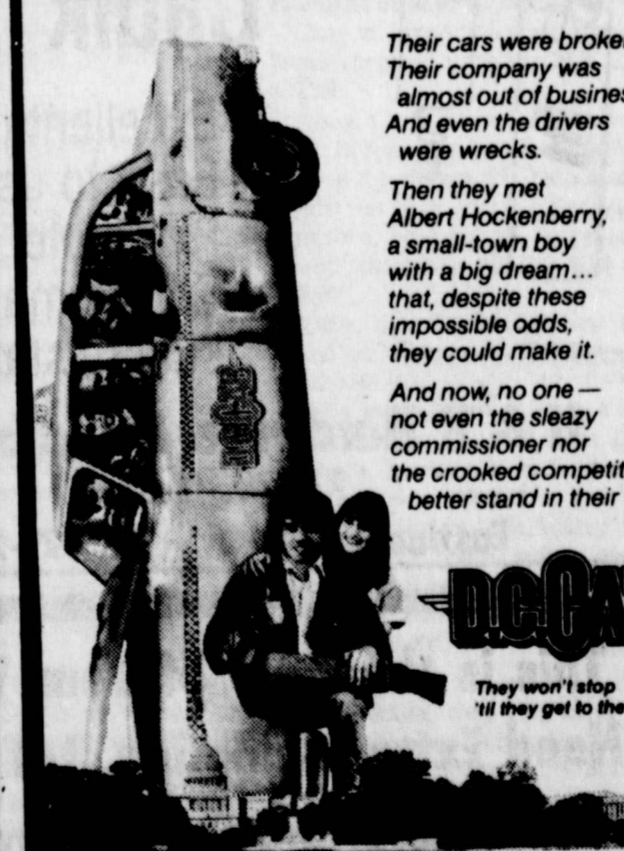

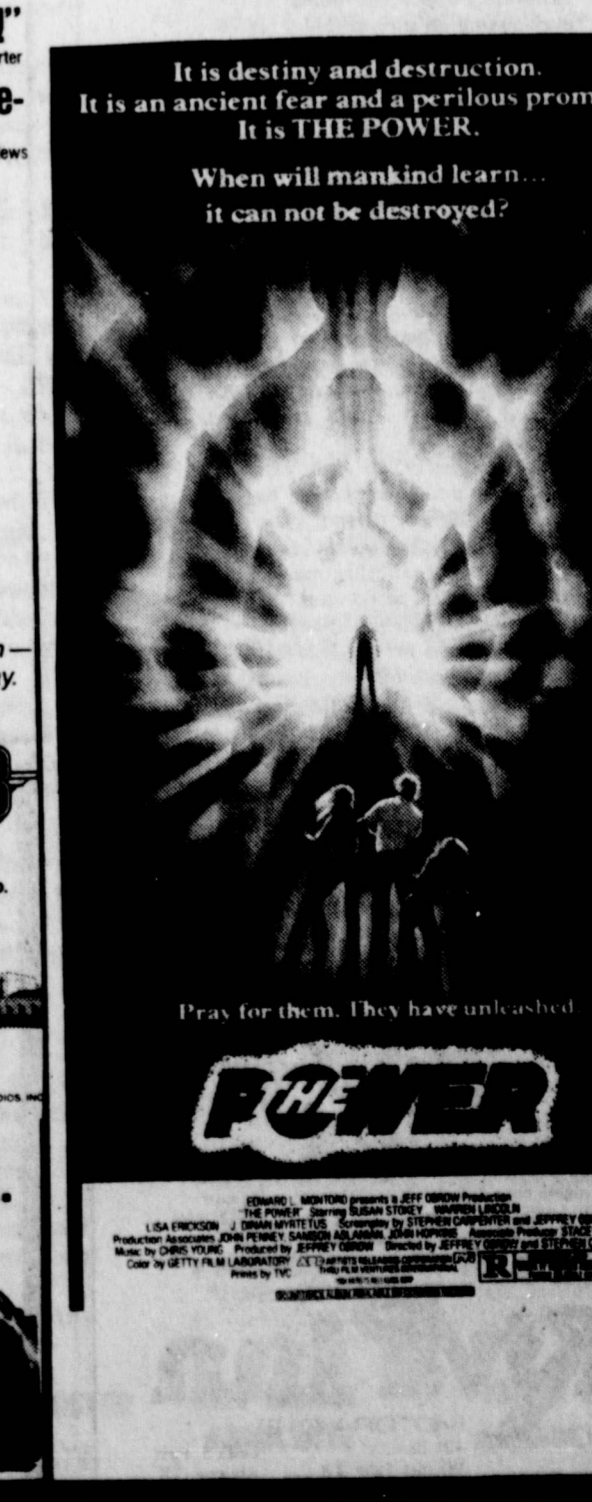

Workers' Compensation Required Of Farmers

Farmers and ranchers with one or more employees have until midnight March 16, to buy workers' compensation insurance or face very serious liability without common law defense should they be sued by an injured employee, according to Ernest Reich of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Any farm or ranch employee injured after March 16 could claim his right to sue his employer if that employer does not have workers' compensation insurance, Mr. Reich said. Mr. Reich pointed out that this situation came about as a result of the ruling March 7 by State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin that the exemption of farm and ranch laborers from workers' compensation is unconstitutional.

Mr. Reich noted that any employer liability policy (employer liability endorsement on farm and rancher owners, homeowners of farmer's comprehensive

personal liability) covering farmworkers as approved by the State Board of Insurance states that it will not pay claims of injured farmworkers if they are covered by the workers' compensation law.

Pending final disposition of this case, attorneys who have reviewed the judge's ruling have advised that the only safe course of action is for employers to acquire workers' compensation insurance immediately, Reich said.

Mr. Reich stated that Texas Farm Bureau has and will continue to oppose removal of the exemption of farm and ranch employees from workers' compensation. The Texas Attorney General has indicated that his office will appeal the ruling.

