Architects And Board Inspect Mobley-Hilton Progress

The Mobley Hotel, which is being restored as the first of the Conrad Hilton chain, was inspected by architects and members of the board of directors of the Conrad N. Hilton Community Center and Memorial Park last Thursday morning.

The above picture was made of visiting architects, including Earl Kamatsu (left), Gordon Marchant (center), project manager for the architects, and John Van Ness of Houston, architect and member of the

board of the University of Houston Foundation.

President Eris Ritchie and Board Members Joan Cermin, B rad Kinbrough, and Mike Moore accompanied the architects of their tour of the building, which is in the final stages of completion.

Mr. Van Ness made numerous pictures of the building that will be sent to the Hilton Foundation, which provided a 1.2 million dollar grant to finance the project.

Mr. Ritchie reported that the board and the architects

for the project would meet at 10 a.m. Monday with representatives of Bennett Construction Company, contractors for the project, for an inspection to determine anything that remains to be done before acceptance of the building.

Plans call for the Chamber of Commerce to move into the building as caretakers as soon as it is officially accepted, Mr. Ritchie said.

New Waste Water Disposal Plant Is Under Construction

Contractors are on the job in the building of a new waste-water disposal plant and an new water reservoir for the City of Cisco, according to a report Thursday by City Manager Mike Moore.

Wardrop & Associates of Lubbock, contractors for the waste-water facility, began moving dirt to build legume ponds during the past week, Mr. Moore reported. The plant is being built on 40 acres east of town.

Representatives of the Environmental Protection Agency, Texas Water Resources Board and others attended a meeting here earlier in the week to inspect construction work and take part in conferences concerning the project, Mr. Moore reported.

Lone Star Gas Company has move a six-inch main line that crosses the waste-water facility site ahead of the dirt moving work, the city manager said.

Bulldog Steel Company of Clyde has the contract for a new 500,000 gallon steel storage tank that will replace the old reservoir at College Hill. Fabrication work is underway at the Clyde plant on the tank while the contractor has preparations underway at the site to move the old reservoir and install the new one.

Both contractors have employed some local labor, the city manager said.



Principal Assumed Duties August 1

Mr. Jack Martin has taken over the duties of Cisco High School principal as of August 1. He was hired as new high school principal by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at the July 21 meeting.

Mr. Martin and his wife Carol have settled in here in Cisco after a move from Houston where he was vice-principal at Hargrave High School for the past three years.

Mr. Martin was raised in Memphis, Texas and graduated from high school there. He is also a graduate of West Texas State Univer-

sity at Canyon where he earned both his bachelor's and his master's degrees.

Other schooling experiences include being a teacher at Sunray, elementary principal at Lakeview and Lorenzo, and junior high school principal at Anson from 1981 to 1983.

Mr. Martin, who is active in the Methodist Church, states "I am looking forward to meeting the people of the Cisco community. If parents or anyone have any question I would like to encourage them to call or come by my office."

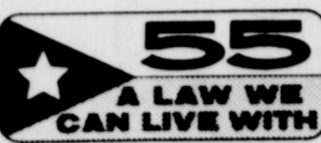

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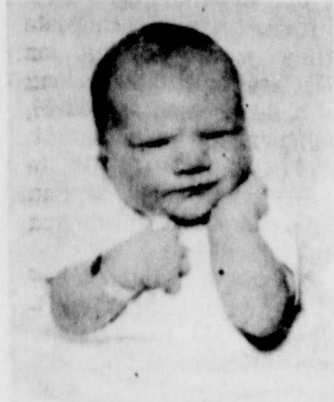

HOW ARE YOU SHAPING YOUR CHILD'S LIFE?
A small boy sat in the kitchen watching his mother busily preparing the evening meal. Since guests were expected for dinner, she was eager for everything to be "just right." The boy being aware that his mother was working hard asked, "Mommie, can I help you?" "No dear," she quickly replied, "I'm too busy for you to help me."
Children grow up all too fast. They become less flexible, less open, and our opportunities to have an impact on their lives decrease. We need not only to set goals, but evaluate where we are in reaching those goals.
We have written major goals for our daughters. The goals include training her to one day be a godly wife and mother. As I evaluated where we are in relationship to the goals, I realized she had spent several days on academics but I had done very little in training her to keep a home.

