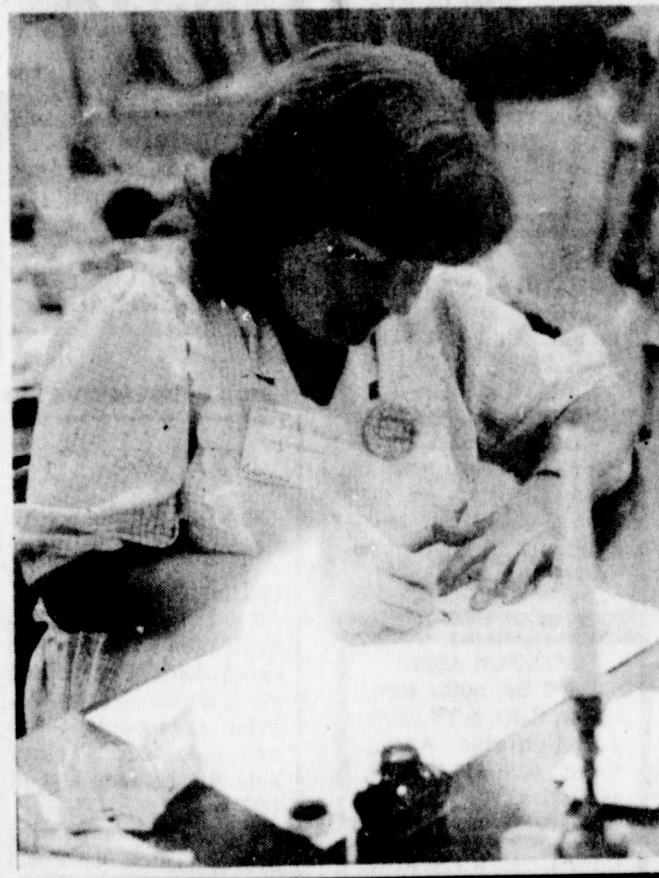

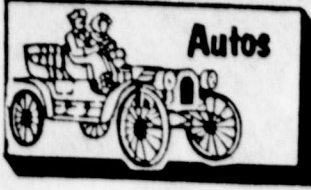

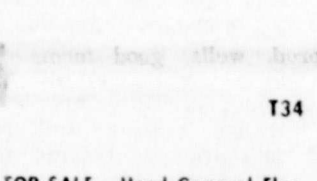

# Prevention Is The Best 'Cure'

The majority of cancers could be prevented if only each person cared enough to practice healthier habits.

Scientists say as many as 80 percent of all cancers are the result of lifestyle factors people can control but too often ignore.

Smoking, improper diets, excessive sunlight, some occupational hazards and assorted environmental agents all are implicated in many of the 100-plus malignant diseases called cancer. Combinations of these bad habits over long periods boost an individual's chances for cancer manifold.

Studies show smoking now causes more than 30 percent of all cancer deaths and costs nearly \$30 billion in medical care in the United States alone.

"What a waste, particularly since we know how to prevent these and could do so for a fraction of what's being spent on treating them," laments Dr. David T. Carr, chief of pulmonary diseases at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston.

Dr. Carr contends the epidemic of lung cancer "is the worst medical disaster we face today." Approximately 140,000 new cases are expected this year, making it the most prevalent type affecting men and women.

Only about 10 percent of lung cancer patients live for five years or longer after diagnosis, although several recent reports demonstrate improved survival for one particular type. Unfortunately, the bleak outlook for most lung cancer patients drags down the overall cure rate for all malignancies, Dr. Carr says.

Cigarette smoking and use of other tobacco products also contribute to cancers of the mouth, pharynx, larynx, esophagus, pancreas and bladder. Smokers have higher rates of heart attacks, strokes and chronic lung ailments.

"Many people erroneously think it won't do any good for them to quit if they've been smoking for a long time. The fact is, regardless of how long someone has smoked, the risks for serious medical problems begin to decrease almost immediately after cessation," Dr. Carr says.

Getting smokers to stop is only part of the prevention story. The other half involves convincing young people not to ever start this deadly habit.

Adolescents and teens may not appreciate the dangers developing cancer in later life, but they can understand that smoking causes a type of drug addiction, bad breath and yellow stains on hands and teeth. Research shows most smokers are "hooked" after just three or four packs of cigarettes. In addition to the addictive factors, the nicotine is a powerful, poisonous stimulant which immediately affects the brain and central nervous system, then later slows digestion and reduces blood circulation.

The combination of smoking and heavy alcohol use or exposure to some occupational risks can increase greatly the chances of cancer.

The role of dietary factors has taken on increasing importance in recent years to the point where many medical specialists say 35 percent or more of all cancers appear to be related to what we eat.

"High-fat diets are associated with much greater risks for colon and breast cancers, in particular, while consuming more fiber-containing foods along with those rich in vitamins A and C appear to protect against certain cancers," explains Dr. Guy R. Newell, chairman of the Department of Cancer Prevention at M.D. Anderson.

The incidence of colon and rectal cancers is second only

to lung cancers among all Americans. Breast cancer will affect almost one out of 10 women in the United States. Other risk factors associated with these common types include a family history of colorectal and breast cancers.

The National Academy of Sciences' National Research Council acknowledged the increasing importance of diet and cancer when it made these recommendations:

- Reduce consumption of total fats to 30 percent or less of daily dietary intake by eating fewer fatty meats, whole-milk dairy products and butter.

- Increase high-fiber foods like whole-grain cereals, bran products, sunflower seeds and brown rice.

- Eat plenty of vegetables and fruits with high vitamin A and C contents, such as dark green and deep yellow vegetables along with those in the cabbage family and citrus fruits like oranges and grapefruits.

