## The Role Of Christ A Calling And Mission

All the roles of the Kendrick Pageant on the Life of Christ have special requirements. But undoubtedly the most demanding is the portrayal of Jesus Christ - the central figure of the drama.

Kent Bridges, age 24, will play the part again at 3:30 this Sunday morning at the Amphitheater, just as he has for the past five years.

Actually the Gorman native has portrayed Christ for about 17 years, since he first came to the Pageant with his parents, George and Jimmie Bridges. He began with the part of Christ as a small boy in the carpenter shop, and later played Christ at age 12 in the Temple in Jerusalem.

The Bridges family lives in the New Hope Community, about two miles west of Gorman. Kent, like his parents, is a member of the New Hope Baptist Church.

"Mom" Kendricks also has the important work of making costumes. In the Life of Christ there is 63 scenes and 35 actors, so this is quite an undertaking.

The costume Kent Bridges wears for the role of Christ is a simple white robe with a brown cassock. He wears a brown wig and beard and brown leather sandals - the only part of the clothing that hasn't changed much since Biblical times.

In the crucifixion scene Kent, like the "two thieves" on the crosses beside him, wears no clothing above the waist. This can cause him to get a bit cold at times, with the unpredictable weather at Easter. The lowest temperature Kent ever remembers during an Easter Pageant was 23 degrees. Things are looking much better this Sunday!

Probably Kent's role in the Pageants has even had some influence in his choice of a profession. He studied Vocational Nursing at Cisco Junior College, graduating in 1983 with an L.V.N. Degree.

He is now employed as a nurse at Ranger General Hospital. Helping people who are ill is a calling, he says, requiring some of the same dedication as religion.

He certainly has a sense of dedication and mission and, as he fills the role of Christ in the various Pageants.

"I personally feel that I cannot ever live the life that Christ lived," Kent Bridges says. "But if by portraying the part I can make even one lost person feel the agony that Christ went through to die upon the cross for our sins - maybe he will accept Christ."

A slender young man with finely chisled features, Kent Bridges fills the role of Christ with a sincere and reverent manner. He says that the part he has played at Kendricks has had quite an influence upon his life.

For one thing, he puts a lot of time in on it. There are a number of rehearsals for the Christmas and Easter Pageants, and a number of portrayals during the summer season.

Another thing is that he has just about memorized the portion of the King James Bible used in the almost-three-hour dramatization. Pierre Kendrick narrates the Pageant, with the actors silently moving about the stage. Phil Kendrick takes care of lighting and direction, and Mrs. M.D. (Mom) Kendrick plays background music on the organ.

## Large Crowd Expected At Easter Pageant Sunday

A large crowd was expected for the 22nd annual non-denominational production of "The Life of Christ" as an Easter pageant at the Kendrick Amphitheater at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, March 30, midway between Cisco and Eastland on Highway 80.

Many thousands of people from throughout the region and state have attended the event each year. The pageant has 63 scenes that are presented on a 365-foot stage in the Amphitheater. There is a 20-acre parking lot

to accommodate the crowd.

The play begins with scenes several months before the birth of Christ and follows his life through the Resurrection, ending around 5:30 a.m. when day breaks gently over the region.

Live animals, including Curley the camel and Cricket the donkey, are used in the cast as props for the Wise Men, the shepherds and for Jesus in his travels. Some 35 persons appear in the pageant, including Kent Bridges of Gorman who

plays the part of Jesus, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Bridges, also of Gorman.

Phil (Shorty) Kendrick is the long-time director of the pageant, and Mrs. J.H. (Mom) Kendrick is the organist as she has been since the beginning of the annual event. Narrator will be Pierre Kendrick.

The Religious Diorama at the Amphitheater will be open during the Saturday night program and visitors will be conducted through

hourly until 1 a.m.

Good weather conditions were forecast for the weekend.

"The Life of Christ" is also presented every Thursday and Friday evening between June 15 and August 15 every

year. That performance has an admission charge of \$3. The Easter pageant is presented with charge, though a free-will offering will be accepted.

