The Wranglers compiled a 12-4 record before Christmas, and won their last six in a row. They have outscored the opposition by an 83 to 71 margin, and have

## CISD Board

## Receives Check For Gymnasium

A decision as to how the storm damaged gymnasium at Intermediate School will be replaced will be considered by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Supt. James Couch reported that a check for \$134,000 in insurance settlement money was received by the school system during the Christmas holidays. This was the appraised damages sustained by the building, which was some 50 years old.

Architect Richard Buzard of Abilene, who has been making a study of replacement possibilities, was expected to complete his work and attend the meeting to offer suggestions to the board, Mr. Couch said.

The gymnasium collapsed during a windstorm last October 13th. Since that time, physical education students have been bused to other buildings for their regular classes when the weather did not permit them to meet outside.

The architect was expected to recommend whether it would be best to restore the old gym or to clear away the debris and build a new one, Mr. Couch said.

Freshman orientation activities will begin at 9 a.m. Monday in the auditorium of the Fine Arts Building and will continue on Wednesday, Jan. 6, and Friday, Jan. 18. Also scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday are nominations and elections for campus and class favorites.

Basketball activities for the spring semester begins at 7:30 p.m. Monday at CJC gym as the Wranglers play Temple Junior College. The Lady Wranglers will be in action next Friday night in Temple against Temple JC. A "welcome back" dance for all students has been scheduled in the Student Center Building at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

## City Council Approves Annual Audits Tuesday

Cisco City council members approved the annual audit report for the City of Cisco, as well as the Revenue Sharing audit report, prepared by Joe Cooper, local CPA. Mr. Cooper presented the audits

to the council at the regular meeting Tuesday night. The council also extended an oil and gas lease with Kelly-Barnett Petroleum Company for six months to allow declaration of unit and distribution of royalty interest.

With four votes in favor, one against, and one abstaining, the council approved a resolution accepting the water treatment plant improvements installed by Ben Sira and Company. City

Manager Mike Moore reported that everything is completed and the plant is working well. The city has a one-year warranty period beginning in December of 1984.

Council member Bobby Ingram voted against the acceptance of the plant because one of four water leaks had not been repaired by the company in exchange of use of cabins at the treatment plant site. City manager Moore said he would pass along the information to the company.

In old business, the council opened bids on two former police cars and awarded the bids to Peggy Flores and W.E. (Edd) McGough, Mrs. Flores bid \$775 for the better of the two vehicles and Mr. McGough bid \$225 for the other.

There were no bids made for the Lake Patrol boat, motor and trailer, so the council decided to go out for bids again in the spring.

The re-leasing of outstanding acreage in the Airport Oil and Gas Lease to Hanvey Production, Inc. was tabled by the council until more information may be obtained from Hanvey Production.

City Manager Moore told council members that the pumping station at Battle Creek is in operation, after both pump motors had been completely re-built. He said the anticipated cost of the renovation will probably exceed \$20,000.00.

Mr. Moore stated that with both pumps running during a rainy season, with the ground as saturated as it is now, the Battle Creek pumps could put 2 million gallons of water into Lake Cisco a day.

Municipal Court Judge Doug Fry gave a quarterly report to the council in which he said there had been 46 total complaints and 57 cases pending. He stated, "I have never had any better cooperation than I have with the Police Department and City Hall staff. I would like to commend the Police Department on how hard they work."

Mayor Eris Ritchie said he would like to commend Mr. Fry for "the good job you are doing."

The council also heard and accepted the financial report for November, 1984, as well as the minutes of the regular council meeting December 11, 1984.

Three committees were named to begin work on immediate projects as the Cisco Chamber of Commerce met for the first Board of Directors meeting in 1985. Bill Austin Jr. President of the Chamber of Commerce presided at the meeting.

Ivan Webb will chair the Banquet Committee and will be announcing soon a date on which it will be held and other plans involved. The annual banquet recognizes the work done the previous year and provides an insight of what is to be accomplished in the coming year for the Chamber of Commerce. Other special awards are presented to Cisco citizens to recognize their contributions to our community. A guest speaker will also be on the program.

The Christmas in May project will soon be underway with preliminary work being started now. The Christmas in May is a program for community improvement and calls for volunteer housing repair for the elderly and handicapped. Money contributed by the citizens of Cisco is spent for material to make repairs to the home chosen. The repairs are made by volunteer labor. The project has been well received and continues to benefit the citizens of Cisco. Details on application and other requirements will be announced by the committee in the near future.

The Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors also established a Special Projects Committee this year. It will be set up to help various programs that may need the assistance of the Chamber Members. As soon as all the members of the committee are named an announcement will be made of

## Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent Janet Thomas

Since cold weather has arrived, you may be experiencing higher heating fuel bills. Weather stripping is one of the most cost-effective ways to improve the energy efficiency of your home.

At any hardware store or home center you should be able to find several types of weatherstripping which vary in cost, durability, ease of installation and visibility.

Metal or plastic tension strips are the longest lasting type of weatherstripping, but they are relatively expensive. Once in place, tension strips are out of sight. They can also be used for nearly any type of door and window joint. However, they cannot fill irregular gaps.

Reinforced strips and tubular gaskets can be used with all types of doors and windows. They're durable, and will fill irregular gaps. The big drawback of reinforced strips is that they attach directly to the frame, so they are quite visible.

Self-adhesive foams are quick and easy to install. They are not visible under window sashes or in door jams and can fill gaps in irregular surfaces, but they don't always stick well. They are best used when they are held in place by compression.

Foams vary in durability. The polyurethane and sponge rubber foams are short-lived, while the vinyl and EPDM rubber foams will last several years.

Non-reinforced felt strips can be used much like non-reinforced form strips. Felt

is more resistant to abrasion than foam and will last several years. But it absorbs water, and should only be used where it can dry out quickly. Felt strips are inexpensive, and can be easily installed with a staple gun, but cannot fill irregular gaps.

A relatively new weatherstripping is a magnetic gasket which can be used with metal insulated doors. It forms a tight seal like the seal on modern refrigerator doors.

For other types of doors you can get special weatherstripping to handle the often large gap at the bottom of the door. Door sweeps, for example, are attached to the inside face of an in-swinging door, or the outside of an out-swinging door. They work well, but are highly visible. Door bot-

toms and vinyl or rubber gaskets thresholds can also weatherize a door.

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

If you enjoy the convenience of a brownie mix but folks around your house love chewy, homemade brownies, then this brownie mix is just right for you. The mix will produce five batches of delicious brownies that are "soft and fudgelike" inside.

#### BROWNIE MIX

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 8 cups sugar
- 2 1/2 cups cocoa
- 2 cups shortening

Combine first 5 ingredients; stir well. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Place in an airtight container; store in a cool, dry place or in refrigerator for up to 6 weeks. Yield: 16 cups. Quick and Easy Brownies:

## OIL AND GAS NEWS

Eastland County's Nimrod Field gained a new producer when the No. 9A Texas was finished by Au-Na Oil & Gas Co.

Located one-half mile southeast of Nimrod, the well pumped 48 barrels 38-gravity oil per day with 15 barrels water.


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USS TEXAS (CGN-39)

**A Navy Within Our Navy..(3rd In A Series)**

**A Tradition Of Fighting Ships... Texas**

The USS TEXAS (CGN-39), a nuclear powered, guided missile cruiser, is the fourth ship to bear the name of the Lone Star State. Of the previous three, two were United States Navy ships and one served in the Texas Navy.

The first TEXAS was a sloop-of-war commissioned in the Texas Navy in 1840. Although never fully manned, TEXAS was to carry a

complement of 24 officers and 147 men, and was allowed 30 muskets, 10 pistols and 30 cutlasses for arms. On April 20, 1840, Texas President Lamar changed the name to the AUSTIN, then transferred her to the United States Navy in 1846. Two years later she ran aground and broke up.

The second TEXAS became the Navy's first battleship, launched in 1889 and

involved in the Spanish-American War. In 1911 she was decommissioned and named SAN MARCOS. Sometime later, she was sunk as a target for gunfire practice.

The third TEXAS (BB-35) was commissioned in 1914. Highly advanced for her time, she quickly earned a reputation as one of the finest gunnery ships in the Navy. After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, TEXAS served as an escort for convoys to Europe, and later to the Pacific to fight the Japanese. Following the war, TEXAS was decommis-

sioned and moved to San Jacinto Battleground, in Houston, Texas, where she remains today as a memorial.

The fourth, and current TEXAS (CGN-39) was commissioned September 10, 1977, and is a Virginia class cruiser. She can move at speeds in excess of 30 knots. Her engineering spaces have two nuclear-fission reactors which power a set of geared turbines and twin screws.

