CHS Lobos Will Travel To Rotan This Friday Night

Seventh and Junior Varsity Teams Will Play Here Thursday

The Lobo varsity of Cisco High School will travel to Rotan this Friday night, September 14, where they will play their second game of the season. Following last Friday night's loss to DeLeon by the score of 26-20, Cisco will be looking for its first win of the season.

The Junior Varsity squad will play Ranger in Cisco Thursday night, September 13, at 6:30 p.m. The seventh grade team will also play Ranger here, but the eighth grade will not play this week. The seventh grade game will begin at 5:00 p.m. Cisco's J.V. will also be looking for its first win of the season this week, since they were defeated by DeLeon last Friday, 16-6.

CHS Head Coach John Parchman stated Tuesday, "We were pretty well pleased with Friday night's game against DeLeon." He said the varsity put forth good effort during the game.

While DeLeon was making its three touchdowns in the third quarter, Coach Parchman said at first he thought the Lobos were falling apart. Then he looked around and five of the eleven defensive starters were on the sidelines. He said the replacements were playing as hard as they could, but Cisco's second string could not quite stop DeLeon's first string.

When asked about injuries during the game, Coach Parchman said the biggest injury was "wounded pride." Most of the players had a lot of bumps and bruises, but only two were questionable about whether or not they will play Friday night.

Josh Potter, 172-pound senior offensive tailback and defensive free safety, has a strained knee, but Coach Parchman said it will not require surgery. Also questionable was James Berry, 120 junior offensive end and defensive strong safety, who has a sprained arm; however, Coach Parchman said Berry may be able to play in Friday night's game.

One problem the Lobos are a little concerned about is the fact that five members of the varsity squad missed workouts Monday due to an intestinal virus. Coach Parchman said some were pretty sick and there were even thoughts about hospitalizing a few of them.

So, if everyone gets over their illnesses by the Friday night game, Cisco will probably have the same starting line-up as last week. Those players are as follows:

Defense--Ends, Johnny Seabourn and James Deadman; tackles, Don Baggett and Willard Johnson; linebackers, Dusty Deitiker, Johnny Ramirez and Patrick Qualls; cornerbacks, Steve Abbott and Danny Kerney; strong safety, James Berry; and free safety, Josh Potter.