It would be well for us to look a few years ahead and ask ourselves if the tasks we are having our children perform each are training them for their major tasks in life.
Perhaps you would consider these ten ways in which to shape a child's life:
1. Notice him
2. Encourage him
3. Allow him to talk
4. Listen to him
5. Show an interest in his future
6. Let him ask questions
7. Lift up ideals before him
8. Compliment him
9. Share your own experiences
10. Lead him to Christ and encourage him in his Christian walk.

Governor Mark White's Address To The 69th Texas Legislature Special Session

(To) "Lieutenant Governor Hobby, Speaker Lewis, members of the Senate and the House of Representatives, friends and fellow Texans:

We would not be here today if the price of oil were \$26 a barrel.

There would be no shadow darkening our economy.

There would be no shortfall in state revenue.

There would be no gap in the budget.

There would be no need for any of the emergency measures we are about to consider. But we aren't the first generation of Texans to face tough choices or tough times.

All year long, all across Texas, we have been recalling - and celebrating - the Texas victory that won our independence in 1836. Let's not forget, though, that in the summer of 1836 the new government of the Republic was deeply in debt.

Texas had a brand new Treasury but there was not a penny in it. There was no money to pay the troops. There was not even enough for stationary. They had to borrow to pay the bills. And when they couldn't borrow, they resorted to issuing promissory notes - plain old I.O.U.s.

But they did everything they could, in Sam Houston's words, "to avoid the absolute dissolution of the government." They had fought and won one of the greatest struggles for freedom in the history of the world. There were no easy solutions for moving forward, but they weren't about to turn back.

We are meeting here today in this historic room for much the same reason. In the past three and a half years, we have made tremendous progress for Texas. We have written new chapters in Texas history: in education, for highways, and with a water plan. Great victories and now tough choices, and now we must not turn back.

Let's not forget that after the Civil War, Texas was mired in debt. In 1874, receipts covered less than half of state obligations. No expense was spared the knife. Salaries and even school funds were cut. There were no easy choices.

Around the turn of the century and into the depression of 1913, cattle and cotton prices plummeted. Cotton dropped from 31 cents to less than a nickel a pound. Farmers and ranchers went

bankrupt by the thousands. Agriculture, the backbone of the Texas economy, was broken and in shambles. There were no easy choices.

The Great Depression of the 1930s brought with it drought and dust storms. Farm prices hit the bottom. Oil and gas production stagnated. Industrial growth that was just starting up in Texas came to a halt. Revenues dried up. Again the state had no money. Five special sessions were called. People were having the hardest time of their lives. And there were no easy choices.

There were no easy choices at any of those times, and there aren't any now.

But we're not here to make easy choices. We're here to do what's right. We are here to uphold the Constitution. We are here to face up to the reality of the hardest time in our lives. And we are here to protect the economic well being of the people of Texas. Tough times call for tough choices.

When we took our oaths of office, we didn't swear to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution only when times were good. We pledged to execute our duties whatever the circumstances, whenever we were called upon to do so. The Constitution doesn't say that we ought to balance the budget. It doesn't say that we should balance the budget. It says that we shall balance the budget, and that is what we must do.

We weren't forced into public office; we asked for public office. And we're here to serve the public interest, not our own.

We're not here as Republicans and Democrats. We're here as Texans. Throughout this Special Session, let us put aside our differences of politics and philosophy and region.

The state of Texas is facing the most serious economic challenge of modern times. We've never had to face anything like this in our lives. But in hard times Texans unite and band together.

In a period of just five months the price of oil plunged from \$27 a barrel to less than \$10 a barrel. More than 700,000 Texans can't find a job. One out of every four in the oil industry is out of work. The rig count has fallen from 1,900 to 700; down 63 percent. Oil industry investment has been cut by

at least \$12 billion; down 40 percent.

And oil imports into the U.S. from Saudi Arabia have shot up from 27,000 barrels a day last year to over 700,000 barrels a day this year.

In 1985, no one foresaw the predatory tactics of the Middle East. In 1941, no one foresaw Pearl Harbor, either. And that's the point. Economic war is being waged against us, against our major industry, against our major source of income - oil.

The casualties of that war are Texas businesses, Texas jobs, and the Texas budget.

There is no way of knowing with certainty what our budget shortfall will be six months ... eight months ... a year from now. It changes every day with the price of oil. While only yesterday oil was up - today it's down again.

