

Sales Up In Eastland, Rising Star

State Comptroller Bob **Bullock Tuesday sent checks** totaling \$53.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the onepercent city sales tax.

"Texas is pulling out strongly from the trough we were in last year," Bullock said. "Along the border, January sales were well above last year in Laredo, Brownsville, and El Paso. Among the 20 biggest sales tax cities, only Midland and Odessa are still running behind last year. Overall, sales tax receipts are up more than 12 percent."

March checks reflect sales made inJanuary and reported to the Comptroller in late February.

Houston received the largest check--for \$9.7 million-which brings that city's 1984 total to \$37.2 million, up 5 percent over what is had received by this time last year.

Dallas' check for \$6.7 million brought year-to-date payments \$24.8 milion, up more than 15 percent over

last year. San Antonio's payment was \$2.9 million, up more than 36 percent over the same period last year. Austin's March check for \$2.3 million brought the city's yearly total to \$8.4 million, or nearly 22 percent ahead of 1983 totals.

Fort Worth received \$2 million, bringing the 1984 total to \$7.4 million, up more than 7 percent over 1983. Elpaso received \$1.2 million, with 1984's year-to-date total now running nearly 20 percent ahead of 1983.

Bullock also sent checks toi the state's three Metropolitan Transit Authorities, including a firstever check for \$4.9 million to DART, the new Dallas transit authority. The Houston MTA received \$11 million and the San Antonio MTA got a cheke for \$1.6 million.

Location's of fish attractors can improve the potential of each. Spring spawn: During this time fish are searching the smoother bottom areas as a rule. Small gravel points that gradually fall into deeper water will best hold fish. Also rocky shoreline, as during this time the rocks will warm quicker due to the increased sunlight. In our region the normal spawn depth will be from 6" to 5 ft. Again depending on the clarity of the water. Excessive sunlight will move these fish deeper as a rule to lessen the strain on their eyesight.

Dog Days Summer: This period of time has long been misunderstood. Until recently, it was generally expected that bass moved to deep holes. Recent studies have proved this is not always true. Our area lakes will hold fish shallow almost year round. The prime are to place attractors this time of year will be near rapidly dropping shelves, near points on river channels and creeks on secondary slows. Four feet will be the prime depth if oxygen supply is adequate.

For the fathers and mothers to admit that their child was not attending a state controlled school was to admit they were involved in criminal activity - the criminal activity of sending their children to a Christian rather than a public school. Twenty Christian schools in Nebraska now have had their doors locked by state Gov. Bob Kerrey of

Nebrasks appointed a panel to study the matter. They reported they could find no fault in the Christian schools. The panel suggests the students be tested annually on a standardized test made by the State Department of Education. If score averages were at least equal to, or better than the public school scores, then church-related schools would meet state approval. Christian schools were willing to be tested educationally. Although this was the state's argument used to close the church-related schools they were unwilling to go along with this.

If all schools must be approved education to state requirments, doesn't this give them the power and opportunity to mandate other requirements such as teaching only the evolution theory. Have you noticed that many of our laws now being made are making inroads into moral values? Without moratity evil reigns.

When any state makes laws restricing Christians to peaceably assemble and teach moral principles especially when their students are doing well or better in reading, writing and arithmetic than students in public schools, it is taking away constitutional rights.

Since the beginning of creation a battle has raged between the forces of good and evil. Walking on the streets of Moscow, Leningrad, in villages and cities in China I was followed constantly by the KGB and the Red Guard. I observed the results of being under the rulership of a government that had abandoned morals. It is time to come out of the



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Reflections In Perspective

I.W. Ussery

It is difficult to describe the reaction of the British occupants of the tiny island of Das in the Persian Gulf to the arrival of some 40 or 50 "Staff" types of genuine, unreconstructed, unbending Texans who had come to that faraway place with a strange-sounding name for the purpose of constructing a submarine pipeline system the terminal of which was to be on the island. The system was calculated and designed to transport the wellhead stream of petroleum from some twenty or thirty flowing oil wells in a field 33 miles from Das. "Umm Shaif", the field was named.

To the majority of the Britishers the outlandish Texans, with their somewhat unconventional dress and their almost unintelligible speech were an outright oddity. Das had been invaded, and was being "surrounded and outnumbered" even though there were at least five British subjects for each invading Texan.

