## CofC Taking Applications For 'Christmas In May'

Applications are now being taken at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office for the annual Christmas in May project. Anyone meeting the requirements is urged to fill out one of the application forms. The deadline for registration has been set at February 15th.

The project, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, calls for volunteer housing repair for the elderly and the handicapped. All applications will be considered and reviewed by the selection committee. If selected, the home will then be included for repair by the volunteer labor force in May.

Eligibility requirements are that the applicant be 60 years of age or older or handicapped if not elderly. The person must own the home (or in the process of buying it) and have a low income (financially unable to afford repairs).

An appeal is also being made for donations of time,

money and material. A goal has been set to raise \$3,500.00 by the middle of March. The money will be used for materials only as all labor is done voluntarily by many of

Cisco's citizens.

The program was begun in 1982 and has been well received by all segments of the city. The Chamber of Commerce sponsors the pro-

The 12th Annual Cisco Folklife Festival will be held in a new location this year according to Bettye McGinness, Folklife Festival chairman. The festival will be held in the downtown Cisco Historical District near the Mobley Hotel.

The Folklife Festival will be held April 27-28, 1985 in conjunction with the Cisco Junior College Ranch Days. Food and demonstration booths will be open to the public immediately following the 10:00 a.m. parade on Saturday, April 27, staying open until 11:00 p.m. and

## Tentative Date Set For Rebuild

A tentative starting date has been announced for new construction by Southern Television in the Cisco area on new cable lines. The company has been planning to upgrade the cable system in Cisco.

The starting date has been announced for Feb. 1, but Southern Television manager Roy Thackerson said he does not really think work will begin on that date. He said the crews are working near Eastland and Breckenridge and have made no indications when they will be starting in Cisco. Once construction work does begin in Cisco, it is possible there will be some service interruption. Mr. Thackerson said outages are

to be expected, just as they would be if electric lines or water lines were being worked on and replaced throughout the city during a major rebuild.

He stated outages should not occur more than 25 or 30 minutes at a time, unless problems are encountered by the construction crew. After allowing about a half hour, if a customer is still not receiving a cable reception, they might want to contact their local office to see if their is a problem.

Mr. Thackerson said he will release more information later when there is a definite date set for construction to begin in the Cisco project.

## EASTLAND

They were greeted by publishers H.V. and Gay Nell O'Brien, their son Vance and daughter Amy; Production Supervisor Ted Rogers, Ranger Editor Jeanne Mackey, Cisco Editor Herrel Hallmark, Rising Star Editor Carolyn Ratliff, and numerous employees from the papers throughout the county. All admired the spacious new building. Among the honored guests were Cong. Charles Stenholm and veteran newspaper people from a wide area.

Eastland City Commissioners have given approval to an oil and gas lease with North Ridge Corp. of Grand Prairie. Approx. 20 acres north of the airport will be involved.

A request made by the Staff Water Board for the city of Eastland to allocate more water for the Staff Line was denied by the City Commissioners.

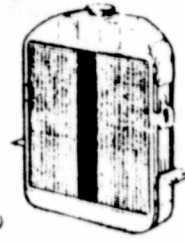

**Eastland Area Confirmed As Possible GM Location Site**

WFAA Television (Channel 8) has confirmed that the Eastland area is definitely on the possible site list for General Motor's to-be-announced Saturn plant location.

In town Monday to report the Eastland-GM story, the Dallas station's representatives confirmed that the Eastland area is one of the locations being considered and that the announcement will be made within three months of the final choice.

In separate, but related developments, members of the Eastland County Task Force were in Austin Monday to confer with Gov. Mark White and the Economic Development Commission (formerly the Texas Industrial Commission) about the General Motors Program. The group was unable to visit with the governor but did spend considerable time with the Development office, and learned that Gov. White conferred with GM officials on Monday, Jan. 21st in Detroit, at which time he made an inclusive pitch for the company to select Texas for its brand-new subdivision and auto plant.

The Commission has been working with GM and is in the process of preparing data which they have requested. The counties were asked to up-date the information about each of the towns in the county for the commission so that the latest and best information may be presented.

The Eastland County group had lunch with Sen. Bob Glasgow who is assisting with the effort.

