CHS Head Coach John Parchman stated Tuesday, 'We were pretty well pleased with Friday night's game against DeLeon." He said the varsity put forth good effort during the game.

While DeLeon was making its three touchdowns in the third quarter, Coach Parchman said at first he thought the Loboes were falling apart. Then he looked around and five of the eleven defensive starters were on the sidelines. He said the replacements were playing as hard as they could, but Cisco's second string could not quite stop DeLeon's first

When asked about injuries during the game, Coach Parchman said the biggest in-

jury was "wounded pride." Most of the players had a lot of bumps and bruises, but only two were questionable about whether or not they will play Friday night.

Develop A Savings Habit

People who say they "just can't seem to save any money," may need a plan to get in the savings habit, says family finance expert Nancy L. Granovky.

"Waiting to see if you have money left over at the end of a pay period is seldom an effective way to save, " explains Granovsky, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Ser-

If you feel uneasy about not saving enough money, either for financial emergencies or long-term goals like a downpayment on your child's college education, take some steps now to develop a savings plan, she

advises. Begin by taking a hard look to see where your money has gone over the last several months. Look at old bills, cancelled checks and credit card statements to decide if all the spending was necessary or whether some of that money could have been saved, says the home economist.

Then overhaul your family budget so some savings money can be set aside each month before you do anything else, recommends Granovsky. Make it a routine, like paying a bill. The amount doesn't have to be large, she says, what matters is that money is set aside regularly.

If your willpower is limited, try a payroll savings plan or have automatic withdrawls made from your checking account, she says. Also reduce the temptation

to spend by separating savings from checking account money. If necessary, put your savings in a different financial institution than the one which handles your checking account.

In addition to getting some money into a savings fund, make sure you put those savings to work for you, Granovsky says. Compare interest rates, and as soon as you have enough saved, move your money to higher paying accounts so your nest egg will continue to grow.





Food Plots Improve

September plantings of Elbon Rye, oats, wheat, or triticale make excellent fall and winter food plots for deer and turkey, Jack Prichard, range conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Eastland said recently. These plants provide high quality, nutritious food at a time of year when natural foods are less abundant and lower in nutritional value.

"Food plots simply supplement natural foods," Prichard said. "Nothing can replace the native forbs and browse that good habitat management produces, but food plots can be important, especially during drought periods when the supply of natural foods is low. Another benefit of these plots is to improve game harvest.

Prichard said animals are easier to locate and identify in these open areas, enabling hunters to choose individuals of the right sex and age to harvest. For example, doe and spike buck harvests can be increased and forkantlered deer can be protected.

"Locate and design the food plots so deer or turkey are never more than 100 yards from protective brush cover," Prichard said. "5-10 acres is a good size. Plantings for turkey should be located in or near creek bot-

plots are too small, plantings may be unsuccessful."

It is important to prepare a good seedbed and plant by September 30th. Broadcast or drill the following rates of commercial seed per acre: rye - 42 pounds; oats - 48

pounds; wheat - 50 pounds; triticale - 40 pounds. Fertilize with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre or apply an equivalent fertilizer at a rate which will yield 30-40 pounds per acre of both nitrogen and phosphorus.

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Varsity Loses Season Opener To DeLeon, 26-20

Cisco High School's Lobo varsity played a good game Friday night against the DeLeon Bearcats during the first three quarters of play. But, during the final quarter, Cisco looked like a different team, and so did DeLeon.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1984**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (% for The University of Texas System and 14 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and mainteance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County. PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to

the county clerk. constitutional The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor.'

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a members of organized police reserve corporation, association, or comgroup policies of political subdivi-

proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge

the right to discovery of evidence. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges. and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."



Children-Machinery Do Not Mix

"Boy Crushed Under Tractor." "Youngster Falls From Combine," "Farm

Tractor Injures Child. "The headlines point to tragedy that can result when children and machinery mix," says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineering specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and vice president for agriculture, Texas Safety Association.

"In no other industry are family members, including children, exposed to the operation of complex mechanical equipment associated with such severe injury potential as in farming or ranching," says Nelson. "Excluded from even touring most manufacturing plants, young children often use farm equipment as a playground.'

Children are strongly attracted to farm machinery, notes the specialist. They play with tractor machinery and delight in the chance to see the real thing in action. They also may plead for a ride. Before machine relenting. operators must remember that every "joy" ride contains the potential for "tragedy." "Out of love for our children, we must often say 'no' to them," says Nelson.

The risk of serious injury can be reduced through the use of "NO RIDERS" policy. "No seat, no rider," states Nelson. "If a rider must

Two things should be kept in mind about farm machinery. First, to do its job, farm machinery must be designed to perform violent movements, points out the engineer. It is designed to cut, shred, crush, grab, compact, wrap and perform similar actions. Although major improvements have been made in machine guards, many danger areas must remain open for machines to do the job for which they are intended.

Second, farm machinery is dumb-dumb in the sense that it can't tell the difference between a stem and a finger, a stalk and an arm, a job well done or the taking of a life, Nelson notes.

So, what happens when children and machines come

Children fall from the operator's lap or lose their wheels or into the path of trailing balers, shredders or other equipment. Children also may get caught in operating farmsted equipment, fall from farm buildings, or even play hide and seek in windows or other crops being harvested.

Nelson points out that these potential tragedies can be controlled through the strict policy of keeping kids away from farm machinery and work fields and enforcing the "NO RIDERS" rule.






