Council OKs Drilling Test Well

City Council members ap- from \$750 to \$2,500. proved the drilling of a test water well south of Cisco Tuesday night during their regular monthly meeting. The test well will be drilled in the same vicinity as an old well.

A driller from Rising Star was called in to look at the area and he said he believes there is good water potential there. The driller asked to make a test hole and pump water for a 24-hour period to see what kind of water and how much flow may be obtained from the site.

The land owner has given the city his permission to drill on the site. The drilling depths are estimated to be anywhere from a minimum of 60 feet to a maximum of 250 feet, with the cost being was come com was our come

and approved a resolutin authorizing and providing for the incurrence of indebtedness for construction of a waste water plant. City manager Mike Moore said the resolution is a requirement by the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA). from whom the city is asking for a loan in the amount of \$875,000.

Also required by FmHA, and approved by the council, was an agreement for engineering services for the Wastewater Treatment Facility project. That agreement is with Jacob & Martin, Inc. of Abilene, Texas, and calls for the construction of a Wastewater Treatment Facility including lift sta-

town, MA. But, the local organization is being put together by E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco. Helen Orr, hospital administrator, says any club or organization wishing to learn more about the program is asked to contact her. She will be glad to present a slide-program and talk to any group when she can work it into her schedule.

The hospital will be in charge of purchasing the systems, but they need donations in order to do so. The cost of one unit is \$435 and anyone donating may designate who they want to receive that unit. A tag will be placed on the unit listing the donor.

THE LIFELINE system is a great opportunity for Cisco and is something which is greatly needed in our area since we have such a high percentage of elderly.

An elderly woman contacted me at The Cisco Press about a month and a half ago and sent a copy of an article telling about a woman who fell and injured herself in her home. She had a Lifeline system and the hospital was alerted that there was a pro-

blem. The hospital contacted her son who went to her home and found his mother. He then took her to the hospital for treatment. The article stressed the fact that had it not been for the Lifeline System, it might have been days before she was found.

The Cisco woman who contacted me asked about the possibility of having Lifeline in Cisco. I told her I would

check on it. The article contained an 800 number to call and I did so and asked for a brochure on the program and the names of Lifeline systems in our area.

The Council agreed to open bids on Tuesday, Feb. 26, at 3 p.m. in City Hall for improvements on the water distribution project. The new improvements call for the "looping of water lines" in the city, several new values, cleaning and painting the exterior of the elevated water storage tank near I-20.

City manager Moore said consultant Joe Smith ahs recommended the postponement of awarding a bid until March. He said the city has \$250,000 budgeted for the improvements.

In an addendum to the agenda, the Council approved the renewal of a jail contract with Eastland County Sheriff's office. The contract expired in January.

The new contract better clarifies who is responsible for prisoners once they are in the jail, according to city manager Moore. He said the contract says, after the prisoner is in the county jail, if he is to appear before a municipal court, the city is responsible, but if he is to appear before the district court then the county is responsi-

A bid for an oil and gas lease near the airport was opened and awarded by the city to Hanvey Productions, Inc. It was the only bid submitted for the lease

In the citizen-council discussion, city manager Moore informed those present that two valves in the dam at Lake Cisco froze and cracked recently. The leaking of water through the valves was stopped, but neither valve is now opera-

One of the cracked valves was near the top portion of the dam and has not been under water for a number of years, and the second valve had just recently gone back under water sine the level of the lake had risen. The valve being used by the city to draw water is still functioning properly.

The 18-inch valves were replaced this summer during the water treatment plant construction. The consensus of the council was that the responsibility of the cracked valves is not with the city or city council, but with either the manufacturer of the valves, the con-

the valves, or the engineers the next scheduled meeting. who made the specifications for the installation.

City manager Moore said the State of Texas has never heard of an 18-inch valve or 18 inch line "freezing in this state. It simply does not get cold enough here."