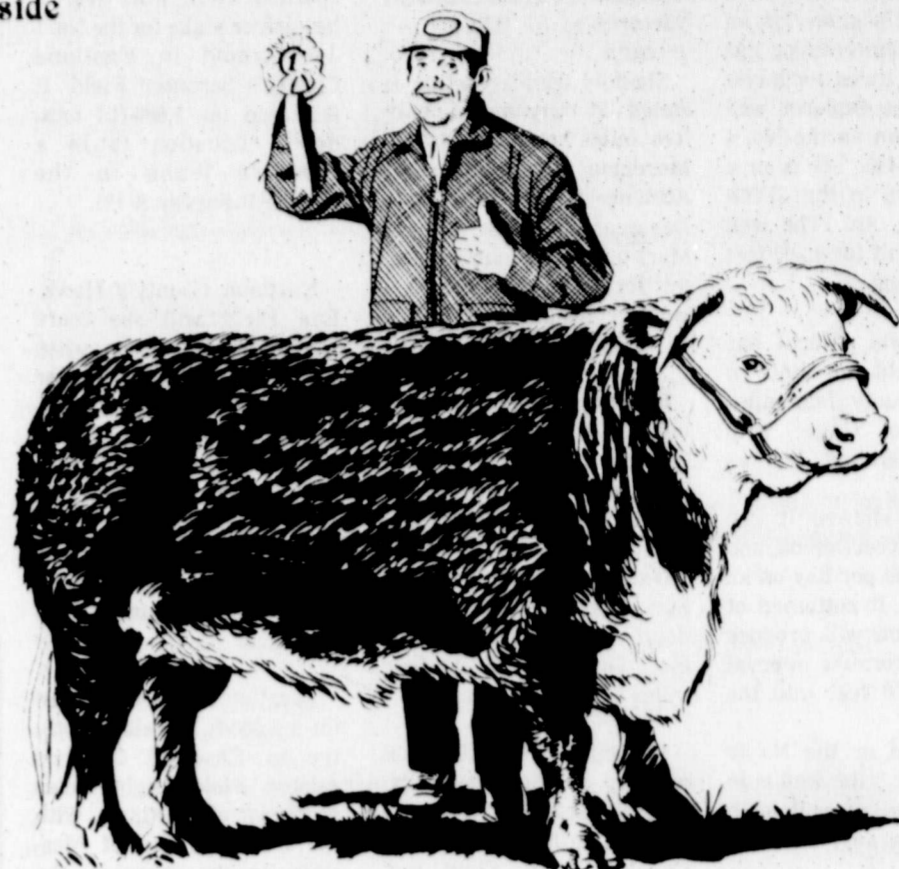

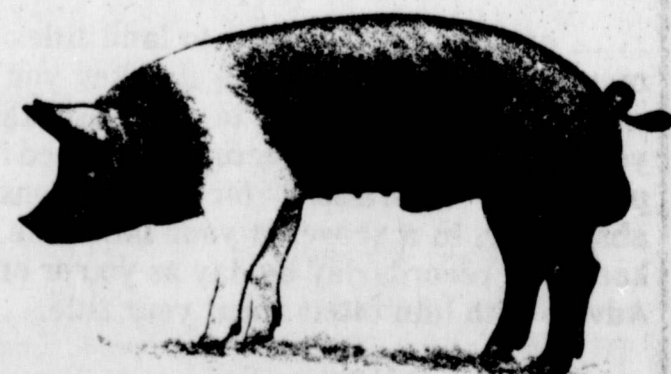

A New Way To Control Weeds

The commercial nurseries in Florida and the Southeast have used a woven matt as a ground cover for many years that is designed to promote vigorous growth and to prevent weeds. This is a brown woven plastic cover with

thousands of tiny openings so water can pass through in a gentle filtering motion. You just prepare you garden in the same way you would normally by fertilizing and tilling as usual. After you have completed this operation you would unfold this matt and place it over the area. The

matt is easily cut with sissors or a knife to fit the exact size of the area to be covered. Then you would anchor the corners with rocks or stakes. You could also cover the edges of the matt with several inches of dirt to hold it in place. This prevents the matt from blowing in the wind. After the matt is in place you can cut small slits or circular openings at the places you want to plant seeds or bedding plants. You do the same for a vegetable garden or a flower garden. This matt will virtually

eliminate weeding because the openings are too small for weeds to grow through. This feature alone will save you hours of hard work, and will result in a neater and better looking garden and will give you healthier and more productive plants. This matt also serves as a heat and moisture retaining mulch to encourage a fast start and vigorous growth during the entire season. You can water through this matt because it is a woven ground cover with a thousands of tiny openings so water can pass through in a gentle filtering motion. At the same time your garden is protected from "gully washers." The tiny holes also let the matt breathe so the soil does not become sour.

This matt discourages pests and disease because most pest do not like to travel over it. There is an additional advantage to using this matt it provides a clean resting place for fruits and vegetables like tomatoes, melons, and cucumbers because it protects them from the soil bacteria that produces rot.

This matt is called the "Weed Block" and is now available to the home gardener. The "Weed Block" lets you work in your garden without getting your knees, shoes or clothing dirty and muddy. In fact you can go into your garden just after a rain and not get muddy.

