'Fingerprints On File'

Fingerprints On File has been organized by the Cisco Police Department Office to be used as a tool for locating and identifying missing children. This is the sole purpose of this program and can only be successful through the cooperation of the Sheriff's Officers, local Police, school officials, parents and guardians.

Thousands of children are reported missing each year. Some are runaways while others "just seem to vanish." It is a large problem that is getting larger. While there are no hard statistics, the best estimates

are that about one million American youngsters leave home each year. Approximately ninety percent of these return home within two weeks leaving about 100,000 children unaccounted for. In addition, another 25,000 to 100,000 children are stolen by divorcees or separated parents.

How does F.O.F. work? As a parent or guardian of a school child, one is being asked for their permission to have their child participate in this program. The actual fingerprinting will be done at the convenience and manner prescribed by school officials.

Police Officers will visit the school and take one set of fingerprints from each child that has permission. (Parents and guardians must sign permission letters before this can be done.) The fingerprints will be placed on the permission letters. Upon completion of the fingerprinting, this form will be returned to the parents or guardians for safekeeping. In the event the child is missing, the fingerprints should be turned over to law enforcement authorities when making the report.

Fingerprints remain the same all through life. They are an efficient tool of identification no matter how much time has lapsed between the child being reported missing and the possibility of the child being found.

Local schools will have students fingerprinted on the following days: Primary School-- April 9th; Intermediate School-- April 16; Junior High and High School-- April 25.