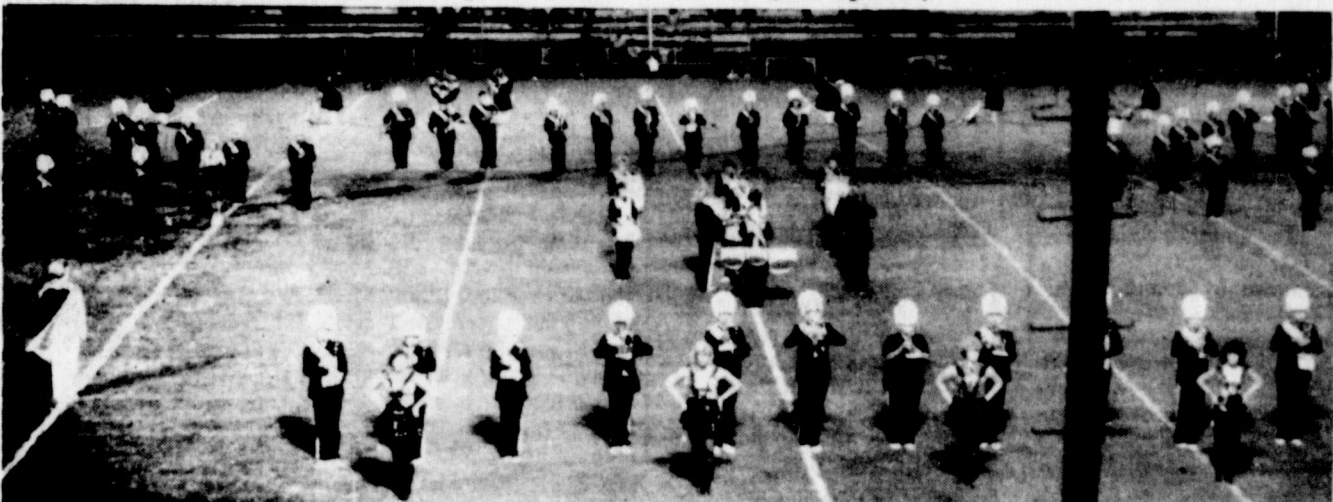

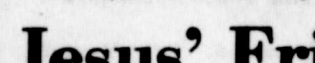

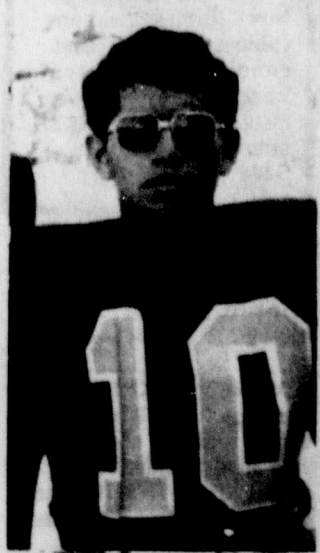

CJC Band & Belles Will Be In Parade

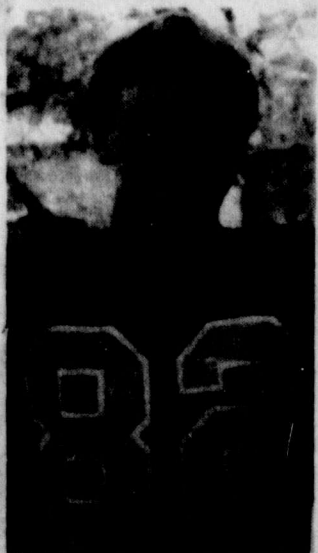

Kay Hawari Will Serve On State Committee

Mrs. Hawari was invited to work with a group organized to identify objectives and develop specification measurements for Grade 7 students under the new state educational regulations, Mr. Couch said. "This is an honor for Mrs. Hawari and for the Cisco Public Schools," Mr. Couch said.

This is Mrs. Hawari's fourth year as a member of the CPS faculty. She is a graduate of Cisco Junior College and Hardin-Simmons University.

In November, 1983, the City of Cisco awarded two water system improvement contracts totalling over \$1,300,000. The 12-inch water line is now complete and the water treatment facilities are approximately 95 percent complete.

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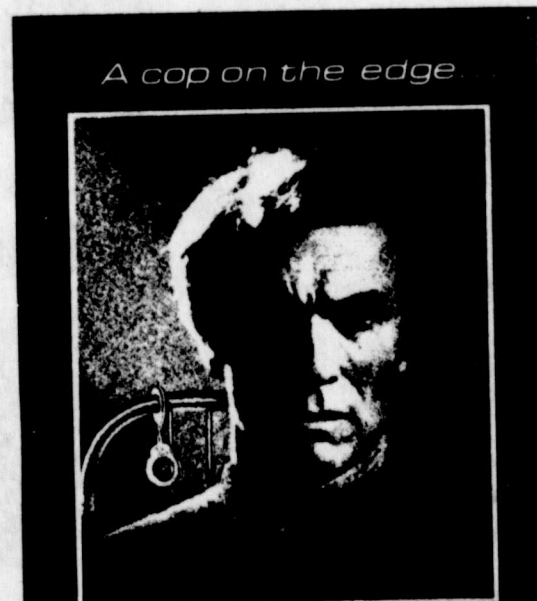

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Texans Urged To Make Farms, Ranches Safer

Special emphasis is needed to bring down deaths and serious injuries which occur in the unique environment of farms and ranches across Texas and the nation, says Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and vice president for agriculture, Texas Safety Association.

Governor Mark White has issued a proclamation declaring Sept. 16-22 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas. A statewide

campaign to inform rural residents about accident prevention will be sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System, Texas Farm Bureau, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas.

"The rural work environment is unique in a number of ways," Nelson points out. "Each unit has its own hazard potential based on the type of heavy machinery

used, topographical features and ground cover. In addition, the independent farmer or rancher does not have the benefit of structured safety training and safety guidelines that are present in the urban corporate environment."

