## 1.5 To 3 Inches Of Rain Bring New Water To Area

Rain that measured from 1.5 to three inches in this region brought new water to Lake Cisco and benefited area farms and ranches, according to a survey Friday.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that Lake Cisco rain gauges caught 1.5 to two inches of water. The lake level was up three to four inches Thursday and water

was running in from Lake Bernie and from the Battle Creek pump station. Water from Battle Creek flows into Lake Bernie which empties into Lake Cisco via a connecting creek. The runoff from Lake Bernie was expected to continue for several days without additional rainfall. The water level at Lake

Cisco was six feet and eight inches above the low mark registered last year, according to North Shore residents.

The soaking rain was of much benefit to wheat and other small grain fields that

survived the severe January freeze. Stock tanks were full and running over.

Forecasters called for possible rain showers Friday night and through the weekend.

## Boys' & Girls' Teams In Meets

Both the boys' and girls' track teams of Cisco High School will enter area competition on Saturday, March 16, according to the schedule released by the school.

The boys' team, coached by Rusty McLeskey, will take part in the Bluebonnet Relays at Brownwood, while Coach Lori Larrison will take her girls' team to Breckenridge for an invitation meet.

Both boys' and girls' teams have been working out for the past month in preparation for the season.

The schedule for the boys includes an invitation meet in Cisco on March 23, an invitation meet in San Angelo on March 30-31, an invitation meet at Glen Rose on April 13, and the district meet in Cisco on April 20th.

The girls' team will enter the Cisco meet on March 23 and the district meet here April 20. On March 30, the girls' team will take part in an invitation meet at Comanche and on April 13 they will be in Goldthwaite for an invitation meet.

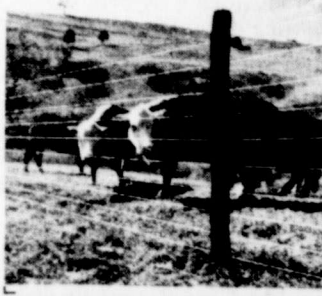

## Herring

### artist learns, experiments

Helen Herring Green, who is the daughter of Jan Herring, will be displaying a number of her oil paintings and enamels during the annual Herring Art Exhibition beginning Monday, March 18th, at the Eastland Na-

tional Bank Community Room.

Mrs. Green is a graduate of Texas Women's University, where she received her degree in sculpture. She has won a number of scholarships and awards in her field, and her works hang in numerous public and private art collections.

Mrs. Green has been enameling since she was ten years old and is an accomplished enamelist and professional teacher. Her students are taught both ancient and contemporary techniques. She has been teaching in private and museum sponsored classes for fifteen years.

Mrs. Green maintains studios in Clint and El Paso and teaches workshops at the Herring Studio at Cloudcroft, New Mexico each summer.

Paintings and drawings of expressionistic watercolorist, William Herring, son of Jan Herring, will be displayed during the annual Herring Art Exhibition beginning Monday, March 18th, at the Eastland National Bank Community Room.

Herring is both painter and teacher, maintaining a studio-school in El Paso and a studio in Clint, Texas.

Though they deal with a wide variety of subjects, the paintings share the artist's very distinctive style. They are delicate, ephemeral, almost shimmering in form and vibrant in color. One finds oneself peering intently into each piece to finish the artist's line here only to discover a shape of line there not seen before. The artist has created the space in which the viewer becomes a participant in the creative process.

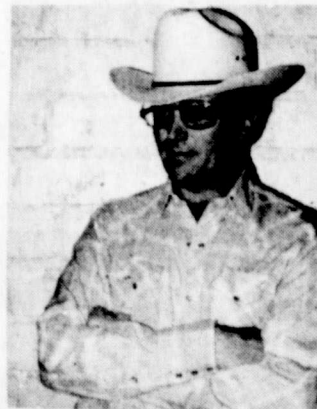
"I paint only that which is necessary, leaving much unsaid," said Herring in a recent interview. "The expressionistic style has a slow, but long-lived impact."

