Millionaire Good For 'Tough' Gifts

The game will make an ideal Christmas gift. organization spokesman, Mr. Pirtle said. It is expected to become a collector's item, he added.

And if the season seems to be moving too fast for you, the Cisco Kiwanis club is conducting a search for Cisco's Millionaire for a day. A few days after Christmas, the group plans to give some lucky resident the interest on \$1,000,000.00 for one day.

Persons may register for the drawing only at the businesses where gift Certificates for the games are being sold.

The object of the Millionaire game is to be the first player to amass \$1,000,000.00 in the property and play money, project chairman Pirtle said. The Millionaire bears a resemblance to the Parker Brothers classic Monopoly, he added, but rather than vying for the deeds to utilities, railroads or streets like

Boardwalk or Park Place, "players will try to take over Cisco businesses around the square and up and down the streets.

"This will give you a chance to bankrupt someone or make a corporate giant out of yourself," he quipped. The Millionaire game will rival any board game on the commercial market.

Proceeds from the sale of the games will be used to support the Kiwanis Club of Cisco.

The game is produced by Henco, Inc. of Selmer, Tennessee near Memphis. It is marketed strictly for the fund raising purposes of non-profit organizations, according to Henco's local representative Gary Phillips.

The limited edition games will be available the first week in January but Gift Certificates can be bought for Christmas, Pirtle said. But shoppers are encouraged to reserve their games now. Only 320 games will be sold here, and the Kiwanis club is only promising availability to persons who order the games in advance.

The Millionaire games cost \$13.00 plus tax, and Gift Certificates are available at most businesses where you see the sign to sign up to be Millionaire for a day in Cisco.

Basic Cable Fee Will Increase

The monthly service charge for basic cable television was approved for an increase at the Tuesday night City Council meeting at City Hall. The second reading of the amendment was approved in a 4-2 roll call vote.

Council members Bobby Ingram, Roy Dennis, Bobby Rains and Linton Batteas voted in favor of the amendment, while Brad Kimbrough and Joe Besselaar voted against.

Southern Television Systems manager, Roy

Thackerson, was present at the meeting to answer questions from the council regarding cable service. He said the increase in rates will be used to replace a number of cable lines in Cisco and to incorporate seven additional channels into the system.

He stated there have been some problems with the cable system in Cisco; however, he said the cable is just like replacing water lines. If some need to be replaced, it may disrupt service to other customers.

They will all be back on-line as soon as possible.

Weather also may affect cable viewing, since several of the channels are transmitted via antennas and the signals may be distorted by severe weather in the area. Weather can also affect signals transmitted by satellite, although not as much.

Mr. Thackerson stated that anyone having problems with their cable service may call the Eastland phone number, 629-1580, which is manned 24-hours a day by an answering service. They will relay the message to an employee of

Southern Television Systems.

The \$3.00 per month increase in basic cable service will not go into effect until the repairs have been made and the seven additional channels are "on-line" for cable subscribers.

Council members unanimously voted to approve an ordinance adopting and enacting a new code of ordinances for the City of Cisco. All provisions of the code shall be in full force and effect from and after December 1, 1984. All ordinances passed on or before April 10, 1984, and not included in the code or recognized and continued in force by reference therein, are repealed.

City Manager Mike Moore said a committee went through every ordinance ever enacted by the City of Cisco and did away with those which were no longer appropriate. All the remaining ordinances were compiled together and printed in one book for the City's code.

In other action, the Council tabled the approval of releasing some outstanding acreage in the Airport Oil and Gas Lease to Hanvey Production, Inc. They said they would like more information and would reconsider the matter at the next meeting.

In the Citizen-Council discussion, City Manager Moore told the Council the final inspection of the water treatment plant had been postponed from December 12 to Wednesday, December 19, in the afternoon. He asked them to inspect the plant beforehand on an individual basis, and direct any questions they might have to him before December 19, so he might ask the inspectors.