- Avoid virtually all salt-cured, smoked and salt-pickled foods like bacon, sausages, smoked fish and ham.

- Practice moderation when drinking alcoholic beverages, especially if you smoke.

Studies are in progress in several medical centers to see if giving extra doses of some synthetic vitamins may boost protection against certain cancers. But Dr. Newell warns against anyone taking huge doses of vitamins because of excessive vitamin A can cause liver damage and too much vitamin C may cause serious bone marrow changes.

The relationship between excessive sunlight and skin cancer has been well-documented for years.

Texans and others living in warm climates need to take special precautions against too much sun, including wearing protective clothing and hats during the hottest

part of the day and using sunscreen or sun-blocking products while swimming or participating in other outdoor activities. The skin should be protected from high winds and prolonged exposure to frost and snow. Individuals with fair complexions are most vulnerable to skin cancers.

Common sense habits help make skin cancer the easiest cancer to prevent. The vast majority of skin cancers are highly curable. One exception is malignant melanoma, a type of skin cancer that usually starts from a mole-like growth and can spread quickly. That's why any obvious change in warts or moles ought to be checked promptly to improve the chances for successful treatments.

People also should take steps to minimize contact with pesticides, chemicals in

the workplace and unnecessary X-rays.

"Along with preaching the need for prevention, we must do better at educating everyone to listen and watch his or her own body. Heightened awareness that any abnormality - lumps, bumps, bleeding, a change in some function, and certainly unexplained pains - should be investigated as soon as possible.

"Unfortunately, many people still fear finding out they have cancer, yet most of these abnormal symptoms do not mean a malignancy. Getting the truth of what those signs indicate as quickly as possible is the best way to offer curative therapies," Dr. Newell emphasizes.

# Capital Update

I feel like all of you would be interested in knowing the results of a recent poll on certain issues taken in my Legislative district, consisting of Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch, and Runnels Counties.

Please allow me to go over those questions and the responses thereto. First, let me say the questionnaire for the poll was sent, at random, to approximately 1000 registered voters in the district. Astounding as it may seem, the response rate was over 30%, when statewide response rates for such polls usually average 1-2%. This response evokes certain feelings of pride, hopefully, not misplaced, in that I hope these weekly articles and my seemingly endless calendar of speaking engagements have made you constantly more aware of issues faced by the State and affecting each of you.

After having patted myself on the back, here are the questions and responses:

1. Do you favor legalizing pari-mutuel betting on horse races in Texas? Response: 49.3% in favor, 50.7% opposed.

COMMENT: This is, to an extent, shocking to us because our unsolicited mail was running roughly 65-70% in favor of pari-mutuel wagering.

2. Do you favor the repeal of the "Blue Laws" (Sunday Closing Law) which prohibits the sale of most general merchandise on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays? Response: 71% in favor, 29% opposed.

COMMENT: Clearly, the vast majority of my constituency opposed continuation of prohibited Sunday sales and these responses will certainly affect my perspective on upcoming Blue Law repeal legislation.

3. Do you favor a constitu-

tional amendment permitting a family to use homestead property for collateral for loans other than for the purchase price of protections were in the law to protect a family from losing its homestead for the failure to repay a minor loan?

Response: 52% in favor, 48% opposed.

COMMENT: This issue is probably one of the most misunderstood propositions ever to come before the Legislature. I am not sure that the poll is reflective of the real desires of the public because my experience has been 1) few people understand existing law or proposed changes, 2) few people are completely satisfied with existing law, to the extent they understand it. It would appear that existing law surely penalizes persons having rural homesteads of up to 200 acres but may not be as repressive on urban homestead owners with homesteads of up to 1 acre. At any rate, it is an issue that bears further study before I am prepared to know exactly what I want to do.

4. Would you be in favor of legislation which would support a ban on open containers of alcoholic beverages in automobiles? Response: 73% in favor, 27% opposed.

COMMENT: Again, as far as I am concerned, there is no question in my mind that there is a broad based desire to ban open containers of alcoholic beverages in vehicles and I fully intend to support this legislation.

5. Should Texas enact legislation allowing for a state lottery? Response: 51% in favor, 49% opposed.

COMMENT: This is one of the real tough issues where a person in my position is trapped between the proverbial "devil and the deep blue sea" in that I will make approximately 1/2 of the people mad regardless of what I do.

It raises a good deal of money and appears to be free of a good many of the morality issues attendant to horse racing. This is just one of those issues that all legislators dread to vote on and I will have to make my decision when I see the bill.

Since this column is made available to you through the courtesy and suffrage of your local newspaper, and at their expense, I will address myself to the remaining five proposals, questions and responses thereto next week.

