The month of April will bring many visitors to the city with the Frontier Jubilee set for the last weekend of the month. The All School Reunion will also be taking place and the Eastland County Health Fair is scheduled for Thursday, April 25th at the Corral Room. All of these activities will attract many people to Cisco. Helen Orr, Civic Planning Committee Chairperson, said, "The city wide clean-up gives all of us the opportunity to do our part in demonstrating civic pride. We want to show all our visitors a clean city which we are proud to live in."

Bill Austin Jr., President of the Chamber of Commerce, also commented. He stated, "All people who own

property should take advantage of the extra effort of the city government in the clean-up campaign." Mr. Austin also said, "We especially urge all who own property in the entrances to the city to take part and we commend the City Council, the City Manager, and the Sanitation Department for their efforts."

Spring Clean Up Week Set April 8th Thru 12th

Plans are complete for the annual Cisco Spring Clean-Up Campaign to begin Monday, April 8th, and to continue through Friday, April 12th, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

During the week, the city will operate as many trucks as needed to haul off trash, debris and tree limbs for Cisco residents. Everyone was asked to pile their debris in containers along with tree limbs near the curb where they usually put their trash.

Those with unusually large amounts of debris or limbs were asked to call the City Hall. A work order will be issued to facilitate handling of large loads, Mr. Moore said.

Kendricks To Present Easter Pageant

A cast of some 40 persons was ready to present the 21st annual Easter Sunrise Pageant at Kendrick Amphitheater, midway between Cisco and Eastland on Highway 80, at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, April 7.

The program called for 60 scenes taken from the Bible to tell the story of "The Life of Christ." Phil (Shorty) Kendrick was serving as the pageant director as he has done since its beginning. The outdoor theater is in a 15-acre area that includes a Religious Diorama that will be open until 1 a.m. Sunday. Many members of the cast, including Kent Bridges of Gorman, have been members of the cast for as many as 16 years. Kent plays

Critics have given the pageant high marks over the years, and in 1980 Texas Monthly Magazine called it "the best outdoor program in Texas."

The city landfill will be open throughout the clean-up campaign - every day, April 8 through April 13. Normally, the landfill is open Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursday, and Saturdays.

"Let's make a real effort to clean up our community," Mr. Moore said. "As part of the clean-up effort letters are already being sent out regarding high grass and weeds. Citizens are encouraged to mow their lawns, especially after the spring rains, and to keep them mowed throughout the summer."

Mr. Moore indicated that not only will this effort help beautify the city, but will also help greatly in controlling mosquitos and improve the general health conditions.

Clean Up Day Set At Country Club

There will be a "Clean-Up Day" at the Cisco Country Club on Tuesday, April 9, from 1 p.m. until dark and all members have been invited to take part, according to an announcement Friday. Members were asked to bring pickup trucks and tools that might be helpful in cleanup work. A front end loader could also be used.

Plans call for removing trash and debris from the club house area and to do some cleaning work on the fairways if enough people turn out, the announcement said.

Plans for the month include the regular monthly

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Service Club Scholarship Is Available