Mr. Moore also reminded those present that the next regularly scheduled Council meeting on Tuesday, December 25, had been previously cancelled due to Christmas.

Joe Jarvis of the Cisco Fire Department extended an invitation to the Council, Mayor, City Manager and their wives, to attend the

Fishing Report

1984 Club catches have shown a number of very large fish having been taken. Lets look at some of the possible reasons for this. Of course No. 1 would have to be the record low water levels on area lakes. But you may ask how can this assist in the apprehension of big bass. Consider a fish bowl containing one gold fish, your cat attempts to retrieve this fish while the bowl is full. But due to the amount of water can't reach it's prey. As the water falls to the point in which the gold fish can barely cover itself with water, this is when dear kitty cat has a snack. Applied to our own fishing as water levels fall our fish are pushed into small and smaller areas.

Another aspect is the fact of discovering new potential good areas. New drop offs, or a tank dam, new areas in which fish will be holding, and probably have held previously, but we just didn't fish.

Remember areas where fish were holding during low conditions and what was holding them. Chances are

they'll be there again.

Area lakes are hit and miss for the most part. Palo Pinto crappie excellent near the outlet, catfish slow. Cisco bass fair, catfish poor, crappie fair. Leon crappie good, some spotted catches in the creek area, bass good up to 3 pounds, channell cats good, Eastland, bass poor, crappie poor, catfish fair, Proctor crappie excellent, jigs and minnows are doing equally well, bass good, stippers fair.

Remember to keep only what you can use and release the rest, who knows maybe next time out they'll be enough for you and a friend.

Jesus, then, was born somewhere around October 1st of our present Gregorian calendar.

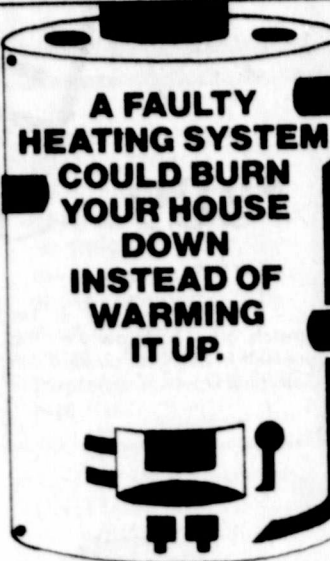

Italy - 40 Years Later

On the way to Sorrento, we had our first experience with an Italian Rest Station. We stopped about 1:00 p.m. and as this was a four lane highway, there are rest stations on each side of the highways. There is a "walk-thru" or tunnel under the highways where one can walk to the other side, if he so desires. As our Tour Bus, No. one and No. two were travelling together, we all went to the same rest station. They are similar to Stuckey's in Texas, but larger.

Our guide had told us that in the rest rooms, which are called "Toilettes", we must leave the woman attendant a coin, or we did not get in or out. This was true all over Italy.

We also had our first experience with the Italian lire. Most of us still had American money or Traveler's checks, as we had not had an opportunity to exchange it. However, everyone was glad to see the American dollar. Later we were able to exchange our money at the local bank or hotels where we stayed. At the time we were there, the exchange rate was approximately one dollar equals 1,900 lire. As the value of the dollar changed every day, so did the amount one received in Italian lire.

Banks are only open in the south from 8:30 to 12:30 noon each day, Monday thru Friday. We received less money at the hotels in exchange, as they expected to be paid for their services. We learned to divide the price of the Italian item by two and that would give us an idea as to what the cost would be in American dollars.

The rest station was quite large, and had long glass display cases, where assorted sandwiches which were marked with the price of each item. As each of us

went thru the line we picked out what we wanted, went to the cashier and told her the prices, and paid her. She in turn gave us a ticket that we again went thru the line and gave our ticket to the attendant behind the counter, and he gave us our sandwiches. They were mostly meat or cheese, all made with Italian bread, and never had any mustard or mayonnaise on them. There were also canned "Cokes", but they were always warm. You can imagine the mass confusion, as over a hundred people were trying to buy sandwiches and drink. We could give the Italians a lesson in fast food service.

