Board Hires New Superintendent

C.R. Saunders, 49, of Anton, has been employed as superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools and will officially take over his duties here July 1, according to an announcement by Dr. Allen McGinness, president of the school board.

Mr. Saunders, who was given a two-year contract, will succeed James Couch, who resigned the position last month, Mr. Couch, who will be on vacation during June, will be in and out of the office to assist with the transition, Dr. McGinness said.

The new superintendent has been at Anton, 25 miles northwest of Lubbock, for ten years as a principal and as superintendent. He has been in the teaching profession for 25 years, including assignments as a vocational agriculture teacher, coach

and science teacher. Mr. Saunders, a native of the Texas Panhandle, holds BS and MS degrees from Texas Tech and has done

post graduate study at Southwest Plains College and graduate study at Colorado School of Mines and Texas Tech. He holds certificates in administration, biology and vocational agriculture.

Mr. Saunders, who is married with four daughters, is a Presbyterian and a member of the Lions Club. He plans to spend the coming weekend in Cisco and to be in and out during June as plans are made to move his family here and to assume his duties July 1, Dr. McGinness said.

The new superintendent was hired after the board received some 50 applicants for the position and interviewed eight candidates. The contract with Mr. Saunders was signed after the board held a called meeting last Friday night. The announcement was withheld until Mr. Saunders could meet with the board at Anton and resign as their superintendent.





However, Walton and I agreed we'd probably be back home by five o'clock. No big deal. We had some business errands we had been putting off, so we further agreed that Mandi would have a better day with her friends at Mrs. Housson's than riding around with us.

My first reaction was that the whole thing was ridiculous-such things happen to other people. They do. They happened to us, too, and Eastland coped.

I've never "been to" a disaster before, but Eastland, her neighbors, the imported experts-the way the situation has been handled may go down as a classic example of how to react in an emergency.


The definition of disability under the suplemental security income (SSI) program is generally the same as under the Social Security disability program-that is, a physical or mental impairment that prevents a person from doing any substantial work and that is expected to last at least 12 months or to result in death. The definition applies to individuals 18 or older.

A disabled child under 18 may also be eligible for SSI monthly payments if his or her disability is as severe as one that would prevent an adult from working and if it is expected to last at least 12 months or result in death. A retarded adult or a retarded child may also be considered disabled under the law.

Regardless of age, a person may be eligible for SSI benefits if his or her vision is 20/200 or less or if his or her visual field is limited to 20 degrees or less with the best | corrective lenses. Even if a person's visual impairment is not considered serious enough to fall within the





Beware Of What You Put In Your Automobile Gasoline Tank

AUSTIN, Texas-"Gasoline at many pumps contain alcohol that can cause rough driving and damage in some cars," a leading newspaper recently reported. The article went on to point out that motorists do not know when they are buying an alcohol blend. nor how much of the additive their fuel contains.

The Texas Legislature may solve this consumer problem. Currently under consideration is House Bill 1717 by Representative Jim Horn of Denton. The bill would require stations selling alcohol blends to notify consumers with signs on pumps.

> While the labelling issue is attracting considerable consumer interest, other issues involving "gasohol" are being studied by the Texas State Legislature. One of the

most important involves the state subsidy provided to fuels blended with alcohol. Currently, fuel that contains 10 percent ethyl alcohol is eligible for a five cents exemption from the 10 cents state motor fuel tax.

Petroleum marketers and others in Texas are opposed to the current exemption and have urged the legislators to end this subsidy. The gasohol exemption was originally approved in Texas to encourage the use of Texas agricultural products being used to produce alcohol that could be blended with gasoline. "While the intent of the

legislature was to benefit Texas farmers, more than 95 percent of the alcohol sold in motor fuels in Texas is produced out-of-state," reports Jerdy Gary, president of the Texas Oil Marketers Association. TOMA represents more than 750 companies that supply petroleum products to more than 10,000 Texas service

"This means that out-ofstate concerns are being subsidized by the state of Texas," Gary points out.

