## DA Working On Lundstrom Brief

It will probably be May 9th before an answer to a defense petition asking the 11th Court of Appeals, Eastland, to overturn the life sentence verdict given Lloyd Lundstrom in 91st District Court can be filed. District Attorney Emory Walton reported Friday.

Lundstrom, 60, was sentenced to spend the remainder of his life in the state prison when he was tried last September on charges of murder in the shooting death of his 27-year old wife, Doris, at their Cisco home.

Defense Attorney Bill Hart, who gave notice of appeal when the jury returned its verdict, filed a brief with the Appeals Court on March 5th. The district attorney normally has 30 days in which to file an answer but Mr. Walton said the pressure of his duties was such that he would have to ask for a month's extension.

In his brief, the defense counsel alleged that:

1. The court erred in not granting his motion for a change of venue.
2. The court erred in not granting a motion that there was insufficient evidence for conviction.
3. The court erred in not granting a motion for a new trial when the district attorney questioned a witness about a confession made by the defendant.

4. The court erred in refusing the defense counsel access to files regarding the work of Policemen Randy Whittle and Jackie Hobbs of Cisco.

5. The court erred in admitting into evidence a letter written by the defendant to his pastor.

The trial lasted some 10 days before Lundstrom was convicted. The shooting occurred March 3, 1983, at the couple's apartment at their Cisco Motel and Monument business in East Cisco. Lundstrom gave himself up some 10 days after disappearing.

After the District Attorney's answer is filed, the Court of Appeals will set a hearing date for attorneys to appear for arguments. A decision by the court will then follow within a few months.

Reports circulated here recently that Lundstrom was out of prison and living in an area city. Mr. Walton said he heard these reports and telephoned the prison in Huntsville. He was told that Lundstrom was at the Wynne Unit and had been since being taken to Huntsville soon after his conviction.

Firemen went to Highway 80 east at 11:10 p.m. Wednesday when a pickup truck caught fire. Records were incomplete on the incident.

Last Tuesday, firemen assisted a rural family find an elderly man who wandered away from the home. The man was found after an hour's search and was in good condition.

## Sale of Lake Cisco Courts Approved After Bid Opening

The Lake Cisco Courts, which includes nine native stone cabins on 10.49 acres of land, were sold to Johnny Hargrave of Cisco for the sum of \$34,500.00 after a bid opening at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

Mr. Hargrave, highest of four bidders, told the Council that he plans to remodel and redecorate the cabins and will probably add camping facilities to the project, located on the Lake Cisco Road across from the Cisco Country Club. The cabins were built by the city to com-

pliment the Lake Cisco park area some 40 years ago.

The sale did not include the cabins in Lake Cisco Park - below the hill. City Attorney Bill Wright told the Council that it would probably take about a month to complete paper work, including an abstract, to finalize the sale. Mr. Hargrave attended the meeting and addresses the Council.

Other bidders included Daniel J. Williams of Eastland, Otis and Coy Cole of Abilene, and Wayne Webb of Cisco. The cabins had

been advertised for sale previously with unsatisfactory bids.

Councilmen expressed the opinion that the price was fair, considering the age and condition of the cabins. Mayor Eric Ritchie noted that the city had been losing money on operating the cabins for several years.

The nine cabins include a 3-bedroom office-caretaker cabin, five one-bedroom cabins and three efficiency-type cabins. There are two four-car carports. The city retains a utility easement for an existing 16-inch water

main across the northwest corner of the land. Mineral rights were also retained.

In other action, the Council approved on first reading an ordinance vacating and abandoning parts of four streets - Britton Avenue, Berry Avenue, Spears Avenue and Bailey Street - in the College Heights Addition. The action was requested by Raymond Whitley who lives on the property and owns all of the area involved. He told the Council that adjoining property owners would not be damaged as none of the

streets are now open. Earl Blackstock, who lives on adjoining property, was present and asked that access to his property be assured.