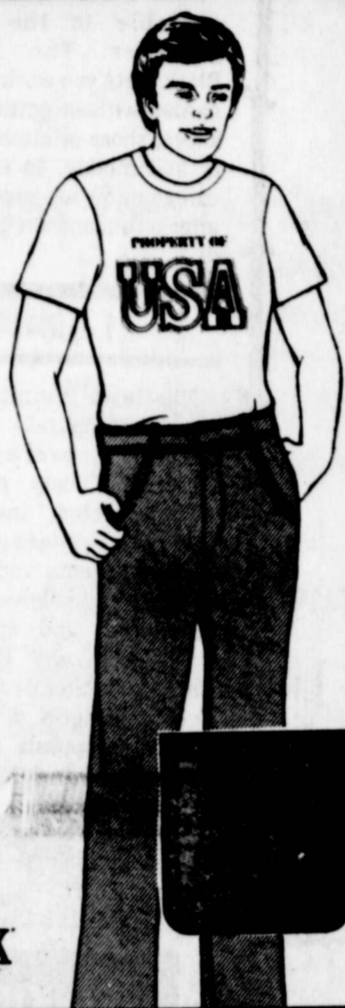

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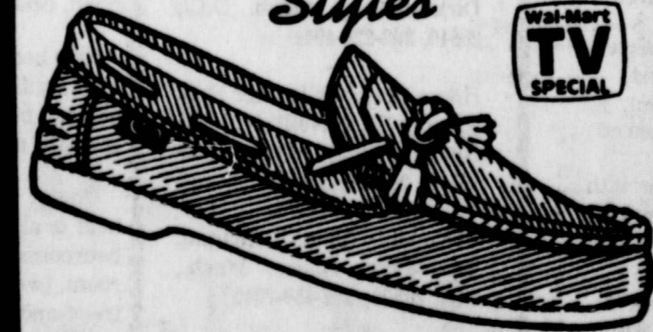

Commissioners Ask D.A. About Gate

Eastland County District Attorney Emory Walton appeared before County Commissioners Monday at the request of Richard Robinson, Precinct 1 commissioner.

Robinson was seeking legal advice before requesting the removal of a gate that had been placed across a county road north of the city.

The commissioner told Walton that District Judge Jim R. Wright had advised him to obtain a letter from Walton before attempting to remove the gate.

In an effort to show Robinson that as commissioner he had the authority to take the gate down, Walton said, "If someone put a gate across I-20, Buddy Haun (resident engineer of the Texas highway department) would jerk it down."

Robinson replied, "No, he wouldn't. He wouldn't have to. The sergeant of the highway patrol would have it removed."

The commissioner continued, "I don't have a badge or a gun to enforce the law. That's why I'm looking to you for a letter giving me authority to remove the gate."

But Walton did not comment whether he would comply with Robinson's request.

After Walton left, a copy of a letter from district attorney's office was circulated. In the letter, written to deal with a very similar situation, the district attorney had requested - a strong language - that another gate be removed.

Before leaving the commissioner's court, Walton requested and got \$3,000 to pay for a partial pre-trial transcript of the Loyal Lundstrom murder trial.

Commissioners voted to amend the operating budget in that amount.

Commissioners also voted to amend the budget of \$1,700 to enable Nancy Trout, tax collector-assessor, to purchase equipment to allow her office to receive duplicate car titles of certificate from Austin by Silent Sender over the telephone.

In other action, commissioners took no action on a request to open a neighborhood lane in the Scranton community.

Joe Mosley of Brazos Construction Machine Co. in Elm Mott was the successful bidder on a used Caterpillar for use in Precinct 3. The bid of \$25,230 allows a \$4,500 trade-in on another Caterpillar the city currently owns, leaving a total of \$20,730.

Commissioner C.B. Dill reported that renovation done on the fourth floor of the courthouse is almost finished, and the floor is now occupied. The area will be used by the 11th Court of Appeals.

Dill requested that the budget be amended by \$2,200 to be paid from revenue-sharing to pay for two heating and cooling units and to purchase partitions to separate office space on the fourth floor. His request was approved.

Permission was granted to Dick Johnson with Flatwood Gas Inc. to cross county roads No. 309 and No. 298 in Precinct 1 with gas pipelines.

Houston Satterwhite with Sun Exploration and Production Co. was given permission to cross county road No. 454 in Precinct 2 with a pipeline.

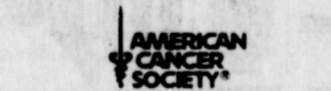
USDA has estimated 1983 peanut production costs declined from those of 1982, so no increase is necessary.

Additional peanuts are those grown in addition to a farm's poundage quota or those grown on a farm without a poundage quota.

Price support rates on additional peanuts are set by USDA to ensure no loss to the Commodity Credit Corporation from sale or disposal of such peanuts placed under loan. This determination takes into account factors such as the demand for peanut oil and peanut meal, foreign demand for U.S. peanuts and expected prices for other vegetable oils and protein meals.

Current law requires the national support price for 1984 quota peanuts to be the 1983 quota support level, adjusted for any increase in the average cost of production, excluding any rise in the land cost for 1983. This increase cannot be more than 6 percent.

