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





Gordon Spot

It's time to spray fruit trees if you want fruit free of worms this year. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases. Diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab can be prevented by spraying with a fungicide. The suggested insecticides are Methoxychlor, Malathion and Zolone. The recommended funcides include Captan, wettable sulfur and Benomyl. Follow the directions on the amount of chemicals to add per gallon of water. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to apply as many as 5 applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches.

It may still be too early to tell if most landscape plants will recover from the recordsetting cold weather in December.

with the spring season still a few weeks off, homeowners need to be patient regarding the removal of "dead" plants or pruning of freeze-damaged plants.

The ability of freezedamaged plants to recover depends heavily on weather conditions this spring and on proper cultural practices.

Damaged plants will often send out new shoots from the roots. Unless the plant was budded or grafted, the new growth will be the same as the original plant.

Careful pruning of a damaged plant can encourage compact growth and make the plant attractive. Remove dead or damaged wood by pruning to good, sound tissue. However, it's best to wait until new growth starts before pruning so that you can determine the extent of the injury. Pruning too soon can result in either removing too much uninjured wood or in not removing enough damaged wood, in which case the plant will have to be pruned again later.

Of course, some plants will be so heavily damaged or will not recover from the freeze so that they will have to be replaced. However, wait until warm weather prevails to determine the status of your plants.

Check ground covers for signs of growth on the lower runners of shoots. Once the danger of a hard freeze is past, cut back the dead tops to allow the sun to warm the soil and encourage new growth. Use a weedeater or hedge shears to remove brown tops in liriope and mondo grass.

Fertilize all landscape plants now to encourage new growth. Apply 1-1/ pounds of 12-12-12 fertilizer per 100 square feet, then watering thoroughly to work the fertilizer into the soil so the roots can use it.

Of special importance is to water landscape plants regularly so that they don't undergo moisture stress. This is particularly important in later spring and early summer when dry periods often plague the county.



Children act fast....so do oisons. That's the theme for National Poison Prevention Week slated for March 18-24. We want to remind adults not to leave any potentially poisonous products unattended, even for a minute. Adults should not allow themselves to be distracted by a telephone call, the doorbell, or food cooking on the stove. Distractions can be disastrous.

Learn to ACT FAST in accidental poisoning cases-you may save a life. Learn speedbased emergency steps during National Poison-Prevention Week since an overwhelming percentage of accidental poisonings happen to children under the age of five. Much of this is due to the natural curiosity of youngsters and their tendency to put things in their mouths.

In the prevention of child poisonings, safety packaging of childproof containers have compiled an excellent record of success. Introduced in 1972, safety packaging has helped reduce the number of certain product poisonings by 56 percent. Care should be taken,

however, not to rely on safety packaging completely. Since child proof containers must be reasonably easy for adults to open, some children will be able to open them as well. Thus it's important to keep medication and other poisons, even if they are in safety type containers, out of the reach of

HERE'S WHAT to do if a child accidentally swallows a poisonous substance.

-Call a poison control center, doctor or hospital immediately for specific action

-Read the label information on the product that was swallowed. Some labels give first aid information.

-Make sure that the airway is clear and that breathing has not stopped. (Apply artificial respiration -Keep the child warm.

-- If the child is unconscious, do not attempt to induce vomiting or give anything by mouth. -Follow first aid instruc-

tions of poison control center, doctor or hospital personnel.

DO NOT induce vomiting for corrosive substances such as household cleaners, bleach, ammonia and dishwashing machine detergents. For most of them, experts say to dilute the poison with water or

In other cases involving non-corrosive substances such as medicines, shoe polish and alcohol, vomiting is generally recommended. A good precautionary move is to keep a one-ounce supply of syrup of ipecac in the home - to induce vomiting when recommended.

When the child is taken to the hospital emergency room or doctor's office, take the product container, too. Label information will help the doctor decide on further treatment.

1 (3 % ounce) package vanilla instant pudding mix. Combine cake mix, mandarin oranges, eggs, and oil; beat 2 minutes at highest speed of electric mixer. Reduce speed to low; beat 1 minute. Pour batter into 3 greased and floured 9 inch

round cake pans.