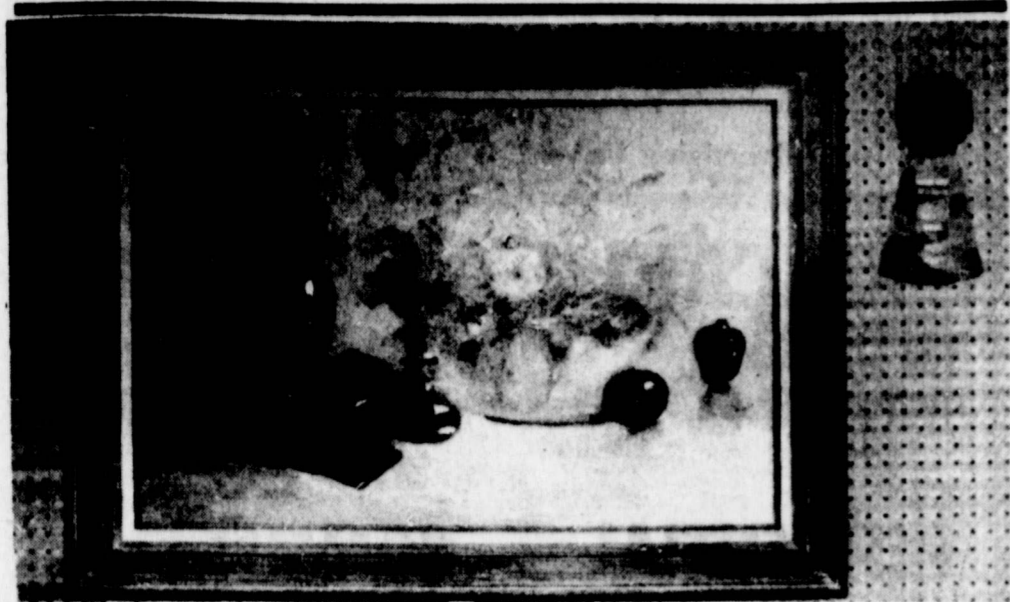

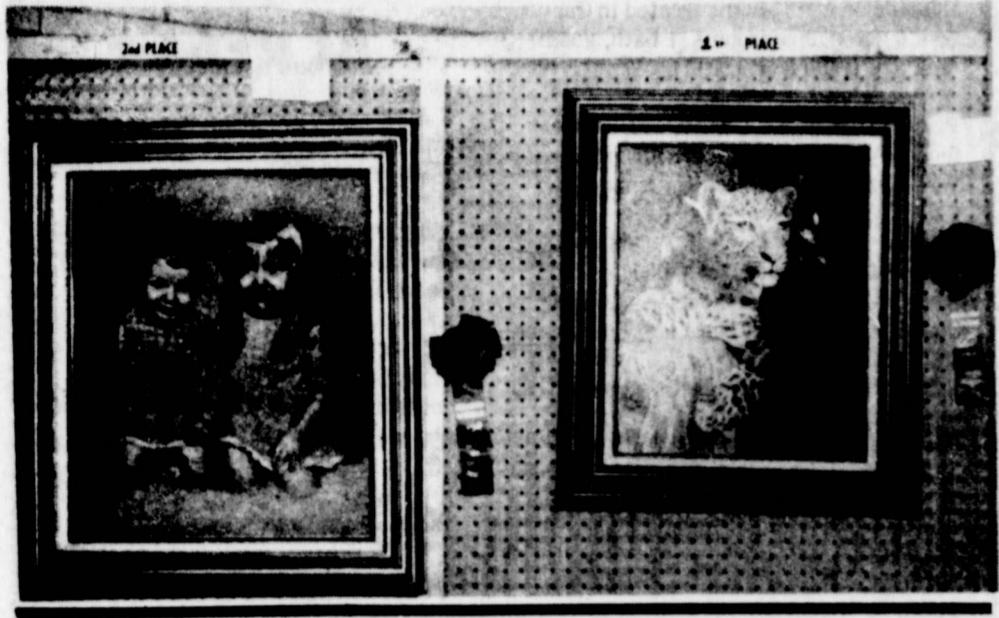

Sales Up In Eastland, Rising Star

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent checks totaling \$53.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 965 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Texas is pulling out strongly from the trough we were in last year," Bullock said. "Along the border, January sales were well above last year in Laredo, Brownsville, and El Paso. Among the 20 biggest sales tax cities, only Midland and Odessa are still running behind last year. Overall, sales tax receipts are up more than 12 percent."

March checks reflect sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller in late February.

Houston received the largest check--for \$9.7 million--which brings that city's 1984 total to \$37.2 million, up 5 percent over what is had received by this time last year.

Dallas' check for \$6.7 million brought year-to-date payments \$24.8 million, up more than 15 percent over last year.

San Antonio's payment was \$2.9 million, up more than 36 percent over the same period last year. Austin's March check for \$2.3 million brought the city's yearly total to \$8.4 million, or nearly 22 percent ahead of 1983 totals.

Fort Worth received \$2 million, bringing the 1984 total to \$7.4 million, up more than 7 percent over 1983. El Paso received \$1.2 million, with 1984's year-to-date total now running nearly 20 percent ahead of 1983.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's three Metropolitan Transit Authorities, including a first-ever check for \$4.9 million to DART, the new Dallas transit authority. The Houston MTA received \$11 million and the San Antonio MTA got a check for \$1.6 million. Cisco received a check for

\$13,770.86, down 6.72% over last year. Eastland's check for \$18,920.04 represented a 51.01% increase, and Gorman's check for \$1,000.66 was down 33.71% over last year's total. Ranger received a check for \$8,882.82, down 4.40% over the same period last year, and Rising Star's check was \$1,664.29, up 48.62% over last year.