Agriculture has the highest level of general stress among U.S. occupations, according to medical experts. That stressful environment includes uncertain weather conditions, disease and pest control, and fluctuating economic conditions, notes Nelson. In this stressful environment the farmer and rancher operates a variety of sophisticated machinery with moving parts. Stressful conditions that divert an operator's attention away from such machinery can contribute to tragic accidents.

"Individual farmers and ranchers can make a conscious effort to manage for safety and health for themselves and for their labor force, which often includes their families," emphasizes Nelson. "With the educational materials and expertise available from various rural-oriented organizations, they can develop safety procedures and management to fit their own particular operations."

"While resources for safety are available, it is up to the individual farmer and rancher to tap those resources for the safety and productivity of his own operations," Nelson notes.

Develop A Savings Habit

People who say they "just can't seem to save any money," may need a plan to get in the savings habit, says family finance expert Nancy L. Granovsky.

"Waiting to see if you have money left over at the end of a pay period is seldom an effective way to save," explains Granovsky, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

If you feel uneasy about not saving enough money, either for financial emergencies or long-term goals like a downpayment on your child's college education, take some steps now to develop a savings plan, she advises.

Begin by taking a hard look to see where your money has gone over the last several months. Look at old bills, cancelled checks and

credit card statements to decide if all the spending was necessary or whether some of that money could have been saved, says the home economist.

Then overhaul your family budget so some savings money can be set aside each month before you do anything else, recommends Granovsky. Make it a routine, like paying a bill. The amount doesn't have to be large, she says, what matters is that money is set aside regularly.

If your willpower is limited, try a payroll savings plan or have automatic withdrawals made from your checking account, she says.

Also reduce the temptation

to spend by separating savings from checking account money. If necessary, put your savings in a different financial institution than the one which handles your checking account.

In addition to getting some money into a savings fund, make sure you put those savings to work for you, Granovsky says. Compare interest rates, and as soon as you have enough saved, move your money to higher paying accounts so your nest egg will continue to grow.

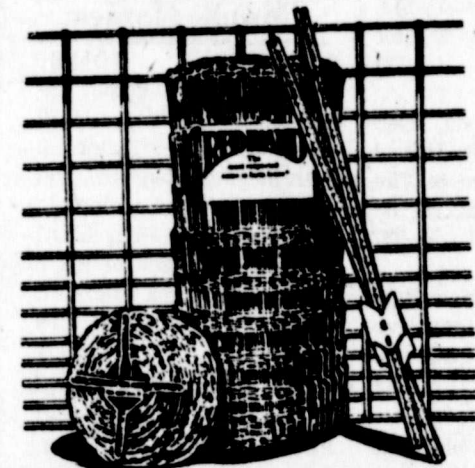

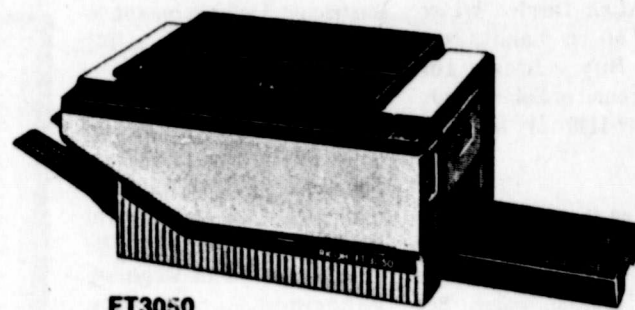

Food Plots Improve

September plantings of 'Elbon Rye, oats, wheat, or triticale make excellent fall and winter food plots for deer and turkey, Jack Prichard, range conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Eastland said recently. These plants provide high quality, nutritious food at a time of year when natural foods are less abundant and lower in nutritional value.

"Food plots simply supplement natural foods," Prichard said. "Nothing can replace the native forbs and browse that good habitat management produces, but food plots can be important, especially during drought periods when the supply of natural foods is low. Another benefit of these plots is to improve game harvest."

Prichard said animals are easier to locate and identify in these open areas, enabling hunters to choose individuals of the right sex and age to harvest. For example, doe and spike buck harvests can be increased and fork-antlered deer can be protected.

