Construction work on the City of Cisco's multi-million dollar water and sewage improvement program is making

good progress, according to a report by City Manager Mike Moore. Concrete work on the 100,000 gallon clear well that will be part of the new filtration plant at Lake Cisco is near completion, Mr. Moore said. Workmen will be starting on the filters in the coming week, he added.

The Ben Sira Company of Dallas is the contractor for the filter system and improvements at Lake Cisco. Work began last November and is due to be completed about Oct. 1, 1984.

The Joe Fambro Company of Stephenville began ditching and laying 12-inch pipe at College Hill last Monday and work will continue south to the water tower in South Cisco, Mr. Moore said. Work is due to be finished on this project in mid-April.

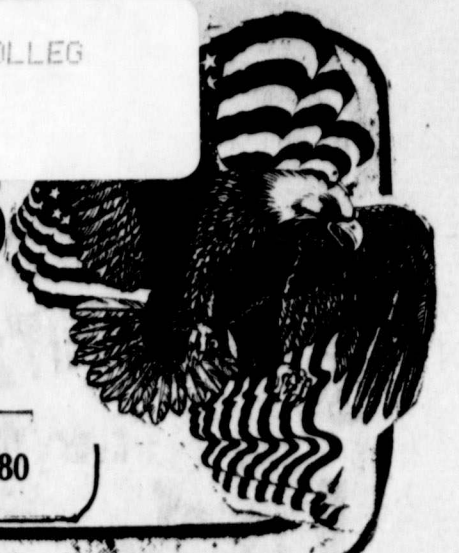

and fitness. That's why it's important for all members of a family to know something about nutrition. America's greatest nutrition problem - overweight and obesity - affects all age groups. Approximately 30 percent of adults and teenagers weigh in at 20 percent more than they should, which is the clinical definition of obesity.

There is no one cause for obesity or overweight. But experts do seem to agree that to lose weight we have to adjust our eating and exercise habits. For most of us, that may mean adjusting the family's lifestyle as well.

According to Extension foods and nutrition specialists at Texas A&M University, here are some of the ways parents affect their children's weight:

"Genetic factors do, of course, have something to do with obesity and overweight. Two obese parent and child weights is partly due to genetic factors. Other factors, such as family eating patterns and child's level of activity may have as much or more to do with his

weight. "Because food habits are established in the early years, parents' pattern of making poor food choices or overeating can lead to a lifetime of obesity for the child. "Some researchers maintain that obesity is related to the number and size of fat cells. Before the age of two and during the adolescent growth spurt are the two critical times for fat cell growth. Overfeeding at these critical times may cause an increase in the number of fat cells and make later weight loss very difficult.

"Parents who encourage their children to engage in physical activities or participate in those activities with their children, are helping them learn weight control and maintenance habits.

Some children spend hours with television or game machines, and are driven most places instead of walking or riding a bicycle. These children are already headed for a sedentary lifestyle. Parents who allow this to happen could be encouraging habits that lead to weight problems later in life.

But it's not just parents who determine the family's nutrition and fitness level. Children and teenagers also have a very strong influence.

For example, children often ask their parents to purchase sugar-sweetened cereals, chips, soda and other "junk food", or eat frequently at fast food restaurants. Active children may not gain weight from eating some high-calorie food, but the extra calories can cause problems for their less active parents.

More teenagers are doing the family grocery shopping and cooking, which means they're making nutrition decisions for the whole family. According to a national survey conducted by Yankelovich, Skelly and White, Inc. for Seventeen magazine, teenage daughters have a strong influence when it comes to food purchases.

Eighty percent of the mothers surveyed, for example, reported that the household had a certain breakfast cereal because the teenage daughter had either purchased it on her own, or because the mother had decided to buy it after the daughter had provided "opinions and information" to her. The survey also showed that daughters influence and brands bought by their mothers.