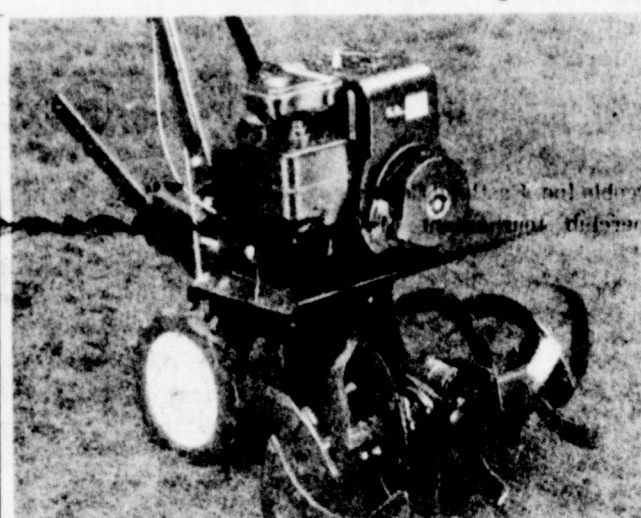
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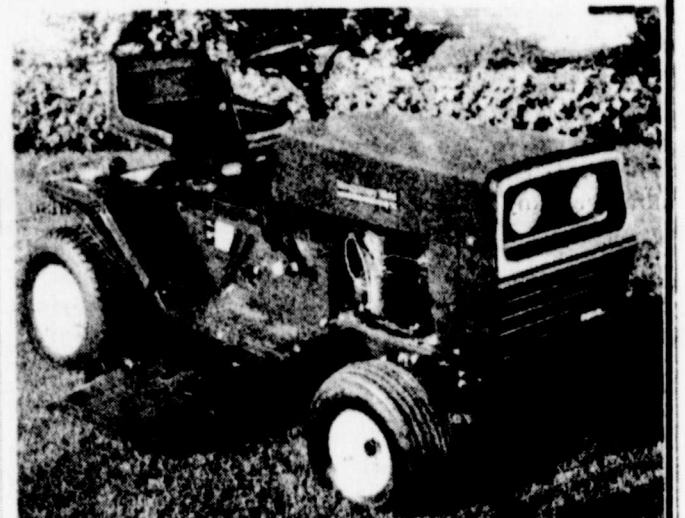

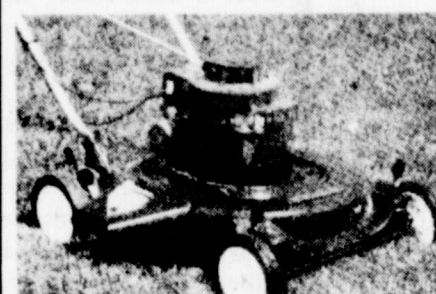

Proctor is full and has alot of cover ranging from 6" out to 10" of water. This cover ranges from green willows to flooded weed beds. Only one angler was able to land a 14" fish to weigh. Terry Wilson was our winner with 2 fish weighing 4 pounds 10 ounces. Terry also won big bass, which weighed 3 pounds 6 ounces.

These fish were caught on wind patterns. Prevailing south winds the prior week influenced my choice of

areas to fish. But the wind had shifted by tournament time allowing me to work very slow. Both of these fish were taken on spinnerbaits with a large trailer. I allowed these spinners to settle on bottom then slowly retrieving them only fast enough to feel the blade turning.

Other lakes which hosted tournaments included Hubbard Creek. Permian bass club had 24 members and 2 youths attend the first days tournaments set up at the Hubbard Creek campground. After the final tally, Lewis Palmer was first with 4 fish weighing 5.38. Lewis also

took Big Bass honors with 1 fish weighing 3 pounds even. 2nd Don Stanley with 3 fish weighing 5.19. 3rd Steve Main with 2.62. Permian fishes a 5 fish 12" minimum and do have a live release program in effect. Results of the second day of competition were not available at this time.

## Piece Work - A Different Kind Of Quilt

Not long ago a person from some distance contacted a Cisco firm, wanting to know where "that book" with the writings of Mary Crofts could be located.

"That book", as it turned out, was "Piecwork", the Cisco Writer's Club publication, which had a limited number of copies of the press last Christmas.

Not only does "Piecwork" have a sampling of the writing of Mary Crofts, but it also has a varied collection from thir-

teen other members of the Club: Christine Reich, Julia Worthy, Voy Wilks, Lela Latch Lloyd, Josephine Cleveland, Vida Killion, Allye Terrell, Bill Roberts, Robert Brown, Helen Wallace, Mary Ann Ziehr, Catherine Worthy and Viola Payne.

Unfortunately three of these authors have moved away since contributing to the book - Helen Wallace, Allye Terrell and Vida Killion. Their material adds much to the quality as well as the sentimental value of

the book.

The title and quilting frame on the front cover hints at what the book is about - it is a collection, or, as the Foreword says, a gathering of favorite material from the authors. The book was printed by Roberts Communications, and the layout and art work is distinctive.

The casual reader who picks up the volume might be inclined to say: "Hmm. So these people all belong to the same Writer's Club. They all probably sound

alike."

Quite the contrary is true. One of the interesting features of the book is how very different most of the material actually is, as if the writing comes from totally different perceptions.

The threads which pull these patches together are a love of the writing craft, and the fact that most of the material relates to the southwest or its people.

As for the writing of Mary Crofts, her prose has a gentle sophisticated humor and her poetry symbolism. There are other special things, such as Julia Worthy's hearty, hilarious version of "Cabbage - What To Do About It". Julia not only

describes a whole life-style. And, speaking of style, Vida Killion's "Watch Your Style" was a prize-winner before it went in the book. It's a serene and flawless as the little lady who wrote it.

Quite a bit of the material in "Piecwork" had either won prizes or been published in newspapers or other media before going into this book. A poem by Mary Ann Ziehr, "The Miracle of Life" will be published soon in a collection of poetry.

Christine Reich has had some things printed, but after reading her stories and poems in "Piecwork" readers will conclude that she should publish a lot more. Sensitive, thoughtful,

probing; these are words

which describe her work. There are so many other highlights of the book - some fine articles by Lela Latch Lloyd, humor and inspiration from Helen Wallace, great travel pieces by Allye Terrell, Voy Wilks and the clarity of his writing, and two superb stories by Catherine Worthy.

Josephine Cleveland, newspaper columnist and author, shares some of her best inspirational material in the book. Bill says he has always written poems just for his own enjoyment, shows that he is a multi-talented individual.

## Changing Farm Picture

COLLEGE STATION-- High interest rates and narrowing profit margins for farmers are causing new and irreversible changes in agriculture.