"Locate and design the food plots so deer or turkey are never more than 100 yards from protective brush cover," Prichard said. "5-10 acres is a good size. Plantings for turkey should be located in or near creek bot-

tombs with roost trees. Plots may need to be fenced from livestock. Where deer numbers are high and food

plots are too small, plantings may be unsuccessful."

It is important to prepare a good seedbed and plant by September 30th. Broadcast or drill the following rates of commercial seed per acre: rye - 42 pounds; oats - 48

pounds; wheat - 50 pounds; triticale - 40 pounds. Fertilize with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre or apply an equivalent fertilizer at a rate which will yield 30-40 pounds per acre of both nitrogen and phosphorus.

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Varsity Loses Season Opener To DeLeon, 26-20

Cisco High School's Lobo varsity played a good game Friday night against the DeLeon Bearcats during the first three quarters of play. But, during the final quarter, Cisco looked like a different team, and so did DeLeon.

Cisco fans watched a 20-to-0 lead vanish, as the Bearcats won the season opener by the score of 26-to-20. Cisco still made some good plays, gaining good yardage, during the

final quarter of the game, but mistakes and penalties seemed to wipe out the good plays.

During the first half of play, Cisco gained 121 yards rushing and 133 yards passing for a total of 254 yards. DeLeon gained only 7 yards rushing and no passing yardage for a total of 7 yards during the first two quarters.

In the second half, Cisco

had 98 total yards, 85 yards in rushing and 13 in passing. DeLeon had 128 yards rushing and 126 yards passing for a total of 254 yards.

Cisco scored one touchdown in each of the first three quarters, but were unable to score in the final quarter. DeLeon, on the other hand, was unable to score in the first half of the game but they did manage one touchdown in the third

quarter and three in the final quarter.

The Lobos received the opening kick-off and started their first drive of the night from their own 39-yard line. With Dusty Deitiker at center and Wade Shackelford at quarterback, the Lobos began moving the ball downfield. Runs by Johnny Ramirez, Steve Abbott and Josh Potter put the Lobos on DeLeon's 18-yard line in 13 plays with three

first downs. Cisco QB Shackelford took the snap from the center, rolled right and completed a pass to James Berry in the end zone for the first touchdown of the game. The extra point attempt failed, making the score 6-to-0 with 5:34 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Cisco took possession of the ball at their own 40-yard line following a failure by DeLeon to gain a first down. On the second play, QB Shackelford hit Patrick Qualls with a pass around DeLeon's 35 yard line and Qualls ran to the nine before being tackled. A handoff from QB Shackelford to Potter netted the touchdown on the next play.

Ramirez carried the ball into the end zone for the Lobos on the extra point attempt, making the score 14-to-0 with 5:52 left in the second quarter.

After half-time, DeLeon received the kick-off from Cisco and started a drive from their own 26-yard line. On the first play, Cisco's Ramirez recovered a fumble at the 25-yard line of DeLeon to set up Cisco's final scoring drive of the night.

Potter and Ramirez carried the ball during the drive and gained one first down in five plays. With the ball resting on the five-yard line of DeLeon, Potter took the handoff from QB Shackelford across the end zone for a touchdown. The extra point kick was no good giving Cisco a 20-to-0 lead

with 9:10 left in the third quarter.

DeLeon's luck seemed to change in the third quarter when James Mathis intercepted a Lobo pass at the Bearcat's 24 yard line. DeLeon then put together its own first scoring drive. With Mathis at quarterback and Stacy Whit at center, the Bearcats moved the ball to Cisco's two-yard line in ten plays and four first downs. Bobby Estrada, Larry Simpson, Ken McKillip, and Jeff Atchley were the yard gainers during the drive.

With only two yards to go for a touchdown, the Bearcats jumped offside getting a penalty and moving the ball back to Cisco's seven-yard line. A pass from QB Mathis to Simpson gained the touchdown on the next play. Another pass, on the extra point attempt, was batted down by Cisco's Shelby Nixon making the score 20-to-6 with 2:13 left in the third quarter.