Children and teenagers can also have an impact on the fitness levels of their families by involving their parents in sports and other physical activities. Many parents, for example, first became involved in jogging or aerobic dancing because of its popularity with their teenagers.

So let's remember that food and fitness is really a family affair.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
I recently found a recipe for low-calorie cookies. They are full of good nutrition and low on sugar and fat.
CHEATER'S OATMEAL COOKIES
2 eggs, slightly beaten
Low calorie sugar substitute to equal 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons margarine, melted
Grated peel of 1 orange
1/2 cup fresh squeezed orange juice
2 cups high-protein cereal
1 1/2 cups quick oats, uncooked
1/4 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
In a large bowl, combine eggs, sugar substitute, brown sugar and margarine. Stir in peel, juice, cereal and oats. Sift together remaining dry ingredients. Add to

cereal mixture, at 375 degrees F. for 8 to 9 minutes. Make about 4 dozen cookies (There are 36 calories per cookie).
*Remember in selecting a sugar substitute that (aspartame or equal is sensitive to heat and heat destroys the sweeteners.)

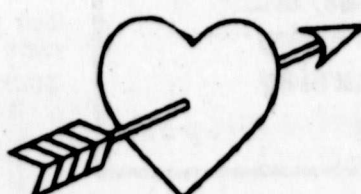

Area Firm Awarded Street Widening Project In City

Strain & Sons, Abilene paving contractor, was the low bidder for a contract to widen Conrad Hilton Avenue (Highway 183) from 12th Street south to I-20 in Cisco at a bid opening at the Texas Highway Department in Austin on Wednesday, Feb. 8.

The Strain bid was \$367,440.00, the highway department announcement

said. There were five bidders for the contract. Plans call for construction work to begin in April, according to the county highway department office in Eastland. Engineering details were prepared by R.P. (Buddy) Haun, county resident engineer, and his staff. Mr. Haun met with the Cisco City Council recently in finalizing plans for the

project. Plans call for the present 36-foot wide pavement to be widened to a total of 52 feet

by paving an 8-foot strip on each side, engineers reported. The contract calls for curb and gutter on both

sides of the street and for driveway entrances. City Manager Mike Moore

reported that the city water department still needs to move some water meters in preparation for paving work.

Lone Star Gas Company and West Texas Utilities Co. have already moved their lines out of the right-of-way.

The project has been under construction for several years by the county highway offices.

Congressman Hance Labeled As 'Underdog' In Politics

The big-city politics are labeling him the "underdog" in the Texas Democratic race for U.S. Senate nomination.

"I've been the underdog in every race I've ever been in," Cong. Kent Hance said in Eastland County Thursday, "and I've never lost. And I've always carried my

home box, my city and my county. Neither of my opponents can make that statement."

A large number of Eastland County supporters joined Hance in Ranger Thursday for a whirlwind stop, and he promised to return soon to spend more time "with my kind of peo-

ple." A former business law professor at Texas Tech, Hance has served in the Texas Legislature and has been a U.S. Congressman for six years. Representing the Conservative Democratic Boll Weevil element, he seeks the nomination to run against the Republican challenger in the November election for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by John Tower who is not seeking re-election.

Speaking before a packed Ranger Lions Club audience, Hance told of his beginning at Dimmett, and of his conservative voting record (along with Cong. Charles Stenholm who has endorsed Hance), stating that had all their votes over the past years carried, there would

now be a surplus and not a deficit with the federal government.

"I'm big on defense but I won't hand the Pentagon a blank check," he said, "and I think the President was wrong to send Marines to Lebanon. Grenada, yes, but not Lebanon. If we'd let the Israelis finish the job in Lebanon, they'd have done it. I'm not so sure we couldn't have sub-contracted the war in Viet Nam to the Israelis and won."

"I think the State Dept. gave the President some bad advice on Lebanon. They told him that he could negotiate a peace treaty and come out a hero. It didn't work that way at all." We've got to have a strong national defense he said, adding that he would be in a

favor of a "verifiable" nuclear treaty.

