

STEERS FATTEN WELL ON IRRIGATED PASTURE

Lubbock-Twelve choice steers showed an average daily gain of 1.2 pounds during a 215-day summer grazing period on six irrigated pasture mixtures at Texas Technological College, according to Edwin Dawson, graduate student, who is conducting a long-range experiment seeking to determine the value of various irrigated pasture mixtures for producing beef.

Six pastures used in the experiment were seeded with alfalfa; alfalfa, brom grass and perennial rye grass; alfalfa and brome grass, alfalfa and perennial rye grass, native grass; and native grass with white clover.

Feed costs per hundredweight gain during the summer averaged \$11.98. Costs were figured at 10 cents per head per day for pasturage, in addition to supplementary feed and minerals, including cottonseed meal, hegari fodder, sorghum,
