Jack Martin, who served as vice principal of Hargrave High School in the Houston area for the past three years, was hired as new high school principal by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at a called meeting last Monday night.

He will assume his new job here Friday, Aug. 1.

Martin is a graduate of West Texas State University at Canyon, earning both his bachelor's and his master's degrees there.

His experience includes being a teacher at Sunray, elementary principal at Lakeview and Lorenzo, and middle school principal in Anson from 1981 to 1983.

While in Anson, Martin was active in civic affairs,

serving on the board of the Chamber of Commerce and the board of the Anson City Library.

He will be moving to Cisco with his wife, Carol; and their daughter, Danielle, 12. He is active in the Methodist Church, and plays the violin and piano.

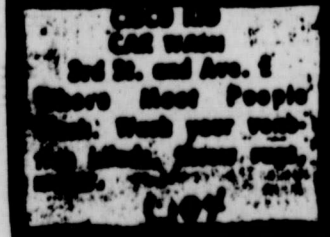

Rita Clements, wife of Republican Gubernatorial Candidate Bill Clements, will be the guest at a reception to be held at the Chamber of Commerce, 102 South Seaman in Eastland from 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 30, 1986.

Suspect Indicted By Grand Jury; Two Others Charged

Jim Bob Cozart of Cisco has been indicted for arson by the 91st District Grand Jury in connection with the fires on June 12 that destroyed Webb's Inc. and Dixon Auto Supply.

He was arrested by Cisco Police Detective Risa Livingston and Sgt. Larry Jernigan as he allegedly ran from the scene of the fire.

Cozart has been released from the Eastland County jail on a \$25,000 bond.

Inomas Wayne Markham

of Cisco, a second suspect in the Cisco Lumber and Supply fire of June 10, is being held for investigation. He surrendered to police Tuesday, July 22, after a warrant had been issued for his arrest. Bond was set by Justice of the Peace J. V. Heyser at \$50,000.

Ray Alderton, a transient, was arrested in Dublin Friday, July 18, on charges of arson at Cisco Lumber and Supply. He remains in Eastland County Jail in lieu

of a \$200,000 bond.

No one has been arrested in connection with the fire that heavily damaged the Red Front Mini Mall on June 11, according to officials.

Cisco Mayor Joe Wheatley reported late Thursday that even though there have been arrests and charges made, the emergency curfew set by the Cisco City Council is still in effect. The curfew states that downtown traffic is restricted between the hours of 12 midnight and 6 a.m.

TO CURB CRIME

Grand Jury Asks Coordinated Effort

The 91st District Court Grand Jury which recessed this week issued a statement requesting a county task force to help combat crime and asked to be held over for an extended period for further service.

The document, read in open court, was signed by all grand jurors except one man, who was absent the day the report was made.

The statement is addressed to 91st District Judge Jim Wright, County Judge Scott Bailey, the Commissioner's Court and the citizens of Eastland County.

The statement said in part:

"This Grand Jury is unsatisfied with the overall progress of the prosecution of criminal cases...It is our opinion that the Criminal

District Attorney should aggressively pursue all cases to see that justice is obtained for all the citizens of this county

"We believe that the recent number of arson cases, drug cases, burglaries and other criminal activity dictate that a new and innovative approach be made to reduce the criminal element in Eastland County.

"It is apparent to us that many of those involved are arrested and indicted time after time but are free to carry on their criminal activity because of a lack of diligent prosecution.

"Therefore, as a possible solution, we suggest that a task force be organized by the Sheriff, Assistant Criminal District Attorney

and the Department of Public Safety, with the help of the various other law enforcement agencies in Eastland County, to actively identify, apprehend and prosecute those persons of being actively engaged in criminal activity in our county...Additionally, we request that the county commissioners appropriate sufficient funds to make the task force successful."

Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton said that he appreciates the interest expressed in drug cases and the drug problems of the county.

He noted that his office had filed 383 criminal cases so far this year and had disposed of 447 criminal cases which is in addition to the other responsibilities of

his office.

Also, he said that the law does not provide for any priority of drug cases over cases involving home burglaries, sexual assault of children or others.

He stated that he appreciated the endorsement of the idea for the task force concerning drug related matters which is what he had previously submitted to the various law enforcement agencies and the commissioners court.

