EDITOR OF the Mineral Wells Index is Bill Bennie, son of Mrs. W.C. Bennie of Cisco and the late Mr. W.C. "Bill" Bennie. Editor Bill Bennie grew up in Cisco and graduated from Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College.

The following is a copy of his column from the March 19, 1985 edition of the Mineral Wells Index. In the column he talks about a service station which was located in Cisco.

Bill's mother said she is not sure just where the station used to be located, but thought Ciscoans might find the column interesting.

Early Sunday afternoon, I decided it was time to give my little Merc Lynx its spring wash job. And, during the process I observed that a couple of tires were a tad low.

Over the next 15-20 minutes, I made a startling discovery. There are a lot more gas pumps in town than air hoses.

It was during this hunting trip that I remembered Jack Leach's service station. In the 40s and 50s, you didn't call them full-service stations. They were just service stations or filling stations.

You'd pull in at Jack Leach's and chances are he'd meet you at the pumps. "Fill'er up, Billy!" "Fill'er up, Jack."

And, while Jack was filling'er up, he was washing your windows all the way around. If there was a spot on the inside, he'd get that too. Before you shelled out the cash, Leach had checked your tires, battery, fan belts and radiator.

While he was performing these little services we then took for granted, he'd generally ask about my golf game, or "How's you mom?" "Hey, be sure to thank Big Bill for that mess of fish he brought me."

Remember the wash jobs they put on cars back in the 40s? Jack, Jr. and another hired hand or two kept the was rack buzzing on Saturdays. They treated every vehicle like it was personal property.

They would cap off the job by painting the then predominately blackwall tires with something that made them pitch black and shiny.

If you needed headlight or taillight bulbs, floor mats, fuses or scores of other accessories, Jack had 'em.

He could fix your generator, give tune-ups, oil/grease jobs, and if you could let him keep the flivver for three hours, he'd put on a jim-dandy paste wa. job for about \$10, that would last six to eight months.

About the only thing that I knew about my first car, a black 1947 Plymouth, was where to put in the gas and oil. I was 18 and the black Mayflower was six. On more than several occasions, we'd limped into Jack's station. He'd often take a timing light and screw driver and have it humming again in short order. I'd say, "How much do I owe you, Jack?" "Catch you next time, Billy," he'd reply. He never did.

As I think back, I can't remember for the life of me what brand of gasoline Jack sold. But the product was secondary. People liked and traded with Jack Leach because he ran a service station.

40 Years Later

Venice/Venezia

When we returned to our hotel in Florence, after visiting Pisa, a group of Japanese-Americans had also arrived. These were Japanese born in America, but placed in prison camps during World War II because we were at war with Japan. These men had volunteered for service in the army and the 442nd was attached to the 36th Division in Italy. One of the nurses in our group, Col. Rose Straley, was talking with some of the men, and recognized several who had been wounded and treated at the base hospital in Caserta, where she was stationed.

The next morning we left Florence enroute to Venice. It was a warm day, and we enjoyed the trip. There was lots of traffic on the four lane highways, which were in excellent condition. The cars and trucks were traveling at a high rate of speed, which seems to come on in all of Italy. Our guide told us that the speed limit was 90 kilometers for trucks and busses and 105 kilometers for cars, but we were sure they were traveling much faster than that. We never saw any highway patrols as we see here.

When we arrived near Venice, we stopped near one of the water-ways and as our buses were not allowed to stay overnight in Venice, we boarded a ferry, and went across the Lagoon to Lido Island, (Lido Di Venezia).

We were only 10 minutes by boat from Venice at our hotel, opposite the venetian Lagoon and St. Mark's Square. Our room looked out on all of this and we had a great view of the Lagoon which was filled with both small and large boats and ships, and we could see St. Mark's Square and the buildings in Venice.

Venice, population 347,347, alt. 5 ft., is often called the Queen of the Adriatic. Its name in Italian is Venezia. No other city is quite like this port of northern Italy. Venice is not built on solid ground. Instead, it lies on a cluster of small mud islands at the head of the Adriatic Sea.

Venice was founded in A.D. 452. People from the

mainland of Italy fled to the mud islands in Adriatic to escape from invading barbarians who come down from northern Europe. The new settlement was at first only a cluster of huts, but the city grew rapidly. By the 600's, Venice was almost independent of the Eastern Roman Empire. In 697 a ruler called the Doge was appointed to govern all the islands.