Texas's mission is to operate independently, or in compliance with strike, anti-submarine or amphibious forces against possible sub-

marine, air and surface threats. She is aided in her mission by a first-of-its-kind fully integrated computer system utilizing the latest technology in computers, weapons systems, sensors and control techniques. Operating and maintaining the Texas is the job of 30 officers and 445 enlisted men who make up her crew. It is these men who will write the history of the fourth ship to bear the name of Texas. These men have been busy already, with recent operations in the Pacific, the East China Sea and the Sea of Japan, in addition to exercises in the North Arabian Sea and Indian Ocean. Her travels have enabled the crew to visit Tonga, Auckland, Sasebo and Pusan.

## State Comptroller Sends Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$51.6 million in local tax payments to the 997 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"Statewide payments are up more than 15 percent over last January's checks, mostly because of the new items brought under the sales tax by the Legislature last summer," Bullock said. Bullock cautioned city governments not to expect similar increases for the rest of 1985. "The cuts we've had to make in expected state revenues are coming from the slump in the oil industry and reduced receipts from oil companies aren't yet reflected in these payments." Bullock added that sales taxes from a disappointing Christmas retail season are due in payments to cities next month.

Houston's check was the largest payment--\$8.6 million--compared to \$8.2 million received in January 1984. Dallas received \$6.7 million, up 24 percent from the \$5.4 million sent last year. San Antonio's payment of \$3.1 million is 22 percent more than 1984's \$2.5 million.

Austin received \$2.6 million, up 33 percent from the \$1.9 million last January. Fort Worth's check for \$1.8 million was a 12 percent increase over last year's \$1.6 million. El Paso's payment was \$1.2 million, a 20 percent increase over the \$1 million last January.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$20.6 million to the state's four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$9.9 million, compared to \$9.5 million last January. Dallas' DART check was for \$8.6 million and San Antonio VIA

received \$1.6 million, up from \$1.4 million last January. The Fort Worth Transit Authority received \$439,200.

January checks represent taxes collected on sales in November and reported to the Comptroller by December 20.

Five Eastland County towns received checks totaling \$41,955.52, compared to \$41,861.64 in 1984, representing an increase of .22%.

Cisco's check was for \$7,549.94, down 30.11% from last January's \$10,802.48.

Eastland's check was the largest payment--\$22,314.23--compared to \$21,191.92 received in January 1984, an increase of 5.30%.

Gorman received a check for \$982.18, up .66% over the \$975.71 received last January.

A check for \$10,212.92 was mailed to Ranger. This represented an increase of 62.44% over last year's check of \$6,287.09 for the same period.

Rising Star received a check for \$896.25, down 65.59% from the \$2,604.44 received in January 1984.

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## To Prevent Errors, Refund Delays, Use Peel-Off Label

Many simple errors that can cause weeks of delay in the processing of federal income tax returns could be prevented if taxpayers would use the preprinted label and envelope that accompany the tax package, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

The peel-off label contains the taxpayer's name, address and social security number. It also has a series of numbers that are computer shorthand for the taxpayer's name, another series of symbols indicating the Postal Service local delivery route and the service center where the taxpayer filed the previous year. The two-digit number indicates type of the tax package that was mailed to the taxpayer an a three-digit number allows the IRS to pre-sort and bundle the mail by destination for the U.S. Postal Service.

Many taxpayers are suspicious of these numbers on the label, mistakenly thinking that they are coding that will trigger an audit. They have nothing to do with audits. The coding on the label is designed to speed processing at IRS service centers and prevent common errors that delay issuance of refund checks.

When a return is received at an IRS service center, it ends up in the hands of a data transcriber, who types


the taxpayer's name, address and social security number on a machine, which enters this and other information directly into the center's computer. If the return has a label on it, the data transcriber knows that the information already is in the computer and can make an abbreviated entry of just 13 keystrokes. However, if there is no label on the return, the transcriber has to query the computer whether it has the information, which takes 24 keystrokes, nearly twice the time and effort for the same result. If all of the information from the name and address part of the label has to be entered into the computer by the transcriber because the label was not affixed to the return, that can add up to 97 keystrokes. When you consider that IRS service centers process over 170 million federal tax returns annually, over 95 million of which are individual income tax returns, all those additional keystrokes can really make a difference, the IRS said.

The coded numbers on the label speed up the processing of the return and prevent common errors that delay the issuance of refund checks.

