

Also helping were H.T.H. Trucking drivers Sam Proff and Bob Weseman, East Tex. Pipe Sales drivers Ken Baker, Richard Conn, and Roger Stephenson, and J.J. Finley Construction driver Jodi Finley.

In Calf Scramble February 26

Cheri Ann Broyles, a 15-year-old 4-H member from Cisco, Texas, will participate in the 1984 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble on February 26 in the Astrodome. The calf scramble is an exciting part of the rodeo action starring The Oak Ridge Boys as part of that matinee's performance.

Cheri, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Broyles, will compete for one of the 200 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the 1984 Rodeo.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the Southwest's premier charity event, with all net proceeds directly benefiting youth and education. The calf scramble is just one of the many programs aiding young people. The Show is the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships.

The calf scramble is a "year-long" event that begins with athletic competition in the Astrodome and ends with qualitative competition in the show ring.

It involves the turning loose of two dozen or so energetic youngsters and half as many wild, young calves in one arena. Those who manage to grab a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line are provided with a \$600 calf purchase certificate. The certificate

donated by a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a pure-bred, registered beef or dairy heifer.

The calf is raised by the winner for a special show ring competition to be held at next year's show. In accordance with the general rules of the livestock show and the scramble program, each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent. Controlled learning experiences include proper livestock evaluation techniques, efficient cattle feeding and production methods, principles of economics and money management.

The calf scramble program typifies the purposes and goals of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Through the program, participants gain invaluable experience that many times serves to stimulate a career in agriculture.

Post Office Says Address Items Properly

If you want your valentines to be delivered on target and on time, you can help the Postal Service by addressing them properly, Postmaster Wiley Cox of the Cisco Post Office said today.

"A return address should be the first address a person puts on an envelope," he said. "If there is a delivery problem, it will allow us to return the letter, card or parcel to the sender."

Both the return address and mailing address should contain complete address information. This includes all of the following elements that apply:

Full name of recipient; apartment mailbox number or apartment number; rural route number and box number; street name and number or post office box number; city, state and - very important - zip code.

Postmaster Cox also urged use of: legible handwriting, a ball point pen (felt tips smudge easily) and correct postage (oversized cards require extra postage).

"Proper addressing is especially important around holidays such as Valentine's Day, when many people do not use their return address in order to momentarily surprise the recipient. But when the card or letter is undeliverable, the one who is surprised is the sender when he or she discovers it was not received. Use a little care, and we'll get it there."