This week OPEC met and once again made a decision to manipulate oil prices, as well as all know.

We can not - we must not - we will not let Saudi Arabia, or OPEC, or any other kingdom of the world hold the people of Texas and the economy of Texas and the future of Texas hostage to the price of oil. Today, by the best available estimates, there will be a \$2.3 billion gap in the budget if we do not take action now.

The Comptroller has estimated the size of the expected shortfall is \$2.9 billion in general revenue. This number includes \$420 million in negative contingencies and \$210 million in spending that can be deferred into the next biennium.

The Attorney General assures me there is no immediate threat that the state is going to lose substantial sums of money in the courts. We've already made progress toward a balanced budget under recent executive orders to reduce spending.

Now we've got to deal with the problems on the table. Now comes the tough part - the toughest part of all - and we're going to have to be tougher than we've ever been before. It's going to hurt. It will be agonizing. But we've got to dig down and make deeper cuts in the budget.

Our first task is to cut every dollar that can be cut from the state's budget without destroying essential services.

We have identified \$1.4 billion in cuts. These cuts include:

- * \$10 million from the Governor's Office;
- * \$17 million from Parks and Wildlife;
- * \$5 million from the Adult Probation Commission;
- * \$3 million from the Texas Water Commission;
- * \$17 million from the Department of Health;
- * \$86 million from the Department of Human Services;
- * \$78 million from Junior Colleges;
- * \$64 million from 36 Universities;
- * \$306 million from the Highway Department;
- * \$97 million by foregoing the fiscal year '87 pay raise;
- * \$94 million by rolling back salaries 3 percent.

More than a dozen state agencies will be merged or eliminated.

We've been asking more and more from our state employees and giving them less and less. Indeed, regret-

tably, some may necessarily be laid off from their jobs. But the last thing we want to do is create new unemployment...we've got too much of that already.

I want every agency head to understand this: layoffs of state employees should be the very last resort. Not one state employee should lose his or her job until every possible alternative has been exhausted.

Nobody knows better than I the value of the work they do.

Let me tell you about the governor of another southern state who imposed a hiring freeze. He received a letter of resignation from a state employee - a drawbridge operator - who said, "Since there will be no one to replace me, Governor, what do you want me to do?...Leave the drawbridge up?...Or leave the drawbridge down?"

To avoid interruptions in essential services or any unnecessary layoffs, we need emergency budget executive authority. This will enable us to make budgetary adjustments between legislative sessions, should our financial situation improve or deteriorate.

These cuts are deep. These cuts are painful. I know what they mean in human terms. It's devastating.

But that's where I draw the line. It would be irresponsible to go any further. It would be wrong.

And let me tell you why...

Her name is Angela Botello, four-years-old. She lives in La Joya and attended Kennedy Elementary School this past year. A year ago, little Angela knew just a few words in English. She knew how to say "table" and "water". Most of her family speaks only Spanish. Her mother says that when Angela comes home from school now she sings - in English. Angela has a birthday coming up on Saturday, she'll turn five, I think the very best birthday present we could give her would be our promise that we're going

to keep her school a place to build her future.

We didn't build public education in 1984 to tear it down in 1986.

Two years ago, in education, we began near the bottom, 46th in the nation, and we made it the number one priority in Texas. We did that together in this chamber. We began without a bill and without a budget to pay for it. There was one thing we had. We had the resolve to make a commitment to quality education for our children. That commitment is already paying off. That's what we're fighting for today.

We were 30th in teacher pay, and today we're 21st, up nine places.

We were 40th in investment per student, and today we're 34th, up six places.

Student achievement score are up 12 points in Texas.

And just a few days ago, we learned the results of basic skills tests for our first grade students:

83 percent passed their math;

80 percent passed the writing portion;

73 percent passed in reading.

All across the board - all across this state - our youngest students are already on the forefront of success. That first grade class is the college graduating class of the year 2001. They'll be leading Texas into the 21st century, and they're off to a great start.

Remember what we did, right here, to build the future with a pre-kindergarten program, beginning at the bottom, in the earliest grades, going right through high school, going all the way to the top.

That's why we've got to draw the line. We're not backing off of the education reforms in House Bill 72.

We're not going to shut down our hospitals or our prisons - in fact we need more of them - and we're not going to cut law enforcement or public safety. We will not take away the eye glasses and the canes and the crutches of the people who need them. We will not take food from the mouths of the elderly or the infant.