The Crusaders stopped at Venice on their way to the Holy Land, and helped the Venetians extend their conquests. By the middle of the 1400's, Venice had become the strongest sea power of the Christian World. The city was the center of an empire which extended to other islands, including crete, and to parts of Italy. Venice had a great merchant fleet, defended by many warships.

The Venetian merchant princes built magnificent palaces and encouraged Venetian artists. Venice was one of the great cultural centers of the Renaissance. Discovery of a new sea route to India by the Cape of Good hope, in the late 1400's, weekend Venetian trade. Gradually, Venice lost most of its empire. In 1797 Napoleon divided what was left of the Venetian empire between Austria and France.

In 1866, Venice became part of the unified Italy.

Venice suffered little damage during World Wars I and II. The city was taken over by the Germans in 1943, and was attacked by Allied planes. But Allied bombers raided only the port of Marghera, and were careful to spare Venice itself. The city remained in German hands until 1945.

Today, Venice stands on 118 mud flats or little islands which are separated by 160 canals and connected by 400 bridges. Venice has canals for steeds, and has gondolas, or flat-bottomed boats, for taxicabs. Venice is in a sheltered lagoon in between the mouths of the Piave and Po rivers. A sand bar called the Lido borders the lagoon on the east, and this sandy island makes a beach resort for tourists and Venetians. A causeway, or road raised above the water, connects the western end of Venice with the mainland. The islands fall into two main groups. These groups are separated by the Grand Canal, which winds through the length of the city in an S-shaped curve.

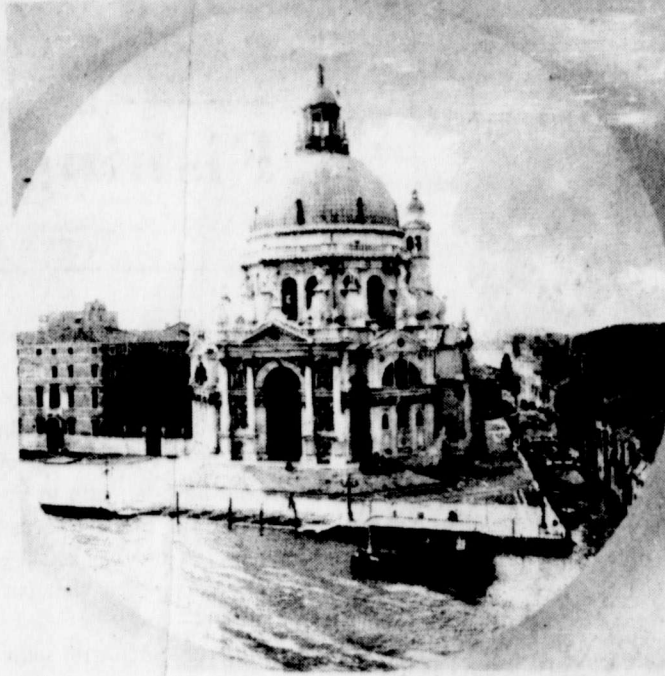
There are also 150 smaller canals. The buildings of the city stand on the islands. Narrow lanes and streets pass between the buildings. The 400 bridges that connect the islands, are built of stone. These bridges arch above the canals to let the highpowered gondolas pass beneath. The Rialto Bridge is in the heart of the city. It crosses the Grand Canal with a single arch thirty-two feet high. Shops are built along each side of the bridge.

Another famous Bridge, is the Bridge of the Sighs, which crosses from the Doge's Palace to an old prison. Under the bridges and through the canals sail hundreds of boats, motor launches as well as long, flatbottomed, black gondolas with their graceful curved ends.

Venice gained its wealth from her commercial powers on the sea, and poured that wealth into magnificent works of art. It is famous as one of the most colorful and romantic cities in the world.

The panorama of the city spreads eastward along the Rive degli Schiavoni lined with the homes of the princely families, and on to the Riva dei Sette Martiri. Still further beyond are the Arsenal and the Gardens of the Biennial Exhibition of Venice hasits home.