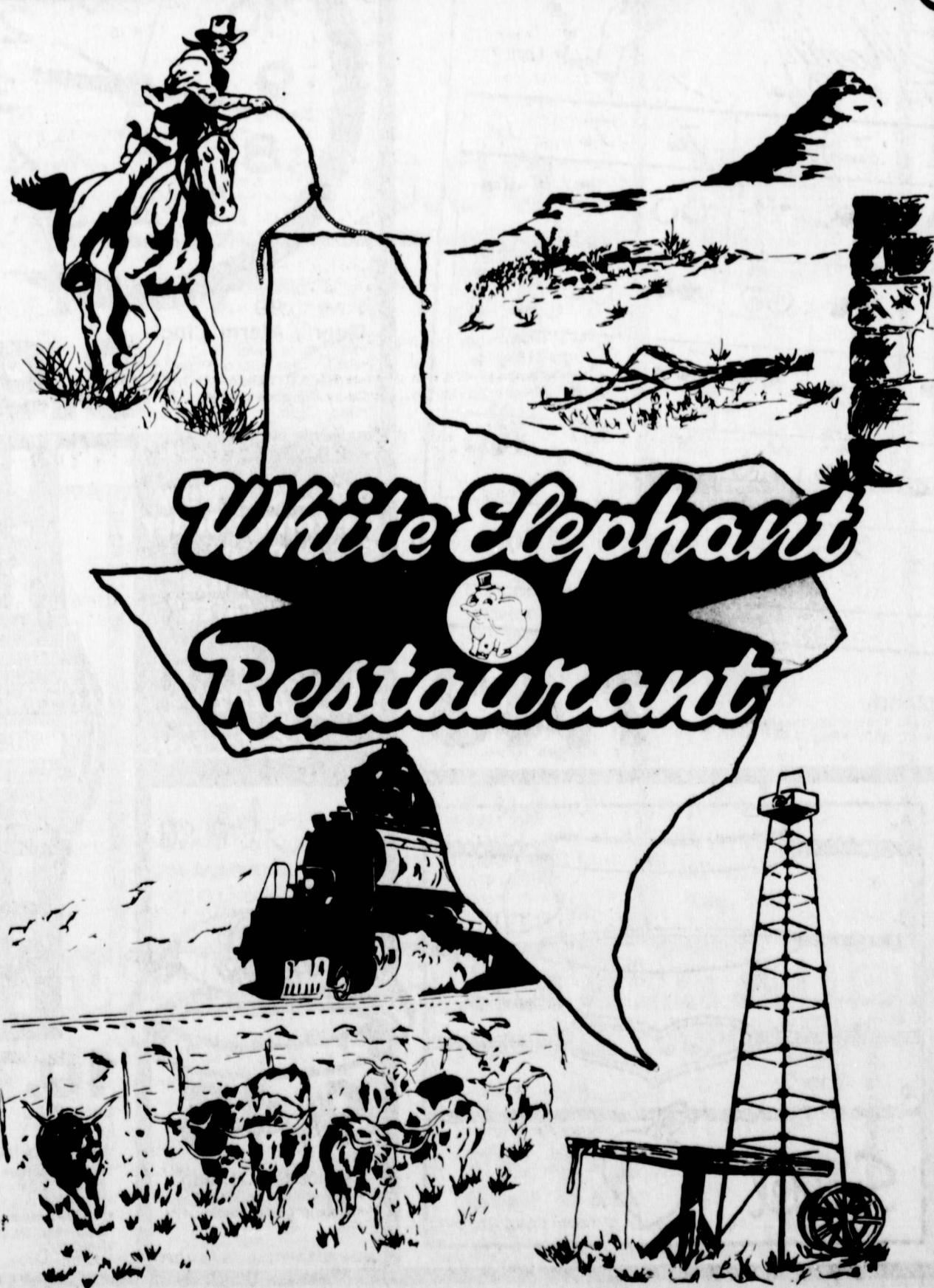

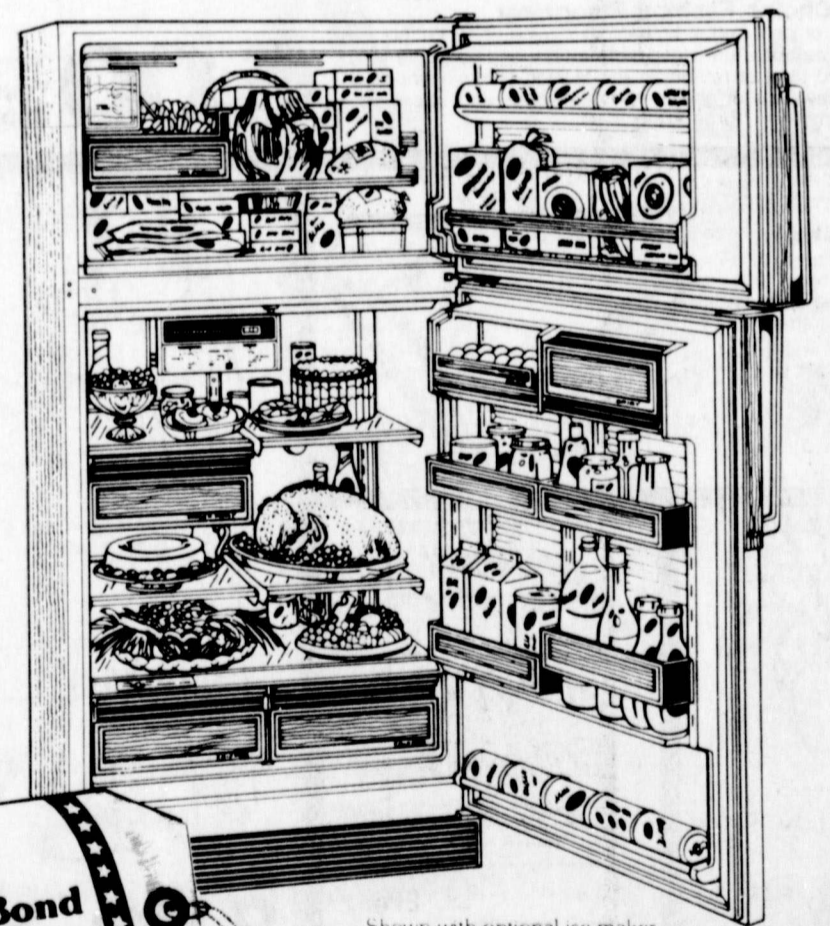

Drilling Bits

First production figures have been posted for a new producer in Palo Pinto's Regular Field two miles southwest of Graford.

Sweetwater Drilling Company's No. 1 Smith-Hinkson flowed at the rate of 171,000 CF gas daily on a 5/16 choke. It was given a 188,000-CFD rating on open flow.

Located in a 157-acre lease, it went to total depth of 4,386 feet and was plugged back to 3,950. It will produce from a set of perforations 2,735 to 2,910 feet into the wellbore.

Chester R. Upham Jr. of Mineral Wells has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 W.D. Parks in the Mineral Wells Field three miles east of the town of Brazos. The well is scheduled for total depth of 2,500 feet and is situated in a 320-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's Levi Currant Survey.

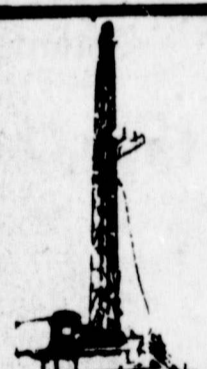

Natural Disaster Assistance Plans Underway

A letter has been received by Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey from the office of the Governor, stating the Governor White's request of U.S.D.A. Disaster assistance to the farmers and ranchers of Eastland County has been granted.

The letter from Austin was signed by Robert A. Lansford, State Coordinator of the Division of Emergency Management. It was attached to a communication from Agriculture Secretary

John Block to Governor White.

Signed by Richard E. Lyng, acting Secretary of Agriculture, the U.S.D.A. letter said that the natural disasters in 25 counties listed by Governor White included

drought, an early freeze, hail storms, a tornado, and excessively heavy rains.

The U.S.D.A. decided that production losses in 23 of these counties are sufficient to warrant a Secretarial Natural Disaster determination.

Of these, 17 counties are named due to losses sustain-