We've simply got to draw the line.

I am asking you,

therefore, to enact an increase of 1 1/8 cents in our state sales tax effective September 1.

I know that will take a bipartisan effort by this Legislature.

I'm asking Republicans and Democrats - every member - to join with me to do this immediately.

This will be a temporary "oil and gas replacement tax" - an emergency tax - to make up for lost revenues. It will be sunsetted automatically on the last day of this biennium - midnight, August 31, 1987. Should circumstances improve, nothing will please me more than to abolish this tax even earlier.

Every penny of this tax will be used to balance the budget. Not one penny will be used for new programs or for additional state employees.

Some say this may cost us our jobs. And it might.

I know what I'm asking of you when I call for a tax increase. No one ever wants to raise taxes. But it's not a question of want, it's a question of need.

Cost us our jobs? We all know Texas wasn't founded by leaders fearful of losing their jobs - or their lives.

Cost us our jobs? There are more than 700,000 Texans out there who have already lost theirs.

No, we must do our job for the people of Texas - regardless of the consequences. They expect us to do what is right and what is necessary. While they fight to save their homes, their farms, their ranches, and their businesses, they expect us to fight to save our schools, our highways, and the future of Texas. And that is what we must do.

They expect us to fulfill our constitutional responsibilities. I'll accept that challenge. And I'll accept the consequences.

We need this emergency tax - for one year. We need it for the future of Texas. But there is one tax we don't need and we'll never have.

Today, I am asking you to give the people of Texas a constitutional amendment

prohibiting a state income tax - corporate or personal.

Banning an income tax in Texas will help us continue to diversify our economy and attract new industry and jobs. It will compliment the foundation for our future that we have already established through our commitment to education, research, highways and water.

And of course you can't have a strong economy without a strong banking system. We must consider fortifying our Texas banks through interstate banking.

We've learned all too well that we can't build our economic future on the instability of fluctuating oil prices. That's why our program for economic diversification is built upon certainty - good roads, good schools, adequate water supplies, strong banks and low taxes - and remember, 42 states have higher taxes than Texas.

We have to fix this current crisis with our current tax system. But we've got to face the fact that the current tax structure no longer fits the changing Texas economy. We must work to reform not only our sales tax, but also property taxes, severance taxes - all those taxes that are getting out of step with changing times and a changing Texas economy.

My staff is looking at ways to make our tax system fairer, and I will be coming to you in January to reform our system. We want to do this well. We want to do it right. We want to do it so that it meets the needs of our state for at least the next decade not just the next ten or twelve months.

I will also be calling on private/public sector partnerships to provide incentives for future investment in Texas, with particular authorization for use of our public funds to spur business expansion, job creation, and industrial development.

The one thing we cannot do now is to allow a crisis to immobilize us with panic and fear.

That's the real lesson of our history.

Our forefathers taught us to preserve and provide for the future even as we are in the throes of a crisis. That's what they did.

When men were fighting and dying at the Alamo, others were meeting at Washington-on-the-Brazos. There in an unfinished farmhouse, in the freezing cold, they were writing our Declaration of Independence - a declaration of political independence and human rights.

We must make that same kind of bold commitment to our future now.

We've got to fight to keep the groundwork we've already laid for economic diversification, profits, jobs, and opportunity.

In this session we've got to stand off the pressure bearing down on our economy and take the first steps toward economic recovery.

We've got much more to do in the months ahead, because we've just begun to write a new declaration of independence for Texas - a new kind of declaration - a Texas Declaration of Economic Independence.

None of this will be easy, it never was before.

But you and I will not be fighting alone or for ourselves - because there are 16 million Texans standing behind us. They will be with us and for us if we do the right thing.

I don't need to remind anyone here today who said, "Do right and risk consequences."

Let's do right. This will not be our Alamo. This will be our San Jacinto.

Thank you.

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Gordon Spot

It's that time of year again! Do I plant winter pastures? Do I use small grains only, or include ryegrass? Now is the time to make the decision and plan for planting and management of those pastures if they are to be included in the management program.

The first and most logical step at this time is to take a good soil sample. Get a composite of several locations in the field. Send it to a reputable lab. The Extension Soil Testing Lab at Texas A&M University would be one suggestion. The main purpose for a soil sample is to look at the phosphorous and potash levels since nitrogen can be predicted with estimated forage yields. The Extension lab runs nitrate nitrogen to help determine initial nitrogen fertilization. If phosphorous and/or potash is needed, they should be applied prior to land preparation so that they will be well mixed into the soil surface.