The public has been invited to attend.

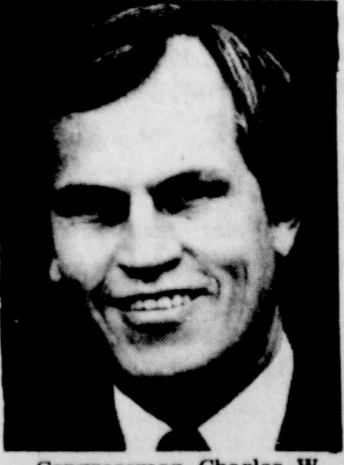


The Cross

### Policy For Eastside Ball Park Set

The following policy regarding the use of the Eastside Park Softball Field was approved by the City Council on March 25, 1986, and is effective immediately:

1. The softball field is open to the general public for their use and enjoyment.

2. The softball field may be reserved through City Hall for a specific length of time for league or tournament play. The field can be reserved only for after 5:00 P.M. on weekdays and for weekends. Reservations shall be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

3. The concession stand and restrooms will be available at no cost to persons who reserve the field. However, a \$50.00 DEPOSIT will be required for the use of the concession stand and restrooms to insure maintenance of the facilities. After inspection and approval by City personnel, the deposit will be returned. If the facilities are damaged during the time period they are reserved, the person or organization reserving the field shall be responsible and repairs of the damages shall be paid for out of the deposit.

4. Anyone wishing to utilize the field lights may do so by contacting City Hall prior to 5:00 P.M. on normal work days and obtaining a key to the light switch boxes. The fee for using the field lights shall be \$20.00 per day, along with a \$25.00 key deposit. Both must be paid prior to receiving the lighting key. Michael D. Moore City Manager

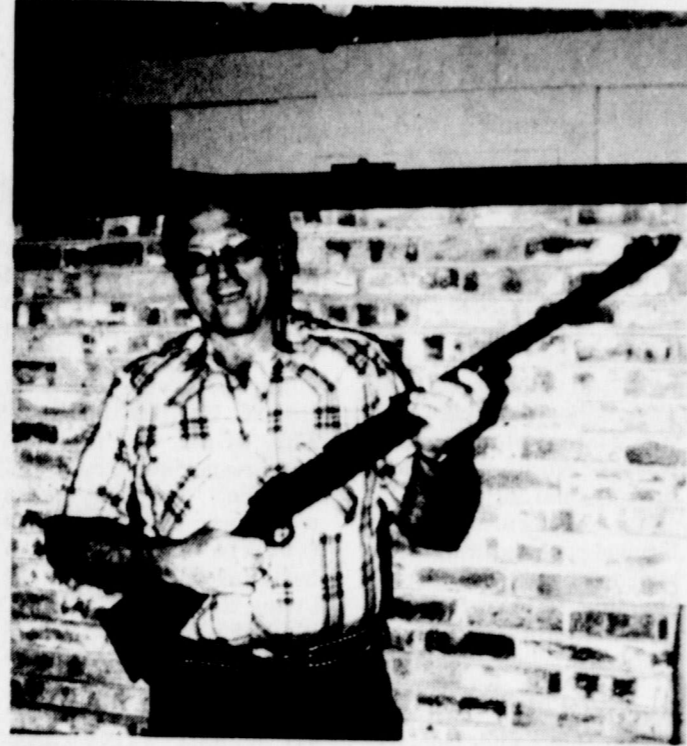
Mr. Conner, whose West Texas CofC organization

## Dr. Danny Wheat To Open Office At Hospital

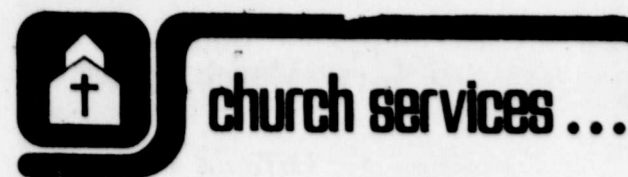

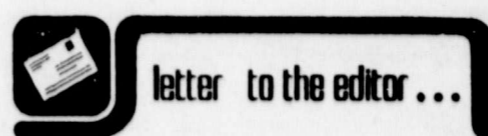
Dr. Wheat's surgery training was at a Texas Veterans Administration hospital. He will have offices in Stephenville and Cisco and currently lives at Granbury.

