aware, only 60 percent have their condition under control. These figures show marked improvement since 1976, but officials say intense efforts are necessary to further progress, according to Dr. Cermin. 'The first step in improv-

ing rates is to educate the public," Dr. Ayres Cermin says. "When people understand what high blood pressure is and how serious its effects can be, they tend to get on treatment and bring their condition under control. We offer detection, follow-up, and counseling programs to identify the problem in those who are unaware, and to help aware hypertensives understand their condition and maintain normal lives under daily treatment," Dr. Cermin added.

May is National High Blood Pressure Month, and the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is sponsoring several free activities throughout May to focus extra public attention on high blood pressure.

The E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital urges the public to check their blood pressure regularly and maintain treatment.

Blood pressure is the force of blood pushing against the walls of the blood vessels. High blood pressure results when blood vessels become narrow, forcing the heart to pump harder to push blood through the body. High blood pressure has been cited as a major cause of stroke, heart attack, and kidney failure in Eastland County residents. Doctors do not yet know what causes high blood pressure. They do know that high sodium intake, obesity, and lack of exercise contribute to the disease. Although there is no cure, the condition can be controlled through daily treatment that includes sodium reduction, weight loss, moderate exercise to help lose weight, and daily medication.

According to Dr. Ayres Cermin, patients sometimes have trouble adhering to treatment because it requires a change in routine

that occasionally occur from medication also deter treatment maintenance. "It takes a daily, lifetime commitment that many people tend to neglect," he said. "We would like to encourage citizens of Eastland County to make a special effort to watch their diets, exercise regularly, and take their medication daily."





weekend was mentioned, in which a country road about six miles S.E. of Cisco caved in where a pipeline had been repaired a few months ago. This happened after a





FIGURES DON'T LIE! IS THAT SO?

Figures on results of the teachers' competency test keep dribbling in-though the dribbling is hardly up to that on a basketball court. The subject is like a kid with a scab-just has to be

picked at until it is raw and bleeding again. Instead of the predicted ten percent of teachers fail-

ing, only 3.3 percent came out below C-level.

Reports say 96.7 percent passed, but they do not give you the 3.3 percent figure for failure. Nope. "There were 6,579 teachers who failed the test," says the Associated Press report that is tucked away between "Death Notices" and an ad for ceiling fans.

No total number of those taking the test is given. If you want the total, divide 6.579 by 3.3 and multiply by a hundred. At least, that's according to the math I learned by competency tests inflicted upon me by Teacher Mattabel Downing in Moran Grammar School (I never got to go to an "elementary" school) and Papa C.C. Ballard at home.



People living in areas subject to frequent tornadoes should prepare some type of tornado shelter. A rootcellar makes an excellent tornado shelter and requires very little modification. Locate the tornado shelter near the residence but not so close that falling walls or debris could block the entrance. If there is a bank or rise in the ground nearby, a cellar might be dug into it to take advantage of the extra protection the bank or rise might provide.

The tornado shelter should not be connected to the house drain, cess pool, sewer, or gas pipes. Upon entering the shelter, leave the surface door open. The inside shelter door should be hinged to open inward so it will open even when debris blocks the entrance. The shelter need not be large but it should be large enough to provide storage for a lantern, shovel, pick, crow-bar, and other tools that might be needed for rescue work or to clear debris from the shelter en-

Next across a rather dry stretch of pastureland, populated with thousands of sheep, we headed for Burbong, a "sheep station", run by Ray and Reuben, who were very cordial hosts, Ray even kissing all the girls goodbye. 