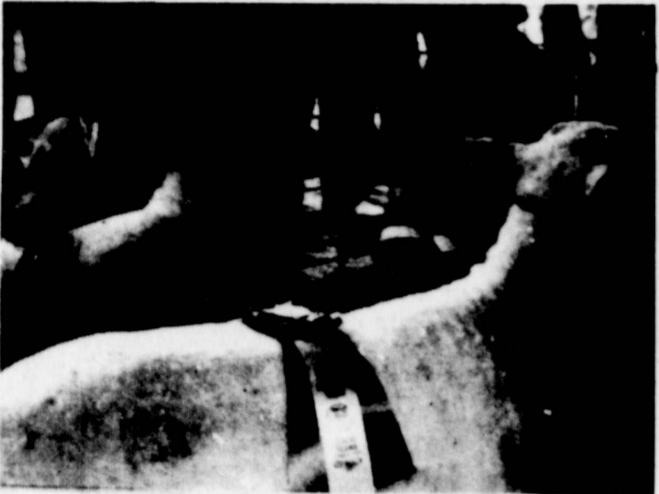

'83 Gas Production Down From 1982

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 462,474,761 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in November 1983, down 3.93 percent from field runs a year earlier.

That brings total production for the year through November to 5,091,765,615 Mcf of gas. Through November of 1982, Texas had produced 5,639,221,018 Mcf of gas.

Marketed gas production in November totaled 377,356,613 Mcf and reflected

a 4.14 percent decrease from the November 1982 volume. Marketed production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is reinjected into the producing reservoir to maintain gas pressure, gas that is used to fuel production-related equipment on the lease site, or gas that is otherwise not marketed.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in November totaled 175,437,733 Mcf, and reflected a 6.05 percent decrease from the year-earlier month.

Texas gas production in November came from 237,281 oil and gas wells.

In October 1983, Texas wells produced 477,359,527 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in October totaled 380,714,302 Mcf. October exports of Texas-produced gas totaled 139,366,801 Mcf.

Just as the women's lives are varied, so are the songs that were selected for "Blues in the Night," according to director Sheldon Epps, who also conceived and directed the show for Broadway. "There's a misconception that blues music is all alike, and it all says the same kind of thing," Epps said. "I hope this show proves that the blues express every kind of emotion, from pain to elation to feeling sexy."

Epps describes "Blues in the Night" as a celebration of great American Music with that kind of classy production value that says "show biz." The three women in "Blues" are supported by five jazz musicians, including musical director Clem Moorman. Adding a visual dimension to the show are a stunning set and theatrical lighting, which bring to "Blues" the finesse that characterizes the best of Broadway.

CONSERVATIVES OF every type stripe convened in Eastland County Monday night to cheer their champion: West Texas Front Runner for United States Senate Kent Hance and Cong. Charles Stenholm who were in town for a fund-raiser and to rally and be rallied by those who hope for an end to the "mortgaging of future generations in deficit spending."

Amid barbecue (Oscar's no less), bands (found and good), banners (bunting of red, white and blue; flags, flowers and posters), some 300 paid \$10 a plate (and more) to express their political zeal.

Hance is strong in West Texas and if that enthusiasm can be carried south and east and particularly into the metropolitan areas, he stands a good chance of becoming the next United States Senator from Texas.

Most see Hance as "our kind of folks" and more than a few have already declared him to be the type of common-sense representative Texas (and the nation) needs in the Senate.

(At a publishers' seminar in South Texas last weekend, the top writer for a major metro paper, said of Hance: "He's the kind of person everybody deep down would want to see in office." We found through coffee-break visits, that publishers throughout the state feel the same way and are gearing up to push him in their respective areas. We were much encouraged and even though he's not getting (or actively seeking) certain endorsements, find that those groups are refusing or splitting their endorsements of the other candidates, so Hance could prove to be the man THAT THE PEOPLE WILL ELECT.

A number in this area (and throughout the state) have already started a letter-writing campaign in his behalf. It could well be the key(s) that opens the doors for him in the Metropolitan areas to earn for him the help he deserves to win the biggest election of his life.