And so it is, one sees one side of a young man's face, but when the viewer's eyes seek the line of the jaw and cheek on the other side, it is impossible to find its boundary. The paint is applied in such a way that the face and background become, as some imperceptible point, as one. This flowing use of color is called "open color" and is a technique whereby the artist expands the color beyond the boundaries of form. Few sharp clear lines appear in this work. "The values are cushioned," says Herring,

"which, when done correctly, moves the eye around the piece, keeping it inside the painting."

Herring uses almost startlingly bright colors, which he rarely mutes. Opera pink, peacock blue and permanent violet make up a palette whose sheer brilliance is a feast of color for the eyes.

A flurry of bright flowers in a vase, race horses pounding to the finish line, ballet dancers suspended in a leap and a patchwork puppy capture and hold the eyes and the imaginations of the viewer.

A graduate of Texas A&M University, Herring teaches art at the Ysleta Independent School District in El Paso and in his studio in Clint, Texas. He also teaches workshops in the Herring Studio in Cloudcroft, New Mexico each summer.

The fourteenth annual Jan Herring Art exhibition will be held in the Community Room of the Eastland National Bank Monday, March 18, 1985, through Friday, March 29, 1985. The show, entitled "A Family Affair", will feature the works of Jan Herring, her son, Bill Herring, and her daughter, Helen Herring Green, and will be composed mainly of oils, watercolors, enamels and drawings. Area art lovers are extended a cordial invitation to visit during regular banking hours during this two week period.

As in past years, this exhibition is being held in conjunction with Jan Herring's annual two week workshop here.

There will be some special afternoon lecture-demonstration classes available to the public. Anyone interested should contact Mrs. Austin McCloud at 629-1598 to secure the necessary reservations. The Herrings have just last week exhibited a family show at the Airport Gallery in El Paso and are scheduled to present another family show at Iman Galleries in San Angelo in April shortly after leaving Eastland. "I've been painting all my life, as long as I can remember."

Jan Herring lit a second cigarette and settled back into her chair. The walls of her living room, like every other room in her rambling 100-year-old house, are festooned with oil and watercolor landscapes and portraits.

"My father was an amateur carpenter," she said. "One day, when I was 5 or 6 years old, my daddy was in an upstairs bedroom, tearing the walls apart. He had cut all these little square pieces of wood. I gathered them up and started painting farm scenes on them - cows, chickens, tractors. I made an entire farm community with those blocks. That was my first art project."

Raised in Montana and South Dakota, Herring had little exposure to fine arts, but her parents encouraged their daughter's passion for art.

"My mother recognized my artistic talent very early," she said. "I was always using paints and paper. When I was 8 or 9, we made a special trip to the Minneapolis Museum of Art. It made a big impression on me. It was one of those great things my mother did for me."

Herring saw a show of animal paintings by naturalist Rosa Bonheur. Herring - woman, painter and animal lover - immediately identified with the French artist and resolved to make art her career. She studied art at Northern State Teachers College in Aberdeen, S.D., and later at the University of Texas at El Paso. But she most values the education prominent American painter and instructor Frederic Taubes gave her when she was 28.

"He gave me my technical and aesthetic background," she said. "He was one of the greatest influences on my work."

Like her mentor, Herring has become a renowned painter and teacher. Her portraits, figures, landscapes, florals and still lifes have been collected by museums and corporations throughout the country. She earned numerous awards, including the American Artists' Gold Medal and the New York Allied Artists Heydenrick Award. Herring has written two books on painting and is contributing author for American Artist Magazine.

She plans at least three major exhibits annually, a schedule that requires constant labor in the studio.

"I work better under pressure," she said. "Basically, I'm lazy. Just thinking about painting is enjoyable in itself, and I can postpone an oil a long time doing that."

Despite her success and years of experience, Herring insisted she still is learning and experimenting with technique and ideas.

"It's all experimental." Without a hunger to explore, she said, an artist becomes dull and redundant. To fight boredom, Herring works on several paintings simultaneously. She may stick with a single theme for seven or eight canvases.

"There's so much to say on a good subject, you can't do it all in one painting," she said, noting that carousel horses have been a favorite subject for 20 years. "I think that goes back to my childhood. When the carnival or circus came to town,

there was always a merry-go-round. Now they're so scarce they're becoming collector's items. It's one of those fast-disappearing bits of America."