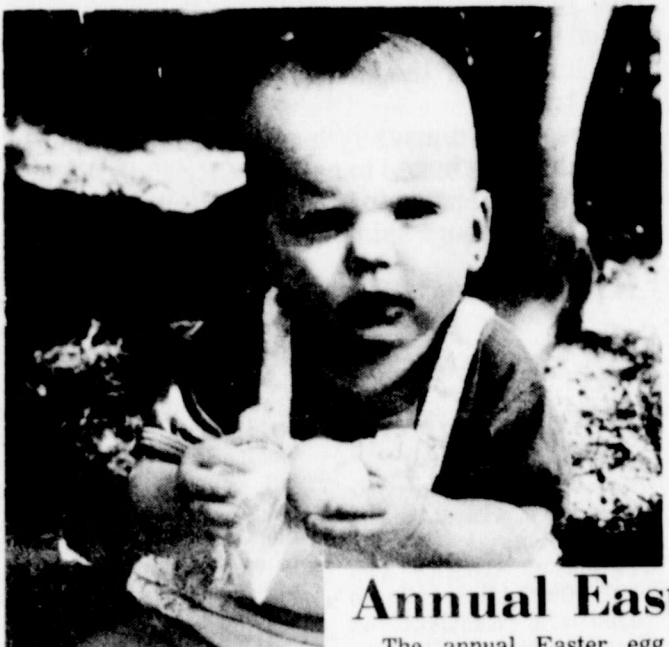

8th Grade Wins Sweepstakes At CJC Festival

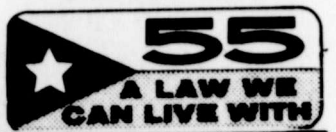

Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent Janet Thomas

Best wishes to everyone for a wonderful Easter weekend. Easter egg hunts are a favorite activity, and Easter meals often include ham. It's this "special treatment" of decorating and hiding Easter eggs or serving fresh ham for a large family gathering that raise questions.

We are often asked at this time of year if it is safe to eat the hard-cooked eggs used in an Easter egg hunt. Yes they are safe to eat if they have been handled properly. First, cool hard-cooked eggs in cold water immediately after cooking and then refrigerate until they cool all the way through. If any eggs crack while cooking, don't use them for the hunt since bacteria can easily get through the openings and contaminate the eggs.

When you plan the hiding and hunting of Easter eggs, I strongly recommend that the hard-cooked eggs should not be out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.

Another frequent question is, "how long will hard-cooked eggs keep in the refrigerator?" Hard-cooked eggs in the shell should be used within one week. Use eggs with cracked shells or those with the shell removed within one day.

If you are planning to serve ham for Easter, remember that your fully-cooked hams has no danger of trichinosis. These hams are ready to eat without fur-

ther cooking. If you choose a fresh ham, take extra care in preparation. Cook the fresh ham until the center reaches a temperature of 170 degree F. To make sure this temperature is reached, insert a meat thermometer in the thickest part of the cut, not touching the bone or fat.

And finally it is so important to store your hams properly. Uncured ham will keep in the refrigerator from 3 to 5 days. It will keep in the freezer from 4 to 8 months.

Cured ham will keep in the refrigerator for one week. Left-over cooked ham that is tightly wrapped and refrigerated 1 to 2 hours after cooking will keep 4 to 5 days. Both uncooked and left-over ham can be kept in the freezer up to two months

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

As soon as the Easter egg hunts are over, what do you do with all those hard-cooked eggs? Deviled eggs come easily to mind, or you may use them in potato salad, egg salad sandwiches, or as garnishes.

For a different idea, try this recipe for swiss egg bake.

SWISS EGG BAKE

1 cup chopped onion
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
8 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
1 (10 3/4-ounce) can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
3/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon dillweed
6 slices rye bread

Saute onion in butter until tender; sprinkle in an 1 1/2 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2 inch dish. Arrange egg slices over onion;

sprinkle with cheese.

Combine soup and remaining ingredients except bread; blend well. Pour over cheese. Cut bread into triangles, and arrange on top of soup mixture. Bake at 350° for 40 minutes. Place under broiler 1 minute. Yield: about 6 servings.

County History

A writer in an issue of that paper of date July 16, 1909 gives the above information and states that when he visited the Tent office he was shown a rattlesnake which had been killed nearby the day before.

The paper was named after cowboys had shot up the town and the Editor had visited a round up near Cisco. The writer well remembers an article in the paper describing the editors observations and experiences on that occasion and would give much to read it again. Wonders if any one has a copy of the paper with that or a clipping describing this event filed away.

The Round-up has continued on a weekly publication to the present time and is the only newspaper in the county with so long a continuous record.

Mr. Luse only published the paper for a few years before disposing to Baily and Rose who continued its publication until about 1891 when it was acquired by Frank Vernon, an able and vigorous character by whom it was controlled for some years.

Its first issue as a daily appeared February 13, 1920 but its name was soon changed to The Cisco Daily News. Since that time its name as well as its ownership has several times and is now "The Cisco Daily Press".

Another early newspapers published in Cisco was "The Cisco Apert", a weekly, under the management of Warner Wilson. This publication was continued for a number of years but had no successor.