To the west two great



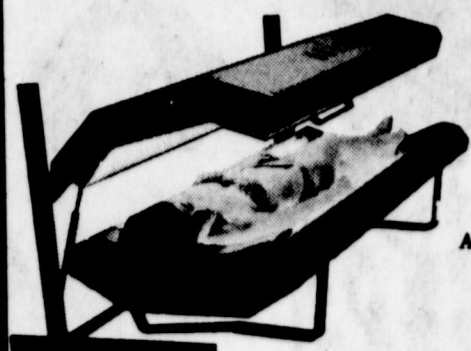
water ways run divided by the pretty Punta della Dogana del Mare (The Customs House Point) with the majestic mass of the Basilica of the Madonna.

On the other side is the mouth of the Giudecca Canal, a waterway leading

to industrial area, with the churches of the Redentore and the Gusauti on either side.

On the side of the Salute the Grand Canal, the most splendid thoroughfare, and palaces of all ages are located on either side.

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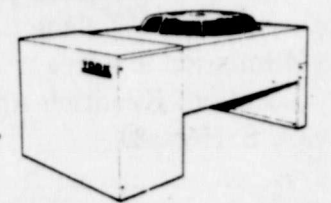

Wheat growers in Eastland County need to keep a sharp lookout for leaf rust disease on their crop this spring.

Conditions seem to be right for a major leaf rust problem over much of the state.

Leaf rust is caused by a fungus and appears as small, round orange spots on the leaves. A heavy infection will defoliate the plant and interfere with grain development.

Many wheat varieties are susceptible to leaf rust fungus, but the incidence of the organism varies greatly from year to year.

One of the best practices for dealing with rust is to plan resistant varieties or at least several different varieties of wheat each year. Then, if the disease becomes a problem not all varieties may be affected. Producers that plant all their wheat acreage to a susceptible variety generally suffer the greatest losses when a leaf rust epidemic hits.

Varieties that are showing the most resistance in Central Texas are 71C-8130-R, TE 5221, Pioneer 2157, Cocker 68-15 and Bounty 301. Varieties that are showing heavy rust infection are HW 1035, HW 1010, HW 1030, TX Red, and TAM 107.

With good yield prospects this spring because of favorable moisture conditions, producers will need to consider applying a fungicide to their wheat if leaf rust becomes a threat. Using a fungicide is a good alternative if the potential yield exceeds 40 bushels per acre.

Two types of fungicides

are available that vary in effectiveness and cost. The systemic - type, Bayleton, is quite effective but expensive. Protectant - type fungicides such as Manzate 200 and Dithane M-45 are less expensive but are effective for only a short period.

Time of fungicide application is also critical. A producer must consider the susceptibility of the variety being grown, the potential for continued disease development, and the growth stage of the crop. Generally, the flag leaf should be protected from the time it is formed until the grain is filled.

When the threat of leaf rust is great and potential yields exceed 60 bushels per acre, growers should apply a fungicide prior to the development of the flag leaf. In this case, the systemic - type fungicide should be applied at the time of jointing and again as the flag leaf

begins to unfold. With protectant - type fungicides, additional applications may be needed to get the same level control.

Actual control level depends on how well the fungicide application is timed, how well it is applied and the seriousness of the rust problem. Fungicides are almost always applied by air, and best results are achieved when the correct dosage is made in five gallons of water per acre.

Producers expecting a good wheat harvest this spring should be able to get a good return on money spent for fungicides to control leaf rust, assuming there are no other limiting factors.

Between April 8 and 22 a mail-in referendum is being conducted for wheat growers relative to becoming included as a part of the Texas Wheat Producers Board. Wheat producers will be voting on a proposal to assess themselves not more than 1/2 cent per bushel for research education and marketing. The purpose of the wheat producers board is to enhance the production and marketing of wheat, leading to potentially higher income.

Spring Clean-Up Week Set Here April 8-12

Members of the Cisco City Council established a Spring Clean-Up Week for Cisco as April 8 through April 12, 1985, at the regular meeting Tuesday night. The city will be making extra rounds to pick up debris and trash from residences in encouragement of cleaning up the city.

The Council also approved the temporary closing of the 100 block of East 5th Street from noon on Thursday, April 25 until 7 p.m. on Sunday, April 28, 1985, for the Civic League Folklife Festival. The festival will be held in the old Rockwell Lumber Company yard.