"The sudden surge in interest rates a few years ago and persistent high real rates since then have triggered some dramatic changes in agriculture," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

High interest rates not only increase the cost of doing business, but they also contribute to a strong dollar, discourage farm exports, encourage imports and stimulate incentives for foreign producers to step up production, Anderson notes. It all adds up to fewer crop exports and low U.S. farm prices. This accelerates changes in the structure of American agriculture.

Currently, farm operators with little debt have a strong advantage over those making large in-

terest payments," notes the economist.

"Rental agreements are turning away from cash rent, and traditional crop share arrangements are being renegotiated based on equitable resource contributions of both operators and landlords. Use of credit capital in agriculture is declining because of low returns to farm investments."

Anderson points out that the current farm economic situation discourages new entries into farming. Furthermore, new machinery purchases drop and there is more maintenance and repair work, more custom operations and more joint ownership of large machines. Marginal cropland shifts to forage and grazing programs which, over time, will lead to excess beef production and thereby lower cattle prices.

"Other changes with the current state of the farm economy include a squeeze on irrigated farming and a drop in land prices, especial-

ly irrigated farmland," the economist points out. "Farmers are discouraged from owning farmland, and off-farm income becomes vitally important and often necessary. Farm consolidations increase and commercial operations turn more sophisticated in business management, financing, production and marketing decisions."

As interest rates begin to climb and farm margins start narrowing, storage costs go up and marketing becomes disorderly, Anderson adds. Increased production and marketing costs are absorbed by the farmer in the short-run, but eventually farmers become serious about building better markets so that higher costs can be passed on to consumers. Thus, marketing becomes an essential ingredient in shifting price risk, and production and marketing processes become more integrated. Group marketing systems are encouraged as being more efficient.

"Producers that can make necessary adjustments to survive prolonged periods of low income will be a business-minded group that

have or can hire a considerable amount of financial, production and marketing expertise," notes Anderson. "Eventually, remaining producers will recognize the benefit of developing a committed marketing program that can adjust production to markets

commodity by commodity.

"And, if the runaway federal budget deficit is brought under control and the over-valued dollar adjusts downward, export markets could expand, imports retreat and prosperity could return to agriculture," Anderson says.

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
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# Area News Briefs

whereas the falls of the Beardless Irises are hairless.

In planting Iris the soil should be dug deeply, and a little well-decayed manure worked into the topsoil, and ground limestone and bone meal or lime forked into the topsoil. The best time for planting is from July to September, but it may be done even as late as March, although the flowers will be inferior the first year.

The rhizomes are planted flat and only half covered. They must not be deeply buried, as it is necessary for them to be sun-baked to produce the maximum number of flowers. They are set 6-8 inches apart, with the tips of the rhizomes pointing toward the outside of the clumps. If the soil is dry you must thoroughly moisten it first. There is no further cultivation required except that an annual top-dressing of leaf mold or well-decayed compost can be applied annually in Autumn.

IRIS, THE OLD STANDBY

I can remember my grandmother's flower beds and her referring to the "flag" which were so beautiful. Of course, she was referring to her beautiful Iris. In my reading on the subject of Iris, I have found them referred to as "flags" on many occasions. It seems like this year the Iris (Flags) have been more beautiful than in many years in this area.

The Iris is a large genus of mostly hardy flowering plants, most of which have perennial rootstocks or bulbs. You will find Iris growing wild in the temperate coun-

### Good Buys In Protein Foods

COLLEGE STATION--Some of the best buys in meat, according to the latest survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), are beef liver, ground beef, chicken, turkey, ground chuck and pork shoulder.

The economy of a cut depends on the amount of cooked lean meat or the number of servings it provides, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

"Meat cuts that are relatively high priced and have little or no waste may be more economical than low-priced cuts with a great deal of bone, gristle or fat," she explains.

The USDA study also compared the costs of 20 grams of protein from different meats and alternates, Cooksey reports.

Some meat alternates, such as peanut butter and eggs, are as good a buy as less expensive cuts of meat. Some processed meat products, such as franks and bologna, were found to cost more as sources of protein than pork roasts and some beef roasts.

But many meat alternates and meat products require you to eat more than you normally would to get the same amount of protein, advises the nutritionist.

For example, a 3-ounce

tries of the northern hemisphere. Most Iris are grown from rootstocks which are sword-shaped leaves. The bulbous Irises and the Spanish Iris have narrow leaves. Most Irises bloom in April, May and June, but in mild climates a representative selection will provide flowers throughout the greater part of the year, commencing with the Unguicularis in January and concluding with Alata in late Autumn.

The Iris belongs to the family of Iridaceae. The name is derived from Iris, the rainbow, and alludes to the beauty and variety of the flowers. Our Iris differ in structure from most plants. The three outer perianth

serving of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish provides about 20 grams of protein or more. But it takes four and

segments (petals) hang downwards, and are known as the falls; the other three stand erect and are called standards; in addition, the three styles of the flowers are colored and petal-like in appearance.

Irises are divided into two main sections - those which grow from bulbs and other which have thick rootstocks or rhizomes. We are more familiar with the Iris that have thick rhizomes, and these consist of four different types: Tall Bearded, Intermediate Bearded, Dwarf Bearded and Beardless. The Bearded Iris are so-called because the outer petals, or falls, have a thick line of fine hairs stretching down the lower half,

one-half tablespoons of peanut butter, four frankfurters or 10 slices of bacon to provide that same 20 grams of protein, she says.