Why is Easter Sunday on March 30 this year?

"Because" is probably as good an answer as possible, and it's a good place to stop unless you want to join me in an egg hunt.

Most of us are probably familiar enough with the formula that sets Easter as the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox to recognize it as "right."

The spring equinox usually is on March 21, but it was March 20 this year. The first full moon was March 25, so Easter Sunday is March 30.

So that's all right and tight.

No? No, not for everybody.

More than half the time there are two Easter celebrations, and this year they are more than a month apart: March 30 and May 4.

Churches that have their roots in Rome are observing March 30, and Eastern Orthodox Churches will celebrate May 4.

This is not saying that all churches observing 3/30 are Roman Catholic. When Martin Luther led the Protestant split from Catholicism, he did not throw out the baby (faith) with the bath water (malpractices). Neither did Henry VIII when he rearranged the religious practices of England to suit his not-too-private desires.

As it happens, the death and resurrection of Jesus can be pinpointed; his birthday, no.

Jesus, who was a Jew, remember, was crucified on the fourteenth day of Nisan on the Jewish calendar. He arose three days later.

It is not simply a matter of transferring Nisan 14 from the Jewish calendar to the Christian.

The Jewish year is based on the cycle of the moon and has only 354 days. To make that cycle come out even with the seasons, a leap month is added seven out of nineteen years. If I understand that, and no way will I say I'm positive, that extra month (Adar II) doesn't have to be added in the same year of the 19-year cycle each time. When it is added, it follows Nisan, the month of Passover.

So, we have a definite date on the Jewish calendar which varies according to the moon. (Definite?)

We want to transfer this date to the Christian calendar which is based on the sun's cycle of 365 days and which adds a day every four years.

It is not enough that lunar and solar cycles do not coincide. Incidentally, it may be of interest to know the lunar calculations are Babylonian and the solar are Egyptian, both antedating Christianity.

The gain of the days in the solar calendar (Julian) was adjusted in 1582 by Pope Gregory XIII by omitting ten days from the present "Gregorian" calendar of the western world. The Eastern Orthodox Christians stuck to the Julian calendar adopted in 46 B.C.

Why not observe Easter according to the Jewish calendar? Jesus was crucified at Passover, and Passover is based on the full moon. As the first Christians were born Jews, many of them did want to stay with the familiar, Hebraic tradition or calendar.

The Christians wanted a Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday, observing Good Friday, and ending with Easter Sunday, the Resurrection. As Passover falls on any day of the week, figuring from it would not fulfill Christian desires.

Constantine the Great called the Council of Nicea in 325 AD, and it devised our presently used formula. But who was to decide when the moon was full?

This matter was referred to Alexandria, the site of authority in matters astronomical. These calculations are now based on the works of the U.S. Naval Observatory and the Royal Greenwich Observatory which jointly published "Astronomical Phenomena."

How scientific this may be doubted as, "The data printed there are derived from centuries of church debate and traditions..."

However, neither Martin Luther nor Henry VIII can be held responsible for Protestant and Catholic churches celebrating the same Easter date. That goes back to 664 AD when Oswy (Oswiu), king of Mercia, summoned the Synod of Whitby and announced they'd go along with the Roman calendar.

There is, and has been for centuries, movement for a fixed Easter. It hardly seems a fixed date for Easter would be any more reprehensible than a fixed date for Christmas. Observance of the occasion should be more important than the date on a calendar.

So March 30, whatever calendar we use, we recognize the pagan rites of the vernal equinox, the Hebrew Passover, and the Christian Resurrection, and each one is a celebration of Life.