Among those in Austin Monday were Carl Conger and Delton Ake of Eastland, Dick Woolley of Cisco, Ron Butler of Ranger and Mont Montgomery and Tommy Clark of Gorman.

The Dallas television station devoted a major portion of its 6 p.m. news to the Eastland visit, which included a visit with Chamber Manager James Wright, Industrial Foundation Executives M.H. Perry and Grover Hallmark and CoC President Terry Edwards. Considerable air time was devoted to comments by Wright and Hallmark. The crew came in the Channel 8 helicopter, landing at the Eastland Municipal Airport where they were met and taken to the probable site for the plant.

Word was circulating in Eastland Monday night - probably based on Channel 8 report - that GM had already definitely chosen Eastland as the site.

The County Task Force, which is made up of representatives from throughout the county, is working hard to assemble information for the Texas Development Commission and also to work direct as requested to show that this area is the ideal place for the Saturn plant.

With the lakes in this area in excellent shape it's felt that so many things are working in favor of this selection here.

Maybe not so coincidental-

Saturn plant last week during his weekly television show.

"Yes, we did discuss the Saturn plant," he said of his meeting with Smith, "and he gave us some very favorable indications."

He promised he would be "very aggressive in trying to demonstrate to them the real test of a company's ability to locate in Texas - profitability."

White told the CWA meeting that GM is most concerned about transportation and electricity costs. He said the Public Utility Commission, which in recent months cut rates for several major electric utilities, has helped make Texas a more attractive home for business and industry.

In general, the governor said it's up to management to give Texas' workers the tool to keep the state's industries strong.

"We can talk about a well-tuned labor force all day long. If we don't have well-trained management we don't get the combination that make the productivity," White said.

**Cong. Stenholm In Favor Of School Prayer**

(Editor's Note: The following is reprinted from the Monday, March 5, 1984, edition of the Congressional Record in Washington. The Record publishes "proceedings and debates of the 98th Congress, Second Session.")

**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES**  
**SCHOOL PRAYER**  
 MR. STENHOLM. Mr. Speaker, I thank the gentleman from Virginia for yielding to me. I have enjoyed very much his excellent presentation of the purpose of why we are here this evening, and I am privileged and pleased that he has yielded to me for purposes of participating in this bipartisan effort to reaffirm what the Constitution of the United States has to say about the subject of prayer and the part of God in our daily lives.

Mr. Speaker, it is often said that out of the mouths of babes comes great wisdom. Margaret, a young 10-year-old girl, shared some wisdom when she wrote, "Dear Pastor, I think God is smarter than everybody in the world. Even Mr. Lewis my math teacher."

Throughout our history, that belief that God is smarter than we are has run through the fabric of this country. But now, Margaret is not permitted to discuss matters such as God or religion or prayer with Mr. Lewis or anyone else associated with the public schools. We have a long history of acknowledging God as a part of our Nation. But now, a small minority of citizens has succeeded in forbidding virtually any mention of God in most public institutions, particularly public schools.

Those who insist on the removal of religion from public schools usually ally themselves with our forefathers who wrote the Constitution and established our country. These Founding Fathers, they claim, intended strict separation of church and state in all affairs of the country. But how well do their claims hold up?

James Madison, the primary author of the Constitution, was part of the committee that recommended a chaplain for the House of Representatives. As late as 1833, President Andrew Jackson signed a treaty with the Kickapoo Indians to provide \$3,700 of government money which, in part, was intended to build a church for the Indians. Most of our Presidents, starting with George Washington, have signed national Thanksgiving Day proclamations, stating that, as a country, we should render "our sincere and humble thanks for (God's) kind care and protection of the people of this country."

In 1787, the Congress of the Confederation wrote in the Northwest Ordinance, "Religion, morality and knowledge, being necessary to good government, shall be forever encouraged." A few years later, John Adams wrote, "Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other." Now, that says it is entirely in the interest of the Government to encourage a moral and religious lifestyle.

But what about religion and the public schools? Thomas Jefferson argued that a religious college should be allowed to locate on the campus of the State University of Virginia, "so as to give to their students ready and convenient access and attendance on the scientific lectures of the University." Today, the Supreme Court would hold that letting religious schools establish themselves on public property would constitute aid to religion.