At this time there were three weekly newspapers be-

ing published in Cisco. The Cisco Pilot, published by Edgar Rye in 1896 was probably re-named the New West which under the management of J.J. Edger, was the mouth piece of the Populist Party in Eastland County until its demise in or about 1906. Mr. Eager was a very aggressive leader and made things quite interesting for the Democrats for several years.

According to the New West, mentioned above, a paper was published at Hobart, an eight mile suburb of Cisco, in 1899 as is evidenced by the following quotation from that paper; Volume One, and number three of the Hobart Daisy is before us. "The Daisy is an eight page, all home print paper, published in the interest of the county of Hobart. Its High Mucky Muck and Faber Pusher is M. Lee Hull. The New West welcomes the

little Daisy as one of its exchanges."

Cisco has a splendid public library, housed in a nice white brick building. The library was founded by Frank Vernon in 1894 and for a time was located at the home of Mrs. A.B. Johnson. Mrs. George Langston is the authority for the statement that the first volume donated was "Ben Hur" by the founder. Mrs. Wm. Reagan, formerly Mrs. Frank Vernon, is the present (1942) chairman of the Library Committee.

Its management was taken over The Twentieth Century Club in 1899. In 1900 the library consisted of 450 volumes. This number has been increased to more than six thousand.

UTILITIES

In 1903 Wood McSpadden and Mayhew and Company put into operation a system of Electric Service under the name of The Cisco Electric Company. The property was operated under this name

until sold to The West Texas Utilities Company in 1924. Included in this transfer was The Cisco Ice Company which had operated for some years under the first name ownership.

Cisco was first served by The Lone Star Gas Company exclusively but in 1934 The Cisco Gas Company was organized and the city is now served by the two companies. A minimum rate ordinance protects the companies supplying the city from price wars and the competition between the companies would seem to assure the city good service at a fair price.

Frank Vernon, a dynamic personality, to whom Cisco is deeply indebted, was the father of the Cisco Telephone System which spread over the larger part of Eastland and some of the surrounding counties. He was granted permission to erect telephone poles along the public roads of Eastland County February 8, 1897, by the Commissioner's Court.

The system was acquired by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in 1923.

A very important factor in the early growth and prosperity of Cisco was the Cisco Oil Mill, established by Reynolds Brothers in 1896. Many thousands of cattle were fed at the pens near the mill during the years of its existence. After the destruction of the cotton industry in Eastland and surrounding counties by the boll weevil, the mill was dismantled and the machinery moved to California. Some say that it was to Dublin.

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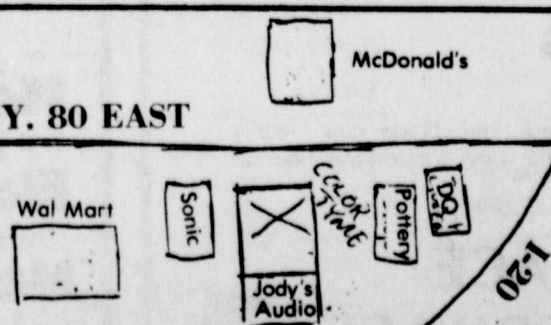

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—The Texas Legislature, over halfway through the current session, is still struggling to cut another \$900 million from the state budget, and the going is getting rougher.

What one group of lawmakers take out, another group tries to put back in.

Last week, Houston State Rep. Paul Colbert got the House Appropriations Committee to abolish branch state universities at Galveston and Odessa, but legislators from those areas went into action and the cuts will not likely survive.

Two plans to raise tuition for state universities—one already passed by the House and the other advocated by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby in the Senate—drew a veto hint from the governor concerning funds for scholarships.

In short, the two budget committees are finding political pressure whenever they attempt to cut a specific budget area, and they are burning the midnight oil to finish their task by Easter deadline.

Other Cuts

The Office of State-Federal Relations, the state's lobbyist

in Washington, D.C., received a 20 percent budget cut, or about half a million dollars, a week after lawmakers forced the resignation of agency head Sarah Weddington for taking too much time off and too many trips.

Weddington's chief critic on the budget panel, State Rep. Bill Ceverha of Dallas, lost his bid to cut two-thirds of the funding.