Praising our technology and personnel, Hance said that students under socialists are taught to follow the book. Our kids are being taught to think and that's why we're superior.

It was Hance's amendment that exempted stripper wells from the windfall profit tax, which he called a reverse tariff.

A number of citizens joined Hance later at the Ranger Times office where he visited further. With a number of school people in attendance, he reminded them that when he was in Austin, he helped kill the Peveto Bill (central evaluation system now in effect), but that it got passed in 1979.

"You'll be seeing more of

me," he predicted, as supporters began mapping plans for a giant county-wide rally which will feature Hance and Cong. Stenholm sometime in the near future, with details to be announced.

One supporter suggested that Hance is the conservative Democrat that a Texas voter can get with now and stay with through November.

Another suggested that there is a good possibility that present U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen (D) could easily end up a running mate in a Texas trade-off in the presidential campaign, which could leave Texas without a Democratic senator in the event a Republican is elected to replace Tower.

"For Those I Loved," by Martin Gray with Max Gallo, Copyright 1971. It is a rare day when Poland is not highlighted in letters, large or small, in newspapers, television reports, or magazines. James Michener has written over 500 pages about Poland in the "historical drama of fact and fiction - a spell binding saga of the unending Polish struggle for national self determination." In the foreword, he pays tribute to "the sterling group of Polish men and women who discussed with me hour after hour every aspect of Polish history that I proposed touching" and said "Normally I would list their names as I have done in my other novels, their impressive occupations, their achievements in research and scholarship, but I cannot ascertain whether in the present climate this would hurt or help them. I know this: they were loyal Poles; they loved their land; they spoke of it with unbounded affection and never a hint of disaffection. They were patriots of a high order; two of them had spent time in Auschwitz, and Majdanek brought tears to my eyes as we retraced in brutal, infinite detail the day-by-day existence in the latter camp. This book is dedicated to them, and I hope it conveys some of the passion they expressed in telling me of their Poland." A.M. Rosenthal, Executive Editor of the New York Times and recipient of a Pulitzer Prize in 1960 for his reporting from Poland, writes in the December 1983 issue of Reader's Digest under the title of "The Trees of Warsaw," about his return to Poland last May. There were many countries that he had visited and revisited, during his foreign reporting days, he said, but not Poland. "I was not romantic about Poland. There was a stone in my heart that created a sense of separateness from an abused people, which I always had wished I did not feel... a stone that was the realization of anti-Semitism in Polish history... anti-Semitism that had been part of the atmosphere of Poland before, during and after World War II." On this return visit, however, he said he began to feel a sense of being a part of Poland, and the melting of this stone, in recognition of the hope despite all the years of Communist tyranny, that prevails among the Poles, and he pays this tribute: "I felt I was returning because it had been too long since I had paid the smallest of freedom's dues - which is to go and bear witness." And again -- Star Telegram, November 21, 1983. Israel is seeking extradition of John Demjanjuk, an alleged war criminal discovered residing in the United States. Demjanjuk is sought to stand trial on charges of killing tens of thousands of Jews at the Nazi death camp of Treblinka, Poland. Treblinka... No one who reads "For Those I Loved" will ever forget the description of Treblinka, location of one of the infamous gas chambers, the end of the line for the cattle cars filled with victims, the monstrous excavating machines digging graves in the yellow sand, and the hundreds of bodies of men, women and children. This book which you will find

at the Cisco Library, is written by Martin Gray, a survivor of the Holocaust, as he told it to the prominent French author, Max Gallo. This is a true story about Gray's experiences from the time he was 14 years old, but, as he says when he was really born - 1939 and the occupation of Poland by Germany. His miraculous survival during these years of horror was his determination, to live to tell the world of the atrocities suffered by his friends, family and co-workers - "Those I Loved." There is a tremendous message in this book.