Also, he stated that he is considering requesting the commissioners court to authorize the appointment of an investigator to coordinate the criminal investigation of the various law enforcement agencies in the county.

Local Talent Shares Texas History At Folklife Festival

Make plans now to attend a special four-day summer session specializing in crafts, dances, music and food of Texas. Nearly 6,000 participants help more than 100,000 visitors learn about the fascinating pioneer heritage and ethnic diversity of the state during the 15th Annual Texas Folklife Festival, July 31 to Aug. 3, sponsored by The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Helping visitors learn more about the contributions of many Texas ethnic groups to the growth and development of the state are members of the Cisco Civic League.

Working under the direction of Jo Ann Cermin, members of the Cisco Civic League demonstrate how early Texas residents made bread without ovens and fashioned candles without wicks.

Civic league members make "hoe cakes" from cornbread dough cooked on the blade of a hoe. Festival visitors, curious to know why those folks from Cisco stand around with their hoes in a hot fire, learn that the American Indians probably originated the technique by cooking their corn cakes, called appones, in hot ashes

or on hot stones.

Members also demonstrate how pioneers coated cattails with several layers of tallow to make candles.

If it's back to school to study frontier life, what better place to start than the Festival's one-room schoolhouse? The clang of the bell summons children of all ages to class, where the schoolmaster teaches the three R's as students copy their lessons on slate boards.

Step out of the schoolhouse and into the "Back 40" area of the Festival where participants provide impromptu lessons in a variety of pioneer skills. They demonstrate how to make boots and saddles, quilts and rugs, clay pots and cedar bark baskets, horsehair rugs and rawhide whips to bring Texas history vividly back to life.

Offering live instruction in folk music and dance are hundreds of participants featuring the rhythms and movements of many cultures through continuous performances on the Festival's 11 stages.

Serving a wide array of ethnic food are Festival chefs preparing courses of Korean bul-go-gi (grilled beef), Cajun shrimp jumbo,

Greek souvlaki (shish kebab), an assortment of desserts including Jewish honey cake and Polish jablka w cieście (apple fritters) and much more.

Festival visitors don't earn a special diploma, but they do graduate with a greater understanding of Texas history.

The Festival, an extension of the Institute's role as a statewide learning and communications center concerned with the history and culture of the state, is held on the Institute's grounds on HemisFair Plaza at Durango Boulevard and Bowie Street in downtown San Antonio. Tuition for this hands-on course in Texas history is \$5 admission for adults, \$1 for children 6-13 and free for children under 6.

Festival hours are 5 to 11 p.m. Thursday, July 31; noon to 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Aug. 1-2; and noon to 10 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 3. In honor of the Festival's 15th anniversary no gate admission will be charged from noon to 1 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 1.

Local Fireman Attends Training School

The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

Firemen can choose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Train-

ing, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection, and Disaster Rescue Training.

Fireman Fields was sponsored by Eastland County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance

Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 100 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe Volunteer Fire Departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said President S.M. Why Ulcers Bite In The Night

If you wake up in the middle of the night with a sharp pain in your gut, chances are you may have a duodenal ulcer. Nighttime pain is a hallmark of ulcer disease, but nobody knows exactly why ulcers bite in the night.

In recent years, special sleep laboratories have been established all around the country where medical researchers are spending a lot of time and effort to find out how the body functions during sleep, in sickness and in health. Sleep-related symptoms can be very helpful in leading to a correct diagnosis. Heart disease, diabetes, breathing disorders, and ulcer disease all send out special signals during the night.

There are five distinct stages of sleep, each with its unique pattern of brain wave activity. These stages basically alternate every 90 minutes between periods of light sleep, marked by rapid eye movements and therefore called REM, and the tranquil state known as Non-REM sleep, when heart and breathing rates are slow and regular. REM periods are of special interest to medical researchers because this kind of sleep is marked by dreaming and by increased blood pressure, heart rate, respiratory rate, and altered brain waves.

Gastroenterologists, the medical specialists concerned with digestive diseases, have a special interest in the sleeping gut. They found that the digestive tract continues its "housekeeping functions" while we are asleep, secreting digestive juices and moving food through the stomach and small intestines. Some studies have shown that ulcer



patients produce more acid during REM sleep, perhaps accounting for nighttime ulcer pain. But other findings indicate that ulcers bite even when acid levels are normal, because the stomach has been emptied and there is no food to take up the acid.