City Manager Mike Moore said the 24-hour pumping of the water well test site on the McMillan lease, west of town, was finished up Tuesday morning. He said a

40-gallon-a-minute pump was the largest they could get inside the casing, and the best reading they were able to achieve was 40 gallons a minute, but they could only sustain 35 gallons a minute.

He said the well was deeper than originally thought, since the pump was lowered 350 feet and it was near the bottom, but not right on the bottom. He said this particular well would not be sufficient in flow for the city's needs, or economically feasible.

The council recommended the alternate water committee meet again to reconsider what direction they should take, since members had been told that before Battle Creek's pump station was built, the city had looked into the possibility of wells but

none were located.

Mayor Eris Ritchie said he feels the lake will eventually fill back up, since it has been lower in the past than it was last summer. But, he emphasized that the city should continue exploring the possibility of alternate water sources. He also stated, "Everybody who believes as I do, in the power of prayer, should pray every day" for the filling of Lake Cisco.

Discussions were held by the council on utilizing private contractors for sanitation collection and disposal and on the current status, policies and procedures of the Police Department. City Manager Moore said the discussion of private contractors for sanitation collection was purely that, "discussion."

He informed the council he had been approached by Tony Waits, who operates Klean & Tidy, about the use of a private contractor to pick up trash in Cisco. He said such a situation would be cost effective for the city.

Benefits of a private contractor would be: decrease in salaries; no insurance costs for sanitation truck; no replacement cost on truck; and in some places no need for a landfill, but he said Cisco would want to maintain a landfill for those who haul off their own trash.

The bad points would depend on whether a reliable contractor was hired and collection would only be made once a week. Council members seemed in agreement they would want pickup at least twice a week.

Mr. Waits presently collects sanitation at Lake Leon, Lake Cisco (north shore), Morton Valley, and

Olden. He disposes of the trash at his own landfill near Ranger.

The council decided to have a workshop format at the second meeting in April to discuss the proposal with Mr. Waits and to find out more about private contractors from the City Manager.

Police Chief Billy Rains answered questions from the council about the use of police cars outside the city limits, passengers riding in police cars, and "excessive" overtime in the department.

Chief Rains explained the overtime was due in part to the fact the department is one officer short at this time, and the other officers must fill in that vacancy. City Manager Moore explained police officers are paid straight salaries for overtime work, they do not get paid time and a half.

Chief Rains said the department uses a preventive maintenance system for its vehicles which he drafted from the Texas Department of Public Safety. He stated part of the problem of maintenance on the vehicles is the fact that they have higher mileage than some of the autos which the department originally wanted to buy in Austin. Chief Rains said he was late in getting to Austin last year and the better cars were already sold.

The department has no policy against passengers in the police car, as long as the passenger signs a waiver at the department and they realize they are along only as an observer. They also must realize they can be put out of the car at any time the officer feels it is necessary.

Chief Rains said only one

officer takes a police car outside of the city limits to his residence and he lives less than a mile from the city. The only time he takes the car home are: if he is on back-up call for an officer in town; he is taking calls at his home; or he worked the night shift getting off at 10 p.m. and is expected back on the job at 6 a.m.

In the financial report for the city, City Manager Moore said the utility fund and general fund of the city are both at a low point at this time due in part to unexpected expenditures such as the repairs on Battle Creek pumps and decrease in tax revenue. He said at the end of work Tuesday there was \$1,023.24 in the checking account of the utility fund and \$22,959 in a money market account.

The general fund had \$2,981 in the checking account and \$49,300 in a money market account.

He said this problem is not unique to Cisco, since all cities in Texas were predicting a decrease in revenue and an increase in expenditures.

Mr. Moore asked the council for permission to use money from the oil and gas royalties to subsidize the general fund, if it is needed. He said if the council did not want that money used in that

way, then it would not be touched.

The majority of the council members seemed in agreement that the city manager could consider using the money, with the intention of repaying it when the general fund gets in better financial shape. They indicated they want to know beforehand, how much might be taken from the oil and gas royalties and what it is to be used for, and it be used only as an emergency fund.

In the City Manager's report, Mr. Moore informed the council that the individual wanting to file for an Economic Development Grant in conjunction with the city did not get all his paperwork ready in time. But, the city will refile for the grant in June.