As there were no seats in the building we went outside to eat. The front door was for entering the building only, and we had to go the opposite side of the building to find the exit. We had one hour to

eat and to rest and then we were on the bus again.

Sorrento is approximately 258 kilometers from Rome, and our guide told us about the history of the country we were going thru. Soon we saw the Mount Cassino Abbey on the mountaintop to our left. This is where some very heavy fighting took place between the 36th and the Germans who were "holed" up there. It was finally bombed, but many men lost their lives in this vicinity.

Sorrento is a beautiful old city located on the Gulf of Naples. As we approached the outskirts of the city, there were many apartment buildings, which were either five or seven stories high. Our guide said they were not allowed to build them any higher due to the threat of earthquakes or the possibility of Mount Vesuvius erupting

again. Evidence of the last eruption in 1944 could be seen along the highway. Some buildings had not been repaired, and lava stone had been used on the embankments on each side of the highway. The highway narrowed, and we travelled for several miles along the coast high above the sea. The road was made up of hundreds of curves and the bus driver drove at a rather high rate of speed, or so we thought. However, one of the experiences of going to Italy is to ride a tour bus. If a person can do that and not be afraid, he can do anything. The ocean was over to our right, and it was very beautiful in the afternoon sun.

We saw the Isle of Capri in the distance, and there were many boats and ships in the bay. When we arrived in the city, we saw many villas and homes back in the mountains to the south and east of the city. We stopped in the south part of the city, and as the streets were very narrow, our bus could not go to our hotel, so we walked about a block. Our luggage was brought to the motel by minibus.

So there it was, Hotel Imperial Tramontano, which was two hundred years old. It was a three story, white stucco building, very elegant. The gardens, which surrounded the hotel, very beautiful, large trees, lemons and limes were in the gardens, many flowers were blooming, and many vines had beautiful flowers on them, and many lush, tropical plants were also there, and a large swimming pool, which of course, was not two hundred years old.

We went up to our room and it was large, furnished with antique furniture. All of the rooms faced the bay, and each one had a balcony. We opened the French doors, and there was the ocean below and many fishing boats were bringing in their nets for the day. It was great. With the open doors,

we thought for sure the flies and mosquitoes would soon be there, but we never saw any during our stay in Italy.

And so our first day in Italy was coming to an end. We had travelled from Texas to the southern Peninsula of Sorrento in two days, and we were tired.

However, after a short rest, we were dressed and down in the lobby. It was very spacious and lovely. On the west, another balcony ran the entire length of the building, and we could again see the ships and boats in the bay and the beautiful homes and hotels along the cliffs around us. Many lovely arrangements of flowers were in the lobby which added to the beauty of it all.

By this time, the group was assembling and our guide was with us to take us about two blocks to the Ristorante "La Favorita" for our first U.S. Veterans II World War 40th Anniversary

dinner. The menu was: Antipasto: Caprese, Cannelloni alla Sorrentina, Scaloppina alla pizzola, Contorni di Stagione, Profiteroles and Caffè.

There was a large group of veterans and their wives and relatives, as all of the tour came to this dinner.

We had great native entertainment. There was a group of Italian dancers in their bright costumes, and they were very good. A band furnished lively music.

Several officials from the city was there, as well as our official tour host and his wife, Col. Julian Phillips from Houston.

A group of service men were special guests. They were stationed with the American 6th Fleet in Naples.

Needless to say it was not hard for us to sleep that night.