Please let me share with you a short tribute to my beloved brother and your friend, the late John Delano Taylor. Or perhaps he was your cousin, or your dad, or (?). Although separated by many miles, J.D. and I were very close. I always knew I was his favorite sister (being the only one) Ha!

Many of you also knew our beloved parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John Henry Taylor, long time residents of Cisco, and various parts of Eastland County. Going farther back, our grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Wilson (Hugh and Ophelia) and Mr. and Mrs. William Dolphard Taylor, all of them having their roots in your part of Texas. These two large families have been closely associated for many generations. Our mother's brother married our dad's sister, the late Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Wilson. Their oldest son, Monroe, and his wife, Mattie, still reside in Cisco. The descendants of all these Taylor and Wilson families number in the hundreds, and a large percentage of them live in Eastland County. There have been several school teachers, ministers, businessmen, farmers, and etc., all good reliable citizens, as far as I know. (Don't think there was a "horse thief" in the bunch!)

Back to the central purpose of this letter, now, J.D. was not only the founder of THE TAYLOR CENTERS in

Cisco and Eastland, and a highly respected business man, but he was also a friend to all, especially to the under-privileged. He and his wife, Gladys and their children, lived in their HOUSE BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD, and everyone knew, (especially youth and children) that they were welcome there. J.D.'s favorite motto, on a beautiful wall plaque in the Living Room, was: CHRIST IS THE HEAD OF THIS HOUSE, THE UNSEEN HOST AT EVERY MEAL, THE SILENT LISTENER TO EVERY CONVERSATION.

Also, I would like to add my simple, four line tribute, which came to me, in the wee hours of the morning, the day of the funeral:

J.D. WAS A MAN OF FEW WORDS,

BUT HIS LIFE RANG TRUE;

FROM HIS MANSION IN HEAVEN

HE'LL BE WATCHING FOR YOU!

Shall we all meet him there? From Northeast Oklahoma, I send my love to all our DEAR ONES—both relatives and friends. Please write to me.

## City Council Receives Request To Close Street During Festival

A request to close East 5th Street between the 100 and 200 blocks during the April 25-27 Cisco Folklife Festival was approved at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

In other action, the Council considered policies regulating the use of the softball field on East 14th Street and the City Park baseball field and studied the College Hill water reservoir cover problem. The monthly financial report was read and approved.

The Folklife Festival will be held in the old Rockwell Lumber Yard on East 5th Street and closing of the street will benefit the crowds attending the event, Mrs. Jo Ann Cernin of the Civic League festival committee told the Council in a letter.

The two blocks were closed by Council order last year.

City bookkeeper Maryann Perry, showed that tax collections for the current fiscal year amounted to \$248,911 or 94 per cent of the budget estimate. February sales tax collections amounted to \$25,955 and franchise taxes were \$12,612. Oil and gas royalties for February were \$4,447 to bring the year's total of \$31,744.

General Fund expenditures during February were \$59,183 to bring the year's total to \$337,331. Water Department sales amounted to \$33,966 plus \$10,182 in sewer fees. Expenses included \$33,929 for the water department plus \$47,958 for the waste water department.

Mayor Eris Ritchie presided at the meeting and Councilmen Linton Baateas, Joe Besselaar and Bobby Ingram were present along with City Manager Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson. Also present were Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wheatley, Allen Masters, Bobby Rains and Dick Wages.

The ABC Club had requested a lease on the City Park baseball facility for the coming spring and summer months and President Bobby Rains was present to discuss plans for the field. City Manager Mike Moore reported that the park lights cost about \$10 per hour. Details of an agreement were to be studied, the Council was told.

Mr. Moore reported that the new softball park will be open to the public and would be reserved for league play after 5 p.m. on week days. Those who use the property for tournaments and weekend play will be asked to obtain a key for the lights at City Hall and to pay \$20 per night. A \$50 deposit will be required to use the concession stand and rest rooms, and a \$25 key deposit will be required, Mr. Moore said.

