Webb's Inc. sustained the total loss of the White Auto store building in downtown Cisco. The building was used as a

warehouse. The Dixon Auto Supply was destroyed as a result of that same fire. The day before, the Red Front Mini Mall was heavily damaged by fire. There were two offices located in that building, The Calco Oil Co. and Ann Williams office of Pat Maynard Realty.

On Friday morning, June 20, the Frank Wilcoxen home just north of Cisco, was totally destroyed by fire. No one was home at the time.





Brides Need New Social

Security Card

New brides, along with anyone else who has had a recent name change, should contact the Abilene Social Security office to arrange to have their names changed on Social Security records and to apply for a new Social Security card showing the name, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Unless the bride plans to use her maiden name after marriage, the record should be changed so that earnings are correctly reported.

To apply for a new Social Security card, which will show the person's new name, number, a person needs evidence showing both the old and new names. For brides, the original or certified copy of the marriage license is the best evidence. If the bride is foreign born, she also needs evidence of U.S. citizenship or current alien status. This service is free; Social Security does not make any charge.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency are acceptable. Uncertified photocopies are not accep-

It takes about 2 weeks after acceptable evidence is submitted for the new Social Security card to be issued.



Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

Recent United States Department of Agriculture research shows that the acidity level of fresh tomatoes drops after canning. A little lemon juice may make the difference between safe home canned tomatoes and those that can cause food poisoning.

This can compromise the safety of home canned tomatoes, especially if they are overripe when canned or if the lower-acid varieties are used.

The acidity of food is ranked on a pH scale. Foods that have a pH below 4.6 are acid enough to prevent the production of botulin toxin if heated in a water bath canner. The botulin toxin can cause a person to become ill with botulism, a serious form of food poisoning.

Foods with a pH above 4.6, such as vegetables and meats, must be canned under pressure to reach a temperature of at least 240 degrees to destroy the botulism organism.

MILD SUGGESTIONS that professional payrollhunters be utilized in the unending effort to bring small factories and jobs to

Eastland County have pretty much fallen on deaf ears. Well, maybe not deaf, but maybe more conservative

There are of course any number of full-time, for-hire organizations who do nothing but work (presumably) with companies who are planning moves, and try to get them to move to areas which are customers of the organization. There are fees, of course, and they usually

aren't cheap.

These professionals depend to a large measure on local help in putting together extra-slick, top quality sales brochures about the area which engages it, and then uses these brochures as sales tools with the various contacts the company has to show the advantages of Area A over Area B (assuming that Area A has hired it to do

There are a lot of people in each of our towns in this county who are most capable in assembling data and presenting it in a commendable manner, so the question comes up, why should we pay an outsider to do our

It's a good question and we don't pretend to have an answer. Sure, we could colfectively spend a lot of money and even then might come up with a blank.

And certainly the competition is stiff: in these soft economy times, every village and hamlet is looking for more payrolls to put people to work.

A major firm made a presentation in this county in recent times and their rate was expensive, but their track record looked good. They have since touched back with an inquiry for information for what appeared to be a prospect in this area. No report vet.

In an earlier column under this head we recommended a broadscale letter writing effort on the part of our citizens. These could turn up the raw ore we need.

One advantage of this type effort: these people claim to have computer-matching facilities which will link up assets of an area with those being sought by Planning-to-Move Big Company, and that way, it's a tailor-made ef-

One of the big pluses would have to be that these companies have contacts: they are doing business with companies who trust them and they obviously know what's going on. (Although we'd guess that right now with the national soft economy, that there's probably fewer companies nationwide who are looking for expansion and relocation plans.) However the company that contacted us has extensive foreign contacts who are looking to

come to the States. And contact is one thing that we local folks don't have a lot of. Our utility companies have excellent industrial expansion departments and they have and or doing a good job of helping the communities they serve - but they often serve a vast area, which makes our individual chances diminish-

So what's the answer?

Area pork producers have the opportunity to participate in a U.S. Department of Agriculture sponsored state wide election, July 7-11, to help select individuals for appointment to an industry-wide body that will administer a promotion, research and consumer information order for pork.

DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent, said all pork producers in Eastland County are encouraged to vote in the elections. Candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each State will be eligible for appointment by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the State's allotted positions on the National Pork Producers Delegate Body

The Delegate Body, consisting of approximately 165 producers, including two or more members representing each of the 50 states and four importers, will be responsible for administering all aspects of the pork order.

Gordon said that voting in Eastland County will take place at the Extension Office, in the basement of the county courthouse. The office will be open for voting each day from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. except for the lunch hour from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m. Pork producers can vote in any county in their home state after signing a voter registration list certifying that they are pork producers in that state.

Pork producers are urged to vote in person at the County Extension Office. If this is not possible, an absentee voting packet containing a ballot and registration form may be obtained from Jim Epstein, National Pork Producers Election, P.O. Box 23762, Washington, D.C. 20026-3762; telephone (202) 475-5407. Absentee ballots must be postmarked by July 11, and received at the above address no later than July

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



MARLOW, Okla.-For the first time in more than 60 years, we attended a reunion of relatives in this Stephens County, Oklahoma, town the other day. It was a gathering of second cousins-descendents of two pioneer Oklahoma sisters, our grandmother and her older

There were perhaps 100 people at the reunion. Our family and the family of Grandmother's sister lived perhaps four miles apart some five miles southwest of Marlow. We visited mostly on Sunday afternoons and holidays, making the trip to each other's homes by horse and buggy.

THIS WRITER was a lad of perhaps eight years of age when he climbed into a covered wagon loaded with the family's household goods. The lad's father said "giddyup" and the team of mules headed toward the Texas Panhandle. Others of the family were to follow by train, which they did a month or so later.

Over the years, we didn't see but one of the second cousins. He was in graduate school at the UofT when we went there as a freshman.

DRIVING AROUND Marlow, we began thinking of things we could remember as a child. These included standing near a buggy at the second cousin's house and have a wheel run over a bare foot, making several toes

We recalled a day in town when we saw an Indian on the paved sidewalk in front of a bank, lying in his own blood-dead. A new yellow pencil with rubber eraser was also in the blood ... A jewelry store on main street where the watchmaker kept a big bottle of the best jaw-breakers tasting (candy) ... A few years later, we moved to town and started to school and immediately came down with smallpox! And our house was quarantined. The sheriff came to the house, knocked, and talked for a time. Starting to leave, he said, apologetically, "I guess I'd better leave this." And it was a yellow quarantine flag that he nailed to a post on the

THE FIRST TIME we ever heard a voice on the telephone was out in the country near Marlow. Men of the community arranged for a telephone line to be strung down a road that

homes, including our family's. The telephones were put in the homes and the line was being built. At noon one day, the line was near our house and our dad finished lunch and tied a line from our phone to a barbed wire fence to which the telephone line down the road was attached to await completion of the

After running the line to the fence, the telephone crank was turned and this caused the neighbor's phone to ring. The first conversation over the telephone began. And the children were permitted to listen and hear their first magic words from the black box.

OUR FIRST RIDE in an automobile took place near Marlow. Our family obtained a Model T Ford on a Saturday and next day we all piled in and rode to the second cousin's home. It was sensational ... The old Ford was pretty bouncy on the dirt country roads and almost useless when it rained ... It required hand cranking to start the motor ... In wet weather, the coils under the dash that provided the spark It was before the days of batteries.) would refuse to work if they got wet or damp. The remedy was to place them in a pan in the oven to dry out for a time.

THE LAST TIME the second cousins were together occurred when the families drove in wagons to a creek near Rush Spring for a day's outing. The men folks, including small boys, seined a creek for fish that were fried in a huge pot of boiling hog lard. It was memorable for small boys.

Doubtless, the gathering the other day will be the last time for many of the second cousins as some are in their late 70s and early 80s and one is age 90. And it was with a somewhat heavy but appreciative heart that we left soon after lunch for our date in Idaho.

WE REACHED Memphis in Hall County before dark and spent the night in a trailer park in the edge of the city in which we grew up. Across the road in a pasture was the place where we went for a first airplane ride-in a

Ford Tri-Motored tin goose . It was near the football field where we received a few lumps and bruises and learned a few of life's basic lessons ... We turned through a telephone directory passed near five or six without spotting a name that

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