With one second left in the third quarter, DeLeon started their second scoring drive from their own 28-yard line. A handoff from QB Mathis to Atchley looked as though it was going to get the touchdown on the first play, but Cisco's James Berry caught the runner at Cisco's 28-yard line. During the tackle, Berry sprained his arm.

DeLeon took three more plays before they scored on a 23-yard pass from QB Mathis to Simpson in the end zone. The extra point attempt, a

pass from QB Mathis to Simpson in the end zone. The extra point attempt, a pass from QB Mathis to Faron Alix, was good making the score 20-to-14, with 10:52 left in the final quarter.

Less than three minutes later, DeLeon had tied the score at 20-to-20 following a three-yard run by Estrada. The extra point attempt was broken up by the Lobos for a tied game with 8:16 left to play.

DeLeon's Mathis intercepted another Cisco pass to set up the Bearcats final scoring drive, beginning at Cisco's 44 yard line. With Mathis shaken up on the interception, DeLeon's Gordie Saldivar took over the quarterback position. Five plays later, with less than a minute remaining in the game, Mathis came back in as quarterback. After completing two passes, one to Alix and another to Simpson, Mathis hit McKillip with a 10-yard pass for the final touchdown.

After DeLeon's first extra point attempt failed, they had another chance due to a Cisco penalty, but it also failed, making the final score

20-to-26, with 14 seconds left in the game.

Outstanding Lobo defensive players include Josh Potter, Johnny Ramirez, Shelby Nixon, Danny Kearney, Johnny Seabourn, Willard Johnson, and James Berry.

Bearcat defensive standouts were Larry Simpson, James Mathis, Ken McKillip, Bobby Estrada, Jeff Atchley, Bryan Boen, Brad Johnson, Clay Dixon, Billy Faulkner, and Faron Alix.

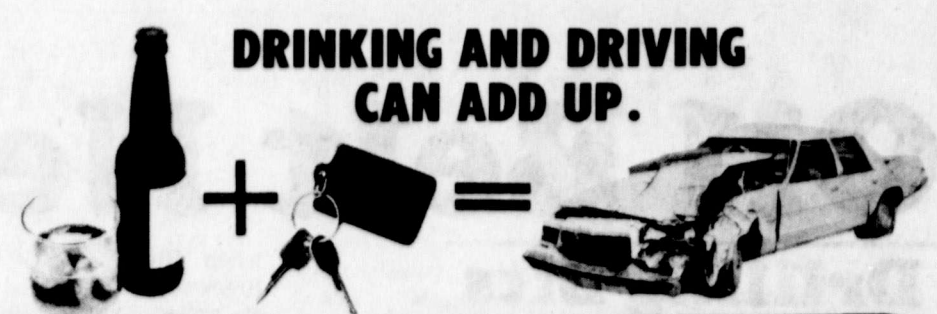

Drilling Bits

A gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Katlaco-Cook Field, with Kelly-Barnett Petroleum Inc. of Wichita Falls as the operator.

Located three miles southwest of Cisco, the well is in a 160-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, A-177. It is designated as the No. 2 McDonnell.

County News Briefs

EASTLAND

Late word from Senator John Tower's office in Washington is that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved a Rural Electrification Administration loan to Comanche County Cooperative Association for \$3,737,000. at 5% interest. The borrower will obtain supplemental financing from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corp. This will finance for 2,207 additional customers, finance 239 miles of distribution lines, and more system improvements.

Reonvation work has been completed on the small water tower in Eastland, and work on the large tower is beginning. This means that customers of the Eastland water system are operating only on the small water holding tank. Upon completion of renovation work on the million-gallon larger tank, both will be painted by the firm in charge. Work will be completed by Nov. 1. 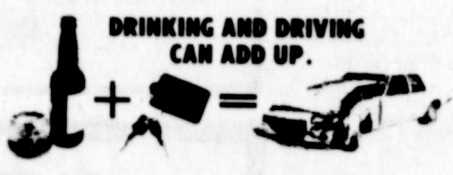