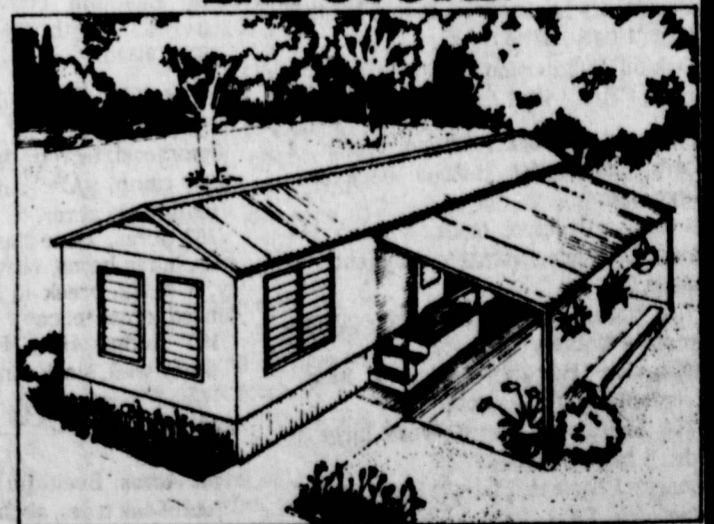

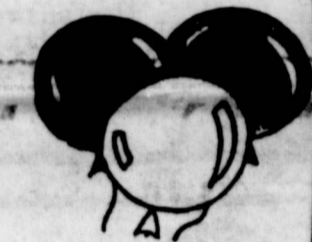

Fishing Report

BASS CLUB REPORT
"BUILD A BONANZA
PART II"

Location's of fish attractors can improve the potential of each. Spring spawn: During this time fish are searching the smoother bottom areas as a rule. Small gravel points that gradually

fall into deeper water will best hold fish. Also rocky shoreline, as during this time the rocks will warm quicker due to the increased sunlight. In our region the normal spawn depth will be from 6" to 5 ft. Again depending on the clarity of the water. Excessive sunlight

will move these fish deeper as a rule to lessen the strain on their eyesight.

Dog Days Summer: This period of time has long been misunderstood. Until recently, it was generally expected that bass moved to deep holes. Recent studies have proved this is not always true. Our area lakes will hold fish shallow almost year round. The prime are to place attractors this time of year will be near rapidly dropping shelves, near points on river channels and creeks on secondary flows.

Four feet will be the prime depth if oxygen supply is adequate.

Winter time: Can be the least productive time of the year. Attractors placed on the end of points on the northern regions of the reservoirs will come nearer to holding fish due to less wind and usually warmer water.

Items to build with: Perhaps the fastest attractor would be mesquite trees, also good oak, cedar, hay bails, tires, and even car bodies. The most overall effective would have to be willow trees, the small

numerous limbs provide ample cover and ambush points.

A variety of food attractors will enhance your efforts. For bass rabbit pellets, alfalfa hay are excellent, and also help on crappie. Channel cat and carp run to a can of dog food with holes in the cans, also mildewed corn placed in bread wrappers will draw those big cats.

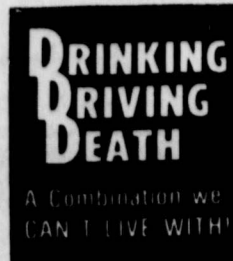

Season Saturday

Six Flags Over Texas begins its 1984 season Saturday, March 10, with a totally new lineup of shows including performances by the U.S. High Diving Team. AARP Pushes Lower Costs

Roy V. Cartee of Cisco, is helping implement a National Campaign by the American Association of Retired Persons aimed at reducing skyrocketing health care costs and saving the Medicare program from insolvency. Mr. Cartee, assistant state director, recently returned from a meeting in Dallas, where plans for the campaign were discussed. He will be responsible for working with individuals and groups at the state and local level on campaign activities. According to Mr. Cartee, the immediate priority of the 15 million members of AARP is to save Medicare, which is threatened with insolvency by the end of the decade and faces a 300 billion dollar deficit by 1995 unless prompt action is taken. "Medicare's problems are only symptoms of a greater problem that affects all of us - the uncontrolled cost of health care," he said. "Only by dealing with the entire health care system and reducing the rate of growth of all health care costs can we save Medicare and assure accessible, affordable health care for all Americans. An overwhelming 81 per cent of the American Public believes that reasonable limit on what hospitals and doctors can charge is the only way to save Medicare. AARP wants to turn to strong public sentiment into positive actions," Mr. Cartee stated. Brigham Young University, and the Santa Fe Art Museum.

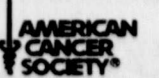

Farmers' Participation Expected In 1984 Farm Programs

Charles W. Mayfield, State Executive Director of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, states that he is optimistic that producers' participation in the 1984 farm programs will be great in Texas and throughout the Nation.