Bake at 350 degrees F. for 20-25 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans, and then turn out to cool completely. Combine pineapple, whipped topping and pudding mix; beat 2 minutes at medium speed of



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

R.C.&D. Has Annual Banquet

After a very good dinner at the Leon-Bosque Resource Conservation and Development Area annual banquet held at Lake Proctor, Eastland's Ron Bailey spoke about the purpose, scope of projects and projects underway by or of the organization and Robert King, who Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower sent to speak in his place as he had become ill, campaigned for the Democratic Party, telling the crowd that his party was for more federal spending in this area.

In the business meeting chaired by Mrs. Betty Terrill of DeLeon, minutes were approved, a treasurer's report was given, and officers, County Directors and Executive Council members were elected. Douglas Fry of Cisco, who also gave the invocation and G.A. White of Eastland were the Executive Council members elected

from Eastland County.

Ron Bailey explained that organizations such as this did not exist everywhere in Texas but that there were ten in the State.

Two types of projects are handled through the Leon-Bosque R.C. and D: federally fundable projects such as erosion and flood control and drainage, water quality control and irrigation to name a few; and non-federally fundable projects such as parks and water and sewer plants.

The Leon-Bosque Area has completed 67 projects and has 14 more underway. These projects include a sewer plant for Cisco and a baseball complex in Eastland. The Hilton project in Cisco may also be included in the program.

It was reported that \$1.1 million in funding had been received for the conservation projects plus an additional \$400,000 for city parks

OUESTION: Is research close to finding the secret of how cancer

ANSWERline: Recent findings from studies of the genetic factors in malignancy suggest that an understanding of the mechanics of cancer may be rapidly developing. The recent identification of certain genes - called "oncogenes" - in normal cells is one of the promising new discoveries: Oncogenes appear to be involved in the production of cancer by somehow cluding normal cell controls and triggering the uncontrolled growth which is characteristic of cancer.

QUESTION: What new treatments are under development for the control of cancer!

ANSWERline. Now in the experimental stage are "hybridomas," hybrid cells that can be programmed to produce antibodies that seek out foreign substances or cancer cells and destroy them. Researchers are also devising ways to put anticancer drugs into antibodies which then become "guided missiles" carrying anticancer drugs directly to cancer cells without affecting normal cells. Work also is progressing with "biological response moditiers" like interferon, which is still in the experimental stage. Interferons are natural body substances which can cause at least partial regression in some forms of malie nant tumors. These natural products have a different mode of action than the anticancer drugs now in use, and are not as toxic

QUESTION: Is there any connection between the smoking habits of parents and children?

ANSWERline: Yes. Studies show that two-thirds of the high school students who smoke cigarettes have parents who smoke.

QUESTION: Why does eigarettesmoking cause coughing?

ANSWERline: The irritation of cigarette smoke destroys tiny hairlike structures in the throat called cilia. When the cilia can no longer function properly, coughing is the only way a person can get rid of debris and mucous which the cilia would normally carry away from QUESTION: Can cancer develop without any symptoms?

ANSWERline: Yes. Symptoms may not appear until cancer has invaded an organ or spread to other parts of the body. However some cancer may be detected by tests and physical examination before they would otherwise be noticed. This is why regular cancer checkups are so important.

QUESTION: Does everyone suffer from nausea and vomiting after radiation therapy

ANSWERline: Although nausca and vomiting are typical side effects of radiation therapy, not all patients experience these discomforts during treatment. Such side effects usually depend on the level of radiation received, and sometimes there are ways to avoid or overcome them. Patients preparing for radiation therapy should consult their physician as to what to expect, and what instructions to

QUESTION: Do women get blad-

der cancer! ANSWERline: Bladder cancer is more prevalent among men by almost three to one. It occurs mostly in persons above 50 years of age Men who work in industries using dyes and other chemicals are at higher risk

OUESTION: Do young men get prostate cancer?

ANSWERline: Prostate cancer generally occurs in men over 50, although younger men have been known to get it Prostate cancer also occurs more frequently in married men than among single

Western Production Company, 1701 River Run Road, Suite 812, Fort Worth, Texas 76107, has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to dispose of produced salt water or other oil and gas waste by well injection into a porous formation not productive of oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to dispose of oil and gas waste into the Cross Cut Hutton "C", Well Number 4. The proposed disposal well is located 1/2 mile south of Scranton in the Scranton Field, in Eastland County. The waste water will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from 1650' to 1700' feet.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Chapter 27 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, Title 3 of the Natural Resources Code, as amended, and the Statewide Rules of the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.