The panel also voted to cut aid for students in private colleges by \$6 million.

Senate Action

The Senate last week approved bills requiring motorists to wear seatbelts and easing farmers of the sole burden of notifying neighbors of pesticide use.

Tentatively, the Senate advanced a proposal to order judges running for election to report specific contributions from persons with cases pending on their dockets.

The seatbelt bill would provide a \$25 to \$50 fine for persons riding in the front seat of cars and pickups without wearing a seatbelt.

Changes in the pesticide regulations under Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower would add his agency or other agencies to notify nearby residents of impending pesticide use.

A&M Chair Quits

The Republican chairman of the Texas A&M Board of Regents resigned last week after regents voted in a new chairman.

H. R. "Bum" Bright, the multimillionaire owner of the Dallas Cowboys football team, accused Gov. Mark White of controlling the votes like puppets "on a string" and said he decided to leave after White pressured him for political support in '86.

Bright, who was appointed by White's nemesis and Republican predecessor Bill Clements, tells a story of not going along with the deal and having to sacrifice the gavel.

The new chairman, Dave Eller of Houston, is a former neighbor of the governor and has served on the board for two years. Other regents said Bright was probably being politically over-dramatic to embarrass White.

Senator Quits, Too

Houston State Sen. Lindon Williams resigned his seat last week to take a justice of the peace appointment which will make him an estimated \$100,000 a year.

Williams called for an early special election, and one rumored candidate is a former aide who is being courted to run as a Republican.

On that subject, speculation is that a handful of Democrats will convert to the GOP in unison once the Legislature adjourns in May.

Port Arthur Fracas

In Port Arthur, where the Jefferson County DA has won the reindictment of hometown State Sen. Carl Parker on charges of cocaine dealing and promotion of obscene material and an unrelated bribery charge against hometown Rep. Frank Collazo, the verbal charges are flying.

Parker accused District Atty. James McGrath of waging corrupt law enforcement practices and McGrath has challenged Parker "to put up or shut up" in a court of inquiry into the allegations.

Earlier in the week, Parker had issued a statement alleging the existence of an underground clique of law enforcement unknown to decent citizens.

Proctor was drawn for this month's inner club tournament, which will be held April 14th. Headquarters will be the north ramp on Promotory Park. Fishing hours are 6 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Don't forget folks the race for anglers of the year is still wide open. David Row is leading with 11.37; Jerry King 2nd 5.44 Howard Wilson is in third with 5.37. So as you can see folks its anyone's race, one fish during our Proctor tournament can make a lot of difference. So lets all plan to attend and catch a hawg.

Recently 2 new state records have been set. On Lake Conroe a 99 pound blue catfish was taken on a trotline baited with a minnow. This fish was taken on March 3rd by Raymond Lynch. This new catch beats the old state record by

almost 10 pounds.

Patrick Barill of Waco tossed a cheese-baited hook into Meridian State Park during January and was jolted by a 5 pound 12 ounce rainbow trout which is now the new state record. Shattering the old state record of 4 pounds 13 ounces. This fish was believed to have been one of the brood fish which have been stocked.

Speaking of state records folks, at present there is no entry in the black crappie division. State officials do require a minimum of 3 pounds for an entry, and I know some of you out there have caught some 3 pound and even 4 pound black crappie from area impoundments.

Don't forget keep only what you can use and release those others gently, next time out you might have the joy of hooking and landing this fish or its offspring.