An acknowledgement of God is an inextinguishable part of our culture, our social practices, and our Government - not just in the past, but today as well. State legislatures and the U.S. Congress still have chaplains today. Our currency is imprinted with the words, "In God We Trust." There are references to God in both the Star Spangled Banner and the Pledge of Allegiance. The official reference point for all dates is the birth of Jesus Christ; or A.D., Anno Domini or after the birth of Christ. Christmas and Thanksgiving are national holidays. In light of such practices, denying the right to pray approaches the ridiculous.

We see from our history lessons that our forefathers took great pains to make this country a place of freedom for personal expression. Yet, religious speech is now totally excluded from public schools. It is ironic that while students are forbidden to pray, they have an almost absolute right to any type of secular expression.

The Establishment Clause of the Constitution states that the Federal Government is prohibited from establishing an official national religion. A strict separation of church and state is never mentioned in the Constitution. There is a great deal of talk today about the need not to impose one religion on our children, and I will quickly add a warning. What disturbs me is that imposing religion is exactly what is happening - we are imposing a religion of secularism on our students.

I want to be among the first to voice a strong caution about how religious activity should be reinstated in the classroom. To begin with, decisions about whether or not to have group prayer, and what the content of the prayer should be, must be made on the local level. Then, there at that level, it is imperative that the plurality of religious belief in the Nation be taken into account. Schools must communicate better with parents, so that the voluntary nature of the prayer must be insured, with no child being forced or unduly pressured to participate. We need a broad marketplace of religious ideas and expressions. Religious activity in the schools should be permitted by the courts or the Constitution, but there should not be an automatic return to the practices which kindled the controversy originally.

In a September 1983, Gallup poll, 81 percent of the people who were aware of a constitutional prayer amendment supported such a proposal, with only 14 percent opposing it. My own experience in talking with my constituents, especially school students, confirms this overwhelming support. The people of the country have spoken. The legislation in Congress has been introduced. The Senate of the United States is now acting. How long will the House of Representatives refuse to move on the important issue of school prayer?

# Numerous Items At County Commissioners Meeting

Commissioners Court met Monday, Jan. 28 in the Courtroom with all four Commissioners present: Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Soett Bailey presided.

The first order of business was the granting of permission to cross County Road No. 159 in Pct. 1 with a pipeline. The request was brought by Mrs. Ernest Sneed and Jerry Carter.

A request to cross County Road No. 223 in Pct. 3 with a pipeline (a gas line west of Rising Star) was brought by Hutch Petroleum Co. The request was granted.

Additional requests for pipeline crossings, although not on the agenda, were brought by a representative of Sun Oil Co. The proposed crossings would all be in Pct. 2, on graveled county roads north of Olden. They would be 8 in. gas gathering lines. The commissioners approved this project.

The next order of business was a request by Hattie Williamson that the county consider maintenance of County Road No. 329, located north of Eastland in Pct. 1.

She asked Richard Robinson, Commissioner of the Precinct, why the road was not being maintained. She stated that it was in very bad condition, and that her family and two others in the area found it hard to get to and from their homes.

Commissioner Robinson replied that he had sought legal advice on the matter and that until the dispute was settled over the owner-

ship of the road the County had no authority to maintain it.

Robinson explained that "The man who owns the land on each side of the road has ordered us to stay out. I don't want to put my men in jeopardy by sending them in there."

Mrs. Williamson then gave a summary of the history of the road, with her statements substantiated by those of two neighbors. One of them recalled that the road had been used by the public as far back as the horse and buggy days.

Mrs. Williamson indicated that there had never been any trouble about the road until the property was purchased on each side by the present owner, who also claims the roadway.

She noted that there were Lone Star Gas lines, Texas Electric poles and Bell telephone lines along the road.

Judge Bailey said that this might have some bearing on the case, but that more research would need to be done to determine the deed easement and status of the roadway in question.

He stated that the Commissioners Court had no jurisdiction to decide dispute in title and ownership of land. This was a matter for the District court and a jury trial. He indicated that sometimes a public road was not necessarily a county road.

Mrs. Williamson said that she planned to continue with the matter and get a passable road to her home -

some counties are beginning to provide it.

The motion was made and approved for the county to provide secretarial help for the DPS office on a one-year trial basis.