Doctors use their knowledge of the sleeping gut to protect ulcer patients from unnecessary pain. For instance, when Carafate (sucralfate) is prescribed for duodenal ulcer patients, one tablet is taken at night. The drug goes directly to the ulcer site, where it forms a protective barrier against acid that accumulates in the empty stomach. This allows the healing process to continue and keeps the patient comfortable.

As one physician observed, "A sleeping patient is still a patient." Therefore, it is important for anyone being treated for any kind of illness to follow medication schedules very carefully so that the medicine can work during sleep as well as during the waking hours.

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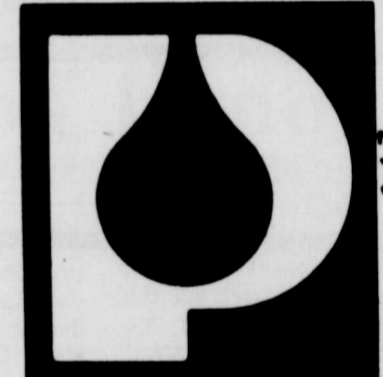
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Drive-In Band Camp

Homemaking Hints

Some stains are more seasonal than others. Prompt attention to stains helps insure easier removal. Once set, some may be impossible to remove.

GREASY STAINS--Bicycle and car grease, Butter, Cooking Oils, Mayonnaise... Pretreat with a heavy-duty liquid laundry detergent or a prewash soil and stain remover.

CATSUP--Scrape off excess with a dull knife. Soak in cold water 30 minutes. Rub detergent into stain while wet. Launder in hot water using Chlorine bleach, if safe for fabric.

heavy stains, place stain face down on paper towels. Apply dry cleaning solvent to back side of stain, replacing towels frequently. Let dry. Then rub in liquid detergent or dampen area with water, rub with bar soap, liquid detergent or detergent paste, made with granules and water. Rinse and launder.

MUSTARD--Apply a prewash soil and stain remover. Or, dampen stain with water and rub with bar soap. Rinse and launder using chlorine bleach, if safe for fabric. If not, soak in an enzyme pre-soak product or an oxygen bleach using hottest water safe for fabric, then launder. Several treatments may be needed to remove the stain.

Layer squash and salt in a large glass or plastic container. Cover and let stand

Dampen stain; rub with bar soap. Soak in an enzyme pre-soak product. Launder in hot water and chlorine bleach, if safe for fabric. Should color of fabric change, use ammonia for fresh stains and vinegar for old. Rinse and launder in hottest water safe for color.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

If you have more squash than you can eat, make up some jars of squash pickles. They are delicious!

SQUASH PICKLES 4 medium size yellow squash, sliced 1/4 inch thick 1/2 cup pickling salt 2 small onions, thinly sliced 1/2 cup sugar

1 1/2 cups vinegar (5 percent acidity) 3 tablespoons dry mustard 1 tablespoon ground ginger 1 tablespoon curry powder 6 whole peppercorns

Layer squash and salt in a large glass or plastic container. Cover and let stand

about 4 hours. Rinse squash several times in cold water; drain well.

Place squash and onion in a large Dutch oven. Combine remaining ingredients in a small, heavy spacepan, mixing well. Bring to a boil; boil 5 minutes, stirring often.

Pour vinegar mixture over squash; bring mixture to a boil, and cook 5 minutes or just until squash is crisp-tender.

Pack into hot sterilized jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Cover at once with metal lids, and screw bands tight. Process in boiling water bath for 15 minutes. Yield: about 2 pints.

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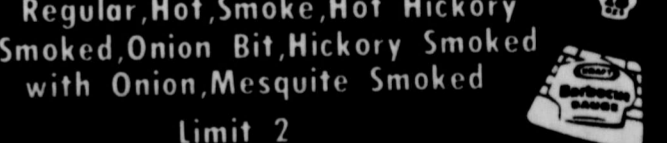

A "Texas Size" Title Dispute Shows The Value Of A Clear Title

FOREWORD:
Recently the *Telegram* published a story about an Eastland woman's difficulty in recovering oil royalty on land claimed by the state. There are probably similar experiences in other parts of Texas, for all title difficulties were not solved by the Constitutional Amendment of 1981.