Enserch Plans To Expand **Present Facility**

Enserch Exploration, Inc. is modernizing and expanding its gathering, compression, and processing facilities in Eastland and Stephens Counties in response to the intensive drilling activity in the area. Enserch Exploration, formerly known as Lone Star Producing Company, has operated in this area since the late 1920's when it purchased much of the old Chestnut and Smith operation. Since most of the gas gathering pipeline is almost 60 years old, major refurbishment has been required.

The Enserch Exploration gas compressor station and processing plant is located on FM Highway 101 approximately 6 west of Ranger. The compressor station now includes 9 natural gas engine drive compressors, and the tenth unit is presently under construction. Only two of these compressor units were operating prior to 1982. In late 1983, a 10-million-cubicfeet-per-day processing plant, designed to extract natural gas liquids such as propane, butane, and natural gasoline, was installed in parallel with a smaller plant which was built in 1971.

UNCLE SAM'S BOOMING BUSINESS.

Jack Baker of Baker Sales in Alhambra, Calif., wishes the post office would stick to processing mail. Five years ago the Postal Service started providing, free of cost, cluster mailboxes — groups of mailboxes all in a central area — to selected housing complexes.

Baker's company makes and sells home, apartment and cluster mailboxes and Mr. Baker doesn't understand why his postal rates are being used to subsidize mailboxes when postal policy clearly states that it is the responsibility of the mail receiver to install and maintain boxes.

This is just one of many examples of government competition with independent business. The federal government alone is spending \$6 billion a year to produce goods and services that private companies already make. Clearly, this is not the function of government.

Government should restrict itself to performing only those services business cannot safely perform. National defense and law enforcement are obvious examples of the proper role of government in our society.

On the other hand, John Hanrahan, in his book Government for Sale, cites a litary of abuses that have occurred when the government contracts to have its work done by business. One example frequently mentioned is Defense Department contractors that submit low bids and then stick the government for multibillion-dollar cost overruns.

Another area of abuse has been garbage collection. Hanrahan notes that of the country's three largest trash haulers, one has admitted to bribing government officials and the other two are under investigation by federal government for other illegal corporate activities.

The solution to that problem is for government procurement people to insist on open competition in the bidding process. Small-, independent-business owners are anxious to get new business and will provide reasonable bids and good service after they get the work

Both business and the government are burned when work is done in house. Business owners lose by paying taxes to support a competitor that does not pay taxes. Taxpayers lose too, because government in-house labor and benefits are more expensive than contract labor. Government loses the tax revenues that otherwise would be collected if the jobs were

done by the private sector When federal deficits are the cause for so much concern and when many states and localities are struggling to meet bud, its with less federal help, it seems logical for government at all levels to look to the private sector for products and services rather than to maintain costly in-house "businesses.



## **Eastland County History**

A treasure-trove of Eastland County history has turned up - as it often does in an attic.

Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager James Wright in clearing belongings from his parent's home on S. Daugherty St., discovered a notebook-bound manuscript with typewritten pages of history about county towns. It's guessed that it might be material which did not make it into Ed T. Cox's History of Eastland County which was published by the Naylor Co. of San Antonio in 1950 - and now out of print.

There is a letter to Mr. Cox from a Mr. Cone in Rising Star, who claims to be the first settler of that town, and the letter indicates that Mr. Cox was then - in the early 1940s -- working on his history of the county.

There is also a newspaper clip of a picture of Mr. Cox "with ox yoke behind with George Hazzard, pioneer of Eastland County, came to Texas in 1880."

It seems possible that the typed pages might be by Mr. Cox from material of his own knowledge or from material supplied to him by others about the towns. His 96-paged History is a general overview and doesn't go into as much detail as does the manuscript pages.

Mr. Wright has loaned the newspaper the notebook and we will attempt to print the history as space permits. It's material that needs to be added to the library and archives. It appears to be basic, original material.

#### **RURAL COMMUNITIES**

A reasonably complete history of the smaller towns and communities, would require a fair sized volume and months of diligent effort.