The Council approved and accepted a plan for Springwood Unit No. 1, an addition that Dr. Norman Wallace is opening on land he owns just west of the city limits on I-20. Eight lots of five acres will be opened initially. A paved street will be built down the middle of the 40-acre tract with a turnaround at the end. All of the tracts will front on the street. City water, electricity and gas will be available. Septic tanks will be built for each tract.

An Austin firm was hired for the sum of \$260 to assist city engineers in preparing application for grant funds for a 1984 community development program. Ballots and supplies for the 1984 city election were approved.

The Council called for bids to be opened at the March 27th meeting for the purchase of a small tractor with mowing equipment. Specifications are available at the city manager's office. City Manager Mike Moore said funds to buy the tractor and equipment are provided in the current city budget.

The Council ordered a special meeting for 10 a.m. Saturday, March 31, to make an inspection tour of water system improvements construction projects. The tour will start from the city hall and the public will be welcome, Mayor Ritchie reported.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Ritchie, City Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Bobby Rains, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Bateas, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright.

## City's Toronado Alert Is Ready

With the tornado season approaching, Cisco residents were reminded this week by City Manager Mike Moore that sirens are still ready for use in the event of "tornado eminent threat."

The alert warning will be a blast that will last for three full minutes, Mr. Moore said. If the weather looks bad and the sirens sounds a long blast, residents should take cover.

During the daylight hours, the siren is sounded with one short blast for fire alarms. The new time for test blasts of the three sirens over town will be at 1 p.m. on the first day of each month.

Cisco firemen send out a team to watch clouds during stormy conditions and they are equipped with radio for use in alert warnings. It was understood that the Eastland County Dispatch office also plans to have sky watch teams during storm conditions.

## City Being Sued On Water Rates

Westbound Water Supply Corporation has filed suit in 91st District Court at Eastland for clarification of the water contract between the corporation and the City of Cisco.

Under the contract that was written when the corporation began operations in the area some five years ago, Westbound was paying 50 cents per thousand gallons for water. Recently, the city raised water rates for all consumers and Westbound's new rate was set at \$1.27 per thousand.

The rate raise was made to finance and extensive water improvement program, in-

cluding a filtration plant, and city officials said the added income was necessary to pay for the program.

The City Council, meeting in executive session after Tuesday night's meeting, voted to employ counsel to assist City Attorney Bill Wright in representing the city. An Austin firm filed the suit for Westbound.

City Manager Mike Moore said the city had not been officially served with court papers in the suit as of Wednesday.

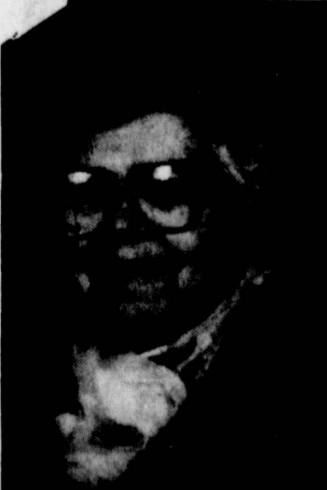

The apostle Paul so beautifully declares to the Romans, "For we are saved by hope: but hope that is seen is not hope: for what a man seeth, why doth he yet hope for?" (Romans 8:24). Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3,4).

Would you not this day believe that Jesus is the Son of God, Savior of the world. (John 8:24) Would you not turn from a sinful life and repent of those things you have done contrary to God's will? (Luke 13:3). And then in that believing, repentant state, would you not put your Lord on in baptism to arise to walk a new life? (Romans 6:3,4).

If you would you could have that hope of which Paul speaks that would keep your eyes lifted toward heaven and someday make that place your eternal home.

The nurse, in fact, may well be the person who gives the last comforting services to the dying patient and be a source of great comfort to his family as well.