The Council delayed action on the water reservoir cover problem. A new cover could cost up to \$250,000. Before any action is taken, the Council decided to call in experts to determine the feasibility of repairing the present cover.

"We want to know the most cost effective plan for the cover problem," Mr. Moore reported. He noted that state regulations require a reservoir cover.

A resolution to authorize the mayor to execute a contract with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation to participate in the state's litter reduction campaign was tabled for further study.

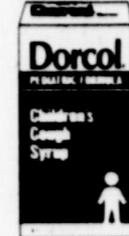

### Yogurt Coated Snacks Are Candy

COLLEGE STATION--Consumers may be buying yogurt coated raisins and nuts under the misimpression that they are "health" snacks, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) specialist.

Nutritionist Marilyn Haggard says the yogurt coating used in these snacks usually has sugar as its major ingredient. The other ingredients include partially hydrogenated vegetable oil, which may contain saturated coconut or palm oil, non-fat milk solids, non-fat yogurt solids, whey and artificial color and flavor.

She says that many people believe that they'll get the benefit of yogurt's protein, calcium and riboflavin from these snack foods.

But a .9 ounce serving of yogurt raisins provides only

2 percent of the recommended dietary allowance (RDA) for calcium, less than 2 percent of the RDA for riboflavin, and one gram of protein.

These products should be

considered in the same category as candy-coated nuts or raisins, says Haggard.

For a real high-nutrition snack, the TAEX nutritionist recommends putting some

raisins in a cup of plain yogurt and adding a non-nutritive sweetener to taste.

TO GO to Big Bend from here one could enter the park from Marathon, Alpine or further west, Marfa. We chose the Alpine (central) entry and think we made a wise decision. Driving time to Alpine is about six hours and it's a pretty drive in after you've passed San Angelo, Big Lake, Rankin, McCamey and Ft. Stockton. You'll drive on I-10 a ways, and we hit Alpine right at dusk - a pretty entry.

The county seat of the state's largest county (Brewster) Alpine boasts some 6,500 people at an elevation of 4,481 feet, and the home of Sul Ross State University. If you did Marfa, you'd also hit Presidio and drive back east to Big Bend along the Rio Grande.

Headquartered at Alpine, it's easy to do Fort Davis and its attractions. We went first to the Ft. Davis State Park and as you know, Texas parks are like Texas highways--first class. Center-point is the white adobe Indian Lodge, a 39-room hotel originally built in 1933 by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Some walls are as much as 18 inches thick. It's an ideal resort spot - but be advised reservations as much as a year in advance are necessary to stay there. The restaurant is first class and caters to many tour buses.

McDonald Observatory, 13 miles west of the park is operated by the University of Texas, and we were

treated to a super tour, including an inside look in the giant dome, but we didn't look through any telescopes. Naturally, the Comet Halley is the central attraction for the staff and professional astronomers who utilize the equipment every dark moment. With reservations, McDonald opens the Observatory on the last Wednesday night of every month and visitors do get to look through the 107-inch telescope, one of the 12 largest in the world. It's all atop Mt. Locke and something that all Texas can be proud of. (Among the many things we learned is that you don't just peer through an eye piece; images are carried down from the dome onto the viewing screens and/or projections.) There's more atop the 6,800 foot mountain: the millimeter wave dish (which operates around the clock because it's viewing different light waves and the daytime doesn't affect the viewing; a 30-inch dome, a small but highly sophisticated instrument which has contributed much to recordings; the 82-inch dome (oldest on the hill); the 107-inch dummy mirror; the big 107 telescope; as well as scenic overlooks, where you can see forever in the clear low humidity sky. Harvard has a satellite dish in a valley recording radio signals from distance distant sky points separate from McDonald.

Coming down the hill and back toward the town of Ft. Davis we quickly did the Fort Davis National Historic site, key post in the early defense system of West Texas. From 1854 to 1891 troops based here guarded immigrants, freighters and stagecoaches on the San

Antonio-El Paso road and contended with the hostile Comanche and Apache Indians.