She has mastered the difficult media of oil and watercolor, though she still finds watercolor nudes and portraits a huge challenge, "because you must be absolutely faithful to the facts."

She occasionally dabbles in other media, especially enamels and sculpture. "I've always been interested in sculpture, but physically it's too difficult," she said. "In any new medium, your aesthetic sense transfers, but you still have to learn the skills. I don't have time. There aren't enough hours in one lifetime to do it all."

Herring conducts workshops across the country and teaches six to eight weeks each summer in her Cloudcroft studio. She limits her teaching time, because it takes too much away from her own paintings.

"Teaching is a fascinating field," she said, "but you find yourself extremely involved with what the students are doing. You forget your own work."

Teaching has had its personal rewards, though. She and her husband, a retired dairy owner, have three children, two of whom have become professional artists. Her daughter, Helen Green, earned a degree in sculpture and is a painter and enamelist. Her son, William Herring, is a painter and teacher. And one of her seven granddaughters is an avid student.

But art classes will not turn a mediocre painter into a world-class artist. Herring does not embrace the teaching philosophy that anyone can become a fine artist through training.

"It's not true that anybody can paint," she said. "There has to be some innate talent. Classes can guide students toward better skills, and teachers can save them lots of time."

But the art education has its failings, Herring had learned. Classes are rushed, students are short-changed,

and they consequently opt for shortcuts. For instance, art students today tend to favor watercolor over the more taxing medium of oil.

"Oil painting today suffers from a lack of good technique," she said. "It's a very sad thing in the painting profession. It's very important to teach technique first to allow the person's raw talent to be useful. I've had students who couldn't stretch a canvas. That's ridiculous. Possibly a university is not the place to teach painting. There is not enough studio time to develop talents sufficiently."

"Also, universities have done a lousy job teaching the basics in aesthetics and techniques," Herring said. "It's important to teach aesthetics. That is the core of fine arts. Usually, the student does not know the difference between fine art and commercial art. Students are in a quandary about what to focus on. In commercial art, there's a product to sell. That's the emphasis. But the fine artist should be consumed by a subject's beauty and simplicity, not the message. They should interpret nature. It's an entirely different expression. The philosophy and techniques are different. The sad thing is the student hasn't been taught the difference and consequently doesn't have his direction. He should at least know where he's headed."

She said other gaps exist in art education. The practical aspects of being a professional artist are rarely emphasized in school. Surviving takes more than simple artistic skill, Herring said. Discipline and business savvy are prerequisites to success.

"You have to approach painting as a job," Herring said. "That's where so much talent goes down the drain. It takes self-discipline and organization. You have to force yourself to work. You can't wait for inspiration. It's a business and you have to treat it as a business."

Furthermore, the job entails more than the glamour and intrigue of translating visions to canvas. There's the

"drudgery" of paper work, shipping, framing, stretching canvases, buying and storing materials, promotion, all the chores that have little to do with the artistic brilliance.

And to be truly good, Herring said, artists must be able to critically appraise their own products.

"It's very tough to be objective," she said. "That's the hardest skill to develop: sound judgement about your work. Many painters depend on a good friend or someone else in the field, but ultimately it is the artist's responsibility to recognize good and bad."

In the process of scrutinizing her own paintings, Herring has many times flung a finished piece into the trash can.

"Not everything you do is a masterpiece," she said with a shrug.

Finally, the artist must find gratification in work itself. The prizes, the money, the fame, all must be deemed secondary rewards to the joy of creating.

"You cannot count on earning a spot in the history books," Herring said. "So it's important to enjoy what you're doing. I always tell my students, 'Don't worry about getting there, just enjoy the trip.'"

Herring is optimistic about the future of budding artists, because art appreciation in mushrooming in the United States.

"We're in a golden age of art," she said. "We have the social and economic structure for it. We have a public that is supportive. The general public today is very informed about art. Everybody wants a hand-drawn oil painting on the living room wall. That's a beginning, at any rate, in public involvement."

