

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

Workers' Compensation Required Of Farmers

Farmers and ranchers with one or more employees have until midnight March 16, to buy workers' compensation insurance or face very serious liability without common law defense should they be sued by an injured employee, according to Ernest Reich of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Any farm or ranch employee injured after March 16 could claim his right to sue his employer if that employer does not have workers' compensation insurance, Mr. Reich said.

Mr. Reich pointed out that this situation came about as a result of the ruling March 7 by State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin that the exemption of farm and ranch laborers from workers' compensation is unconstitutional.

Mr. Reich noted that any employer liability policy (employer liability endorsement on farm and rancher owners, homeowners of farmer's comprehensive

personal liability) covering farmworkers as approved by the State Board of Insurance states that it will not pay claims of injured farmworkers if they are covered by the workers' compensation law.

Mr. Reich stated that Texas Farm Bureau has and will continue to oppose removal of the exemption of farm and ranch employees from workers' compensation. The Texas Attorney General has indicated that his office will appeal the rul-

Pending final disposition of this case, attorneys who have reviewed the judge's ruling have advised that the only safe course of action is for employers to acquire workers' compensation insurance immediately, Reich



Prices Announced

Peanut farmers will USDA has estimated 1983 receive a national average support level of \$550 per short ton for 1984-crop quota peanuts and \$185 per ton for 1984-crop additional peanuts, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said today.

These are the same price support levels in effect for 1983-crop peanuts.

Additional loan and collateral peanuts from the 1984 crop will be sold by USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation for export edible use at no less than \$425 per ton, Block said.

Current law requires the national support price for 1984 quota peanuts be the 1983 quota support level, adjusted for any increase in the average cost of production, . excluding any rise in the land cost for 1983. This increase cannot be more than 6 percent.

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



Just as the women's lives are varied, so are the songs that were selected for "Blues in the Night," according to director Sheldon Epps, who also conceived and directed the show for Broadway. "There's a misconception that blues music is all alike, and it all says the same kind of thing," Epps said. "I hope this show proves that the blues express every kind of emotion, from pain to elation to feeling

Epps describes "Blues in the Night" as a celebration of great American Music with that kind of classy production value that says "show biz." The three women in "Blues" are supported by five jazz musicians, including musical director Clem Moorman. Adding a visual dimension to the show are a stunning set and theatrical lighting, which bring to "Blues" the finesse that characterizes