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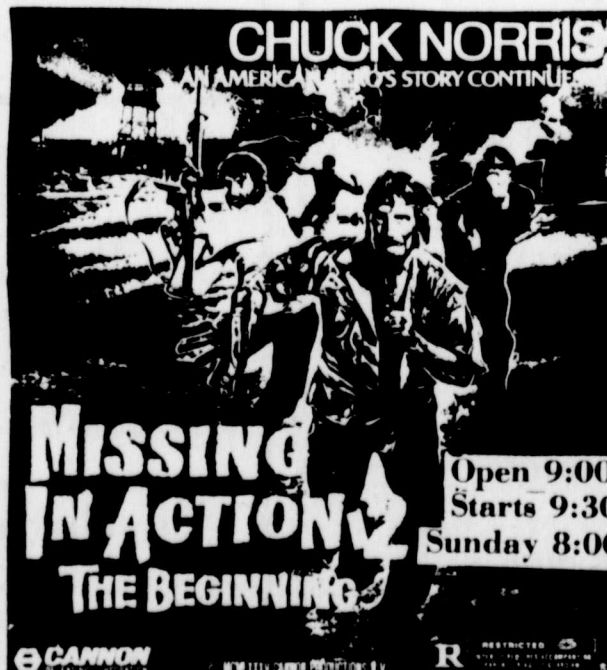

# Oil Belt News

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Eastland County by Sun Exploration of Abilene one mile north of Desdemona. Designated as the No. 1 Veda Davis, the well is in a 120-acre lease in the A.J. O'Rear Survey A-870. Total depth is projected to 4,999 feet.

Production in the Adams Branch Formation will be the target when H.E. Austin of Cisco starts making hole for a quartet of developmental wells in the Hawk Eye Field, Eastland County.

All carry permit for 1,400-ft. maximum depth, with drillsites in a 133-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-1328, about one mile west of Romney. The wells are designated as the No. 19a through 22A Cox.

Flowing 656,000 CF gas per day on a 10/64 choke, the No. 11 Hagaman has been finished by Ridge Oil in the South Hagaman Field, Eastland County.

It was rated at 3,800,000 CFD on open flow.

The operation is in a lease 16 miles north-northwest of Desdemona.

Ridge took the well to total depth of 3,850 feet. Production will be from set of Conglomerate perforations at 3,653 to 3,659 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1 Miletus Church has been plugged and abandoned at a location two miles west-northwest of Nimrod in the Scranton Field, Eastland County. It probed to a dry bottom at 1,503 feet and was a venture of Western Production Inc.

The same operator has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 H.G. Beene in the Scranton Field four miles west-northwest of Nimrod. Location will be in a two-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-191. Western operates out of Fort Worth and is proposing total depth of 1,800 feet.

Pumping 18 barrels of oil per day on an open choke, the No. 2 Schaefer has been completed in the Katlaco-Cook Field, Eastland County.

Katlaco Drilling Inc. is the operator.

The well bottomed at 4,077

feet and will produce from a set of Mississippian perforations at 3,880 to 3,986 feet into the hole. Oil tested at 45-gravity. Location is in the H&TC Survey A-1373.

A 3,800-ft. Eastland County wildcat is scheduled to be spudded by Dallas-based Tiki Exploration five miles east of Eastland. It is the No. 2 J.J. Finley, with drillsite in a 69-acre lease in the McLennan School Land Survey A-367.

A total of five undrilled Eastland County wildcat locations have been abandoned by Morrison Energy Co. at locations from four to five miles south of Carbon. Three wells were under permit for 3,400-ft. TD, one for 3,500-ft. TD and the fifth well for 900-ft. TD.

The wells had been designated as the No. 9-1 Martin Unit, No. 10-1 Martin Unit, No. 1-A Martin, No. 1 Martin Unit "11" and No. 1

Martin Unit "13".

Showing ability to pump 29 barrels of 39-gravity oil with 15 barrels of waste water daily on an open choke, the No. 1 Pence has been finished in Eastland County's JMJ Field.

Locations are four miles northeast of Eastland.

With Snow Oil as the operator, the well bottomed at 3,938 feet. It will produce from a set of Marble Falls perforations 3,491 to 3,504 feet into the wellbore.

Operating out of Brownwood, Midwood Petroleum Inc. is preparing to make hole for the No. 1 H.E. Pittman in the Eastland Regular Field. Location will be two miles north of Scranton in a 96-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-192. The venture is under permit for 2,000-ft. maximum drilling depth.

Meager production potential was recorded when the

1-A Sibley was completed by Dramar Developmental in the Eastland Regular Field six miles south of Ranger.

It flowed 72,000 CF gas daily on a 12/64 choke and was rated at 151,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

It probed to a 913-ft. bottom and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cisco Sand, 841 to 861 feet into the wellbore.

An unsuccessful developmental try has been written off as a dry hole in Eastland County's Marsan Field four miles south of Carbon. It is designated as the No. 1 Carter, with Brazos Resources Inc. as the operator. It bottomed with no commercial shows at 3,199 feet.

Dramar Developmental of Eastland has driven stake for a 1,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field seven miles east-southeast of Eastland.

The well will be designated as the No. 2-A Sibley. It is in a 20-acre lease in the William Van Norman Survey A-545.

The No. 1 Travis Smith is scheduled for spudding in the Eastland Regular Field with Miles Moore of Eastland as the operator. It is in a 143-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-801, two miles west-northwest of Gorman. Total depth is projected to 900 feet.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for a shallow developmental bid in the Eastland Regular Field seven miles west-northwest of Cisco. Designated as the No. 2 Yeager, the well bottomed dry at 335-ft. TD. Adler Petroleum Inc. was the operator.

The Jones Co. of Albany has staked location for a 4,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field eight miles north of Desdemona. It carries the designation of No. 1 Allen A. A.C. Allen Heirs. The operation will be in a lease in the M.J. Robinson Survey A-1819.