"All over the country," she said, "museums are popping up in small communities where you wouldn't expect to find collections of art. This is making a tremendous difference. The public is behind an art movement. As any society becomes more affluent, the people turn toward the arts and culture."







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# City Council Authorizes Issuance Of \$250,000 Bonds

The Cisco City Council approved ordinances authorizing the issuance of \$250,000 utility system revenue bonds and the execution of an Escrow agreement for \$250,000 utility system revenue bonds at Tuesday night's regular meeting. Both ordinances were considered emergency items so they went into effect immediately.

The bonds were previously voted for but unissued in two separate bond elections. The first election provided for \$150,000 in waterworks bonds on April 3, 1982, and the second provided for \$100,000 in bonds on November 19, 1983.

The purpose of the bonds is to improve and extend the city's waterworks system. The bonds will finance the building of a new wastewater treatment plant

which is being required by the state.

Council members awarded contracts for the water system distribution improvements and water storage tank renovation to the low bidders of the last meeting of the council. Those bids and their companies were as follows: \$179,162.81 by Stegemoller Construction Company in Breckenridge for water distribution improvements; and \$35,500.00 by G&S Sandblasting and Painting in Abilene for recoating and improvements to the 500,000 gallon elevated water tank near IH-20.

A second public hearing was held during the council meeting on the purposes and development of an Economic Development Program Grant Application which has

been requested from the city by an individual who is interested in starting a business here.

Following the public hearing, the council approved a resolution authorizing the filing of an application for the grant and authorizing the city manager to sign the application and program documents.

In the grant application, the city will be asking for \$166,000 plus administrative costs. The grant money, if approved by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, will be loaned to the

individual who is interested in re-opening the old tile manufacturing facility located one-quarter mile east of the city limits on Highway 80.

Two test water wells, located on the McMillan lease west of town, were discussed by the council. The wells were reported to have been drilled years ago by the Texas Highway Department to provide water while Interstate 20 was being built in the area.

They have not been used since that time and the city wants to pump the wells for

approximately 24 hours to see what kind of water flow they can provide. After the wells have been pumped, if they seem promising, a sample of the water will be sent to a laboratory to determine whether it would be drinkable.

The council gave City Manager Mike Moore per-

mission to test one of the wells. He told the council it would cost an estimated \$500 per well for pumping and testing.

In other action, the council approved a list of election supplies and ballot number

assignments for the upcoming April 6 election, they agreed to participate with other Texas Municipal League cities in the 1985 Southwestern Bell rate case, and they voted to cancel the regular council meeting of

July 23, 1985.

Council members present for the meeting included Bobby Rains, Joe Besselaar, Roy Dennis, and Mayor Eris Ritchie. Those absent were Bobby Ingram, Brad Kimbrough, and Linton Batteas.

## Progress Made In Medical Transplants

Considerable progress has been made by the medical profession in organ transplants during the past few years and the next decade should see a dramatic increase in the field, Dr. E. E. Addy told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon at their weekly luncheon at the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. Addy, veteran Cisco area physician and surgeon, reported that he recently attended a medical program in Dallas that was devoted to up-dating physicians on organ transplant surgery.

A real plus for this type of surgery would be a big increase in the number of people who volunteer as donors upon their deaths, Dr. Addy said. Donors can be anyone in good health from age one through age 40. Individuals may sign documents allowing the use of their body for organ transplant purposes or relatives of persons who die in accidents or at early ages may sign releases, he added.

When a body is available for organ transplant use, a medical team goes into action, Dr. Addy said. The team might travel up to 1,500 miles to take the various parts of the deceased, including hearts, liver, kidneys, the pancreas, bone marrow, eye cornea, skin and others. These are carefully packed in suitable storage solutions and containers for transport to a hospital where a patient will likely be waiting on an operating table with another team of surgeons and technicians ready for transplant surgery. Speed is the keynote for success in this work, Dr. Addy said.

A new drug introduced in the past two years has improved the chances for suc-

cess in organ transplant, Dr. Addy said. The survival rate for liver transplants in the United States in 1983 was over 90 percent, he said. This was compared with 30 percent a few years earlier.

