

Plants May Be Transplanted Soon

Lubbock - Most favorable time for transplanting trees and flowering shrubs is as soon as the plants shed their leaves in late fall or early winter, according to Dr. W. W. Yocum, professor of horticulture at Texas Technological col-

Contrary to wide spread opinion, these plants make roots all during the fall and winter, and their chances of surviving transplanting is greatly increased if they are allowed to begin growing in a permanent location during this season, he stated.

Evergreen should have been transplanted in September or October, he stated, but if this has not yet been done, November is a better time than during the spring.

Distiller's Processed Grain Has Feed Value By-Product Speeds Up Growth of Livestock

By W. J. DRYDEN

Leading agricultural colleges have conducted experiments with distiller's dried grains and have found that for every bushel of grain milled in a distillery the high protein and vitamin by-products recovered are equal to one and one-seventh bushels of grain in feed value when fed with farm-raised grains.

From every bushel of grain processed for alcohol in the distillery, 17 to 18 pounds of highly nutritious animal and poultry feeds are re-



beef, the animals use up 60 per cent of the original organic matter, 25 per cent of the nitrogen, 20 per cent of the phosphorus and 10 per cent of the potash. With careful handling the manure (liquid and solid) will return to the soil a high percentage of the fertility originally contained in the feed. But under ordinary methods of handling, manure may lose as much as half its fertility and organic matter. In order to maintain and improve the soil, manure should be reinforced by other good management practices. These should include liming, the growing of deep-rooted legumes in the rotation to open and ventilate the soil, and the application of commercial fertilizer as needed.

Trials Show Efficient Feeding of Molasses

Three series of trials using a total of 122 pigs were conducted to determine the maximum amount of cane molasses that can be utilized efficiently by pigs from weaning to a weight of 70 pounds. Rations containing levels of 10, 20, 30 and 40 per cent molasses were compared with check rations containing no molasses in these experiments at Univer-

sity of Hawaii. The results indicate that, with the rations fed, 20 per cent is the maximum amount that will allow satisfactory gains and efficient feed utilization. Above this level of molasses both the rate of gain and efficiency of feed utilization decreases mark-

Cost of Keeping Rats Runs High on Farms

est animal enemies, cause enormous losses to agricultural crops, root crops, tubers, bulbs, cereals and trees. Rats also transmit such diseases as typhus and bubonic plague. It costs about two cents a day or \$7.30 a year to keep a rat. One rat will eat and destroy from 85 to 100 pounds of feed a year, or as much as is consumed by a laying hen. A cow produces on food of 225 rats.

Ice-dipping of sweet corn in the fields has been tried out during the past season and has proven that all possibility of the corn losing its sugar content has been eliminated. The ice water on the field made it

Tapioca Starch Made From New Waxy Corn

A substitute for tapioca starch now is being made from waxy corn. It is enough like the real tapioca

The particular type of waxy corn was discovered in China by an American missionary. Seeds were sent to the United States 37 years ago. From this seed has been developed a satisfactory waxy hybrid.

Farmers Urged to Pay Cash for Machinery

In many cases it will be good business for farmers to spend more money for labor-saving machinery. Many farmers are now in position to pay cash for machinery. By paying cash, they avoid the risks of having to pay this year's debts out of next year's income. They know that debt payments, which seem reasonable at present incomes, could be too heavy if income fell off sharply.

With increased shortage in labor and the high cost of labor, many farmers will find it profitable to gear their purchases of machinery toward those that offer the most in labor saving.

Home Refrigerators Supplement Lockers

The idea of supplementing central locker plant service with home-type refrigerators that include compartments for freezing and for storing frozen foods is one that appeals to farmers who are equipped with electricity.

Larger frozen cabinets now are available for farm use in which a large part of the winter supply of frozen fruits, vegetables and meats may be stored. In some cases it still may be advisable to use community or co-operative locker plants for the larger amount of frozen foods needed.

In Killing Tree Borer When applying paradichloroben zene to kill off tree borers, take hoe and pull the soil back from t. tree, down to the crown of the root system. Scrape off all gum and loose bark. Then pull the soil back up around the tree, to a height of about six to eight inches, and smooth off the top of the mound Then apply one ounce of paradichlo. rebenzene for a tree that's over three years of age.