"The 1984 farm programs are a means for our producers to hold onto the price edge they gained through participation in the 1983 farm programs which included the Payment-In-Kind (PIK). The massive acreage reduction of 1983 cotton, feed grain, rice and wheat successfully reduced the commodity stocks that had a strangle-hold on farm profits," Mayfield said.

"Today, for the first time in years, prices overall on these commodities are good, and with continued restraint in planting, prices will hold and get better. Full income recovery is in the hands of the farmer's now. They

realize that speculation is growing for quick profit on an emerging healthy market would bring about over-production and financial disaster."

"Farmers are cognizant that our foreign markets have been drastically diminished by unfair trade practices built into agreements among the European Common Market countries, and that subsidized farmers in Europe have won a fair size of markets we previously enjoyed. The purchasing power of other world markets has weakened as they continue to find ways and means of working out of the inflation and recession from which we are recovering. Until foreign markets realize that it is in their best interests to participate in fair trade practices, and resolve their financial burdens - it would be self-defeating for us to produce for storage."

"Sign-up for 1984 programs with its agreement to reduce acreage not only insures the Nation's farmers of a continued healthy market with farm profits, it reduces production expense and guarantees price protection. 1984 sign-up, together with FCIC's crop insurance, will guarantee economic well-being and a more prosperous future for America's farmers. There is no doubt about it, sign-up for 1984 is a sound investment."