Organ transplant is expensive due largely to the many medical procedures and technicians involved in pre-surgery work plus the large team of specialized people needed in the transplant work, Dr. Addy said. Knee or hip joint transplants cost from \$1,000 to \$1,500 while kidney transplants cost \$25,000 to \$35,000 and heart transplants might cost more than \$200,000.

The use of skin transplants has done much for burn victims, Dr. Addy said. Medical science has developed procedures for covering large areas of burned flesh with skin from donors. Moreover, methods of growing skin in the laboratories have been successful, he said.

More and more people are agreeing for their bodies to be used for organ transplant, Dr. Addy said. This group of volunteers will continue to grow as educational efforts are going forward, he believed.

Lion Brad Kimbrough was the program chairman. Claude Jessup of Cisco was a guest.

## 'Most Wanted' Fugitive Caught

Governor Mark White announced today that the San Diego Sheriff's Office Swat Team, acting on tip to Texas Crime Stoppers, apprehended "Texas Most Wanted" fugitive and murder suspect Roel Gazara Reyes.

Four out of eight "Most Wanted" fugitives, featured in Crime Stoppers TV segments and newspaper columns, have been taken into custody—two on the basis of direct information supplied to Texas Crime Stoppers.

Reyes, 28, was arrested in California without incident and is currently being held in the San Diego Sub Station. Statewide publicity about the Reyes case began on February 16.

Reyes is wanted on one count of capital murder, one count of attempted capital murder, two counts of aggravated robbery, and two counts of aggravated kidnapping in connection with the September 23, 1983 shooting near Edinburg. One of the two victims survived the attack, which officers believe was linked to a foiled drug deal.

The Hildago County Sheriff's Department obtained arrest warrants for Roel and Ruben Reyes for their part in the murder-robbery. Ruben Reyes was arrested and is awaiting trial, but Roel Reyes remained at large until his arrest Wednesday.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas - at 24 years of age, Matthew Grogan is mighty young to be attracting so much attention from Texas law enforcement agencies.

Grogan is wanted in Brazos County on charges of escape and is wanted in Austin on charges of Aggravated Robbery. Investigators in Temple would also like to talk to him.

But then, problems with the law aren't new to the Goldsboro, North Carolina, native. Several years ago he was wounded by a Lee County Sheriff's deputy.

Grogan's latest problems began on June 4, 1982, when two men tried to rob Julie's Place Restaurant in College Station. One of the employees slipped away

from the robbers and called the police.

Within minutes police responded and arrested Grogan as he ran from the restaurant. A second suspect fled the area and was not apprehended.

After being questioned by the College Station Police Department, Grogan was taken to the 72nd District Courthouse for a hearing. A short time later Grogan managed to escape. He has been a fugitive ever since.

Grogan is described as a white male, 5-10, 150 lbs, with blonde hair and hazel eyes. He has a scar on his right forearm. When he was arrested in College Station, Grogan listed his address as Kyle, Texas.

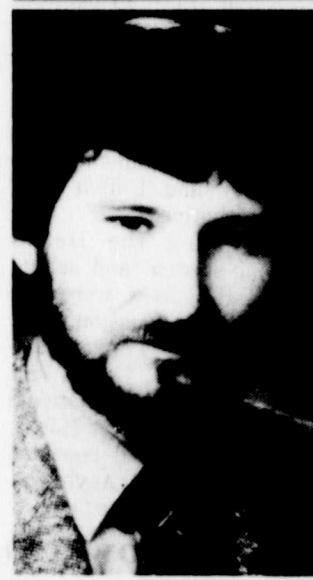

"While constituting our program to buy the full two million shares under option, as well as an additional two million in warrants, we intend to seek financing to acquire and develop U.S. heavy oil properties on which we will use the processes," he said.

Mr. Cowan added that IROC is in the process of securing financing to complete the acquisition of all the UE shares optioned. Acquisition of the full four million Universal shares, under options, and warrants granted to IROC, will cost \$15 million. "It is our intention to take all of it," Cowan said.