WTU Customers Will Receive Refunds Here

West Texas Utilities customers who paid interim rates the latter part of 1983 will begin receiving refunds this month. However, all refunds will be small, and some customers won't get them at all, company officials said. They'll be small because the higher rates were charged for only a short time. Some customers won't be affected, because their rates were not changed during the period. WTU started charging interim rates on October 22 when it became evident that a requested rate increase filed June 10, 1983 would be delayed indefinitely by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Interim rates were allowed by state law, subject to refund, if after three months the PUC had not ruled on the company's request. WTU has asked for an increase of \$26 million annually and the PUC staff recommended \$10 million. The Commission eventually approved \$12 million, with the new rates effective Jan. 6, 1984. WTU now will pay customers the difference between the interim rates and the new rates, plus 12.83 per cent interest. Refunds are being credited to customer bills, while checks are being mailed to those who have disconnected from the WTU system. Amounts to residential customers are averaging less than \$5, including interest. Customers in the following towns, which had denied the rate request and appealed to the Commission, are not affected: Hawley, Tuscola, Lawn, Merkel, Putnam, Clyde, Cross Plains, Santa Anna, Lueders, Aspermont, Jayton, Marfa, Valentine, Presidio, Alpine, Balmorhea, Rankin, Iraan, Estelline, Quitaque, Turkey, Memphis, Dodson, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Bronte, Menard, Junction and Miles.

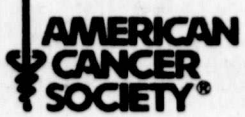

Sick Pay Benefits Are Taxable Income

Taxpayers who receive sick pay benefits from their employer in 1983 must include the payments as income on their federal tax return, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The payments are taxable whether they were made directly by the employer or from a welfare fund, a state sickness or disability fund, or an insurance company, provided the plan was paid for by the employer.

Benefits received under an accident or health insurance policy for which the employer paid the premiums are not considered taxable by the IRS.

More information on sick pay benefits is contained in the free IRS Publication 525, "Taxable and Nontaxable Income," which can be ordered on the handy order form in the tax package or by calling IRS.

Gordon Spot

Inflation continues and one example is the increased fees for soil, water and forage testing. Increased fee rates for soil, water, plant and forage samples at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Laboratories at College Station and Lubbock will go into effect March 1, 1984.

The regular soil test will go from \$4.00 to \$6.00 and the regular plus the micronutrient test will go from \$7.00 to \$10.00. Irrigation water tests increase from \$8.00 to \$15.00 each. The forage tests will increase from \$5.00 to \$6.00 for protein analysis.

If you want to take advantage of the current prices you should get your soil, water or forage samples in before March 1.

Your ornamental shrubs may or may not be dead. This winter's cold damage plants that have never been hurt here before. There are several common plant types that will be frozen back severely, many clear to the ground. How extensive that damage is remains to be seen.

You can get a pretty accurate handle on it, though, by cutting lightly through the bark with a sharp knife. If the cambium layer just inside is fresh, moist and green, that twig will probably come back in the spring. If it's dried, brown or mushy, then you probably have lost that part of the plant. Continue checking farther down the stem and see how much is alive.

Since we really can't yet assess the total amount of damage, the safest thing for you to do is wait until the spring growth starts. If the plant leaves out near the ground, but the tops are dead, then cut it back to the new growth. It may not die back at all, or it may have died out altogether, roots and all. You'll just have to wait and see.

So, what do you do now? Merely wait and water. Keep the plants moist during dry spells. Wait to fertilize until mid-March.

Don't prune plants until early spring. That way you'll not unknowingly remove live tissue.

Check the stems if you wish, to get a better idea of replacements you'll need to make. Wait, though, to give the old plants one more chance before you remove them.