Ridge Oil of Breckenridge has filed for permit to drill

the No. 2 South Hagaman in the Hagaman Field, Eastland County. The well is scheduled for maximum hole of 3,850 feet. It will be located 15 miles north-northwest of Desdemona in a 2,715-acre lease assembly in the E. Sims Survey A-1270.

First production data have been posted for a new producer in the REB Field, Eastland County, seven miles north of Eastland.

The well is designated as the No. 2 Tankersley-North, with Snow Oil of Fort Worth as the operator.

It showed ability to pump 35 barrels of 39-gravity oil daily on an open choke along with 15 barrels of salt water. It was taken to a 3,980-ft. bottom and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,662 to 3,670 feet into the wellbore.

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# Texas Most Costly And Dangerous Problems

BROWNWOOD.--This is the beginning of a story about on of Texas' most costly and potentially dangerous problems: highway sign vandalism.

More than \$695,000 was spent last year replacing and repairing vandalized signs across the state, and the potential for severe and often tragic accidents increases greatly as a result of a defaced or damaged sign.

"Thousands of signs are being replaced because of vandalism long before their normal life expectancy is reached," according to Milton M. Dietert, chief engineer of the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation's Safety and Maintenance Operations Division.

"Sign vandalism has been

a major problem, not only because of the costs of replacing these signs but, more important, because a defaced or missing sign creates a very real traffic hazard," he said.

"In addition to defaced, mutilated or stolen signs, highway safety illumination is also a favorite target of vandals. The department spent more than \$129,000 last year to replace vandalized lighting," Dietert said.

The nine-county area of District 23, headquartered in Brownwood, has its share of sign vandalism, too. Some \$53,000 was spent last fiscal year to just replace signs stolen or damaged.

District Engineer Schulz noted that less than ten percent of the cost to replace damaged signs can be attributed to accidents, but

some 70 percent are the result of thefts, defacement or other vandalism. The remaining 20 percent are worn out in service.

As recently as two weeks ago, vandalism reared its head in McCulloch County," Schulz said. "Somebody pushed over all the delineator and sign posts on FM 503 between US 87 and Salt Gap. After that they made off with all the Salt Gap, Doole, and Stacy community signs. The damages amounted to about \$750."

Sign vandalism occurs year 'round, but the problem usually reaches its peak during the summer months.

Monetary costs, which are born by Texas taxpayers, are only one side of the story. There is another, more serious side that needs to be told.

Not too long ago in East Texas, a multiple fatality occurred when two cars met at a highway intersection. One of the cars didn't stop for a stop sign--because the sign had been stolen only a short time before. The missing sign cost several human lives.

Texas law makes sign vandalism a crime, and persons apprehended can be fined up to \$1,000 or imprisoned for up to two years, or both. But thieves and vandals operate clandestinely and are difficult to catch.

"There is another side to the story," said District Engineer Schulz. "Every time a sign or light is stolen or damaged, it means the cost of replacement will have to be taken from money that would otherwise be used for highway repair. Obviously, for safety reasons replacement of such signs and devices must take priority.

"The vandal is first cousin to the litterbug," he noted,

"but while the litterbug may be merely careless and irresponsible, the vandal is wantonly destructive.

"If anyone should see an act of vandalism, he could help and possibly save lives if he would report it to the local law enforcement agencies," District Engineer Schulz said.

The message is clear: theft and damage to highway signs and lights is costly in terms of lives and dollars. Leave them alone--they are there to help protect all of us.

## American Ancestry

A reader of our column recently asked about one of the most valuable assets available to the genealogist: census records.

Every ten years since 1970, a population census has been taken. The information recorded varies from decade to decade. Census records before 1850 give only the names of the heads of households and the number of males and females in the various age groups.

At the present, census schedules are available to the public, starting with 1970 through 1910. The only exception is the 1890 census which was destroyed by fire. 1790 census schedules are

available for Connecticut, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont. Census schedules are not known to exist for Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, New Jersey, and Virginia as they were evidently burned during the War of 1812. However, the schedules for Virginia were reconstructed from state enumerations and tax lists.

The Soundex systems serves as an index to the 1880, 1900, and 1910 census records. It is not in strict alphabetical order, but is arranged by the sounds in each

surname. This is helpful as the variant spellings of surname will usually be indexed in the same group. Example: ELLISON, ELSON, ELIASON.

The information conveyed in the census can help you determine family relationship and estimate approximate years of birth, but should be regarded only as secondary source.

Published census records are helpful, but they can't always replace your original research.

## Dangerous Herb Pills

COLLEGE STATION--Herbs will add flavor and variety to meals. But herb pills and formulas are not special remedies for nutrition or health problems, and may be dangerous, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Herbal remedies have been touted as good for any number of problems from arthritis to obesity, says Mark K. Sweeten. Often sold in health food stores or by people who sell vitamins out

of their homes, they are claimed to be "natural" formulas.

"If these formulas contained nothing but herbs, they would probably be harmless, so consumers would simply be spending their money for diet aids which have no nutritional value," she maintains.

However, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently recalled an herb pill supplement product because it contained three powerful drugs in potentially

dangerous doses, although the label listed only herbs as ingredients.

According to Sweeten, the government analysis revealed that each herbal pill contained an arthritis drug, a potent diuretic and a tranquilizer. The label suggested taking only 4 pills each day, but the product directions proposed 12 daily pills as the upper limit.

Since it may take some time to recall the outstanding supply of this herb pill supplement, the nutritionist advises consulting a physician before taking any herbal remedies or any other diet supplement.

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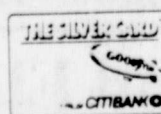

# CAPITOL UPDATE

This week's column is going to be somewhat a "Duke's Mixture" of several issues currently of interest to you, based on letters, calls and personal visits.