ed by drought, beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through Nov. 30, 1983. These are Comanche, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Fisher, Foard, Hockley, Jones, Kent, Menard, Mills, Motley, Potter, San Saba, Scurry, Swisher and Tom Green.

The FmHA Administrator would immediately make EM Loan Assistance available to eligible farmers in the 23 counties designated as Natural Disaster areas. David Martin of the ASCS office in Eastland added that any Eastland County farmers and ranchers may call him at 629-1636 to see if they qualify for assistance.

Cancer Society Views Film

An interesting and informative film entitled "My Friend Has Leukemia" was shown to the twenty-two people present at the February meeting of the Eastland County unit of the American Cancer Society.

The children in the film production were sometimes serious and at times humorous as they told about their experiences and feelings as they went through treatment in an effort to recover from the deadly disease.

Leukemia, a non-contagious disease, is cancer of the blood. Abnormal cells develop in the blood that destroy normal blood cells.

The film showed tests and treatments used and the more common side effects.

It was announced that some hospital type equipment had been donated to the unit to be made available to local patients, and that Mary Ann Underwood had planned a Dance-a-thon to be held in Rising Star on Saturday, March 17, to raise funds for the Cancer Society. It was stated that county-wide participation by the young people was hoped for.

The City of Cisco during the month of December, 1983, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).
The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.
However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.
The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.
The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.