Now is the time to prune fruit and nut trees. Apples, pears and cherry trees produce fruit on little spurs that grow very slowly. They require only light pruning to remove inferior or damaged branches and twigs and to open up the plant so light gets in. Peaches, apricots, plums and nectarines are just the opposite. They grow vigorously sending out long whips and getting out of hand if not pruned severely. Keep in mind that last summer's new growth produces this year's flowers and fruit. When growth is shortened and thinned, always leave some of the previous year's new growth or the tree will not produce fruit this year. Apricots and plums grow fast like peaches and produce flowers and fruit on new wood. But they also produce fruit on slow-growing, short spurs the way apples do. Completely remove new branches that have grown too long or become straggly. To prevent losing the whole fruit crop, try to leave at least a section of each new branch. This increases your crop and the number of fruit spurs for the following year.

Prune pecan trees to a central leader and otherwise treat as a large shade tree. On mature trees, remove broken, diseased or interfering limbs. Make all cuts carefully and be sure every limb is removed for a specific reason. Most large pecan trees require very little pruning.

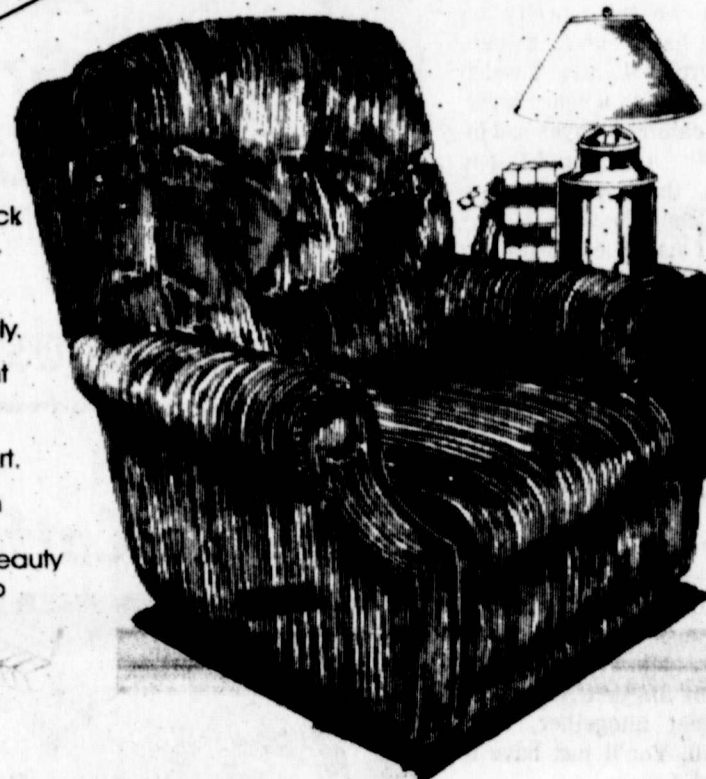



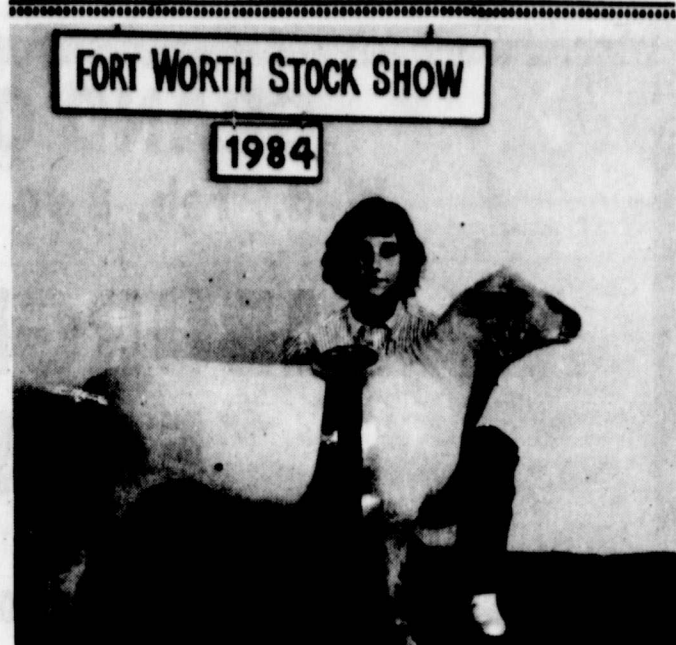

Drilling Bits