One man in particular we know, is sending a brief letter, in his own handwriting, to everyone he knows in other parts of the state, urging them to support and help Hance. Brief, sincere "Letters to the Editor" from locals in towns all over Texas could prove to be the weight that tips the scales in his favor as far as name identification, financial and voting strength on election day.

Some are not altogether pleased with Cong. Stenholm for having voted with the administration on certain matters but who could fault him for voting his convictions? Hance is the same kind of statesman. We might not always agree with their choices and votes, but if we know that they always do what they believe to be best under the circumstances, then who are we to argue with that?

Some would fault Stenholm for picking a candidate to back before the nomination, rather than waiting to "back his party's slate." Wouldn't it be shallow of me not to do the same thing?" I won't argue with that. They...both...at...the...rally...

were described as "men who'd go to the well with you"—the old LBJ reference to those people who can be counted on in fair weather or foul to stand by you then you need 'em.

And I'll tell you, when we need somebody to "go to the well" or make decisions in Washington that affect our national defense, and the future of our kids and grandkids, I'll take a Kent Hance and a Charlie Stenholm any day for making decisions and helping tote the bucket.

ONE OTHER thought before yielding the soapbox: Why in the world do we common-sense human-beings who pride ourselves in higher intelligence, permit ourselves to commit the criminal act of parking in handicapped parking spaces when we have no right in the world to do so?

We've done it and are ashamed. If you've done it, bet you're ashamed too. Let's not wet-ropes ourselves to death though.

Better to make a private vow-pledge right now, never to do it again.

If we have trouble doing this voluntarily, perhaps we might try this little experiment:

The next time we have occasion to park at the courthouse, hospital, schools, shopping center or wherever, let's park as far as we possibly can from where we're bound, and try walking from the car to the front of the door WITH OUR EYES CLOSED. Or maybe from the car to the door, dragging one foot all the way. Or maybe from the car to the door, duck-walking to imagine we're in a wheel chair.

Editor:

Why? Why is Eastland growing daily while Cisco loses industry and business by the month? Well, let's look at some of the more obvious reasons. First of all, Eastland had the foresight to upgrade their water and sewage systems, and improve their streets, years ago. The overall appearance of their town is neat and well-kept. Eastland has a large water supply with approved water at a reasonable rate. Cisco, on the other hand, does not have enough water to sustain any substantial growth. Our streets are in desperate need of paving, and our sewer system, even with a new treatment plant, will still need updating. Our water is such a health hazard, that many people are buying bottled water just to avoid the illnesses resulting from the bacteria. This is of course, just a broad look at the situation, there are many other factors involved, but the biggest and perhaps least obvious problem that Cisco has had in attracting new business is simply that they are not welcomed here.

Many of the business in Eastland scouted Cisco first. Many more have looked here and gone on to other towns. Why? It seems that there are a few people in this town that have "DRIVEN" businesses away. The whole town pays for this short-sighted attitude. Young families that came here to escape the big city, are being forced to leave in order to find jobs. More and more retired people are expressing regret over moving here. Why isn't business welcomed and encouraged here? Why has Eastland, which was nearly of equal size to Cisco, a short five years ago grown so rapidly? Why do our children have to leave this town for any kind of recrea-

tion?

Could it be the fear of competition, fear of the loss of power, or fear of the loss of control? Why? Competition is a fantastic thing - the more stores, shops and services in a given area - the greater the number of shoppers that will be pulled in to patronize them. The more business generated, the lower the prices and the better the selection of goods and services. Cisco would benefit from additional competition, especially in the areas of health care, grocery stores and financial institutions. As for power and control, when they are misused for the personal gain of a few people, with disregard for the good of the entire community - eventually, everyone pays the price.

Perhaps we are so far behind that we will never achieve any real growth. Perhaps the best we can hope for is just to maintain the status quo, but if we could turn this situation around, and encourage the establishment of industry and business maybe our children won't be forced to leave after graduation just to earn a living wage.

It wasn't easy for me to write this, and although it will offend some individuals, I felt that the kids deserve to be answered. Most importantly though, until we are all aware of what goes on behind the scenes, and how our town is perceived, we cannot hope to change the attitudes and actions that are discouraging growth.