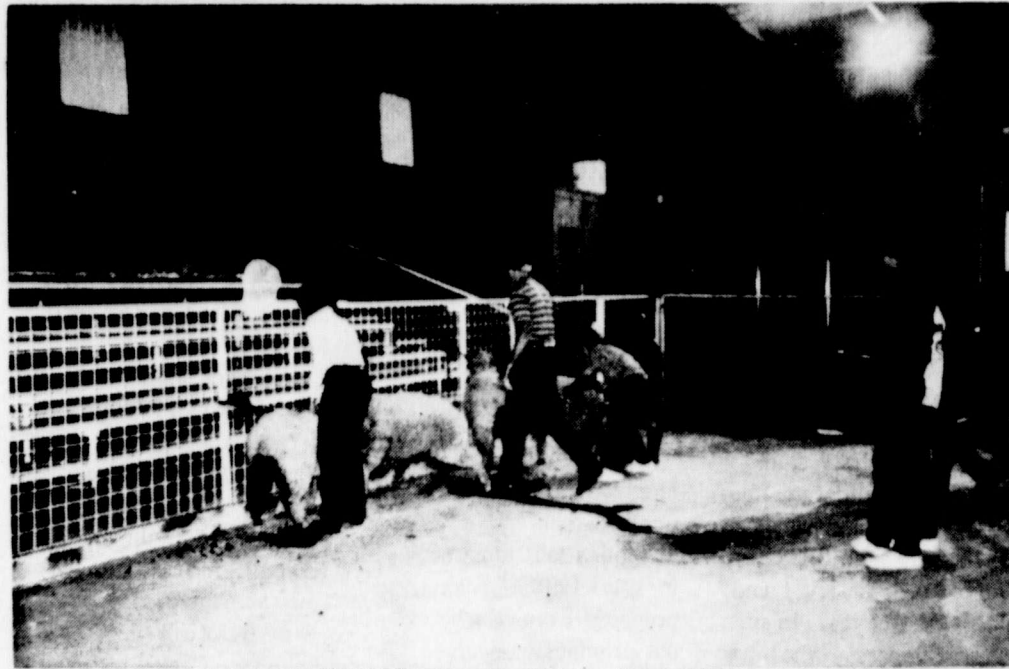

Property Owner's Rights

AUSTIN—A statewide effort is underway to inform Texas property owners of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers, according to Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB).

Patterson says SPTB is working with appraisal districts and local news media to help make taxpayers aware of rendition and exemption filing deadlines and methods to obtain exemptions or other forms of tax relief.

"The first priority for property owners is to file renditions and apply for tax relief before May 1 this year," Patterson said. Taxpayers should file all exemption applications and property rendition forms with the central appraisal district office.

A rendition is a report a property owner makes which lists the taxable property he owned or managed on January 1, 1985. A rendition also gives a taxpayer the opportunity to record his own opinion of his property value. "By rendering a value for his property, the owner makes the appraisal district responsible for notifying him

if the district places a higher value on the property," Patterson pointed out.

Certain property owners must render their property. "Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 is required by state law to file a rendition statement with the appropriate appraisal district," Patterson said.

Special rendition procedures exist for property on which an exemption applicable on January 1 ends during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires the property when the exemption ends must render the property for taxation within 30 days.

The chief appraiser may also require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the property owner of manager. Rendition forms are available from appraisal district offices.

For homeowners, tax relief is usually in the form of exemptions. "An exemption lowers tax payments by deducting part of a property's value from taxation," Patterson explained. Homestead exemptions are available for all qualified homeowners, and additional exemptions are available for disabled veterans and for those aged 65 or over. Elderly homeowners who apply for the over-65 homestead exemption also get a cap, or ceiling, on taxes they pay to the school district.

"Likewise," Patterson continued, "farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their land taxed on its productive value instead of its market value, which also results in a lower tax bill." Productivity valuation

comes in two forms, often referred to by the section of the Texas Constitution that provides them: open-space or "1-d-1" valuation and agricultural or "1-d" valuation.

Property owners who last year received homestead exemptions, disabled veterans' exemptions and open-space land (1-d-1) valuation need not reapply in 1985, unless the chief appraiser requests a new application to confirm the owner's current qualification.

Applications must be filed in 1985, Patterson said, by property owners who have not previously received tax relief on their present homesteads or land.

State law also requires farmers and ranchers to apply each year in all appraisal districts for agricultural use (1-d) valuation.

Patterson noted that people whose property is in more than one county appraisal district have an additional responsibility. These property owners may have to file for exemptions and productivity valuation in each appraisal district in which their property is located. Failure to do so could result in one or more taxing units taxing the property on its full market value.

An example is where a city or school district in two counties has joined only one appraisal district.

Complete information on tax exemptions and rendition requirements is in a pamphlet produced by SPTB. "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" also tells how a taxpayer can challenge the value placed on his property by making an appeal to the appraisal review board. The pamphlet is available free

from appraisal district offices or from SPTB in Austin.