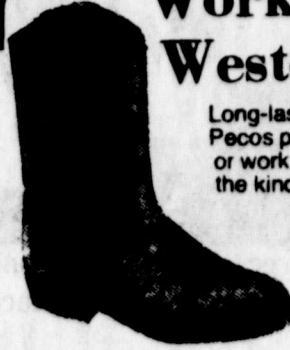

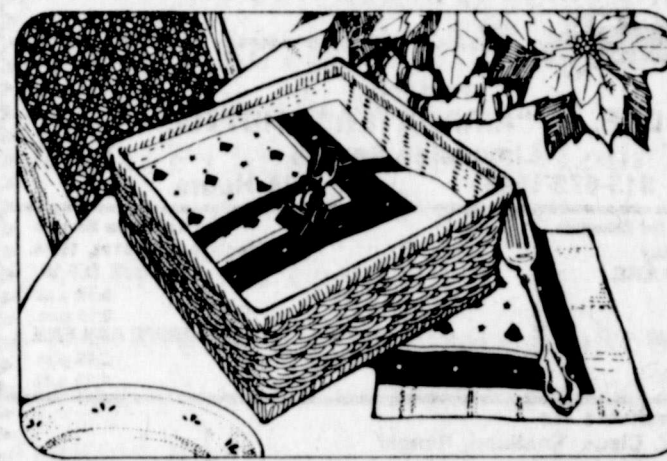

7 In County Due IRS Refunds

'Tis the giving season, and the Internal Revenue Service is trying to give 4194 taxpayers in the North Texas area the refunds it has been unable to deliver to them. "The total owed in this year's undelivered refund program is \$1,913,913," said Pam Whittenburg, Chief of the Dallas IRS Taxpayer Service Division. "That's an average refund of \$456.35, although the range goes all the way from \$1 to \$22,416!"

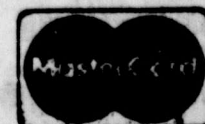

UIL Responds To Education Committee

AUSTIN--A year ago, when H. Ross Perot and the Select Committee on Public Education were emphasizing the idea that students were out of class far too much of the time, a large number of district marching contests and the state contest were scheduled during regular school hours. But the University Interscholastic League has responded to the challenge of educational reform.

This year, the League held district and regional marching band contests on Saturdays or at night, with no loss of class time. "The music programs came under considerable fire when loss of school time was mentioned," Richard Floyd, UIL music director, said. "And some of the criticism was valid. So last spring, music people started looking at the marching band contests, with the idea to schedule every district and regional contest on Saturday."

Then, in September, planning began to reduce the state meet contest in Austin to one day. Even that day was carefully studied.

"We--and by that, I mean the UIL staff, people from the University (of Texas) and Austin Independent School District--went to the drawing board," Floyd said. "We tried to schedule all larger groups so that their earliest commitment would be 2:30 p.m. Most did not have obligations until 4:00 or 5:00 p.m., so unless they lived beyond a reasonable driving distance, most students would stay in school until noon, then board buses and come to Austin for the contest."

Competition was held at Burger and Nelson Fields and at Memorial Stadium on the UT campus. Fifty-three bands participated and, Floyd estimated, between 28,000 and 30,000 persons (fans and participants) filled the stands.

"The contest went off extremely well," he said.

One judge, Bentley Shellabamer, marching band director at Florida State University, agreed. "I hope that everyone who participated in the contest felt that it was a valuable and educational experience," he stated. "It certainly was one of the best organized events in which I have ever had the pleasure of participating."

Why not have the State Meet contest on Saturday also? Two reasons: Distance and football.

"If we held the state contest on Saturday, many bands would have to leave home on Friday so you'd have that day of school time lost," Floyd said. "Plus, the kids would miss their schools' Friday night football games."

Also, most judges are college or university band directors. "During orientation, I conducted my own survey of how many judges would have been able to attend and we held the contest on Saturday," Floyd said. "Only four said they could have come."

"So when you look at the various problems, you can see that we had some pretty

compelling reasons for having the State Meet contests on Monday," he added.