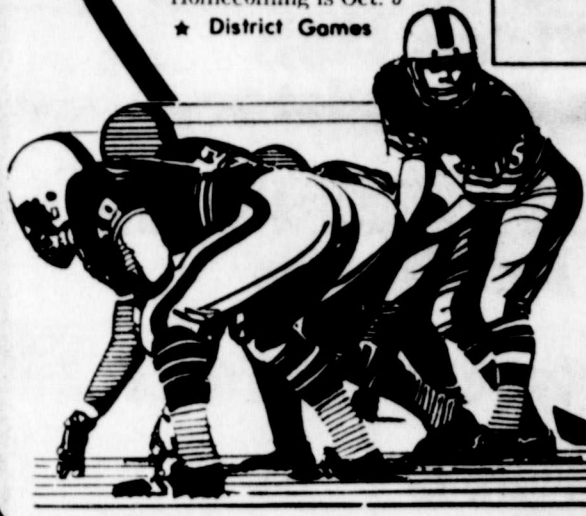

Children-Machinery Do Not Mix

"Boy Crushed Under Tractor," "Youngster Falls From Combine," "Farm Tractor Injures Child." "The headlines point to tragedy that can result when children and machinery mix," says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineering specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and vice president for agriculture, Texas Safety Association. "In no other industry are family members, including children, exposed to the operation of complex mechanical equipment associated with such severe injury potential as in farming or ranching," says Nelson. "Excluded from even touring most manufacturing plants, young children often use farm equipment as a playground." Children are strongly attracted to farm machinery, notes the specialist. They play with tractor machinery toys and delight in the chance to see the real thing in action. They also may plead for a ride. Before relenting, machine operators must remember that every "joy" ride contains the potential for "tragedy." "Out of love for our children, we must often say 'no' to them," says Nelson. The risk of serious injury can be reduced through the use of "NO RIDERS" policy. "No seat, no rider," states Nelson. "If a rider must

'hang on', then the risk is too high. Two things should be kept in mind about farm machinery. First, to do its job, farm machinery must be designed to perform violent movements, points out the engineer. It is designed to cut, shred, crush, grab, compact, wrap and perform similar actions. Although major improvements have been made in machine guards, many danger areas must remain open for machines to do the job for which they are intended. Second, farm machinery is dumb-dumb in the sense that it can't tell the difference between a stem and a finger, a stalk and an arm, a job well done or the taking of a life, Nelson notes. So, what happens when children and machines come together? Children fall from the operator's lap or lose their grip and fall under tractor wheels or into the path of trailing balers, shredders or other equipment. Children also may get caught in operating farmstead equipment, fall from farm buildings, or even play hide and seek in windows or other crops being harvested. Nelson points out that these potential tragedies can be controlled through the strict policy of keeping kids away from farm machinery and work fields and enforcing the "NO RIDERS" rule.

Lloyd Coan Appointed Roundup Chairman

Lloyd Coan of Eastland, has been appointed an area chairman for the Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander of Abilene, general Round-up chairman. Coan is one of nearly 200 chairmen statewide helping in this 25th year for the Cattlemen's Round-up to benefit the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo, said Shelley V. Smith, president/executive director of WTRC. Aubrey Stokes of San Angelo is CRCC co-chairman in the Southwest region. "Cattlemen have always believed in the philosophy of neighbor helping neighbor, and the Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children is a beautiful example of that help," said Alexander. "Livestock donated by ranchmen are collected at a designated point in each community and transported free to the auction site," he said. "The area chairman's role is to make a personal pledge, then ask friends and neighbors to join them in the annual Cattlemen's Round-up drive."

Conda Wylie first approached Smith with the idea, the Round-up has been a major fundraiser for WTRC. "It will take about \$4.5 million for us to treat the approximately 11,000 handicapped we'll serve in 1984," said Smith. "About 75 percent of that \$4.5 million must come from donations. The balance comes from contract and insurance payments. No federal funds are used in treatment." At the West Texas Rehabilitation Center campuses in Abilene and San Angelo trained personnel provide top quality care in physical, occupational and speech therapy, audiology, orthotics, psychology, education and social services, all without charge to patients.