Jones Co. of Albany has filed for permit to plugback for shallower pay at the No. 1 Crawford "76A", a wildcat well in Palo Pinto County, five miles north of Strawn. Proposed total depth is 4,390 feet. The well is in a 294-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

Flowing 127 barrels of oil per day on a 10/64 choke, the No. 1 Latham has been completed in Stephens County's Ivadell Field by Enserch Exploration Inc. of Bridgeport. Located nine miles northwest of Breckenridge, the well will produce from a set of Mississippian perforations 4,437 to 4,456 feet into the hole. It registered 620 PSI flowing tubing pressure. The well bottomed at 4,670 feet.

It is located in a 183-acre lease in the SPRR Survey.

A shallow wildcat is scheduled nine miles east of Moran by Quantum Oil Inc. of Dallas. The well will be known as the No. 5 C.J. O'Connor. It is in a 320-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Total depth is projected to 900-ft.TD.

A new producer has been brought on line in Stephens County's Betty C. Field five miles southwest of Ivan. Designated as the No. 3 Black "27", it flowed 60 barrels of oil per day on a 16/64 choke. Flow pressure came in at 300 PSI.

Locations have been staked for a pair of developmental ventures in Stephens County's Caddo Field, with Delta Oil and Gas of Breckenridge as the operator.

Designated as the No. 3 John Gray Estate and No. 1 Magers Heirs, the wells carry permit for 4,500 and 5,000-ft. total depths, respectively.

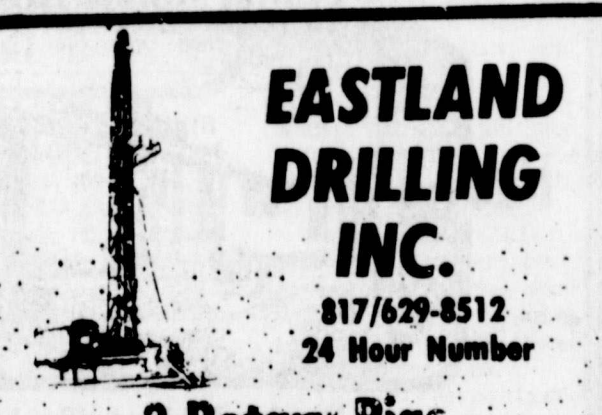

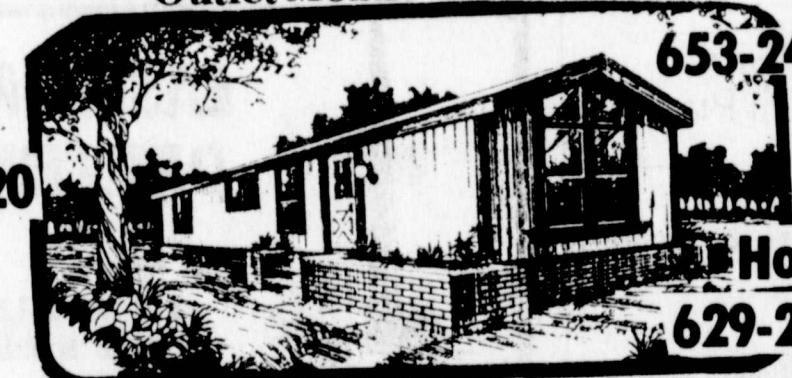

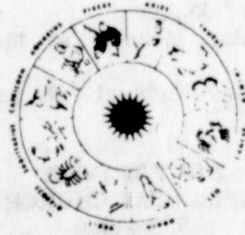