The writer has given as much time and effort to the accumulation and arrangement of the matter for the following pages as he thought could be done without making this part of the volume and the completed one too large and probably tedious.

He hopes that the citizens of each community will find something concerning that particular one that will be of interest.

Occasionally mention is made on the rolls of the County School records of one which is not repeated, or is carried a few times and then dropped, no mention being made of it's subsequent history; such are Staff, on the roll in 1899 and Round Mountain in 1883-84.

#### ALAMEDA

A frame structure was erected and school was conducted there until the Consolidated District was formed in 1930, which has been still further added too, and is one of the important rural schools in the county. The school has 19 and 1/2 credits.

Among the early teachers at Alameda were; Harry McFarland, 1878; L.W. Duffer, 1879; D.W. Hoard, 1881; E.Y. Jennings, 1882; R. Maggie Smith, 1884; T.E. Medearis, 1885; Gussie Shannon, 1886; T.E.

Medearis, 1887; Carra Mangum, 1888; and A.L. Gibbs, 1889.

Salaries paid during this period averaged around \$40.00 per month.

Chaney was a one year high school for some years before becoming consolidated with Alameda High School District in 1939. A \$2,000 bond issue was voted in 1917 and a house built. The new consolidated district school house is situated about two miles South of the Chaney site.

Salem was probably made a school district in 1888 and may have given some high school work during most of the time of its existence. The district was combined with the Mountain School in 1937 and the combined district with Alameda to form The Alameda High School District in 1939.

Thurman was a school in 1884-85 and continued to function until 1889-90 when the name and location were changed and it became Young Springs. This district built a school house in 1902.

The record seems to indicate that Young Springs and Alameda were consolidated in 1919-1920 but if so the union was only temporary as Young Springs and Alameda appear to be different districts in 1922. Most of the original district is now a part of the Desdemona Independent District.

When Shelby Stanfield came to Eastland County in the late seventies and settled

near Mansker's Lake, he brought with him "Steele", a thorough bred, and "Bill Ganer" a quarter horse. These fleet, actice strains fitted well the needs of the people at the time and Peace Wynn were married Alameda became a breeding and returned to their home center for them. while the parents and other members of the family con-

With the decline of stockraising and the rise of agriculture as the principal means of support for the settlers, the heavier and less spirited breeds came into favor and the quarter horse is seldom met with.

When Dallas K. Scott came to Eastland County in 1875 he settled at Mansker's Lake and put in a small stock of goods near Schmick's School House, later becoming Alameda's first postmaster. The judge relates many interesting of the time, one of which is as follows: A family coming from Mississippi had settled in what is now the Kokomo community. A young lady in her late teens was a member of the family and was courted by a young man of a nearby neighborhood and were engaged to be married. The family, suddenly becoming homesick, packed their wagon and started the long trek back to their old home. The young man, in some mysterious manner, learned of the departure of the family, saddled his horse and streaked for Eastland, procured a marriage license and hit the road to overtake his sweetheart. Pausing at Judge Scott's store he learned that the family had preceded a short time before, borrowed a coat from Mr. Scott and con-

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
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

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
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## 1942 Football Squad

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## **40 Years Later**

ROME-THE ETERNAL CI-

On a Sunday morning we said goodby to the beautiful resort town of Fiuggi and boarded our buses enroute to Rome/Roma, 38 miles away, attend military ceremonies at the Plasso Venesia. Our guide Rafaella Brocco, was well versed in the history of Benito Mussolini, Fascist dictator of Italy during World War II. She said he had built highways, gently improved the educational system, and upgraded the living conditions of the Italians. To her, he seemed to be a hero.

Mussolini was born on July 29, 1883, in Predappio, a village about ten miles from the city of Forli in that region of east-central Italy called Romagna. His father, Alessandre Mussolini, was a village blacksmith, atheist, and convinced revoluntionary, and his mother was a Catholic, and unbending elementary school teacher.

"Bullet shots pass by and Mussolini remains - long live the Fascist Revolution!" Mussolini - April, 1929.