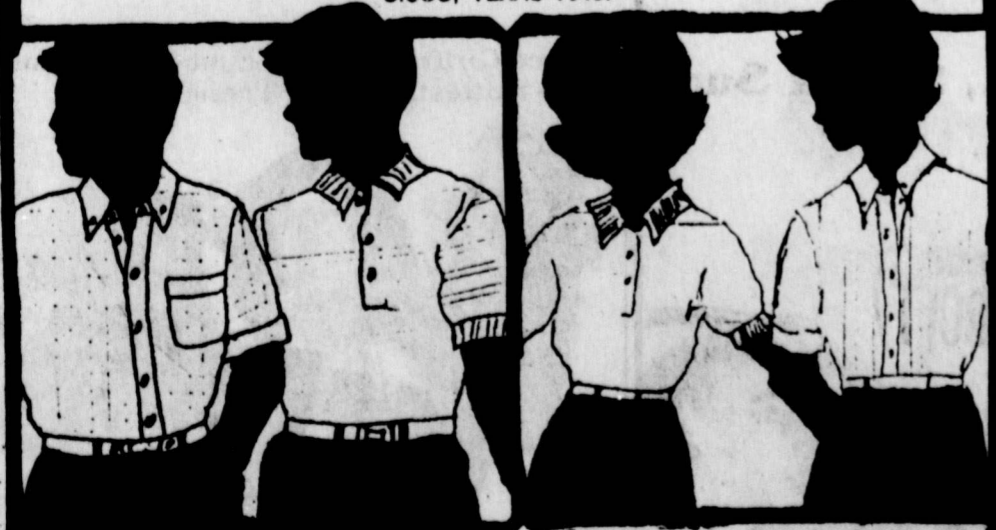

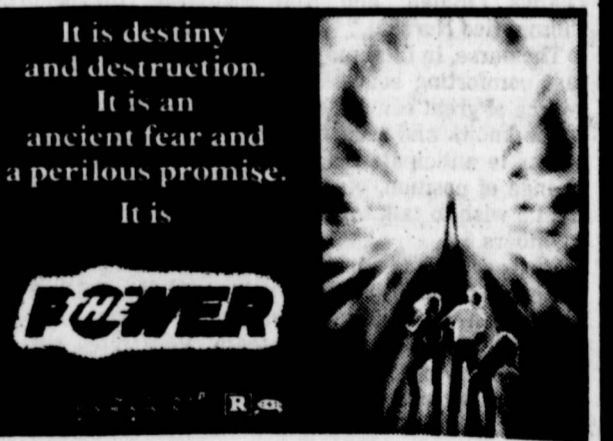

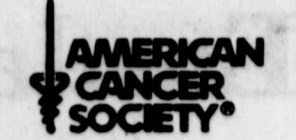

It's time to spray fruit trees if you want fruit free of worms this year. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases. Diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab can be prevented by spraying with a fungicide. The suggested insecticides are Methoxychlor, Malathion and Zolone. The recommended fungicides include Captan, wettable sulfur and Benomyl. Follow the directions on the amount of chemicals to add per gallon of water. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to apply as many as 5 applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches. We have Homeowners Fruit and Nut Spray schedules in the Extension Office to give you more information on fruit tree spraying.

It may still be too early to tell if most landscape plants will recover from the record-setting cold weather in December.

With the spring season still a few weeks off, homeowners need to be patient regarding the removal of "dead" plants or pruning of freeze-damaged plants.

The ability of freeze-damaged plants to recover depends heavily on weather conditions this spring and on proper cultural practices.

Damaged plants will often send out new shoots from the roots. Unless the plant was budded or grafted, the new growth will be the same as the original plant.

Careful pruning of a damaged plant can encourage compact growth and make the plant attractive. Remove dead or damaged wood by pruning to good, sound tissue. However, it's best to wait until new growth starts before pruning so that you can determine the extent of the injury. Pruning too soon can result in either removing too much uninjured wood or in not removing enough damaged wood, in which case the plant will have to be pruned again later. Of course, some plants will be so heavily damaged or will not recover from the freeze so that they will have to be replaced. However, wait until warm weather prevails to determine the status of your plants.

Check ground covers for signs of growth on the lower runners of shoots. Once the danger of a hard freeze is past, cut back the dead tops to allow the sun to warm the soil and encourage new growth. Use a weedeater or hedge shears to remove brown tops in liriopse and mondo grass.