"The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas," Patterson said. "It will generate about \$9 billion this year to help fund public schools, cities, counties and special districts like hospitals, local colleges, fire protection, water and utilities."

"We urge all property owners to become familiar with the tax process, to file renditions and to apply for all exemptions or other tax relief to which they are entitled," Patterson concluded.

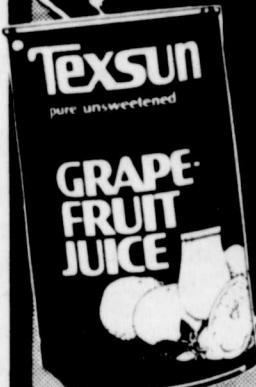

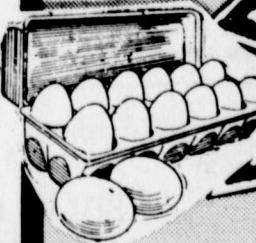

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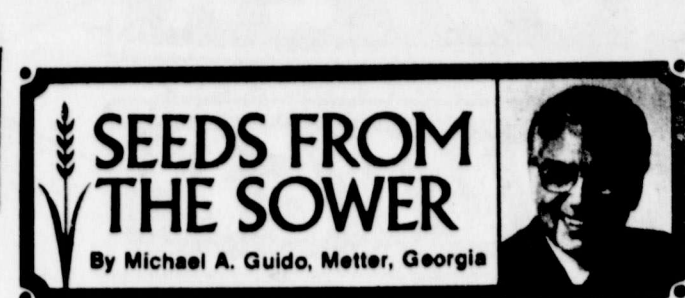

Many people have been asking about the pecan budding and grafting workshop. With the excellent spring we have this year people are looking forward to budding or grafting their young seedling pecan trees.

The 32nd annual pecan propagation workshop will be this Friday, April 12, at Cisco Jr. College. Look for separate news article on the workshop in this paper.

sprays is the best method of supplying the trees with zinc. Zinc deficiency gives more problems than any other nutrient shortage. The most talked about symptom of zinc deficiency in pecans is rosetting or lion's tail. It may also show up as small, often chlorotic (white or yellowish) leaves and sometimes as stem die back. Beautiful pecan trees and regular harvests of high quality pecans begin each spring with zinc sprays. Good foliage is the secret to optimum growth, healthy trees and regular produc-

tion. Mature pecan trees can have double the amount of foliage with three or four zinc sprays in April and May. The younger the leaves, the more good the zinc will do. Therefore, the most important time to apply zinc is now. Most pecan growers spray their orchards with zinc three or four times a year starting at first bud-break. In young trees, however, weekly spraying from bud break until August 1 may be necessary to keep, enough zinc in the tree for optimum growth. Young trees can grow six feet instead of six inches in one year. This is, of course, in combination with a good management program. There are two types of zinc which can be used, zinc sulfate or NZN. Each is effective. Commercial pecan growers have used the wettable powder zinc sulfate

with good results for over 40 years. Caution will need to be used however because zinc sulfate can kill many types of plants such as vegetables and fruit trees. NZN is a liquid and is recommended for yard trees. It is not toxic to other plants and is available at many stores in Eastland County. Mix 2 teaspoons of NZN in one gallon of water or 1 1/4 quarts per 100 gallons of water. Zinc alone is not the answer to perfect pecans. It is however a very important cultural requirement. With good zinc management other cultural practices such as fertilization and irrigation will be more effective. However, fertilization or irrigation without zinc sprays is of little value. So, zinc sprays are one of the pecan growers most important first steps to a successful year.

Appraisal Practices And Tax Burdens

Taxes Local Governments 1983-1984

Austin-Local property taxes were highest in Crystal City and lowest in Brenham in 1983-84 according to the Texas Research League, an Austin-based public policy research group. The average tax on all types of taxable property was 2.3% of market value (selling price) in Crystal City but only 0.7% in Brenham.