The fort has a fascinating history and restorations; half of the original structures have been saved. Like other national parks, it's a national treasure, and we visited just at evening retreat time. Some of the most beautiful pictures in the world have been named at this site with the sheer cliff wall in the background.

Ft. Davis, the town, is a unique and developing little town. A resident told us that the folks who are coming in to make their homes and businesses are rock solid. We talked to a family who moved from Dallas to an open and old fashioned soda fountain drug store with modern bed and breakfast facilities upstairs. There's not a lot of "staying places" but this no doubt will change as the town grows. One would guess that adequate water supply might be a problem.

There are a lot of craft shops, antique stores and restored fronts with highly interesting interiors. They're a good example of making the most of what's been there, and bringing it up to date for the visitors.

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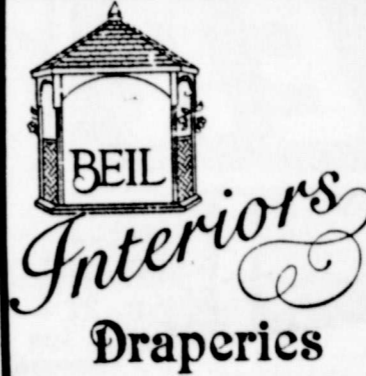

### Convention Frames State Constitution In Preparation For Statehood

It's hard to believe almost a decade has passed since we Texans declared our independence from Mexico in 1836. Now, in this summer of 1845, after so much bloody fighting to gain our independence, the other settlers and I are about to see our status as a free Republic of Texas dissolved with a swipe of the pen and the votes of a few bureaucrats. We're going to become a state.

Most other settlers in Texas seem to favor annexation to the United States of America. They say we'll get federal military protection from Mexico and the Indians. I say we've done all right on our own in those areas. But we will get U.S. postal services; that should speed things up. Maybe this will get us out from under high tariffs; the federal government collects no taxes. And finally, we'll have a currency we can all depend upon. So, maybe it is a good deal.

But we need to think hard about this. We've tried to join the Union before, but only now do they want to have anything to do with us. The word is those northern states may try to make us abolish slavery. Sarah Chapman and 3,028 other women from Boston signed a petition against annexing Texas for just that reason. They told the U.S. legislature, "The undersigned women of Boston, Massachusetts, thoroughly aware of the sinfulness of slavery, and the consequent impolicy and disastrous tendency of its extension in our country, do most respectfully remonstrate, with all our souls, against the annexation of Texas to the United States as a slave holding territory."

A Mr. Henry Clay, a statesman from Kentucky, has also spoken out against the annexation. He thinks Texas would be more of a burden than a boon to the U.S. "If the government of the U.S. were to acquire Texas," Clays said, "it would acquire along with it all the encumbrances which Texas is under, and among them the actual or suspended war between Mexico and Texas. Of that consequence

there cannot be a doubt. Annexation and war with Mexico are identical."  
But I must say it looks like the annexation will go through. The Texas Congress has agreed to accept the U.S. treaty rather than that of Mexico (who took too darn long to offer anyhow, I'd say).

The Constitutional Convention has drafted a good, solid constitution. But it took time to iron out the small points. For instance, one of the convention delegates has argued to strike out the portion of the oath that requires legislators to swear they haven't fought a duel. He insists if a man can't resort to dueling to settle a tiff, he'll resort to poisoning, waylaying his enemy by the roadside or other methods rather than be "deprived of all the sacred rights which belong to every free man." But they settled that problem.

Statehood will work out to everyone's benefit. Constitutional Convention president Thomas J. Rusk summed everything up pretty well. At

the beginning of the convention on July 4, 1845, he said, "The history of the world may be searched in vain for a parallel to the present instance of two governments amalgamating themselves into one, from a pure devotion to that great principle—that many, but enlightening his intellect and cultivating those moral sentiments with which his God has impressed him, is capable of self government. We have one grand object in view; and that is to enter the great American confederacy with becoming dignity and self respect."