Fertilize all landscape plants now to encourage new growth. Apply 1-1/2 pounds of 12-12-12 fertilizer per 100 square feet, then watering thoroughly to work the fertilizer into the soil so the roots can use it.

Of special importance is to water landscape plants regularly so that they don't undergo moisture stress. This is particularly important in later spring and early summer when dry periods often plague the county.

If plants fail to make any new growth by the end of April or early May, they likely will need to be replaced.

## Drilling Bits

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Rebecca Field. The No. 5 Higginbotham showed potential to make 52 barrels of oil and 110,000 CF gas per day.

The operator has 440 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 53, Blk. 4, nine miles northeast of Cisco.

# Homemaking Hints

Children act fast...so do poisons. That's the theme for National Poison Prevention Week slated for March 18-24. We want to remind adults not to leave any potentially poisonous products unattended, even for a minute. Adults should not allow themselves to be distracted by a telephone call, the doorbell, or food cooking on the stove. Distractions can be disastrous.

Learn to ACT FAST in accidental poisoning cases— you may save a life. Learn speedbased emergency steps during National Poison-Prevention Week since an overwhelming percentage of accidental poisonings happen to children under the age of five. Much of this is due to the natural curiosity of youngsters and their tendency to put things in their mouths.

In the prevention of child poisonings, safety packaging of childproof containers have compiled an excellent record of success. Introduced in 1972, safety packaging has helped reduce the number of certain product poisonings by 56 percent. Care should be taken,

however, not to rely on safety packaging completely. Since child proof containers must be reasonably easy for adults to open, some children will be able to open them as well. Thus it's important to keep medication and other poisons, even if they are in safety type containers, out of the reach of children.

HERE'S WHAT to do if a child accidentally swallows a poisonous substance.

-Call a poison control center, doctor or hospital immediately for specific action to take.

-Read the label information on the product that was swallowed. Some labels give first aid information.

-Make sure that the airway is clear and that breathing has not stopped. (Apply artificial respiration if needed.)

-Keep the child warm.

-If the child is unconscious, do not attempt to induce vomiting or give anything by mouth.

-Follow first aid instructions of poison control center, doctor or hospital personnel.

Whether or not vomiting should be induced will depend on the kind of substance swallowed.

DO NOT induce vomiting for corrosive substances such as household cleaners, bleach, ammonia and dishwashing machine detergents. For most of them, experts say to dilute the poison with water or milk.

In other cases involving non-corrosive substances such as medicines, shoe polish and alcohol, vomiting is generally recommended. A good precautionary move is to keep a one-ounce supply of syrup of ipecac in the home - to induce vomiting when recommended.

When the child is taken to the hospital emergency room or doctor's office, take the product container, too. Label information will help the doctor decide on further treatment.

**Recipe For The Week**  
Recently I was given a recipe for Mandarin Orange Cake that sounds delicious. With the arrival of spring, this cake is certain to be appealing with the fruit ingredients.

**Mandarin Orange Cake**  
1 package yellow cake mix (11 ounce) can mandarin oranges, undrained.  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup vegetable oil

1 (15 1/4 ounce) can crushed pineapple, undrained.  
1 (9 ounce) carton frozen whipped topping, thawed

1 (3 3/4 ounce) package vanilla instant pudding mix.  
Combine cake mix, mandarin oranges, eggs, and oil; beat 2 minutes at highest speed of electric mixer. Reduce speed to low; beat 1 minute. Pour batter into 3 greased and floured 9 inch round cake pans.  
Bake at 350 degrees F. for 20-25 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans, and then turn out to cool completely. Combine pineapple, whipped topping and pudding mix; beat 2 minutes at medium speed of

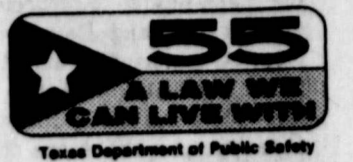

## R.C.&D. Has Annual Banquet

After a very good dinner at the Leon-Bosque Resource Conservation and Development Area annual banquet held at Lake Proctor, Eastland's Ron Bailey spoke about the purpose, scope of projects and projects underway by or of the organization and Robert King, who Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower sent to speak in his place as he had become ill, campaigned for the Democratic Party, telling the crowd that his party was for more federal spending in this area.