Universal Energy, headquartered in Tulsa, Oklahoma, developed its proprietary processes in conjunction with the Illinois Institute of Technology Research Institute (IITRI) over the past eighteen months. IITRI, generally regarded as the leading center for research in electromagnetic energy, owns many of the basic patents in this area. As a result of its work with IITRI, Universal (through a 75-percent-owned subsidiary-- Uentech Corp.) developed its proprietary technology relating to use of electromagnetic energy in heating heavy oil formations. It is this process while

IROC will employ, as will Universal on its huge heavy oil leases in Oklahoma.

# Oil Belt News

First production data have been posted for a newly completed gas well in Palo Pinto County's Carpenter Field two miles north of Gordon.

It is the No. 22 Haney, flowing 578,000 CF gas daily on a quarter-inch choke and rated at 810,000 CF on absolute open flow.

Walter Carpenter is the operator.

Carpenter took the well total depth of 3,500 feet. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,279 to 3,284 feet into the hole.

The same operator has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of a Palo Pinto County wildcat two miles north of Gordon. Designated as the No. 1 Haney, it had been spudded last April 15. It bottomed dry at 3,800 feet and will be plugged and abandoned.

Chase-Mann Petroleum Co. has finalized a new producer in Eastland County's P. Cameron Field, pumping 27 barrels 41-gravity oil daily with three barrels water. Drillsite was in the H&TC Survey, A-1017, five miles northeast of Cisco.

The well is designated as the No. 2 B. McGough.

The operator took the hole to a 4,000-ft. depth and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production at 3,400 to 3,416 feet.

R.D. Caraway has abandoned four undrilled locations in the Eastland Regular Field. The wells had been designated as the No. 1 Arnold, four miles northwest of Romney; the No. 2 Arnold, four miles northwest of Nimrod; the No. 1 Kelly, two miles northeast of Scranton; and the No. 1 Riddell, two miles northeast of Desdemona.

The No. 1 Meeks is scheduled for spudding in the Eastland Regular Field, two miles southwest of Nimrod. Central Oil & Gas of Cisco will be the operator. The venture will be situated in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-1954. It carries permit for 2,000 feet maximum depth.

First production data have

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been filed for the No. 1 Bond, a new producer in the Tucko Field, four miles south of Ranger, Eastland County.

With Inland Land & Minerals, Inc. as the operator, the well indicated it can flow 2,183,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8-in. choke with flowing tubing pressure at 695 PSI. The absolute open flow came in at 4,700,000 CF.

Inland bottomed the well at 3,400 feet total drilling depth. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Conglomerate Formation, 3,190 to 3,200 feet into the hole.

Drillsite was in the William Van Norman Survey, A-545.

Dallas-based Double River Oil & Gas has filed for permit to drill the No. 6 Woods Heirs, a wildcat venture in Eastland County, three miles east of Eastland. With total depth projected to 3,900 feet, the well will be drilled in 206-acre lease in the T&NO Survey, A-1728.

A 1,200-ft. developmental well is planned by Field Production Co. of Fort Worth at a location five miles south of Cisco in the Eastland Regular Field. The well will be spudded in a 1490 acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-930, Eastland County. The well will be known as the No. 1 Carl Ziehr.

Operating out of Dallas, Don H. Hanvey Oil Interest has driven stake for the No. 3 McCleskey, a wildcat well in Eastland County, two miles north of Cisco. With projected total depth of 4,500 feet, the venture is in a 44-acre lease in the SPRR Survey, A-928.

The No. 13 Maxwell is

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scheduled for re-entry and workover operation by Nimrod Operating Co. of Cisco. Located one mile southwest of Romney, the well is located in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey. It originally bottomed at 1,140 feet. Nimrod will be seeking production at about 1,150 feet.

First production data have been posted for the No. 1 Clayton Wilson, a new wildcat producer in Eastland County, six miles east of Sabanna.

With Northridge Corp. as the operator, the well indicated it can pump nine barrels 42-gravity oil per day along with 63 barrels water.

Northridge bottomed the well at 3,494 feet total drilling depth. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Black Lime Formation, 3,027 to 3,120 feet into the wellbore.

Drillsite was in the Thomas J. Fennell No. 33 Survey, A-136.