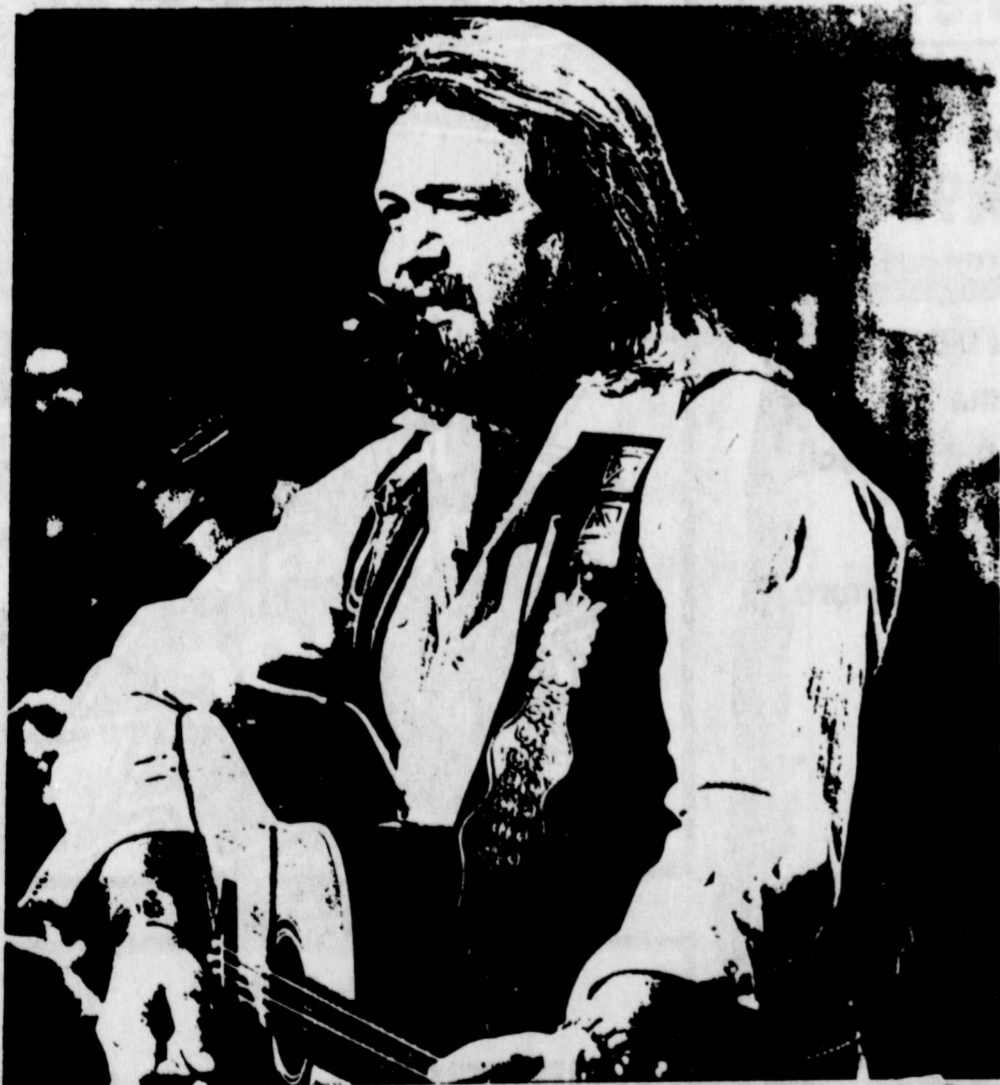

Manager Says...

Oil Firms Expect Good Growth Here

West Texas Disposal Systems, Inc., and Cisco Reclaiming Crude, Inc., two corporations located on city-owned land near town on the Moran Highway, have enjoyed good growth during their first year here and expect to have some 50 employees within two years.

This information was reported by Gregory S. (Greg) Parker, petroleum engineer, who assumed duties as general manager of operations and engineering on February 25th. Mr. Parker came here from Lubbock, home office for the two local corporations.

West Texas Disposal Systems leased the City of Cisco No. 1, an oil test dry hole drilled several years ago, and has been hauling salt water from area oil

leases and re-injecting it into underground formations. The hole is bottomed at 3,300 feet in an oil conglomerate formation.

The Cisco Reclaiming Crude firm takes oil residue from salt water, tank bottoms and in salvage operations. The firm also buys crude oil for re-sale from small leases.

The companies, which have offices on their city lease plus the buildings and grounds they have leased from the Cisco Livestock Show Association, operate four trucks at present. They have six employees and plan to add others soon to keep their truck fleet and equipment in operating condition.

The firms are adding to their office building at present to provide more space

for private offices and machines that handle the bookkeeping chores of the business.

Mr. Parker, who holds a master's degree in petroleum engineering from Texas Tech, has some 10 years of varied experience in the oil industry in West Texas and New Mexico. He is a native of California but has lived in Texas for about 10 years. He has a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma Central State.

Mr. Parker and his wife Sharla and their two children, a three-year old daughter and a six months old son, reside at 712 East 23rd Street in Cisco. He is a member of the Lions Club and the First Assembly of God Church. His wife is a native of New Mexico.

Mr. Parker said he and his companies, which are owned by the Jim Matthews of Lubbock, are excited about the outlook for their business in the Cisco region. The firms are members of the Chamber of Commerce.

China Pictures Shown To Lions

Picture slides made during a tour of China in April, 1983, were shown by Dr. E.E. Addy as the program feature at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. and Mrs. Addy were in China with a group of Texas doctors who made the trip for study purposes and to inspect medical facilities there. They spent some two weeks touring the country and in visiting medical facilities, schools and points of interest.

Dr. Addy said that China, about the size of Texas, has a billion people compared with some 20,000,000 in this state. He believed that medicine was primitive as compared with this country. Automobiles are few and used mostly by top government officials while bicycles are numerous and the universal model of travel in China, he said.

Highlight of industrial plants visited was a silk factory where nearly 6,000 people were working with cocoons to manufacture fabrics. Silk weaving began in China in the early ages and spread to other countries, Dr. Addy said.

Tea is the universal drink in China, Dr. Addy found. It is harvested from trees that live 75 years and are cut back every 25 years, he learned. His slides illustrated points brought out.

President C.B. Dill reported that officers for the coming year will be nominated at next week's luncheon and elected April 4th. Plans are progressing on the talent show planned next month, Secretary Jasper Cook reported.

Viewpoints -- A Call To Freedom

I recently read an article which startled me. The incident would be common place news in atheist countries. Could this be happening in the United States?

"I kissed my wife goodbye and told her to get out of the state," Ralph Liles said from his county jail cell in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Liles was one of seven Faith Christian School students imprisoned Nov. 23 for refusing to testify about their children's Christian school.