from Eastland County. Ron Bailey explained that organizations such as this did not exist everywhere in Texas but that there were ten in the State. Two types of projects are handled through the Leon-Bosque R.C. and D: federally fundable projects such as erosion and flood control and drainage, water quality control and irrigation to name a few; and non-federally fundable projects such as parks and water and sewer plants. The Leon-Bosque Area has completed 67 projects and has 14 more underway. These projects include a sewer plant for Cisco and a baseball complex in Eastland. The Hilton project in Cisco may also be included in the program. It was reported that \$1.1 million in funding had been received for the conservation projects plus an additional \$400,000 for city parks and such.

Robert King is the Director of the Office of Natural Resources, which is a new office set up by Mr. Hightower and its purpose seems to be to find more places and ways to spend your tax dollars. Mr. King said that federal support of the program is eroding, but he encouraged the people to go ahead with it even if there is no funds. The Democrat members of Congress seemed to be pictured by Mr. King as an Uncle Santa Claus who would gladly give the people million of dollars for whatever their hearts might desire and he gave the Democrats in Congress complete credit for the projects accomplished while President Reagan seemed to be pictured as a Scrooge for trying to reduce federal spending. He didn't mention that more money for federal projects and spending would have to come from taxing the people more or from the government borrowing more.

While Mr. King credited the big federal spending to the Democrats, and the spending is done by Congress not by the President, he didn't mention the constant reference to the resulting federal deficit by the Democrat campaigners as President Reagan's deficit. The Democrat speakers on the national level have been criticizing the President for

not reducing the deficit and balancing the budget and here Mr. King, a Democrat, criticizes the President for trying to do just that and brags that the Democrats are resisting his efforts. The Administration was criticized again by Mr. King for only wanting to fund the most needed projects and he said that other areas such as our area would get less funds. Mr. King said that President Reagan is wrong in saying that rural America is basically healthy and that more volunteerism should be used to accomplish local projects. It might be noted that a needed flood control project in Eastland has just been accomplished through such volunteerism after the city was informed by a federal agency that the cost would be way too great if the government became involv-

storage should be considered. It was also stated that Mr. Hightower and his associates are pushing Rural Community Marketing and the Agricultural Development Corp., which can get millions of federal dollars, your tax money, for projects if agricultural growers are involved.

**CANCER ANSWER LINE** American Cancer Society  
M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute

**QUESTION:** Is research close to finding the secret of how cancer begins?

**ANSWERline:** Recent findings from studies of the genetic factors in malignancy suggest that an understanding of the mechanics of cancer may be rapidly developing. The recent identification of certain genes - called "oncogenes" - in normal cells is one of the promising new discoveries. Oncogenes appear to be involved in the production of cancer by somehow eluding normal cell controls and triggering the uncontrolled growth which is characteristic of cancer.

**QUESTION:** What new treatments are under development for the control of cancer?

**ANSWERline:** Now in the experimental stage are "hybridomas," hybrid cells that can be programmed to produce antibodies that seek out foreign substances or cancer cells and destroy them. Researchers are also devising ways to put anticancer drugs into antibodies which then become "guided missiles" carrying anticancer drugs directly to cancer cells without affecting normal cells. Work also is progressing with "biological response modifiers" like interferon, which is still in the experimental stage. Interferons are natural body substances which can cause at least partial regression in some forms of malignant tumors. These natural products have a different mode of action than the anticancer drugs now in use, and are not as toxic.

**QUESTION:** Is there any connection between the smoking habits of parents and children?



Old timers used to be satisfied with a three-ring circus. 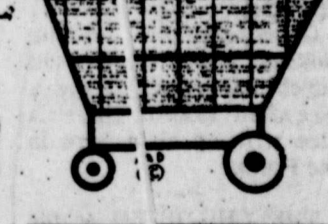