One of the most troublesome errors, according to the IRS, is an incorrect social security number. Such an error can take weeks or even months to correct and is a major cause of delayed refund checks. Taxpayers should make sure that the social security number is correct on the label and if not, mark through it and correct it on the label. In addition, the number should be written in the appropriate box on the return. What if the name on

the label is incorrect or the taxpayer has changed names because of marriage? Correct the name on the label or add the spouse's name on the label.

The IRS said that errors also can be averted if taxpayers would use the special pre-addressed envelope that came with the tax package. This envelope also has special coding on it that speeds the sorting of tax returns in the service centers.

Excessive December rainfall has caused ten Texas U.S. Army Corps of

Engineers lakes to rise above conservation pools.

Included are Navarro Mills, Bardwell, Lavon, Wright Patman, Lake of the Pines, Waco, Proctor, Georgetown, Granger and Somerville.

Two lakes that are especially high are Navarro Mills, which is 8 feet above normal conservation pool, and Bardwell which is 4 feet above. Both are in the upper Trinity River Basin and will remain in the flood control pool for several weeks until stored flood waters can be safely released.

Recreation facilities in some areas are inundated by flood waters and may cause

boating hazards. Federal projects designed to store lake overflows in the Trinity River Basin saved \$2,378,000 in flood damages during December.

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



# Work-in-Progress To Correct Wind-Related Cable Problems

Wind in this part of Texas is a way of life.

But for some, it causes more problems than you can imagine.

Consider the plight of Roy Thackerson, dedicated manager of Southern TV Systems here: wind on the ground is bad enough, but when you multiply it by the height of a tall tower, you can know that the wind velocity at the top is higher and causes problems.

Specifically, even with the most stable of towers, there is wind-caused movement between the top where the

microwave image comes in, and the ground where it's fed out to the Olden Head-In to be distributed to the various cable subscribers throughout this area.

Biggest problem is with Channels 8, 11, and 13, which are normally (meaning low wind days) brought in on the giant tower by way of microwave, but when the wind distorts, Southern has to switch to the off-the-air antennas and the reception is less than perfect.

Manager Thackerson apologizes to viewers who don't always have top quali-

ty reception on these channels. He is happy that the problem has been pinpointed and he has crews who are working on the problem, and there is every hope that the situation can be corrected soon to provide better quality reception on these channels.

"We appreciate the patience of our customers," he said, "and you can know that we're working hard to solve the problem."

You get the impression that it bothers Mr. Thackerson too.

## Deer Harvest Questionnaires

Texas parks and Wildlife Department reminds landowners who were issued antlerless deer permits or special antlerless deer tags for the 1984-85 hunting season that now is the time to return their deer harvest questionnaires. The questionnaire, which is attached to the front of their permits, should be completely filled out. The number of antlerless bucks, antlerless deer, turkey, and javelina harvested for each tract of land for which permits were obtained should be recorded. If none were taken, "0" should be marked in the appropriate blank. All cards should be returned as soon as possible following the close of the deer season. Each questionnaire is self-addressed on the back.

Information obtained from these harvest questionnaires will be used to estimate total harvest of deer, turkey and javelina throughout Texas and to help evaluate harvest regulations. Questionnaires should be returned by the end of January 1985.

## Fishing Report

"Fishing Down Mexico Way"

During our winter months anglers long for spring and warmer weather. Or as George Beighley of Ranger and his brother in law Mr. Lorn Stropes of Rock Island, Illinois, head down south to Mexico.

George and Lorn visited beautiful Lake Vicente Guerrero located due south of McAllen, Texas, approximately 170 miles to the northern portion of Guerrero and 240 miles to the south end which George stated held the better fishing due to less pressure.

During a 2 day stay at Felipe's Camp, these gentlemen caught over 130 fish. Actual fishing time on the water was 14 hours during these two days. George was quite frank when saying if you threw anything white you caught fish. Grape and white worms accounted for

most of the fish taken, with white spinners and copper blades, and Tennessee shad crankbaits also producing. George and Lorn's pattern was quite simple in running open water locating shelves which dropped to 20' rapidly and dropping there worms rigged Texas style vertically along these drops. Ledges are only a small portion of the vast structure contained in Guerrero; moss beds, standing timber, and small towns and ranches which were flooded upon the filling of the lake.