Tiki Exploration Co. of Dallas is preparing to make hole for the No. 1 J.J. Finley, a 3,790-ft. developmental well in Eastland County, four miles east of Eastland.

The venture is in the Lake Leon Field. The operator has 69 acres under lease with drillsite in the McLennon CSL No. 3 and No. 4 Survey, A-367. The well's target is production in the Duffer Formation.

A 5,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Northridge Corp. of Duncannonville at a location two miles south of Ranger in the Eastland Regular Field. The well will be spudded in a 40-acre lease

in the Elizabeth Finley Survey, A-119, Eastland County, the well will be known as the No. n-1 D. Colie.

Eastland-based P & R Oil Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Bacon in the Wood Field, Eastland County, two miles south of Cisco. With total depth projected to 1,500 feet, the well's target is production in the Strawn Formation. The well will be drilled in an 83-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-251.

Operating out of Fort Worth, Snow Oil Co. has staked location for two new developmental wells in Eastland County. The No. 1 Stewart-Whittington is located in the Lake Leon Field, three miles east of Eastland in a 42-acre lease in the T&NO Survey, A-1201. The operator is seeking production in the Duffer Formation.

The No. 2 Tefel-Monroe, projected to be drilled to a depth of 4,000 feet, is located in the Eastland Regular Field, five miles north of Eastland. The operator has 53 acres under lease in the H&TC Survey, A-299.

Flowing 967,000 CF gas per day on a 14/64 choke, the No. 1 Morgan has been brought on line in the Marsan Field, Eastland County, by T.L. Robertson Operating Co. Flowing tubing pressure came in at 914 PSI, while absolute open flow registered 2,700,000 CF. Location is in the J.O. Bohannon Survey, A-1977, three miles southeast of Carbon. Robertson took the hole to a 3,400-ft. bottom and perforated the Conglomerate Formation for

production at 3,074 to 3,084 feet into the hole.

At a location two miles north of Ivan, American Petrofina has completed the No. 1 Douglas in Stephens Regular Field.

The well pumped 25 barrels of 41-gravity oil daily along with 12 barrels water.

With drillsite in the SPRR Survey, the well was drilled to 4,640 feet total depth. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo Formation, 3,270 to 3,276 feet into the hole.

## Repeal Of Blue Law

One of the most highly publicized and controversial issues facing the 69th Texas Legislature is the repeal of the Texas Blue Law. As you probably know, it relates to the sale of certain goods on the consecutive days of Saturday and Sunday. The current blue law was enacted by the 57th Legislature in 1961; however, the blue law controversy began, long before that time.

The precedence for a secular Sunday law goes back to the time of the Pagan Roman Emperor, Constantine, in 321 A.D., when he decreed that people in towns and cities should rest on the day of the sun. England has

had a long history of Sunday laws that began in 649 A.D. with King Alfred when he said that all worldly work must cease on the Sabbath. Texas, however, had its founding not in the puritanism of England and Scotland, but in Catholic Spain.

When protestant ministers reached Texas in large numbers, a clamor for keeping the Sabbath holy began.

There was a great outcry from local ministers in Houston about drunkenness and saloons on Sunday. As a result, the City of Houston passed the first blue law in the State shortly after its chartering in 1839. This statute was repealed by the

Reconstruction Convention in 1868; but, the 12th Legislature, on December 2, 1871, re-enacted the State blue law.

Beginning in 1961, downtown merchants, mom and pop stores, and major department stores wanted regulatory protection from having to open their stores on Sunday and having to compete with large chain discount stores. The Legislature then developed a secular blue law that forbade the sale of 42 categories of goods with which discount houses could compete with small town merchants on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays. In 1981, the House of Representatives voted to repeal the blue law, but the repeal was not passed in the Senate. Although legislation has been introduced in most every session to repeal the blue law, it has remained in-

tact to the present.

There are many proponents and opponents of the repeal, and the following is a brief list of some arguments raised by each side.

**Proponents** of repeal of the blue law state that:

- The repeal would mean an increase in sales tax revenue of \$13.5 million.
- Shoppers should have freedom of choice to shop whenever they please.
- The blue law is an outdated law which is still enforced by only about 10 states and contradicts our free enterprise system of business.