British, And the characteristically, took it all in stride, with utter imperturbability. Knowing full well that our invasion carried no undertones of permanent occupancy, we were their guests. And the British are among the world's most gracious hosts. That collection of the remnants of Her Britannic Majesty's colonial forces tried individually to outdo each other in expressing their welcome. It was virtually months before any member of the Texas contingent could pay for a drink in the "Staff Club". We were there for the final culmination of the effort which the British had been putting forth for more than five years. We had an expertise (and equipment to match) which was entirely foreign to them, and rather than resent it they showed their appreciation.

We'd been on Das for only a few weeks when there came a summons to appear Now the British have a respect for management and authority which is somewhat foreign to many Americans. While the General Manager may be, and usually is, just "one of the boys" during offduty hours' when he is seated behind his desk his

authority is almost unlimited. It is absolute, and his commands and decisions allow no route of appeal. His word is law, final, and everyone accepts and respects that cardinal fact. I responded....forthwith.

The "G.M." was a most personal chap, and over the years we have become fast friends. After a few moments of pleasantries he came right out with the purpose of my having been asked to come to see him. "Isn't there some sort of national holiday that you people across the Atlantic observe in November?" He asked. It was then early in November.

There is, indeed; he was assured. And it is a day which carries alot of meaning to all inhabitants of "The Western Colonies", he was informed. It falls on the third Thursday in the month, and is known as Thanksgiving Day. Since it was first observed long before "The War of the Rebellion" (which the British are pleased to call our Revolution), it carries no connotation of disrespect nor rebellion to the Crown.

And just how does authorisation for the observance of Thanksgiving come about, he wanted to know. Well; it is customary for the top-ranking elected authority (in our case, the President) to issue a "Proclamation"; stipulating that the Day had been decided upon, and that the

populace would be expected to respond with homecomfeasting and foregathering here and there for the purpose of expressing their thanks to the Almighty for having endured another year of taxation, of prosperity, good fortune or bad, to each in accordance with his

Could we draft such a 'Proclamation''? We could. And wasn't there some special sort of feast and festivities which were customary? Affirmative; turkey and dressing, candied yams, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie... and all manner of side dishes of goodies. Then I must discuss this with the "Catering Superintendent", who was responsible for the feeding of the more than two thousand inhabitants of Das.

That individual was one John Erne, a Swiss national who had become a British subject. And not only was John quite adept in feeding and caring for the multinational populace of the Island; in his own right he was a duly recognised, certified Escoffier Chef of "Cordon Bleu" rank. John delighted in meeting any challenge in the field of food and it's preperation. John had heard of the traditional Thanksgiving Feast of the Americans, and was delighted that the "GM" was promoting the idea. We worked out a menu which the most finicky housewife would have found difficulty

in criticizing adversely. Then came the paper work. Before we could legally issue a proclamation, there must be some sort of political entity, and a "head man" who could proclaim the date of Thanksgiving. No

As County Judge, the G.M. signed the documents. First, they were hand-lettered by a very capable draftsman who was skilled in Old English Script. Lovely; they were. They were then run through the copying machine and posted on every "notice board" on the island. The next-to-last Thursday in November would be observed as Thanksgiving.

And observed it was. For at least a week, Thanksgiving was the principal topic of all conversation. Spirits were high in anticipation of observance of Thanksgiving "Of and for British both Americans".

Came the day. Now, tropical climate discouraged

sooner said than done. A "Declaration of Affiliation" was drawn up, informing all and sundry that Das Island had declared itself a part of the Great State of Texas. Henceforth Das would be identified as "Das Island County, the Easternmost County in Texas". Two officials were named. The General Manager was made County Judge and the Manager of Travel and Cargo was identified as Sheriff of the County. We didn't have time to obtain the official approval or endorsement of the State of Texas, but we have never heard any expression of objection to our unilateral alignment.

In preparation for the gala occasion of Thanksgiving Dinner; flags were flown from the three masts outside the entrance of the Staff Club. The center mast is a few feet taller than the other two, and is usually occupied by the flag of the soverign State of Abu Dhabi. The British flag and the banner of the Oil Company flank the Abu Dhabi Flag. Not on Thanksgiving Day, though. The position of honour was turned over to the flag of the

Lone Star State, with Abu Dhabi and Great Britain standing in support. It was by the order of The County Judge. And who was to ques-

The original proclamation and declaration were framed and now adorn the walls of the Staff Club. And Thanksgiving Day did not come and go on that November Day these many years back. Each year the Resident Manager issues another proclamation....with tongue-in-cheek seriousness...and Turkey and Dressing is again enjoyed by the citizens of Das Island County, the Easternmost County in Texas.






Foster Families Complete Training

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

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