The salary for this position would come from money budgeted for law enforcement purposes. One Commissioner suggested that the county would probably make enough in out-of-state fines alone to pay the extra employee.

Several persons applying for the position of Justice of the Peace, Pct. 2 (Ranger) were in the courtroom. When Judge Bailey brought the matter up for a decision

Commissioner Jack Blackwell stated that he preferred Luther Maxwell, and placed his name in nomination.

Commissioners C.B. Dill and L.T. Owen voted to appoint Maxwell, and Richard Robinson abstained. Motion carried, and Maxwell is the new JP for Ranger.

Sheriff Don Underwood addressed the Court concerning several matters. These will be covered in another article.

On the naming of the Salary Grievance Committee, County Clerk Jo Anne Johnson informed the group that only one person of the citizens contacted has

replied to the request to serve.

Kenn Norris of Carbon has agreed to be a member of this Committee. The Commissioners suggested giving those requested some more time before making other choices.

In dealing with the Damaging Travel on Rural Roads, the Commissioners were told that the State Attorney General had been called on the matter of enforcing laws against same.

The Attorney General advised that the only officials authorized to stop such travel are officers from the DPS, the County Sheriff, or

his Deputies.

The Commissioners discussed various problems connected with the hauling of heavy equipment on county roads, especially when the roads are wet. They brought out ideas on signs to regulate this.

The last portion of the meeting concerned budgetary and appropriative matters, and claims and accounts.

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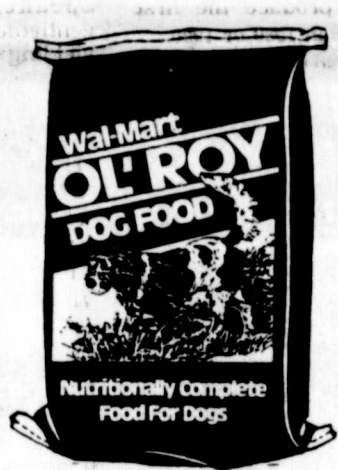

## Effects Of Tax Reform Proposals On Agriculture

Recent tax reform proposals unveiled by the Treasury Department would have a wide ranging effect on Texas agriculture, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"First of all, it is impossible to categorically state whether the Treasury Department's tax reform plan would be good or bad for all farmers and ranchers," says Dr. Forrest Stegelin. "Some producers may pay more taxes while others will pay less, depending upon their operations and amount of off-farm income."

Corporate taxes would be raised substantially (about 25 percent) by eliminating many business tax breaks while individual taxpayers would pay about 8.5 percent less overall. So, most farmers would likely benefit from the lowered individual rates because of sole proprietorship or partnerships, notes Stegelin.

Under the tax reform proposals the number of tax rate brackets would be cut from 14 to three, with in-

dividuals paying taxes at either 15, 25 or 35 percent tax rate. Taxpayers filing joint returns would pay 15 percent if their incomes fell below \$32,000. Those with incomes in the \$32,000-\$64,000 range would pay 25 percent, and incomes above \$64,000 would be assessed at 35 percent tax rate. Indexing is retained in the Treasury plan to prevent inflationary bracket creep, says Stegelin.

The top corporate tax rate would drop from 46 percent to 33 percent for all corporations. This would mean a tax increase for many farmers currently assessed at 25.7 percent for the first \$100,000 in income. Offsetting the lowered tax rates (46 to 33 percent) are cuts in the investment tax credit and accelerated depreciation provision enacted in 1981, notes Stegelin.

The investment tax credit would be eliminated and the accelerated depreciation provisions or Accelerated Cost Recovery System (ACRS) would be scaled back to reflect "real economic depreciation", says the economist. The scaled back depreciation

schedule would be protected from inflation through indexing.

The loss of these provisions may be good for agriculture as they may have caused producers to invest too much capital. This caused overproduction from irreversible asset fixity, which reduces the chance of profitability for some producers, explains Stegelin.

Another significant provision for business is the elimination of favorable capital gains treatment. Currently 60 percent of a capital gain is exempt from taxation. The Treasury plan would tax such gains at the individual's regular tax rate. The capital gains from farm sales would be indexed for inflation so only the actual gain is taxed, says the economist.