One very strange true story is of the title on the land where the State Capitol stands. This account comes from a recent news release by the Texas Land Title Association.

TEXAS-SIZED TITLE DISPUTE SHOWS VALUE OF CLEAR TITLE

There's a piece of land in downtown Austin that one owner - or, to be more accurate, one claimant - has occupied for the past 147 years. During that time, this occupant has paid for the property on three separate occasions, buying it from different "owners" each time. Today, the occupant's only real claim to the land is a deed, dated 1925, that was written to end a nearly century-long dispute over the property. But even with that deed, the title to the land and the red granite building on it is far from clear.

The disputed property in downtown Austin is the land on which the Capitol stands. The building is the Capitol of Texas. The owner with such an uncertain hold is the State of Texas. According to the Texas Land Title Association, this is one sesquicentennial story with a lesson for anyone owning or intending to buy property.

The story of the disputed title to the Capitol building and grounds begins with Thomas Jefferson Chambers, a Superior Judge of Texas while it was still under Mexican rule and later a general in the revolution against Mexico and a four-time gubernatorial candidate. Other participants in the story include Chambers' two daughters, Stella and Kate; Texas Governor James Stephen Hogg; and three children of a Samuel Goucher, who were kidnapped by Indians and whose descendants may yet have a better claim to the Capitol of Texas than the State itself does. As is so often true in cases of unclear titles, none of the confusion would have occurred if the paperwork had been filed properly in the first place.

When Thomas Jefferson Chambers was appointed Superior Judge of Texas in 1834, he chose to draw his salary in undeveloped land rather than in cash. Chambers' tract of land began on the northern bank of the Colorado River, in the western outskirts of today's Austin. It ran 13 miles northeast to just south of Round Rock. Its western boundary extended south, back to the Colorado and ran through the eastern edge of the present city of Austin. The State Capitol and Capitol grounds are located within this thirty-league tract of land.

For several years, Chambers neglected to file his claim to this land at the land office. He had recorded his land grant promptly. Chambers never would have lost control of the land and the State of Texas would have gotten clear title when it later purchased the pro-

erty. But with revolution brewing, perhaps Chambers had more pressing concerns than paperwork on his mind.

General Chambers served with distinction in the 1836 revolution against Mexico and settled afterwards on some property he owned in Liberty County. Meanwhile, settlers began pouring into the new Republic of Texas. Since General Chambers had not filed a claim to his property in the Austin area, the land office began granting tracts of Chambers' land to the newcomers.

Settlers weren't the only land-seekers who found General Chambers' land attractive. The Republic of Texas was anxious to build a permanent home in the form of a new capitol. A congressional commission was charged to locate an appropriate site and obtain the land through purchase or condemnation. In 1839, this commission chose the site where the Capitol now stands.

This tract of land had been granted to a Samuel Goucher more than a year earlier. However, shortly after receiving the patent on the land, the Gouchers were attacked by Indians and all members of the family were presumed dead. The land was granted again, this time to two real estate developers who, in turn, sold it to the Republic of Texas.

Unknown to the Republic, three of the Goucher children had been taken captive by the Indians and were later ransomed. While these children and their heirs had a legitimate claim to the land, General Chambers also had a claim to that particular piece of property which pre-dated any other claim.

In 1840 General Chambers got around to filing his original claims. In so doing, he discovered that 150 patents had already been granted on his property and that one of those patents was now held by the Republic itself. The General turned to the courts to regain his land from the settlers, but he and his heirs were never permitted to sue the Republic or the State of Texas for the portion of his land it held. In 1858, however, the Texas Supreme

Court ruled that Chambers' title to his land was as perfect a title as the law could bestow.

Before Chambers could benefit from this favorable ruling, the Civil War broke out. In 1865, the General was killed by an assassin, leaving two young daughters as heirs. In time the daughters would press their claim to the Capitol grounds. But before that would happen, the old Goucher claim reappeared.

As heirs of Samuel Goucher, the three Goucher children who had been kidnapped by Indians had a legitimate claim to the Capitol lands. James Goucher died a bachelor in 1849. Jane Goucher married and had several children before her death in 1850. In 1853, E.M. Smith offered \$500 to the surviving child, William, if he would sign a "Quit Claim Deed to the 'Government Tract'". Goucher signed the deed and took the money. By 1874, Smith successfully pressed the Goucher claim - which he now owned - and had been paid by the State for the land.