In Eastland County property appraisal ratios to market value ranged from a low of 80.3 per cent in Gorman to 89.8% in Rising Star. Carbon was listed at 86.4; Cisco, 83.6; Eastland, 82.3; and Ranger, 85.9 per cent.

The report points out that many elderly homeowners would pay less because school taxes are frozen at the

level existing when the taxpayer turned 65.

Second, unless all property is appraised uniformly, tax burdens will vary. The report cites two

reasons for the wide range of taxes: First, local officials adopt budgets and set tax rates and homestead exemptions. Houses in Dumas are valued at only 35% of market value while minerals are valued at

97% and utilities 112% of market value according to the State Property Tax Board, the report states. While the legislature has prohibited the old practice of fractional assessing for tax

purposes, the goal of equitable treatment of all taxpayers has not been reached in many localities the report concludes.

Equitable appraisals among different types of pro-

erty are significant in attracting new industry to a community. The 1983-84 property tax on \$80,000 of industrial equipment and inventories ranged from \$558 in Gatesville to \$2,160 in Alvin. Commercial and in-

dustrial properties are taxed at about the same level as other property in Abilene, but in Arlington industrial property is taxed 49% higher and commercial 25% higher than the average for all types of property.

Increase Noted In Crime Rate

AUSTIN - Increases were noted in both the crime rate and the number of major crimes reported in Texas last year, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"The crime rate in Texas last year rose 2.1 percent to 6,029.2 crimes per hundred thousand population," said Col. Jim Adams, DPS director. "The total number of major index crimes reported by law enforcement agencies was 964,014, amounting to an increase of 3.8 percent."

"These are relatively small increases," Adams said. "However, they are disappointing in view of the reductions reported in 1983 and demonstrate the necessity of keeping the pressure on the criminal element through maximum enforcement efforts and increased citizen participation in crime prevention pro-

grams. With our continuing population growth in Texas, we must anticipate increases in opportunities for crime and keep working to create the most inhospitable environment for the criminal."

Two of the four violent crime categories were down in 1984. Murders decreased by 6.6 percent and robberies declined by 4.1 percent. However, the number of rapes were up 15.9 percent while aggravated assaults increased 1.3 percent.

Motor vehicle thefts led the property crime categories, posting 6.4 percent increase. Thefts rose by 5.1 percent and burglaries were up by 1.5 percent.

Twenty-one percent of the index crimes were cleared by arrests in 1984. The value of property stolen during the commission of major crimes was estimated to be approximately \$1.1 billion with \$414 million in stolen property recovered.

Four Texas law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty by felonious action in 1984. Five officers died in duty-related ac-

idents. A total of 3,523 assaults was reported against police officers.

Reported arson cases in 1984 numbered 8,064 compared to 7,486 for the previous year.

Statewide DWI arrests totaled 132,046 in 1984 compared with 149,621 in 1983, declining 11.4 percent. Drug

Highlight Audubon Bird Paintings

The Marshall Islands and Palau, two of three U.S. administered Trust Territories situated in the Western Pacific, will open their 1985 stamp programs by issuing special sets of postage stamps that commemorate the birth bicentenary of the world's foremost ornithologist and painter of birds—John James Audubon (1785-1851).

It was 200 years ago on April 26 that Mademoiselle Rabin, a Creole lady living in the village of Les Cayes, Santo Domingo (now Haiti) bore a son to a French naval captain with a wife back

home in France. Audubon's mother died when John was but four years old and as a result, his father took the lad back to France where he was lovingly adopted into the family by Mrs. Audubon.

It was while growing up in France that John had the unique opportunity to study art under the guidance of one of France's most famed court painters—Jacques Louis David.

At the age of 18, Audubon's father sent the young man to Mill Grove, Pa. in order to supervise some property that the French naval captain owned.

However, upon landing in America, John Audubon primarily used his art talents to illustrate the various birds of his adopted homeland which so fascinated him.

Also shortly after arriving in the U.S., young Audubon met and married Lucy Bakewell, a woman who was to strongly encourage and support his love for illustrating the birds of America.

Often she worked to support the family which soon came to include two sons, so that Audubon would have opportunities to take leisurely field trips into the woodlands of different parts of the country in order to hunt the many bird species he needed as models for his paintings.