First, let me say a few additional words about the seat belt issue. I am one of the persons who subscribes to theory that the Federal Government should be concerned with printing our money and protecting our shores and very little else; but, they are going to use the airbag threat to insure passage of the seat belt legislation. You might as well start practicing your buckling up procedure because the necessity for it is right around the corner.

Some 1500 University of Texas students "marched on the Capitol" on April 2nd, protesting tuition increases in State colleges and universities. I suppose it would

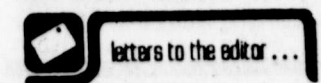
have been more appropriate, and probably more effective, if the mothers and fathers paying the tuition had made the march. Be that as it may, expect a tuition increase to become effective at least by the fall semester. Tuition has not significantly increased since 1957 and this has little or no connection with the cost of a college education in the state.

Hopefully, most of you can live with the tuition increases and maybe even some of you will be pleased with the increases on the theory that it is good "for those riding the train to pay the fare." In light of threats made by some of my very close friends with children in college I may have numerous positions to fill for new close friends after passage of tuition increases. Those wishing to apply for these "close friend positions" may make your request timely known to me.

Overall, look for this session to produce a significant expansion of criminal offense categories and penalties. Several such pieces of legislation have passed out of committee and through the legislative process. There is no doubt that there is a conservative mood in the State concerning crime, especially matters involving children, and this conservative wave is being well received with the possi-

ble exception of those who are in favor of the legislation but question where we are going to put all the convicted persons, when, in truth and in fact, we do not have room to hold the ones we have.

As you well know the Texas National Guard is spending the next few weeks in Honduras. Certain of wiser, more philosophical Capitol watchers believe that it would likely be in the best interest of the people in the state if the Legislators were sent for maneuvers and the National Guard were called home. I can not, with any conviction, disagree with this concept.

## Texas Senior Games May 15

ARLINGTON, Texas--- Newton E. Barrett, a retired Methodist minister, may well have two special awards secured before the competition even begins in the fourth annual Texas Senior Games at the University of Texas at Arlington on May 15.

Newton, who is 94 years old, will come to Arlington for the Games all the way from Moline, Ill. He's certain to be a strong contender for honors as the oldest contestant and the one traveling the farthest to participate.

But those aren't the awards that Newton is looking forward to earning. He wants the Gold Medals for winning the 50-meter and the 100-meter dashes in his bracket. Don't bet that he won't get those, too. After all, he is the national champion.

"I won the 50-meter championship in the Over-90 age division in 1983 and the 100-meter championship in 1984 in the Ill. Senior Olympics," Newton explains. "Of course, I was running in the same haet with a bunch of kids in their 70's because they didn't have any runners over 80. So I got the medals

for my age.

"Then a few months ago I got a letter from the U.S. Amateur Athletic Congress in Indianapolis, Ind. saying that they had declared me the National Champion in the Over-90 division. They said that they didn't have any record of anyone over 90 even running in an organized race. Si I guess I'm National Champion until they find someone else to run."

Newton works out almost every evening when the weather permits. And he has a perfect facility for his speciality event just two blocks from his home on 15th street in Moline.

"Between 17th Street and 18th Street it's exactly 10 meters from curb to curb," he says. There's not much traffic when I run so I almost never have to break my stride."

Newton will be just one of approximately 1,500 seniors who will compete in these fourth annual Texas Senior Games for Fun and Fitness at UTA May 15-18. The competition, which has become one of the largest such events for seniors in the nation, is open to any person, male or female, 50 years of

age or older. The Games are open to non-Texas residents for the first time this year.

Participants will compete in 51 athletic and recreational activities, including track and field, softball, swimming, bowling, golf, tennis, horseshoes, dominoes and dancing.

Opening ceremonies will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 15 at Texas Hall on the UTA Campus. SMU basketball coach Dave Bliss, who has guided the Mustangs to the NCCA playoffs for the past two seasons will serve as honorary chairman of the Games.

Entry forms are available at most parks and recreation departments and centers throughout Texas as well as most area agencies on aging. Deadline for entries is May 1. 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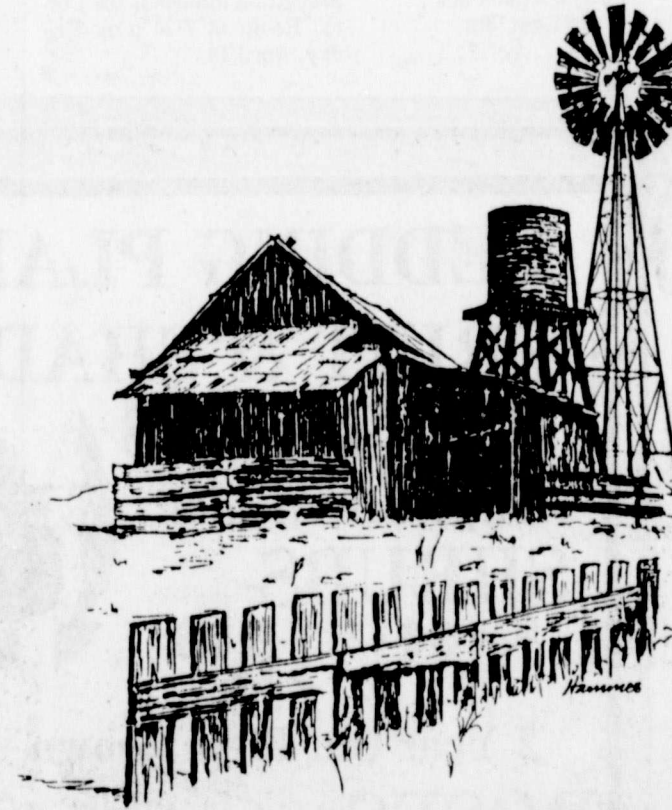
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# History Of Cisco's 20th Century Club

IF ADMIRING wild flowers in all their spring time splendor is your cup of tea, you'll want to hitch up your horses and head out in just about any direction. Our highways are literally bordered by profusions of spring flowers right now.