The tax reform package also includes the targeted elimination of deductions for soil and water conservation and land clearing expenditures. In addition, there is a severe tightening of elaborate agricultural tax shelter breaks—a move applauded by individuals opposing nonfarm investment in agriculture, says Stegelin.

The Treasury Department's proposals are intended to encourage individuals and businesses to invest for economic, not tax, reasons, adds Stegelin.

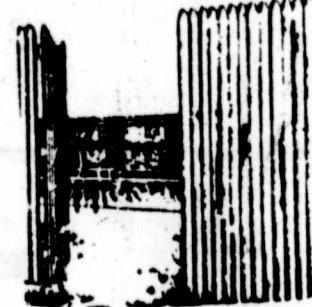

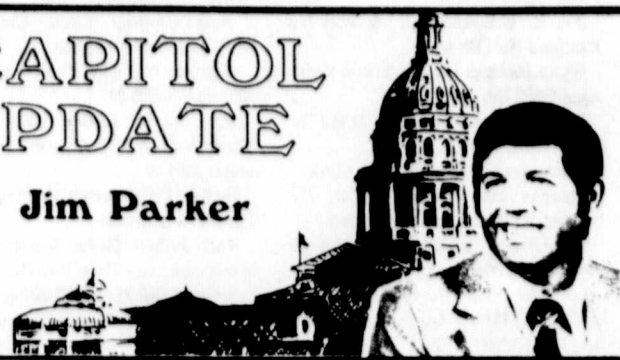

# CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



As the session is commencing, I will once again take up the task of advising you as to issues facing the 69th Legislature and hopefully give you some insights that will prove helpful to your understanding of the direction our State will take for the coming two year period.

Since money, or the lack thereof, is the most talked about issue in the state government today, I would like to make a few comments concerning the "State of the State", from a fiscal perspective.

As a little historical background, it is important to realize that since at least 1971, each successive session of the Legislature has found itself in the enjoyable posi-

tion of having significantly more money than was absolutely needed to fund the State budget. The additional funds, while looking like a blessing, may actually have been a curse, for the reason that many programs of questionable value were commenced simply because the money was available. Those programs are still in place but we no longer have the additional money to fund them.

We must reprioritize state spending and eliminate unnecessary and inefficient programs.

In talking with people of the State I find that most are not opposed to paying taxes but simply feel that the tax dollars they are paying are not being wisely spent. We

all have heard of state money being spent on items we thought were either unnecessary or at least extravagant. Specifically, the hard cold fact is that as of this writing the State lacks \$1.1 billion having sufficient funds to maintain current service levels and state spending for the next two years. We, as legislators, and you, as citizens of this state, are faced with two prospects: (1) cut back state spending to a level consistent with reduced revenue; or (2) increase taxes to maintain current spending levels.

My feeling is that you want thrift and frugality and you want a reassessment of spending priorities.

You have all been very good about expressing your feelings to me in the past and I hope you will continue to do so.

## Americans Eat Less Meat Than Figures Show

COLLEGE STATION-- "It's misuse of industry figures - not gluttony - that accounts for the seemingly high meat consumption in this country," says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

According to Mary K. Sweeten, the animal agriculture industries keep track of how many pounds of "carcass weight" of meat animals are being produced. But carcass weight includes fat and bone that never make it into the supermarket package, she explains.

The number of pounds of meat sold in retail packages is also counted. However, these figures still include fat

and bone which are not eaten and do not account for cooking losses.

When you divide either the carcass weight or retail pack figures by the total number of Americans, it's easy to draw the conclusion that we eat a great deal of meat, says Sweeten. Carcass eight per capita figures show that Americans eat about 170 pounds of red meat per year, while the retail pack figure is 139 pounds each year.

Using these types of per capita consumption figures, the authors of many diet books and plans recommend that we reduce the amount of meat in our diets, she notes.

But when you look at how much cooked meat we eat, the figures are significantly

lower, says the nutritionist. Research conducted by the National Livestock and Meat Board shows that Americans eat slightly less than four ounces of cooked red meat per day, for a total of 91 pounds per person each year.

Even this figure assumes that the average American eats fifty percent of the fat remaining on every cut of red meat served, which probably is an overestimate of actual fat consumption, she says.