The trees that grow in Piazzale Loreto in Milan are young and tender and they murmur softly when the breeze plays among them. The buildings that enclose the square are modern and attractive with polished walls and sparkling shopwindows. But Passale Loreto is old and lies in an old and poor section of the city. It wears its new make-up to hide war time wounds, to forget the tragedies that it witness, bombings and open fights, and acts of terror: Italian partisans throwing a bomb at a German truck and the German Retaliation - fifteen Italian hostages shot by Italian soldiers under German orders, and, at last the morning of April 29, 1945.

April 29, 9:30 a.m. - a crowd has gathered in Piazzale Loreto, a grim crowd, almost all of men, tense and haggard. Along many streets that converge upon Piazzale Loreto from all directions, more men were flowing in steadily, and as they arrived pressing and pushing, the vast square heaved in concentric waves. They pressed and pushed, trying to reach a small area that appeared empty to them, seen as it was over many shoulders, between many heads. A few armed

men guarded that little space and held back the

"We want to see them," shouted an exasperated voice far from the small area. "Let us see them!" roared the mob. "We have a right to see them!" The armed men looked at each other, then at the heap of bodies in the space that from a distance seemed empty, and they decided that the mob

should see them. 10:00 a.m. - six bodies hung by their feet from a steel beam in the roof of a gas station, a station that had no gasoline to sell. Six rigid bodies with arms stretched downward, dancing an upside-down macabre dance at each gust of wind. The eyes of the crowd were on the two bodies hanging in the center of the row, the body of a man past the prime of life and that of a young woman. The man wore the black boots and black riding pants of the Fascist uniform and only a T-shirt on his sturdy chest. His neck was short and thick, his head cleanshaven; his big, square jaw hung down and his mouth was open wide; his face was disfigured by bullet wounds and the marks of kicks.

The girl had short curly hair and apparently dainty even in death. She wore blue high-heeled shoes and a lacy blouse under a prim gray suit. A rope between her legs held her skirt in place. In life they had been lovers: Benito Mussolini, for over twentytwo years dictator of Italy, fed on a steady diet of applause in all the squares of Italy, for which Piazzale Loreto now took revenge, and Claretta Petacci, who of her own choice had shared his fate in the hours of judgement. On each side of the central couple hung the bodies of two high Fascist officials, the most gruesome guard of honor lovers ever

had. Italians are not blood thirsty. The people of Milan are usually quiet and lawabiding. If they behaved like barbarians on the morning of April 29, 1945, it was because they were under extreme provocation, because they had reached the limit of endurance. Almost five years of war had brought devastation to their country, had left Italy a physical and moral wreck, the full extent of which not even the

THE PALAZZO VENEZI "There is something Roman and warrior-like rather than militaristic in our attitudes. Nor is the pagentry of the picturesque side lacking. To me this side is very important. I do not understand sullen and politics--''. gloomy Mussolini, May, 1921.

Until September, 1929, Mussolini occupies offices in the new Palazzo del Viminale and the Old Palazzo Chigi, but he could not be satisfied with the modest space that democratic Italy allocated to her Chiefs of government, and he made provisions for his headquarters in the historical set-

ting of Palazzo Venezia. The palace is in the heart of Rome and surrounded by the monuments of greatest significance for those who have made a cult of ancient Roman glories: the Tarpean rock and the Capitol Hill, the imperial forums, Trajan's marketplace, Nero's tower, and Marcullus' theater. It was built by the popes in the second half the fifteenth century and later ceded

Venice, from which it passed to Austria. It remained the property of the Hapsburgs and returned to the Italian government during World

Pallazo Venezia is in the fashion of medieval castel, with battlements and a low tower, of a warm brown, the color of the old horses stationed with their carrozzelle on the far side of the vast square before it. The windows on the second floor (the noble floor) are a distinguished feature of the facade: they are tall and wide, taller and wider than those of other old Roman palaces, and a big stone cross cuts their openings in

The center window is taller than the rest and opens on a narrow stone balcony.