Liles shares a four-unit cell block with five other men, all of whom like him

were thrown into jail the day before Thanksgiving. Liles' wife hides out in Missouri with 11 year old daughter, Karen, a Faith Christian School student. She and six other wives are under bench warrants to force them to testify against themselves, their husbands and pastor for their involvement in the school.

Nebraska has a law that no school can operate unless the teacher is approved by the state. That looks good on the surface. We want competent, educated teachers. If the state has sole control of requirements for teachers

couldn't that mean they could also decide what should be taught? Hitler dictated what was to be taught in the schools in Germany. It wasn't long he had control of the German youth. We know the result.

Our founding fathers used the term separation of church and state to make clear that the state could not interfere with freedom of religion, freedom of speech and freedom of the press. Under the guise of separation of church and state we have unwittingly given up many of our freedoms. Our Constitution clearly says,

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people to peaceably assemble." Our national government has made laws which forbid this. One that is being debated in the Senate now forbids anyone in our public schools to pray. Now, the state of Nebraska tells its people they cannot send their children to a Christian school unless they screen their teachers under requirements set up by them.

For the fathers and mothers to admit that their child was not attending a state controlled school was to admit they were involved in criminal activity — the criminal activity of sending their children to a Christian rather than a public school. Twenty Christian schools in Nebraska now have had their doors locked by state police.

Gov. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska appointed a panel to study the matter. They reported they could find no fault in the Christian schools. The panel suggests the students be tested annually on a standardized test made by the State Department of Education. If score averages were at least equal to, or better than the public school scores, then church-related schools would meet state approval. Christian schools were willing to be tested educationally. Although this was the state's argument used to close the church-related schools they were unwilling to go along with this.

If all schools must be approved educationally to state requirements, doesn't this give them the power and opportunity to mandate other requirements such as teaching only the evolution theory. Have you noticed that many of our laws now being made are making inroads into moral values? Without morality evil reigns.

When any state makes laws restricting Christians to peaceably assemble and teach moral principles especially when their students are doing well or better in reading, writing and arithmetic than students in public schools, it is taking away constitutional rights.

Since the beginning of creation a battle has raged between the forces of good and evil. Walking on the streets of Moscow, Leningrad, in villages and cities in China I was followed constantly by the KGB and the Red Guard. I observed the results of being under the rulership of a government that had abandoned morals.

It is time to come out of the closet. It is time we joined together and voice our disapproval of any law that violates our freedom. Soon it may be too late. Write or call your Senators. Or yes, isn't it wonderful that if you do not approve of our children having freedom to pray in our public schools, you can also voice your opinion? Let's keep it that way.

DO VETERANS RECEIVE SPECIAL BENEFITS AT TIME OF DEATH?

Yes, there are certain death benefits for which veterans may be eligible.

These benefits are less substantial than they used to be, but they are still worth investigating as to the amount of eligibility. The regulations may change from time-to-time on Veteran and Social Security benefits so you may wish to check these out with these government agencies or with us.

3. A burial allowance of up to \$1100 when a veteran dies of service connected disability.
4. A grave marker allowance, currently at \$67.

Payment for these benefits is not forwarded automatically. Forms must be filled out and application made for them.

Citrus is a good substitute for high-calorie sweets which will result in a better grip on one's weight, while not hurting the family budget either, states a Texas A&M Nutritionist.

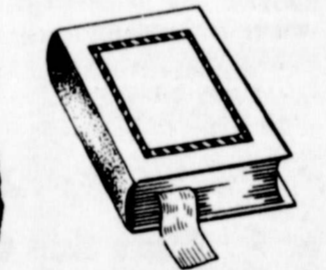

The Eastland Regular Field gained a new producer when Twin Drilling Inc. of Rising Star completed the No. 1 Charles Murphee, one mile north of Romney.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of ten barrels per day. It was taken to a 1,500-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 1,486 to 1,489 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 40-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 58, Blk. 3.