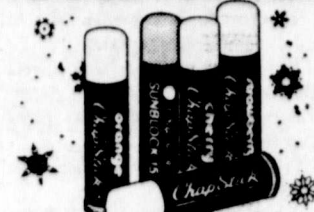
The four ounces of meat we eat per day represents a total of 327 calories, or 16 percent of a 2,000-calorie diet for the average American, Sweeten reports.

"These figures are just an average," she says. Some individuals are eating more than four ounces of meat per day and some less."

Two, 2-3 ounce portions from the meat group are the recommended amount for a balanced diet, says the nutritionist. Eating more than the recommended amount from any of the major food groups can lead to overweight, so moderation and variety are always necessary, she adds. "But don't automatically cut back on red meat just because you have heard or read that Americans eat too much meat," she advises. "Instead, weigh the portions of cooked meat you actually

eat and draw your own conclusion about whether it's enough for a balanced diet or too much of a good thing."

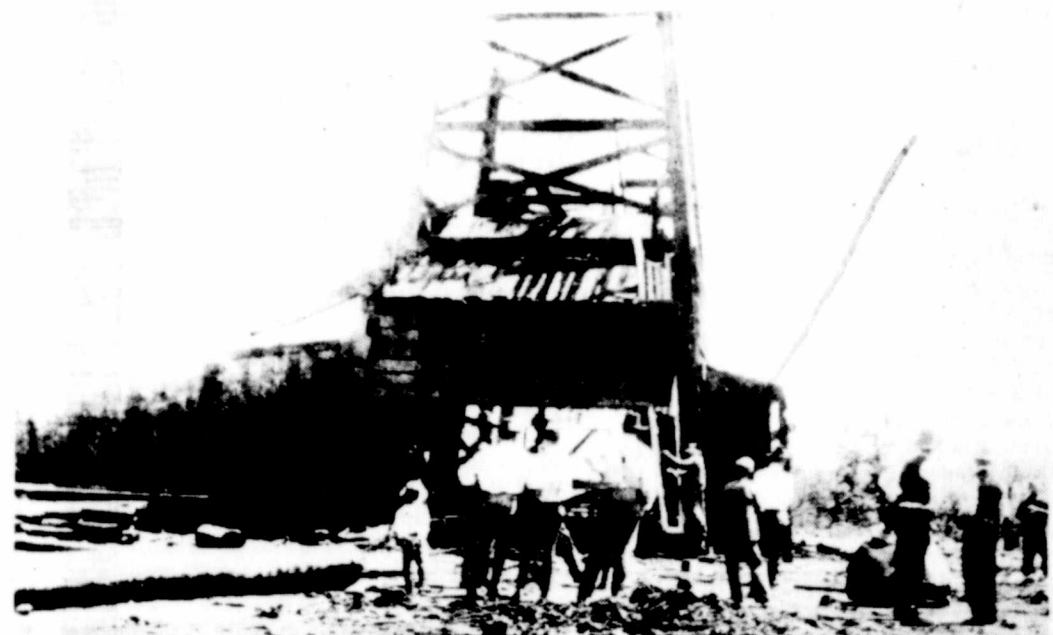

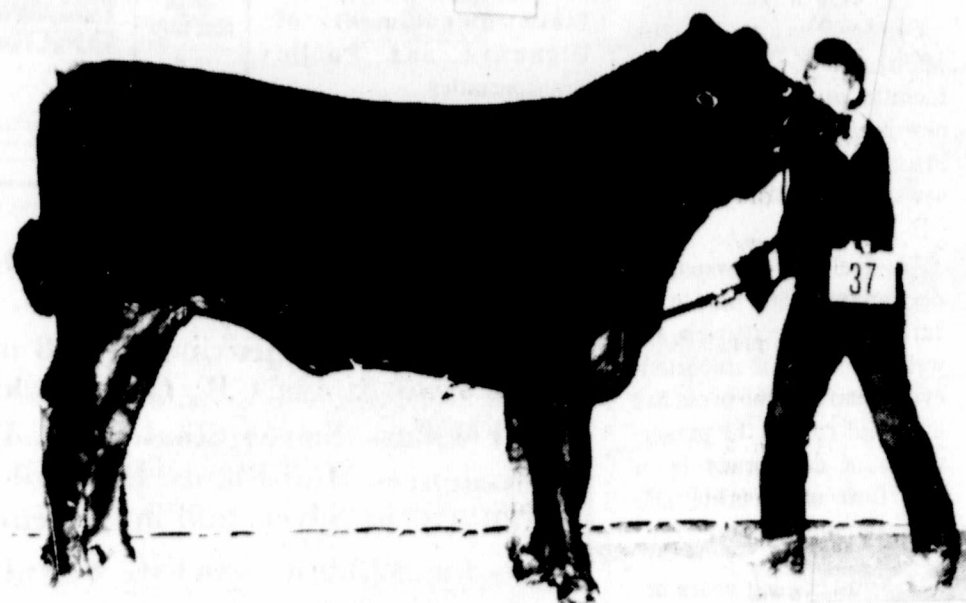

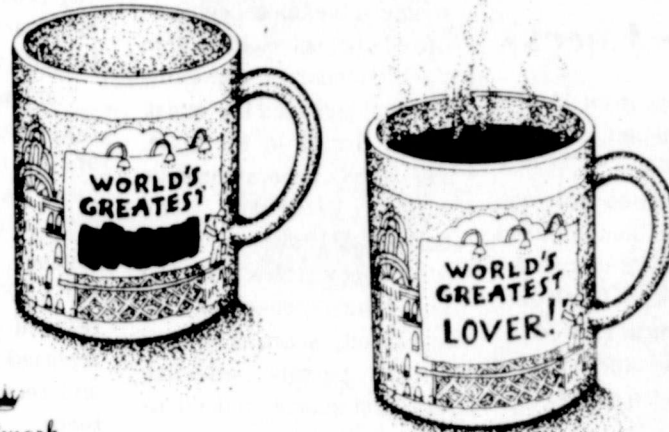

## Business Renditions Required

Section 22.01 of the State Property Tax Code requires that all tangible business personal property be rendered for ad valorem taxation each year. The rendition must be filed with the Chief Appraiser of the Central Appraisal District between January 1 and May 1 of each year.

During the next few weeks, an effort will be

made by a personal property appraiser for the appraisal district to contact each of the business owners of the county. The appraiser will have 1985 rendition forms available at that time.