After the duce decided that he would take over the palace, the restoration was promptly completed and the interior refurnished. (The work costing millions, was paid for by the Italian taxpayers). For his own office, the duce chose the dargest of the very large halls on the second floor, the one with the tall window opening on the balcony, where he made hundred of speeches to the people of Rome. This hall, called Sala del Mappamondo after an ancient map of the world displayed there, is about 66 feet long and 43 feet wide; it is two stories high and has two rows of win-

From the center of the ornate ceiling hangs a heavy chandelier with innumerable lights, and on the floor the inscription in mosaic "Anno V" (Fifth Year), for Mussolini had ordered that years be counted from the day of his March on Rome. 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



Beware of credit card frauds! Even if you guard your credit cards like cash, you could still be a victim of credit card fraud.

Credit card fraud occurs when someone illegally obtains your card number and expiration date and uses them to order merchandise or a cash advance by phone. The con artist just asks that the merchandise or the money be sent to his address, not yours. What you may not realize is that criminals can steal from your account even though the cards themselves are safely in your possession. How?

One is by retrieving your carelessly discarded sales receipts or the carbons from receipts. For example, a dishonest employee might pocket the carbons from a business's transactions and





Ordinary workers for an ancient king were said to have been paid in barley. Woodworkers were paid in silver.

Can you see the woodworker today as he carefully, patiently takes the wood into his hands? He uses various tools for forming a masterpiece. The rip-saw cuts the wood. The planer makes the wood a uniform thickness. The joiner is used so the thickness of the shaving can be varied to suit the kind of lumber to be planed. He places the wood on a table against a steel cutoff gauage. With the circular saw, he painstakedly crosscuts the wood. The ripping

fence cuts the wood lengthwise with the grain. The shaping with a lathe is done by the tools in the hands of the turner. Finer blades of the jig saw is used to cut out delicate work. "Uncle Bud" Robin-

## **Argonaut Real Estates To Help Evaluate Sites For GM Plant**

AUSTIN-Argonaut Real Estate, the GM subsidiary which will handle all site selection work for the new Saturn plant, has asked the Texas Economic Development Commission (TEDC) to work very closely with Argonaut to help them evaluate potential Texas sites for the new GM facility, Harden Wiedemann TEDC **Executive Director announc**ed today.

"GM is receiving hundreds and hundreds of calls a day concerning Saturn. They are coming from all over the country. Argonaut has asked us to help them shoulder some of the burden for the Texas communities interested in the plant. We will be matching GM site selection criteria to interested communities and help GM sort through it all" said Wiedemann.

TEDC has developed a questionnaire for interested organizations and communities which lists criteria for selection of the site of the new Saturn plant in ten key areas. Some of these include: land, electricity, steam, natural gas, water, coal, education, etc.

"GM is looking for a truly world-class campus-style setting for Saturn," said Wiedemann. "They are looking for a very pleasant community with all the recreational and cultural amenities - a place where the quantum leaps in productivity which they are undertaking with Saturan will be possible."

TEDC will be mailing the questionnaires to interested cities, town and economic development organizations later this week. Argonaut will issue a press release from Detroit in a few days asking all interested parties in Texas to coordinate through the TEDC and not approach GM directly.

"I honestly don't think GM expected the kind of interest

Saturn has generated. They've told us they are not equipped to handle the load and need our help. We are delighted to be working in partnership with them. Our Regional Business Development Center coordinators will be working hand-in-hand with interested communities in their respective areas (Metroplex, Central Corridor, East Texas, Gulf Coast, Border, the Plains) and with GM to identify those communities which best meet GM's criteria."

GM is expected to pick the site for their new Saturn plant by late spring to early summer 1985.



## County News Briefs

#### CISCO





of several cases where children were sexually abused as well as abused physically.


The Schrivers started a foster parent program in Germany while he was stationed there. They have found the program "very rewarding," she said.
