#### **Christian Scientists Present Lecturer**

In his lecture here Easter Sunday, March 30, 1986, Mr. John Tyler, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will discuss what he calls "one of the central messages of Jesus' teachings and of Christian Science: that man is not what the physical senses tell him he is, despite the persistence of their message."

The title of the lecture is Spiritual Discovered," and Tyler emphasizes that "Jesus recognized the great need to lead human thought back to the recognition of man's true and original identity, back to

our native freedom and spirituality - our unity with God...In fact, Tyler points out, "everything Jesus knew about man came from his understanding of God."

Mr. Tyler, a former university professor, will be speaking here as a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. He has been a public practitioner of Christian Science for a number of years and cites a variety of healing experiences during his lecture. He is also an authorized teacher of Christian Science. The lecturer describes Christian Science healing as

'not mysterious, nor supernature" but an opportunity "for man to learn about God as...his literal Father, his only creator and cause."

Christian Science, he points out, is a revival of "the method of healing which Jesus taught his disciples," and which is again available to anyone interested in learning more about the spiritual values of primitive Christianity. The lecture is sponsored

by Christian Science Society of Eastland and will begin at 3:00 p.m. on March 30, 1986, at the church, on the corner of Lamar and Plummer Streets in Eastland.

The lecture is open to the public and free of charge.

By Lela Latch Lloyd. District Attorney Emory Walton, Eastland, told the Cisco AARP members on March 21, "You are the prime target of shysters, smooth talkers, and fraudulent operators."

"Tonight I want to tell you the four most fertile areas in which you are bilked and share some ways in which you can help to stop them."

"The four general areas in which the greatest number of these fraudulent crimes are committed are: insurance, termite or insect control, roof repairs, and foundation replacement," the D.A. warned.

Attorney Walton cited that there are many other scams but the most unique one he had heard personally was a call from a salesman who offered him "An autographed photograph of Jesus Christ."

After citing cases in Eastland County in which all these types of crimes had been used against local people, Judge Walton said, 'You are not defenseless against these shysters. Try any or all of these tactics by asking yourself these ques-

1. What can this person do for me that I can't get done by a local citizen?

2. Check with police,

3. Don't let him in your house

4. Remember, the more

"Remember," he cautioned, "If you let such a person in your house and do not buy from him, you still may be his victim. He may have spotted a TV or an appliance that he can steal from you. Bill Beaver announced that the Defensive Driving course, entitled "Fifty Five and Alive" course will be offered in Cisco the first Tuesday and Thursday of the first week of April. The class will meet for 4 hours each morning of April 1 and April 3. Fee for the course which is required every 3 years is \$7.00 for AARP members and that gives a reduction on car insurance for 3 years. 





### **County Commissioners**

### Meeting Report...

Jail Standards Discussed...

The Eastland County Commissioners met Monday, March 24 in a regular session. All Commissioners were present - Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Bill Riddell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk Joann Johnson recorded minutes.

One of the main topics of the meeting concerned jail management and how to meet the requirements set by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

Sheriff Don Underwood told of his efforts along that line, and the difficulties in meeting requirements on segregation according to classification of the crime committed, and with the requirement that a bunk be provided to each person held longer than 72 hours.

The Sheriff stated that during the past several months the jail population has averaged around 30 per day. He said that this time he has around 200 warrants on revocation of probation, most of whom would have to serve some county time.

"We have no place to put them," he said. "If we emptied the jail tomorrow, we could fill it up by tomorrow night.

He requested a line-item change in the Department budget to enable a Jail Matron to be present when all female prisoners are booked into the jail.

Commissioners approved a change in the Budget of \$50 per month from funds budgeted for temporary help.

This will be paid to Matron Betty Webb, who will be on 24 hr. call. This will bring the Jail into compliance in this

The Sheriff reported that other than the segregation and crowding, other areas of the jail standards once reported not in compliance had either been changed or would be corrected shortly

As the Sheriff ended his discussion Emma Morris, County Auditor, brought various bills before the Commissioners. She asked for guidelines on several points, whether Reserve Deputies had the authority to charge bills to the county, and

whether the county should be responsible for repair costs of a privately-owned computer at the jail.

On the matter of Reserve Deputies, Sheriff Underwood said that inside the County Reserve Deputies always worked with another Deputy, but that he did send them outside the county to pick up prisoners. In this they incurred expenses.

Commissioners indicated that Reserve Deputies should restrict credit card purchases to gas, oil and emergency expenses incurred while fulfilling duties.

They agred to pay the repair charge of \$144.95 for the computer in the jail, which is reported to be used for record keeping for the

In other business, repairs to the County barn (Pct. 2) located in Ranger were approved. This will total \$1,350. May 12 was set as the date

for a public hearing on the

Revenue Sharing Budget. Several pipeline crossings were approved, including a request by Staff Water Supply to cross County Rd. 237 in Pct. 2 with a water line. This

was brought by C.N. Adams. North Ridge Corp. was granted permission for three pipeline crossings, one in Pct. 1 northwest of Eastland, and the others in Pct. 2.

#### Letter Received...

During th Commissioner's Court meeting Monday, Mar. 24 Judge Scott Bailey discussed a letter he had received from the Adult Probation Commission in Austin. Duplicate letters had been sent to District Judges, County Executives, and Chief Probation officers.