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Reflections In Perspective

It is difficult to describe the reaction of the British occupants of the tiny island of Das in the Persian Gulf to the arrival of some 40 or 50 "Staff" types of genuine, unreconstructed, unbending Texans who had come to that faraway place with a strange-sounding name for the purpose of constructing a submarine pipeline system the terminal of which was to be on the island. The system was calculated and designed to transport the wellhead stream of petroleum from some twenty or thirty flowing oil wells in a field 33 miles from Das. "Umm Shaif", the field was named.

To the majority of the Britishers the outlandish Texans, with their somewhat unconventional dress and their almost unintelligible speech were an outright oddity. Das had been invaded, and was being "surrounded and outnumbered" even though there were at least five British subjects for each invading Texan.

And the British, characteristically, took it all in stride, with utter imperturbability. Knowing full well that our invasion carried no undertones of permanent occupancy, we were their guests. And the British are among the world's most gracious hosts. That collection of the remnants of Her Britannic Majesty's colonial forces tried individually to outdo each other in expressing their welcome. It was virtually months before any member of the Texas contingent could pay for a drink in the "Staff Club". We were there for the final culmination of the effort which the British had been putting forth for more than five years. We had an expertise (and equipment to match) which was entirely foreign to them, and rather than resent it they showed their appreciation.

authority is almost unlimited. It is absolute, and his commands and decisions allow no route of appeal. His word is law, final, and everyone accepts and respects that cardinal fact. I responded....forthwith.

The "G.M." was a most personal chap, and over the years we have become fast friends. After a few moments of pleasantries he came right out with the purpose of my having been asked to come to see him. "Isn't there some sort of national holiday that you people across the Atlantic observe in November?" He asked. It was then early in November.

There is, indeed; he was assured. And it is a day which carries alot of meaning to all inhabitants of "The Western Colonies", he was informed. It falls on the third Thursday in the month, and is known as Thanksgiving Day. Since it was first observed long before "The War of the Rebellion" (which the British are pleased to call our Revolution), it carries no connotation of disrespect nor rebellion to the Crown.

And just how does authorisation for the observance of Thanksgiving come about, he wanted to know. Well; it is customary for the top-ranking elected authority (in our case, the President) to issue a "Proclamation"; stipulating that the Day had been decided upon, and that the

populace would be expected to respond with homecomings, feasting and foregathering here and there for the purpose of expressing their thanks to the Almighty for having endured another year of taxation, of prosperity, good fortune or bad, to each in accordance with his feelings.

Could we draft such a "Proclamation"? We could. And wasn't there some special sort of feast and festivities which were customary? Affirmative; turkey and dressing, candied yams, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie... and all manner of side dishes of goodies. Then I must discuss this with the "Catering Superintendent", who was responsible for the feeding of the more than two thousand inhabitants of Das.

That individual was one John Erne, a Swiss national who had become a British subject. And not only was John quite adept in feeding and caring for the multinational populace of the Island; in his own right he was a duly recognised, certified Escoffier Chef of "Cordon Bleu" rank. John delighted in meeting any challenge in the field of food and it's preparation. John had heard of the traditional Thanksgiving Feast of the Americans, and was delighted that the "GM" was promoting the idea. We worked out a menu which the most finicky housewife would have found difficulty in criticizing adversely.

Then came the paper work. Before we could legally issue a proclamation, there must be some sort of political entity, and a "head man" who could proclaim the date of Thanksgiving. No

sooner said than done. A "Declaration of Affiliation" was drawn up, informing all and sundry that Das Island had declared itself a part of the Great State of Texas. Henceforth Das would be identified as "Das Island County, the Easternmost County in Texas". Two officials were named. The General Manager was made County Judge and the Manager of Travel and Cargo was identified as Sheriff of the County. We didn't have time to obtain the official approval or endorsement of the State of Texas, but we have never heard any expression of objection to our unilateral alignment.

As County Judge, the G.M. signed the documents. First, they were hand-lettered by a very capable draftsman who was skilled in Old English Script. Lovely; they were. They were then run through the copying machine and posted on every "notice board" on the island. The next-to-last Thursday in November would be observed as Thanksgiving.