A short run down on prices and necessities are: Gasoline 64 cents gallon; guide service including boat \$150.00; guide service alone \$100.00. George did recommend fueling up prior to arriving at lake side due to slightly higher prices there. Of course when entering

another country you will need proof of ownership for boat, motor, trailer and towing vehicle, also a birth certificate will be necessary for visa clearance. At present the exchange ratio is 200 to 1. George recommended taking highway 281 all the way to McAllen, Texas. Approximate mileage is 575 miles, with an overall estimated cost of \$200.00 per person.

George shall be giving a short program concerning Vicente Guerrero during our February meeting, Thursday the 7th.

Area lakes are looking better with new water levels. Hubbard Creek recently yielded a six pound 9 ounce black bass, a real healthy fish considering Hubbard's







# 40 Years Later

Soon after D-Day landings, the 1st Battalion, 143rd, and troops of the 133rd Field Artillery with withdrawn from the Paestum sector to reinforce American Rangers at Chiunzi Pass, a vital gateway across the rocky Sorrento Peninsula. From the pass artillery shells were dropped on German mortar positions at the foot of the mountain. These troops, which remained in the line almost two weeks longer than the remainder of the Divisions, greatly aided the British Tenth Corps in the sweep into Naples and the drive up the the Volturno River.

The Winter Line. German delaying actions across the whole of Italy stubbornly slowed the Fifth and Eighth Army advances during later October and early November. Italy's mountains lay in the path, one after the other. The Germans, skillfully bargaining for time, made each a hard-fought objective to win. Chill and rain marked the seasonal change in weather. Nevertheless, optimism still flowed in the expectations of many that Rome would be reached before long, even "before Christmas." But Rome be reached before long, even "before Christmas." But Rome never looked so far away as it did from the base of Maggioro or Sammucro, with Germans peering down from the top. It rained the November night the 36th moved up to re-enter the line near Mignano, where Highway 6 and a main railway cut through a narrow pass into the Liri Valley running north toward Rome. Elements of the 3rd Infantry Division invited relief from their cold, rock-ledge holdings on the slopes of the mountains flanking the pass. Of the battles and of the winter months that were ahead, General Walker upon their conclusion could forthrightly state:

I do not recall any campaign in the whole history of the United States Army in which soldiers have had to endure greater hardships or have performed greater deeds of heroism than this campaign in Italy." Million-Dollar Mountain. On November 15, the 142nd Infantry moved into defensive positions on the lower slopes of Camino-Maggiore hill mass, 3,000 foot bastion guard Mignano Gap. Harshness on the Texans increased as continual rains turned the mountainside into a slippery, treacherous obstacle. Advantageous hilltop positions clung to by the Germans gave the enemy full observations of the valley.

For two weeks, preparations for a big attack were underway. Supplies were packed by hand to forward dumps high on the mountain slopes. Patrols flet out the German positions. Men came down from the rocky ledges briefly for Thanksgiving Day turkey. A week later, after dark of Dec. 2nd, 600 Allied guns in the valley began the treatest artillery concentration since El Alamein. This artillery expenditure earned for the target the popular name of "Million Dollar Mountain."

Before daylight the 3rd Battalion crossed the line of departure half-way up on the eastern ridge. The attack proceeded swiftly. Lt. Col. Samuel S. Graham 2nd Battalion moving through the 3rd when the latter's objectives had been seized, and pushing forward over the rock-cleft top to the most forward slope, a point 4 kilometers on a straight line from the start. By late afternoon Maggiore had been seized but the enormous problem of maintaining the position over the extended single line of supply had only begun.

Heavy German artillery pounded back on the newly-won positions and on the supply trail. For another week, with more rain falling, our men endured the muddy holes and the enemy shells until a relief was effected. An attempt, then novel, to drop supplies by fighter plane to the men on Maggioro, missed. The Germans got the K-rations.

Long periods of rain turned the battlefield into an endless sea of mud. For the infantry it meant not only fighting up slippery trails, but also living in fox-holes which had been turned into ponds. Behind the front, truck convoys wallowed and stalled in axle-deep mud along secondary roads, or while passing enemy blown installations along the main routes. Even the versatile jeep found itself helpless many times when it became embedded in the quagmire.

When the "Texas" Infantry re-entered the line on November 15, in the Mignano - San Pietro sector, it rained daily for seventeen consecutive days. Cold winter rains brought maddening bodily discomfort. The earth turned to mud. Floodee bivouacs, sliherly roads and trails, often under enemy observation, greatly slowed all operations.