Flowers are prettier than they've been in a decade. So says observers from far and wide. And after a trip down south to Fredricksburg, we're back home to add our endorsement.

WENT DOWN to Fredricksburg last Thursday to attend a travel trailer gathering. The trip south was via Brownwood, Brady and Mason and we returned by Llano, San Saba, Richland Springs and Brownwood.

In many, many areas, the Bluebonnets have spread from the roadsides where the Texas Highway Department seeded them into pastures and up hills and down valleys. Also, you see a variety of other flowers, including Indian Paint Brush, Lazy Daisies, Winecups, Verbena, Yellow Prairie Flax, Phlox, Maximilian Sunflower and the like.

AT FREDRICKSBURG, we parked at Lady Bird Johnson City Park where there are hookups for a hundred or so trailers, a fishing stream, a large swimming pool, nine-hole golf course and picnic facilities galore. And, of course, wild flowers are plentiful.

Drove out the ranch road to the LBJ State Park where Bluebonnets and an assortment of other flowers were spectacular.

Also visited the Enchanted Road State Natural Area, located 20 miles so north. This natural phenomenon was opened to the public in 1984 and nearly a half million visitors have already seen it. As you drive into the park, you behold a panoramic view of Enchanted Rock, with its 640-acre granite dome and adjacent Turkey Peak. The dome is virtually bare of vegetation of any kind.

It is about a mile round trip to climb to the top of the Rock and return, and most visitors make the trip. History tells us that the Indians held the place in awe back in the olden days. They

feared it and believed it sheltered evil spirits.

A large group of Boy Scouts with their leaders and camping equipment arrived as we were preparing to depart. They planned an overnight outing. A few hours later the area was drenched by a thunderstorm, and we wondered how the Scouts made out.

ALSO ENJOYING the outing were the Ed Bradshaws and the Sutton Crofts of Cisco. The Bradshaws went from Fredricksburg to San Antonio where they planned to visit a few days. Ed's brother, Arthur, who underwent open heart surgery a couple of months ago, and a sister they hadn't seen for sometime were due to meet him there at the home of their sister Eunice Garnerick. The Crofts went from Fredricksburg to their ranch near Marble Falls to check on things before returning home.

MR. DOUG FRY, local rancher an city judge, tells us the wild flower situation is real nice out southwest in Eastland and Callahan Counties. "The Buffalo Clover has a grape Kool-Aid smell and is nice to look at and to smell," he reports. "The Bluebonnets that are nice at City Hall were planted a few years ago by the late Ed Farley, a former city commissioner, who often collected Bluebonnet seed to plant. The county VFW Post is having a meeting Wednesday, April 24, at 8 p.m. to elect officers for 1986, according to a report from Commander Jack Mathis of Eastland."

(Editor's Note:) This April of 1985 marks the 87th anniversary of the Twentieth Century Club which sponsors and operates the Cisco Public Library. In 1952, Mrs. C.H. Fee, as Club Historian, and who, in 1889, when the club was organized, was elected its first President, compiled a history of the club. This as printed in the following series, should bring back memories to some citizens today and to others, a glimpse of early day club-work in Cisco.

And the Twentieth Century Club was born that day

As its first President, many anxious hours over it I spent-

And many an amusing tale could tell

But that isn't Club ethics we know quite well.

This, dear Club members, is more truth than poetry. It is the conception that led to the organization of our club.

The friend who call was Mrs. John T. Wilson. She was very enthusiastic. We selected names of friends we thought would be interested in club work, and were to see them personally. This was no easy task. There were no telephones, no taxis, and few of us owned a "horse and buggy", but we did contact the group. Not all accepted the invitation, but there were some dozen or more present.

Mrs. Winston, our hostess, explained the object of the meeting and asked for those who wished to join. Only seven of the number joined, as follows:

Mesdames J.B. Ammerman, J.J. Winston, J.J. Butts, Frank Vernon, L.W. Brannin, John T. Wilson, and C.H. Fee.

The officers elected were: Mrs. C.H. Fee, President; Mrs. L.E. Brannin, Vice President; Mrs. John T. Wilson, Secretary-Treasurer. The newly elected President called for a meeting the following week and appointed a committee to write a Constitution and By-laws. Each member was asked to send in a name for the club to be selected at this meeting, and also to bring one new member.

At this meeting the name

of The TWENTIETH CENTURY CLUB was chosen. Membership was limited to fifteen, as we met in the homes. Later the Club was offered the City Hall as a meeting place and the membership was raised to twenty-five, at which it has remained. We knew very little of Parliamentary Law. Early in its existence the club selected Robert's Rules of Order for our rule of procedure.

Our object as given in our year book was "self culture and social concern." The writer does not remember just what was meant by "social concern", unless it was to entertain our

husbands and friends, which we frequently did.

We early found that a club might be likened to a pool - no matter how much pure water flows into the pool, without an outlet it becomes stagnant. The Club joined the State Federation in 1899 and thus found an outlet! Geographically, we became a part of the then First District which extended from Dallas to El Paso. Later the District was divided into eight Districts and we became a part of the Sixth District, which embraces a large territory.

The Club has, through the years, studied many interesting subjects. For a

number of years, we studied Shakespeare's Plays, Miss Kate Friend of Waco furnishing the programs. Literally hundreds of quota-

tions were memorized! Later we studied the literature of every known country!