Once the Chambers sisters were grown, they pursued their own claim to the Capitol. Although they won supporters as influential as Governor James Stephen Hogg, it was 1925 before the legislature recognized their claim as legitimate. The sisters then agreed to deed the Capitol and its grounds to the State for \$20,000, marking the third time the State "bought" the property.

But how clear is the State's title today? The Chambers' claim has been settled, and so has William Goucher's claim. But William inherited only a third of the Goucher lands. The two-thirds inherited by his brother and sister might still belong to their descendants. Someday from somewhere, an heir of Jane or James Goucher might yet come forward and reopen the title dispute over the Texas State Capitol and its grounds.

So let that be a lesson to all of us, say members of the Texas Land Title Association. Proper research and documentation can establish whether clear title exists to a



Legal Drinking

Age To Raise

Sept. 1

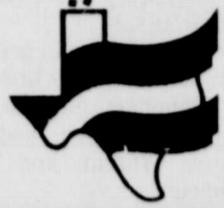
On Sept. 1, the legal age for drinking alcoholic beverages in Texas will go from 19 to 21.

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission reminded Texans that the change will cover several laws.

Beginning Sept. 1, possession of an alcoholic beverage by a person under 21 will be a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to underage people is the most serious offense, the commission noted. The penalty for a first violation is a \$100 to \$500 fine and a year in jail. A second violation can lead to the same jail term and a fine of up to \$1,000.

20-Year Success Story Launches THE HAPPY TIMES

Third Decade With Expansion

Twenty years ago, when Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Pulido opened their original restaurant in Fort Worth, they never dreamed it would blossom into a thriving 13-restaurant chain with more than 300 employees.

Eastland's Pulido Restaurant, located at I-20 and FM570, will celebrate its second anniversary in November.

Jose Gomez is manager and there are about 25 employees.

The multi-million dollar family-owned company, now managed by two of the Pulido's sons and other family members, recently built a tortilla factory and will introduce two new restaurants by Christmas.

The tortilla factory, located in Southwest Fort Worth, is a perfect example of the Pulido family's commitment to expansion during this special anniversary year. Valued at \$1,000,000, the newly constructed 10,000 square-foot factory supplies fresh corn tortillas and tortilla chips to all 13 of the Pulido's restaurants, as well as to many other restaurants across the country. The factory employs 16 people.

"We are also preparing to introduce our tortillas and chips to area grocery stores during the next several months," said company president Robert Pulido.

All of the tortilla chips are fried in 100 percent pure coconut oil, "more expensive to make, but better quality and lighter, fresher taste," Pulido said.

When the Pulidos opened the factory in May the main objective was to supply their own restaurants.

"Outside customers have come to us requesting our products," Pulido said. "The tortilla factory has turned into a great opportunity for

Pulido Associates, Inc. We're just in our third month at the factory and we are already using more than 10,000 pounds of raw corn a day."

The corn is purchased in San Antonio. Once it arrives at the factory it is cooked, washed and ground on site. Then tortilla dough is made, the dough is rolled, cut and placed on conveyor belts that pass through the ovens. The tortillas are then packaged while the chips move on to the fryers. An average day yields 6000 pounds of tortilla chips and 4200 dozen tortillas.

"It is a very efficient process," Pulido said.

Another area of the business that has done especially well this year is the Pulido's catering division. Catering sales have increased 30 percent over the last year, Pulido said, and the most popular catered dinners are for the Pulido's award-winning fajitas. Pulido's catering can accommodate groups up to 2500.

Pulido says he is excited about the growth and progress of the family business. "Our sales have more than doubled in just the last four years," he said. "It's great because we've all worked so hard for so long, it's gratifying to see such results."

"When I was growing up Mama sold her cooking to friends, neighbors, and Papa's co-workers. Her cooking, especially the tamales, was so popular that they encouraged her to open a restaurant," he said.

"So twenty years ago we took the plunge and built the first restaurant ourselves. Papa and my brothers and I all had other jobs and we would meet right after work at 5 o'clock to build the place from scratch," he said. "The street name over there was recently changed to Pulido Street in honor of the original restaurant."

"Mama and Papa say that they retired seven years ago, but they still show up and work everyday because they want to. They really love the