He also informed the council of the problems with the Battle Creek pumps which caused one pump to be moved several inches when a surge of water came through the line weekend before last. City employees made repairs to the pump and it is presently working.

Also in the city manager's report, Mr. Moore said he is trying to get money from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to build a better boat dock at Lake Cisco. He also brought the council up to date on the junk car or-

dinance. He said the police department mailed out 15 letters to individuals who had junk cars on their property.

From those 15, 12 have removed the vehicles, one had the vehicle re-licensed, and they are working with the other two. He said he has suggested the police send out final notices to the two remaining individuals.

The city is presently going through tax records and making an effort to notify all residents who might owe a delinquent tax to the city. He said the council would be surprised at some of "the pillars of the community" who owe substantial delinquent taxes. He said he would anticipate between \$70,000-\$80,000 is owed the city.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved by the council and the response time of Patterson Ambulance Service was discussed during the citizen-council discussion period. It was decided the city manager and one or two of the council members would get together with the manager-owner of the service and discuss the problems.

The council had a closed session which dealt with potential land acquisitions of the city. City Manager Moore reported he had to inform the council of some things which occurred Tuesday, but no decisions were made and the matter was only discussed.

Members present for the meeting were Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar, Bobby Rains, Roy Dennis, Linton Batteas, Mayor Eris Ritchie, City manager Mike Moore, and City Secretary Ginger Johnson. City Attorney William Wright, Jr., was also in attendance. The only council member absent was Brad Kimbrough.

Approximately 50 Attend Breakfast

Approximately 50 persons attended the first quarterly breakfast of 1985 for the Cisco Chamber of Commerce at 7 a.m. Wednesday morning, March 27, at the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. Henry McCullough, president of Cisco Junior College, gave a slide presentation which has been put together by the Association of Junior Colleges. The presentation showed how Junior Colleges in Texas are funded.

According to Dr. McCullough, the Texas Legislature expects less operating money next year and as a result they are planning cuts in spending. One of those cuts will be the funding of higher education in the state of Texas.

Local Junior college taxes only make up about 4 per-

cent of the total budget for Cisco Junior College, stated Dr. McCullough. The rest of the budget relies heavily on state funding, with approximately \$3 million a year coming from Austin. The local college budget is \$4½ million a year.

Funds come from three different sources, with the state funds being the largest amount, but it can only be used for educational projects. Taxes make up the second source and Cisco provided about \$260,000 to the college by way of taxes last year. The third source of funding comes from tuition paid by students, earned interest on college endowment funds, two gas wells on the campus, and profits from the campus book store.

Bill Austin, Jr., CofC president, welcomed those attending the breakfast and introduced the speaker. Rev. John Clinton gave the invocation.

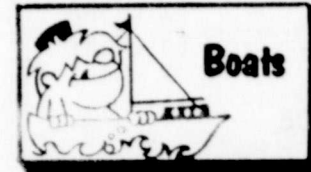

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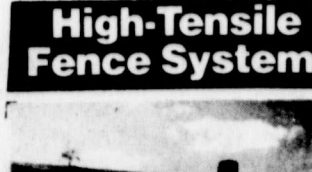

Located two miles northeast of Breckenridge, the well pumped 44 barrels 40.8-gravity oil per day with 478 barrels water.

The operation is in the ME&P Survey. It was taken to a total depth of 3,290 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo Formation at 3,155 to 3,188 feet.

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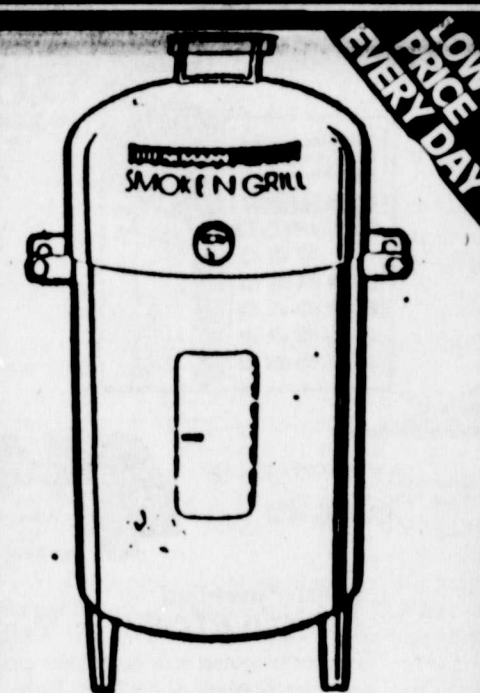

