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

The Holy Land Still **Inspires Visitors**

How does it feel to carry out a long-time dream of touring the Holy Land?

"Very inspiring," says Dub Hoffman of Eastland, owner of Poe Floral Shop." Even with some of the country looking like an armed camp, it still gives you a wonderful feeling.

"I've wanted to see that part of the world ever since I was a boy."

Hoffman reports that the only "front line" sightings he had were where Israel joins Lebanon. High barbed wire marked the border, and mine fields were about 40 ft. beyond. Firing could be heard in the distance.

This adventure and others came about after Hoffman left DFW Airport at 1:00 p.m. this past Jan. 10, for a trip to Israel, Jordan, and Egypt. He was traveling with an Educational Opportunities group (Methodist) led by a Dr. Ridgeway from Florida.

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Most of the 58 persons on the tour were Ministers and laymen from Methodist Churches in Central and West Texas. Barbara Graff of El Paso, a niece of Barbara Anderson of Eastland, was among those making the

'The Educational Opportunities people were very enjoyable to be around," Hoffman says. "We had devotional services each day, and heard experts speak during visits to each area. So the tour really was educational."

Hoffman, a Board member of the First Methodist Church of Eastland, explains that this is the fifth trip he had made with the Educational Opportunities group. He previously traveled with tours led by Ridgeway Switzerland, Belgium, France and Greece.

After a three hour flight from Texas to JFK Airpot, the group boarded a 747 Jor-

danian Jet. Due to extreme cold, this 300 passenger plane had to wait three hours while the wings were deiced. At midnight it lifted over the ocean, and landed briefly in Vienna the next morning.

The 13 hour flight ended in Amman, Jordan, where passport and immigration control at the airport turned out to be surprisingly light. Dub Hoffman's first impressions indicated that Jordan was an advanced and prosperous country.

After an American-type dinner at a hotel, the group slept awhile before leaving at 4:00 a.m. to cross over to Israel. When they reached the Allenby Bridge on the Jordan River, the found heavy security. This included a search of luggage and a body search as well.

They left by tour bus on down the Jordan River Valley, which drops below sea level. They visited Qumran, located in a wild and desolate area, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. Not far away was the large mesa called masada, containing the last fortifications of the Zealots (Jewish peo-

ple) in their war against the Romans after the time of Christ.

After visiting this impressive area the tour group rode on to Arviv for dinner and overnight. As they continued their travels during the next few days, they saw that most of the country was dry and broken, resembling Arizona

A lot of machine guns and other weapons were carried by young Israelis, and number of whom went to army posts each day and came home at night. Some poverty was visible, and a surprising number of Arabic Mosques were noted among the Jewish Churches and Christian Churches and Shrines.

Nazareth, where Christ spent many of his early years, was a rather large city, and modern in most respects. "Mary's Well" was an interesting site, as was the Greek Orthrodox Church.

The Mount of Beatitudes, where Christ gave his Sermon On The Mount, has special interest. The Mount was actually a hill several acres in size. While in this general area the group reached the border of Lebanon.

One stop for a night was in Tiberias, an Israeli town on the western shore of the Sea of Galilee. Part of the eastern shore of the sea lies against Jordan, and a part touches Syria. While in this area the group took a boat ride to Capernaum, the scene of a number of Christ's miracles. They visited a Synagogue, and the home of Christ's Disciple Peter.

Bethany, a large town north of Jerusalem, was pointed out as the home of Lazarus and his sisters, a place visited often by Chirst.

And Bethlehem, south of Jerusalem, contained a number of churches and shrines commemerating the birth of Christ. The tour group particularly enjoyed the Church of the Nativity and The Shepherd's Field.

Jerusalem, still a divided city, was the climax of the tour. There were many historic places to visit, pecially in the Old City. Some of the most impressive were the Mount of Olives, Pool of St. Stephens, Dome of the Rock, The Wailing Wall, the sites of Christ's crucifiction and His resur-

rection, and Mount Zion. This Mount, a hill about half as large as Eastland's Park Hill, contains the traditional Tomb of David and the house with the Upper Room which Christ visited.

January 18, was "free. day" for the tour members. Dub Hoffman spent his day back in Bethlehem, and the Old City part of Jerusalem. It was a rainy, cold day, not like the 50 degrees each afternoon the trour group had been experiencing.

The tour was concluded by a trip to Egypt, a country which contrasted greatly with Israel and Jordan. There was much more general poverty, and a lack of public sanitation. There were things of interest to see, however, museums, the pyramids, the Spinhx, and

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other historic treasures. There was an overnight stop in the Valley Of The Kings at Luxor, where King Tut's

tomb was among those visited. On January 25, the Educational Opportunities group flew back to Amman, Jordan, only to find that the

plane they were supposed to fly home on was grounded in New York. But they finally boarded the big 747 Jet, and settled back to try to sort out their impressions.

Hoffman came away with some lasting ones. "A trip like this enriches a person's life. For one thing, it makes

you appreciate country and

"We think we have problems, but look what many people in Israel live under every day. They seem happy, content and nice, but they don't even know whether they will get to keep their country."

"The greatest thing to me was to get to see the Old part of Jerusalem, and to walk where Christ walked. I'd like to go back there someday."

"But first, in the summer of 1985, I'm going to the netherlands. And that will again be with the Educational Opportunities group."

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

Foster Families **Needed Now in**

This County

Foster Families are desperately needed in Eastland County and a training program will begin Monday in an effort to provide "temporary" homes for the county's battered and abused children.

That's the report from Patricia Mahan, Child-care worker with the Department of Human Resources.

There were 30 cases of child abuse reported in this county last month," she said, "and of that number seven were sexually abused." Ages of the abused were from six to 18 years of age.

The county now has only one Foster Family, and children who must be taken from their parents for their own safety, now are taken to foster homes in other cities in this area.

The Foster Home training will begin Monday, Feb. 20, and information regarding it may be secured by contacting the Dept. of Human Resources at 629-1713.

Eight children from the total 30 reported cases of abuse wound up in foster homes, she said. In most cases, these young people are returned to their parents, either after professional counselling or prosecution.

"Two children die every week in Texas from abuse," she said.

Persons who think they might be able to provide foster care may talk to Mrs. Mahan or Alice Pritchard.

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