And observed it was. For at least a week, Thanksgiving was the principal topic of all conversation. Spirits were high in anticipation of the observance of Thanksgiving "Of and for both British and Americans".

Came the day. Now, Thursday dinner (in the evening, of course) was "shirt-and-tie". Each and every week, members of the Staff Mess were expected to recognise that certain conventions are still in effect "back home", and said members are to appear for dinner properly attired. The tropical climate discouraged

the wearing of jackets, but shirt and tie are not all that burdensome. Since Friday is the "Day of Rest" in the Moslem world, Thursday night opens the week-end.

In preparation for the gala occasion of Thanksgiving Dinner; flags were flown from the three masts outside the entrance of the Staff Club. The center mast is a few feet taller than the other two, and is usually occupied by the flag of the sovereign State of Abu Dhabi. The British flag and the banner of the Oil Company flank the Abu Dhabi Flag. Not on Thanksgiving Day, though. The position of honour was turned over to the flag of the

Lone Star State, with Abu Dhabi and Great Britain standing in support. It was by the order of The County Judge. And who was to question his ruling?

The original proclamation and declaration were framed and now adorn the walls of the Staff Club. And Thanksgiving Day did not come and go on that November Day these many years back. Each year the Resident Manager issues another proclamation...with tongue-in-cheek mocs seriousness...and Turkey and Dressing is again enjoyed by the citizens of Das Island County, the Easternmost County in Texas.

County Stock Show Opens Wednesday

A big event for many of the young people in Eastland County will be taking place this week in Eastland. It is the Annual Eastland County Livestock Show which will start Wednesday and run through Saturday at the show grounds on the northwest edge of Eastland on Hwy 3101.

It is an opportunity for area residents to see what promises to be the biggest and best Eastland County show ever with over eight hundred entries, and a chance to support the county's young people in a very

worthwhile undertaking that many of them have been working for months to prepare for.

In addition to the well groomed and well fed livestock, there will be a concession stand operated by the 4-H Adult Leaders Association to keep the exhibitors and spectators well fed.

For the young people not involved with animals, there will be a 4-H Project Show on Thursday in the old concession building. It is the second year that the Project Show has been held and it is also

expected to be bigger and better.

And there could possibly be something special for the younger children again.

The show will begin at 1 p.m. Wednesday, with the weighing of the steers and lambs, and by 8 p.m. all of the livestock are to be on the show grounds in their places and be properly entered.

On Thursday morning, starting at 8, the market hogs will be weighed.

Also on Thursday morning Project Show entries will be checked in between 7:30 and 9:30, and Project Show judg-

ing will begin at 10.

At 1 p.m. the new division added to the show this year, the dairy goats, will be judged.

Then the breeding swine will be judged at 3:30 p.m. followed by the market swine judging at 5 p.m.

And the 4-H Project Show entries must be picked up by 6 p.m.

On Friday, from 8 until 10 a.m., the breeding swine will be released from the show.

At 9 a.m. the dairy cattle will be judged and at 10 a.m. the rabbit show will be held with the broilers show at 11 a.m. finishing the morning.

The Friday evening judging includes the Angora goats at 1 p.m., the breeding sheep at 2 p.m., and the market lambs at 5 p.m.

The breeding beef cattle will be judged at 9 a.m. Saturday followed by the market steers at 11 a.m.

At 12 Saturday the removal of the non-sale animals will begin.

The market animal auction will start at 7 p.m. and

the special awards will be held in the Moylan Exposition building, which has been insulated so that heaters will be able to keep the inside temperature comfortable as the weather turns cold.

Some new portable hog pens have been built, the grounds have been cleaned by the Fair Association, and work has been done on the damaged plumbing in preparation for the show, which is shaping up to be 25% larger than last year.

An additional award to be presented this year is \$25 donated by Don Estes to be given to the champion dairy goat. Numerous other trophies and awards donated by area people and businesses will be given along with cash awards.

Judges have been secured and the superintendents of each department and the other officials have been busy.

Tommy Toland is the General Show Superintendent, and the show is sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Assoc.