Mountainous terrain confronted the Division in practically every phase of the italian campaign. With it came the enormous talks of getting supplies to the front line forces and evacuating the casualties. In the Mount Maggiore and Mount Sammucro sectors, pack animals carried the food, water and ammunition as far up the steep muddy trails as possible, round trips requiring eight to ten hours. Hand-carry was common and laborious. In addition supply routes were frequently under enemy fire and observation. Sometimes Italian Mule Skinners were used.

The most serious obstacle impeding the capture of San Pietro was Mt. Sammucro, 4,000 foot Hill 1205 - This mountain, one of the steepest heights scaled by Allied troops during the war, descends to the village of San Pietro on its southern slope. Along its icy trails and treacherous cliffs the Germans had craftily organized a formidable chain of mutually supporting pillboxes. For the December 8 San Pietro Assault, Colonel William Martin ordered the

1st Battalion, 143rd Infantry, to attack the summit of 1205. Upon achieving its objective, it was to attack along the ridge to a point northwest of San Pietro. The 3rd Ranger Battalion was the seize Hill 950, another feature of the Sammucro hill mass. The 2nd Battalion, 143rd, was to drive over the olive orchards northeast of San Pietro. The 3rd Battalion, in support was to follow the 2nd at a distance of 400 yards.

As night fell, our artillery hammered powerfully at the enemy's main line of resistance. It was raining at H\*Hour when 2nd and 3rd Battalions crossed the line of departure. Some 200 yards forward they encountered mines and automatic fire from German pillboxes. German mortar and artillery fire were deadly by reason of excellent observation from enemy-held Mt. Lungo, overlooking our advance.

The 3rd Battalion was committed. But the advance never gained more than 600 yards. Our initial assault on San Pietro had been repulsed with heavy casualties. On 1205, however, the 1st Battalion attack succeeded brilliantly. The 1st Battalion began an exhausting five-hour climb up rugged Mt. Sammucro at 1500. Under cover of darkness the men crawled up the slopes, sometimes on all fours, sometimes chinning

themselves over the sharp rocks that cut into their shoes, sometimes using their ropes as lassoes to pull themselves over the otherwise impassable cliffs. Doing without overcoats and blankets they still respired freely on a night that neared the zero mark - it was work to climb the mountain. When the Germans sensed approach to the summit, they rolled man-sized boulders over the top. Occasionally our own men, struggling to keep going, slipped on the ice and loosened other rocks. These boulders, gaining momentum in their decent, caused as many as a dozen casualties on one downward journey.

But A-Company gained the summit before the strongly-entrenched enemy fully realized that an assault was upon them. The infantrymen, summoning every last measure of their strength, stealthily crept up to each successive pill-box and neutralized it until the Germans withdrew stunned.

To the right the 3rd Ranger Battalion also has captured its objective, but only after successive attacks and costly casualties. For on Hill 950 the enemy had been alerted. Counter attacks were expected. They followed quickly seven of them in the first day. The Germans struck back with unceasing violence. The slopes of Hill 1205 were strewn with the

dead on both sides. Prisoners captured by the 1st Battalion stated that they had been ordered to retake Sammucro at all cost.

Four days later the 504th Parachute Battalion reinforced the 1st of the 143rd which threw its entire remaining strength into the push along the ridge. The attack gave out one hundred yards short of the objective when the severe losses in this extreme effort forced a halt. But San Pietro was soon to fall. It had been said by military men of wide experience that the physical discomforts of Washington's Army at Valley Forge could not have been compared to those suffered by the foot soldier in the Italian mountains. Hill 1205 substantiated that opinion.

For ten days at an abnormal altitude the men fought on without blankets, overcoats, or raincoats. Under the conditions, freezing temperatures made sleeping dangerous. Even for those who stayed awake frozen feet were common. Then, too, for the first three day food and water were inadequate. - Only a single K ration unit per man during the period and a single beedon of water for a squad. If it was difficult to bring up supplies, it was also difficult to take down the wounded. To negotiate Sammucro required considerable stamina

even without packs of rifles. To climb it carrying a box of rations or to come down it with a litter demanded maximum effort. Below Mt. Sammucro the 2nd and 3rd Battalions twice again attempted to break through the olive groves toward the town. Both times they met heavy German fire and were stalled. Voluntee patrols made desperate attempts to reach enemy positions and reduce the strong points but not a single member of any such patrol ever came back alive. San Pietro had not yet fallen, but the capture and securing of strategic Sammucro threatened the German position all the way to San Vittore.