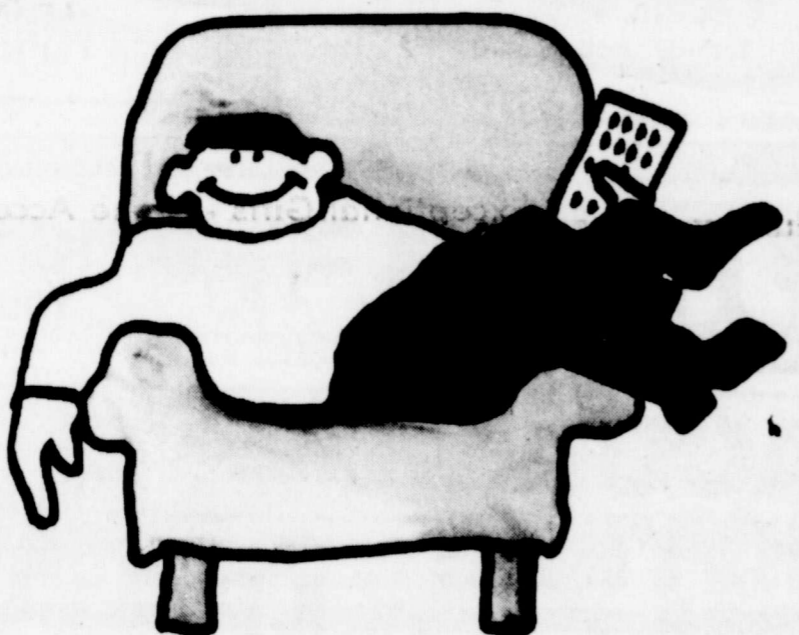

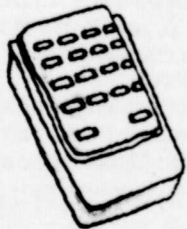

**Rotary Club Presented Talk On Epidemics**

A talk entitled "Four Epidemics of Adolescents," including venereal disease, teenage pregnancies, incest and suicide, was presented by Dr. Tim Boersma at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club last Thursday at the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. Boersma, local family practice physician, said that material for his talk was taken from a presentation by Dr. Arnold Melnick, widely known doctor and writer, at a general practice update seminar in Florida recently.

The Melnick survey showed that there are some 1,000,000 diagnosed cases of venereal disease among teenagers each year. Some 25 percent of this number is among youngsters under age 19, and over 10 percent among those of age 14, Dr. Boersma said.

Causative factors include ignorance and poor sex education, he said. Better public awareness measures are needed to combat this problem, he added.

In the nation, the survey showed that an average of 50 teenagers give birth every hour, including 80 percent of the conceptions out of wedlock, Dr. Boersma said. Thirty thousand babies delivered in 1985 from teenagers were from mothers under age 15, he added.

The Melnick survey showed that marriages between teens in the 14 to 17 age group would result in divorces for 72 percent. A large percentage of teenagers between ages 15

and 19 are sexually active, the survey showed.

"This is not a 'they' problem - it's our kids and our problem," Dr. Boersma. He said that teenage pregnancies often result in suicide or death as well as welfare problems. He noted that in 1985 teenage pregnancies cost the taxpayers \$16.6 billion dollars.

Dr. Boersma said that incest cases are usually reported after a long period of practice. Incest occurs most frequently between brother and sister and less frequently between father and daughter and rarely between mother and son, he said. Victims are usually depressed, frigid or neurotic, he added.

Suicides occur among young people from five years up, the survey showed. There are three to five thousand documented cases each year with probably a million attempts of gestures, Dr. Boersma said. Poison is most frequently used and 35 percent of teenage suicides occur in broken homes, usually without warning, he said.

Dr. Boersma was the program chairman.

Dr. Henry E. McCullough, club president, announced that next week's program would feature an address by Congressman Charles Stenholm and the presentation of outstanding citizenship and scholarship awards to young people and an essay contest winner.