If you own a business and are not contacted soon, you should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District and request a rendition form. The completed form is

required to be returned to the Eastland County Appraisal District prior to May 1, 1985, if it is to be considered timely filed.

For information concerning renditions or other pertinent property tax information, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. The telephone number is 1-817-629-8597.

## Legal Notice

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent taxes.

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located an affidavit; stating that they are sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that they do own and reside in the house that the tax is being levied on.

## State Comptroller Sends Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$13.4 million to 220 counties and 427 cities as their share of the state's mixed drink tax collected at the new rate of 12 percent during the fourth quarter of 1984.

The Texas Legislature

raised the tax from 10 percent to 12 percent, effective October 2, 1984.

Bullock said the state collected \$46.5 million in mixed drink taxes during the quarter, up 22 percent over fourth quarter in 1983.

Texas cities and counties are receiving a 15 percent

rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state. The state's general revenue fund received the balance—\$33 million—of the tax money collected. 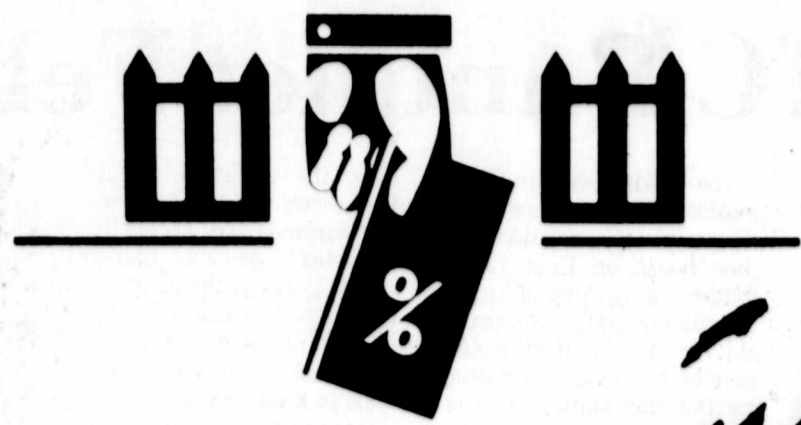