**Opponents** of repeal of the blue law:

- Believe that Sunday should remain as a day of

rest for workers.

• Are concerned that workers who, for conscientious reasons, would choose not to work on Sundays and would be fired.

• State that repeal would be unfair to the small businesses who would not be able to compete with the large chains and would cause many small concerns to go out of business.

Legislation to repeal the Texas "blue law" has been introduced in the Senate and the House of Representatives. They will be coming before both houses for consideration in the near future, and I hope to hear from the people in my District with their comments on this issue before that time.

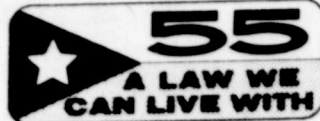

# Homemaking Hints

A valid will is one of the most important legal documents you can have. It's also one of the most important things you can do for your family.

If you die without a will in Texas, the laws of descent and distribution will determine how your property will be divided. And those laws may not reflect your preferences at all.

Lack of a will can also affect your children. Without a will, your husband or wife may be required to support the children from his or her own resources, even though the children may have received substantial inheritances. In other words, your spouse might not have access to that part of your estate which went to your children, so the whole family would have a reduced standard of living.

Without a will you also have little control over when your children get their inheritance and how it is spent. When a child inherits property, a guardian or custodian must be appointed to protect both the property and the minor child's rights. But at age 18, the child's property is turned over to him, regardless of his maturity or financial experience.

If you have a will, and trust to administer your children's property can be established. You can specify how the trust is to be managed, who the trustees will be, how the funds are to be spent and when and how the property should be distributed to your children.

Both you and your spouse need separate wills. Without a will, half of the community property will pass to the children. This can cause financial hardship for surviving spouse and potential cost and problems related to

court-assigned guardianships or custodianships.

Having just one will in the family does only half the job.

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## County Organization Meeting

Eastland County is organizing to help the county grow at a meeting at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Speakers at the meeting were Loyd Stoenner of Texas Electric Service Company, Don Graham Texas Economic Development Commission, Letia Murphy who helps towns with research and other data and Dan Bullock of the Texas Industrial Program.

Loyd Stoenner was the first speaker on the night as he gave the people of Eastland County advice on what everyone can do to improve the community. Mr. Stoenner helps a great deal of people throughout West Texas who are involved with the Chamber of Commerce.

Ken Burdick was the second speaker as he suggested that Eastland County

should work together to help bring in more business. Mr. Burdick also mentioned that other plants are looking for this type of area.

Eastland County could be a good place for perhaps a plastic or rubber plant which could be looking for new locations. Also it was suggested that a stone, glass or clay company would be ideal for this area.

Mr. Burdick also mentioned that Texas is the No. 1 state in the country that corporations are looking for. California remains second on the list. Carl Conger who came to Eastland from California said he was happy to move from No. 2 to No. 1.

It takes a community effort to get things done and to help organize for the growing industry. There are a great deal of high tech and computer corporations looking for new locations.

Don Graham was the third speaker as he discussed how regions were broken up into sections. Mr. Graham also advised the county that 70% to 80% of the jobs can be created in their own community.

Most companies such as G.M. have requirements for a community such as railroads, highway, other transportation, water supplies and sewage systems. Eastland County has a good location on transportation and railroad wise.

Letia Murphy had a lot of good things to say about Eastland County. She discussed research and data projects and talked about industrial finance. Prospecting was also discussed as the community should make good impression on prospective companies that could move.

After Letia gave her

speech, a film was shown on a community called Duncan Fork. The film was quite comical to most but really showed what most towns do go through when they are trying to grow.

Some towns and communities have very little organization or don't know what they're doing. The town of Duncan Fork was completely fictitious, but was a good example for Eastland County to look at.

Dan Bullock was the final speaker as he does a lot of traveling. Mr. Bullock is a relative of the family as he visited with the family while he was in town.

It was suggested by Mr. Bullock that the two Jr. colleges could help the communities to grow. Cisco Jr. College and Ranger Jr. College both are located in Eastland County.

Organization, leadership and communication are very important for the community to help in growth. Utilities have done well in this area