Spray Fruit Trees

It's time to spray fruit trees if you want fruit free of worms this year says County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed for the first time when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab. The suggested insecticides are Methoxychlor, Diazinon and Thiodan. The recommended fungicides include Captan, Benomyl, Thiophanate-methyl, and wettable sulphur. Follow the directions on the amount of chemicals to add per gallon of water. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to apply as many

as five applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties says Gordon. Do not apply insecticides within three

days of harvesting plums are within seven days of harvesting peaches.

Gordon says Homeowners Fruit and Nut spray schedules are available at the county Extension office to give you more information on fruit tree spraying.

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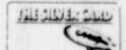

Through the ages, the relationship between good health and a longer, happier life has always been recognized. But it was also recognized that maintaining good health isn't easy.

In more recent time, as medical discovery followed medical discovery, many health experts thought they had it figured out:

Spend enough money on modern medical techniques, educate the public to enlightened forms of hygiene, sanitation and immunization - and you control disease, improve health, lengthen life.

To an extent, they were correct. People today are living better and longer.

So we must be on the right track. Just maintain the search for advances in medical science to make us even healthier and put ourselves in the hands of competent doctors after we get sick so they can make everything right. Right?

Wrong, say medical authorities far from this point of view forward they have concluded it is not science but self-control that will add to our years.

It comes down to this: Most of us are born healthy and made sick as a result of personal behavior and environmental conditions. It's

our lifestyle, basically, our failure to exercise enough, eat properly, take care of ourselves intelligently, that is the cause of many of our current health problems. What should you do? There are some basic habits that can turn the odds for good health in your favor.

We all need the proper exercise. Make time on a regular basis for exercise, such as brisk walks, swimming, jumping rope, bicycling, or calisthenics. You can even find ways to exercise in your daily routine.

A good diet is a necessity. The body needs energy and nutrients periodically, and functions best when these are supplied regularly. And when you snack, nutritionists suggest only fresh fruits and vegetables.

Also, to cut the risk of clogging your arteries, try to reduce the fats in your diet. Cut down on your consumption of sugar and salt. No matter how little you think you consume, the experts tell us it is probably more than necessary.

If you can grab more than an inch of fat when you pinch your waist or arm, then you need to do something about your waist.

If you have a weight problem that is not due to a medical condition, think

seriously about what prompts you to overeat, and try to avoid such situations.

If you realize that your greatest weakness for food occurs when you are angry, for instance, you can take the first important step towards changing that fixed response. Let the anger out in an active way, like exercise. Avoid the food.

A number of studies support the view that by practicing some common-sense habits you can improve your health.

Dr. J. Robert Stamp, who conducted study of more than 2,000 Americans who have lived longer than average, said the results showed clearly that the following five point program could add years to your life:

- (1) Accomodate yourself to life's challenges
- (2) Avoid prolonged stress
- (3) Develop outside interest
- (4) Eat and drink sparingly, but with enjoyment
- (5) Continue to work later in life, either at paid or volunteer activities.

And above all, he admonishes, "Don't fight your enemies, outlive them."

For an easy to fix and nutritious snack try this Peanut Butter Granola. Your whole family will enjoy it.

PEANUT BUTTER GRANOLA

3 cups regular oats, uncooked
1 cup salted sunflower kernels
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup wheat germ
1/2 cup sesame seeds
1/2 cup honey
3/4 cup vegetable oil
1/2 cup peanut butter
3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup raisins

Combine first 5 ingredients in a large bowl; mix well, and set aside.

Combine honey and oil in a small saucepan; place over medium heat, stirring until mixture is thoroughly heated. Remove from heat; stir in peanut butter and

vanilla, mixing well. Pour over oats mixture, and stir until evenly coated.

Spread mixture in a lightly greased 15-x 10-x 1-inch jellyroll pan. Bake at 250° for 50 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes; cool. Add raisins, and mix well. Store granola in an airtight container. Yield: about 8 cups.

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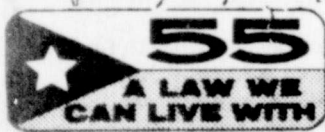
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