The best of the 53 bands was San Antonio MacArthur, which won the coveted Governor's Cup. Conference champions included Asher-

ton (A), Dripping Springs (2A), Robinson (3A), Georgetown (4A), and MacArthur in San Antonio (5A). For Georgetown, the victory was its fifth in a row.

Ranger Native In Cotton Bowl

Jay Richey, a sophomore at Tarleton State University, will be marching with the Texan Marching Band and Texan Stars in the Cotton Bowl Parade on New Year's Day in Dallas. Jay is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Richey of Ranger.

The appearance marks the first time that Tarleton has marched in the Cotton Bowl Parade which winds through one and one-half miles of downtown Dallas. The parade will be broadcast live beginning at 9 a.m. New Year's Day on CBS. Tarleton is one of 16 bands, only eight university bands, that will appear on the 56-unit

caravan.

Under the direction of Milton Fox and Jonathan Hooper, the Texan Marching Band has more than doubled in size in the past few years. The 1984-85 band includes 100 members including 12 flag corpsmen, six rifles, 18 percussion and 67 wind players. The drum major is Gary Gerber of Azle and twiler is Stacey Hufstutler of

Comanche.

The Texan Stars just celebrated their first 10 years of existence at Tarleton. This also marks the first time the dancers have received scholarships for their membership in the group. The Stars are under the direction of Mrs. Penny Wright.

The first place winners of last week's county pecan show were taken to the Central Texas Regional Pecan Show. Regional pecans were judged this last week and Eastland County pecans won 13 ribbons. Dan Childress took six ribbons. He won first in the Chickasaw class, second in Maramac and Caddo classes and third in Shoshoni, Harper and Sioux.

Boch Pecan Orchard was the first place winner in the Barton class and second in the Apache class. The Lost Creek Pecan Orchard won a first with GraBohl variety. Dale Walker won second with Texas Prolific. T.E. Robertson had the third place John Garner pecan. Buttery Pecan Orchard won third in the Tejas class and Charles Walker won a third place ribbon in the smallest pecan class.

It is the time of year to plant fruit trees. This involves a lot of time and effort spent with the expectation of some satisfaction in return. A tree is a long-term investment which usually shows its merits or faults after many years of culture. For this reason you must be careful that the fruit tree selected is well adapted for this area and will produce to expectation. One of the best and surest methods to avoid a disaster is to purchase those varieties recommended by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. We have a list of fruit and nut trees adapted to Eastland County at the County Extension Office. You may call or come by our office for a copy of this list.

Many believe that just because fruit varieties are sold at local stores or nurseries, they are adapted in that area. Unfortunately, this is not always the case. Buyer demand generates seller supply. If buyers demand a fruit variety, even though it does not produce well locally, a seller will usually stock that variety to satisfy customers. Many customers ask for varieties that are familiar or traditional. When people think of grapes they think of Concord or Thompson Seedless. When they think of pears, its usually Bartlett. When we think of

apples the first variety that comes to mind is Red Delicious and of course, everyone has eaten Elberta peaches.

Many fail to realize that there are hundreds of varieties of each kind of fruit. The Texas Agricultural Extension and Research personnel are constantly checking these varieties to evaluate their potential for the various areas of Texas. This is quite a job since each variety may perform differently in each location. Remember, Texas is a big state with many climates.

Now is the time to begin considering selection of fruit trees for your yard. A fruit tree can add the beauty of bloom to your spring landscape, the coolness of shade in the summer, and the color of fall foliage while adding nutritious fruit to your kitchen table. Plan now to enjoy the fruits of your labor.

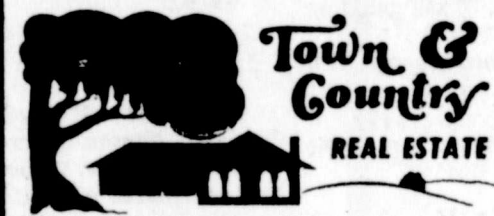