Several bills have been introduced in the State Legislature to correct this inequity. One of the bills, HB 1627 by Representative Horn, has already received the approval of the House of Representatives Energy Committee.

The bill would continue the five cents motor fuel tax exemption for alcohol produced in Texas from Texas grown products, but it would end the subsidy for out-of-state fuel.

"This would provide the financial incentive for alcohol plants to process Texas agricultural products, without being an excessive drain on state tax revenues," Gary maintains.

Currently, state law allows motor fuel tax exemptions of up to \$2,750,000 each calendar quarter or in excess of \$10 million annually.

"The revenue the state

the subsidy for out-of-state alcohol would help to alleviate taxes in other areas," Gary says. "Both the labelling bill (HB 1717) and the exemption bill (HB 1627) would be extremely beneficial to consumers," says Gary.

Consumers who agree that service station pumps must indicate if alcohol is being sold should contact their State Representative and Senator and urge passage of HB 1717 by Representative lim Horn. Those who favor an end to the tax subsidies for out-of-state alcohol should support HB

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

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



The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission issues this seasonal safety alert to warn consumers of the risk of disembowlment to children associated with broken grates or missing drain grates on inground wading pools.

The Commission is aware of at least eight tragic incidents involving children who sat on drain holes and were trapped. In some incidents, the children's intestines were sucked from their bodies.

A 4-year old boy suffered permanent injury when he lost 75-80% of his small intestine and his appendix while sitting

on a drain hole at a private community wading pool. The grate (cover) to the drain hole had been broken and removed from the pool the day before the accident. In a similar incident a 4-year old girl was trapped over a drain hole and was released from the drain suction only after the wading pool's pump was turned off. Examination revealed that the child's intestines had been sucked from her body.

The Comission has investigated these and similar incidents, and has also alerted state and local governments regarding this hazard. The Commission has discussed the potential

gated has a pump that draws the water from the base of the wading pool through the drain hole to the filtering system and then returns the water to the pool. Children are attracted to the hole itself and the sucking action of the drain.

The Commission urges parents to closely supervise children using wading pools and not allow them to play with drain holes or covers. The Commission and NSPI urges pool owners, managers and lifeguards to follow a list of precautions issued by the National Spa and Pool Institute as part of the organization's industry standard:

Jiminez's Family Prayers Answered Near The Blast

"It's a miracle!" That's the way Everisto Jimenez describes the survival of his mother, Micaela Jimenez, his four-year-old daughter Victoria, and 20 mo. old Heather Marie Chapman, daughter of the Kenneth Chapmans. The little girls and his mother were all at the Jimenez home at 412 North Bassett during the explosion Friday - just about 50 yds. away from the blast.

"The house was so hot I thought it would burst into fire," she says. "I knew we must get away from there!" She started walking out-

The road he took ended across the riverbed from the house. He could see trees and grass on fire, and his mother and the children weaving through the heat toward him. "At first I thought my mother was crying," he says. "But she was not doing that at all - she was asking the Lord to save them.



'No Way To Describe Extent Of Potential Danger'

There is probably no way to describe the extent of the potential danger that existed for some ten hours for Eastland as the result of the train-truck crash and resulting explosion, fire and leaking chemicals Friday.

That's the opinion of Sheriff Don Underwood and Police Chief Lyndell Underwood who both emphasized that the hazard was greater than can possibly be imagin-

"Had the tank car of hydrofluoric acid been exploded by LPG explosion," they said, "it would have completely wiped out an area of at least two miles in diameter.

Several were burned and injured, but it was a miracle that no one was killed from

Clean-up of the area has been continuous and Monday, the Memorial Day found most of Eastland closed, and thankful that the event had not been more

Swift, complete cooperation between the emergency personnel and the general public is credited with confining the damage and threat of injury and fatalities.

When the truck and train collided, one of three LPG tankers in a row, exploded and went "airborne", landing eventually in the yard of the Ben Sancillio family. The railroad conductor had provided a manifest for the train which showed the makeup of the cars and their contents. The lawmen were advised that water should not be played on the fires because

of the danger of further contamination and lifethreatening conditions.