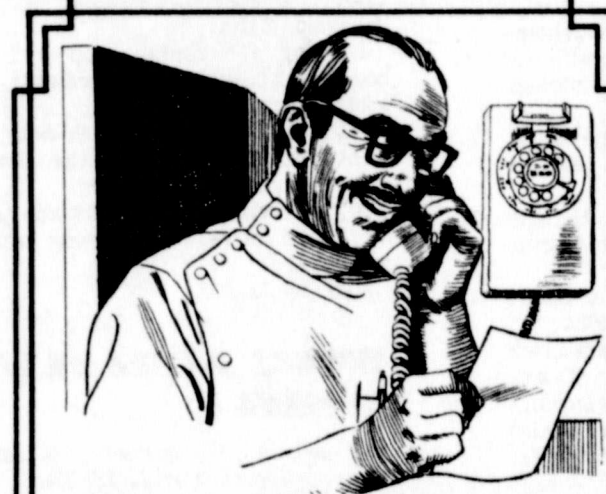

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National Test Date Schedule For SAT and ACT

High School Juniors and seniors who are thinking of going to college after graduation will want to take note of the national test date schedule for the ACT Assessment Program and the Admissions Testing Program of the College Board (including the SAT and the Achievement Tests). Most colleges require that one or the other of these tests are taken for admission.

Students who want to take the ACT or the SAT on the first 1984-85 national test date must have their registration materials completed and mailed before the September 21st (SAT) or September 28th (ACT) deadline. The full 1984-85 schedules of test dates and deadlines are as follows:

ACT-Regist. Sept. 28, 1984 - Test: Oct. 27, 1984, Regist. Nov. 9, 1984 - Test: Dec. 8,

1984, Regist. Jan. 11, 1985 - Test: Feb. 9, 1985, Regist. Mar. 22, 1985 - Test: April 20, 1985, Regist. May 10, 1985 - Test: June 8, 1985.

SAT-Regist. Sept. 21, 1984 - Test: Oct. 13, 1984, Regist. Sept. 28, 1984 - Test: Nov. 3, 1984, Regist. Oct. 26, 1984 - Test: Dec. 1, 1984, Regist. Dec. 21, 1984 - Test: Jan. 26, 1985, Regist. Feb. 15, 1985 - Test: Mar. 23, 1985, Regist. Mar. 29, 1985 - Test: May 4, 1984, Regist. April 26, 1985 - Test: June 1, 1985.

The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$9.50, the SAT \$11.00. Students can obtain ACT Assessment and SAT registration packets, as well as other college and career planning materials, from the counseling office at Cisco High School.

At area test centers on national test dates it will take

about three to four hours to complete the ACT or SAT. In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet is available in the counseling office. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon re-

quest from ACT or the College Board at cost.

Information reports resulting from the tests and the questionnaire are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to those colleges and other institutions specifically designated by the students.

It is recommended that students take these tests during their junior year or early in the senior year so that resulting information will be available in time to be of maximum assistance to students and their counselors in education and career planning. Students who are uncertain if they

need to use the ACT or the SAT, or are concerned about the location of the nearest test center, are urged to contact Mrs. Mouser in the counseling office at C.H.S.

It is noted that the ACT will be given at Cisco Junior College on the October and February dates.

The PSAT/NMSQT is cosponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. It is administered annually to more than one million students and measures verbal and mathematical abilities that are important in college work.

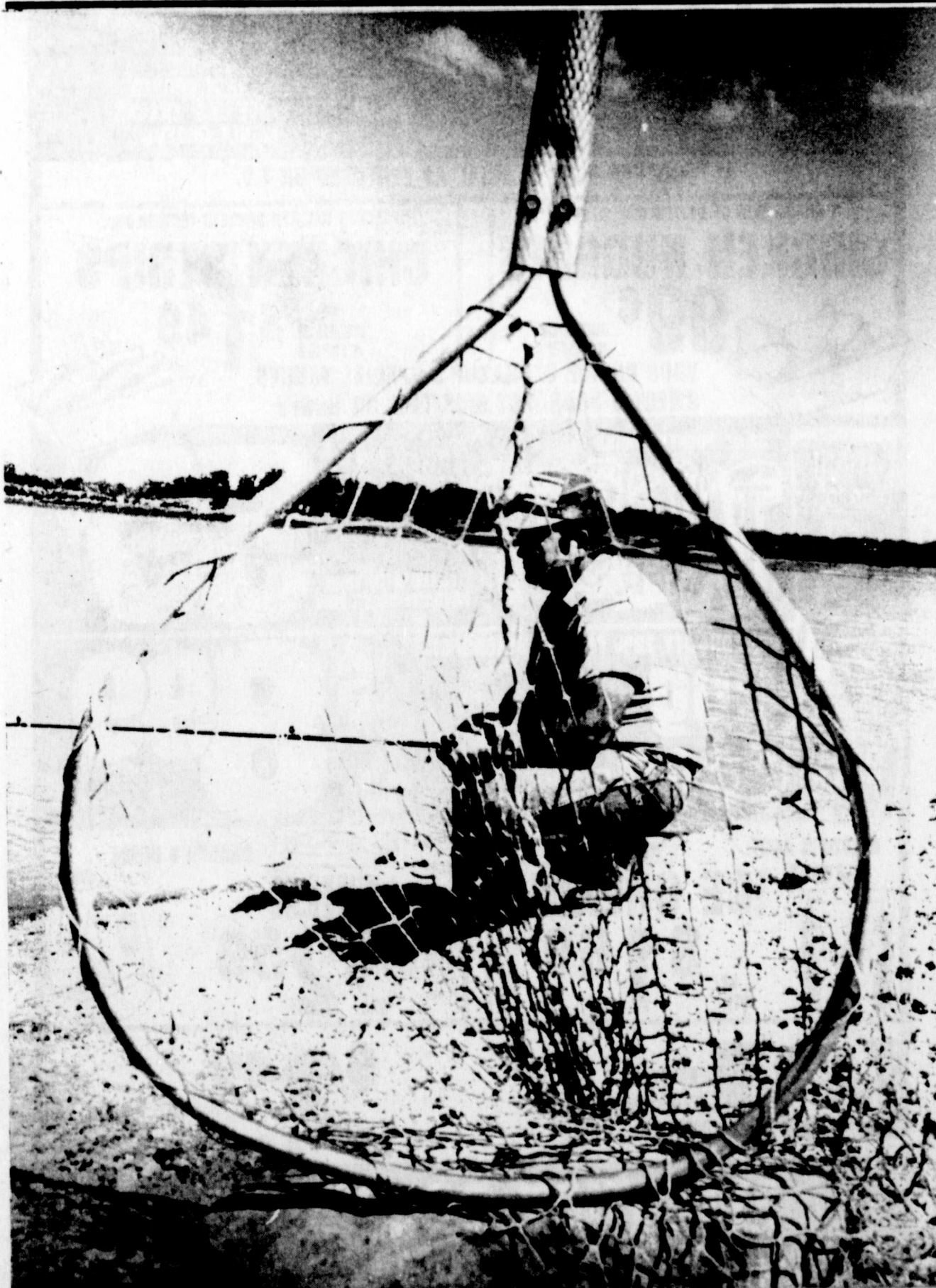
The PSAT/NMSQT gives students a chance to find out what the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like and can be used to predict scores on the SAT. It also helps students in planning for college. Further, students who opt to participate in the College Board Student Search Service have an opportunity to hear from colleges that they might otherwise not learn about.

The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students who wish to participate in the nationwide scholarship competitions administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corpora-

tion. Students in competition for this scholarship awarded in 1986 must take the PSAT/NMSQT in 1984.

Before the test, students will receive the PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin which contains a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions. In December, students will receive a Report of Student Answers which displays the correct answers and the students' responses as well as scores. Schools will return test booklets at the same time so that students can review the original questions. Students will also receive "About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores," a booklet containing information on interpreting PSAT/NMSQT results and on general college planning.

The fee for taking the 1984 PSAT/NMSQT is \$5.00 per student, to be paid at the time of registration. Fee waivers may be requested for students from low-income families who cannot afford to pay the fee. Students may register for the test in the counselor's office before October 4th. Students requesting fee waivers must register before September 26th.