Land should be plowed as soon as possible to allow destruction of all growing materials and allow good moisture penetration and retention if rainfall is received. Also, a seedbed formed by rainfall is much better than one that is soft and fluffy.

Species or variety selection should be made now and need source located. Not all of the newer varieties are readily available locally and it may be necessary to request a dealer to obtain certain varieties. The major choices for small grain pastures in this area are wheat and oats with some triticale and rye. Since triticale is now a hybrid between rye and winter wheat, there is much less winter damage and much better winter growth. However, most triticale and rye varieties have a short vernalization period and will seed out after a very short period of cold weather followed by warm weather.

Heading may occur in December to March. Oats and wheat on the other hand require much more cold weather to initiate heading. Wheat on the whole, will be more winter hardy and will produce more during the winter period while oats are more suitable for early fall and late spring grazing. Even though we have had considerable winter damage to oats in the last few years, they still remain one of the more preferred grazing crops.

There are several new varieties on the market that

should be considered, especially, if seed production is not a production goal. Soft wheat, which is not the quality milling grain wheat, is beardless and in general, a better forage producer.

Some new varieties that have recently been released are Coker 916 and Coker 893. Some of the beardless hard wheats such as Russian, Weathermaster 135 and Milburn are also good grazers. Since no beard is present, animal eye problems are not as great during graze-out. Also, these forages can be hayed with the absence of beards.

Several new oat varieties are also available including Four-Twenty-Two, Mesquite, Okay and Big Mac. All of these are relatively winter hardy with good production in this area. Probably the least hardy of these is Mesquite with the most winter hardy being either Okay or Four-Twenty-Two. This is by no means an exhaustive list as many good varieties of both wheat and oats are available on the market.

As preparations are made to purchase seed, a reasonable planting rate for forages on oats would be 3 bushels per acre and on wheat 1 1/2 to 2 bushels per acre depending on seed size. Suggested planting dates for forage would be anytime after September 1 after good rainfall along with cool weather. It should be remembered that October 15 is approaching the latest date that small grains can be

planted for winter grazing. It has been observed that forage small grains must be emerged and growing by November 1 to allow adequate production prior to frost to give winter forage. Ryegrass may be added at the seeding rate of 15 pounds per acre to extend spring and early summer grazing.

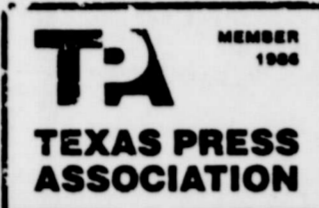

Manufactured Housing

Approximately one out of every five homeowners in Texas lives in a manufactured house—that is, in a mobile or modular home. And more are buying them everyday.

Their popularity has attracted some unscrupulous dealers who fail to honor warranties, sell homes that have not been approved by either the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) or the Texas Department of Labor and Standards, or engage in other illegal or deceptive practices.

The Legislature passed the Texas Manufactured Housing Act to deal with these abuses. Among other things, it authorizes the Attorney General to investigate consumer complaints about mobile or modular homes.

DEPOSITS

The Act distinguishes between a deposit and a down payment. A deposit is money paid to hold or order a home and is usually paid when the Purchase Agreement is signed. If a consumer backs out of a sale for any reason, the dealer may keep the deposit. (If the sale goes through, the deposit is applied to the down payment when the Retail Installment Contract is signed.)

But the Act limits the size of a deposit. If the home is in inventory, that is, on the dealer's lot, the dealer may require no more than a \$200 deposit. On the other hand, if the consumer special orders a manufactured home, the dealer can charge up to 5% of the cash sales price for a deposit.

BONDS AND STANDARDS

All manufactured housing in Texas must carry a seal of approval from either HUD or the Texas Department of Labor and Standards. New houses must meet current standards and used ones must meet the standards in force at the time they were built.

The Act requires that all dealers and all manufacturers must be bonded. Recently, the Attorney General got a temporary restraining order against an out-of-state manufacturer whose factory did not have a valid certificate of registration and who had not filed a security bond with the Department of Labor and Standards.

FOUNDATIONS AND OTHER AGREEMENTS

The Act also requires that all warranties on new manufactured housing must include set up

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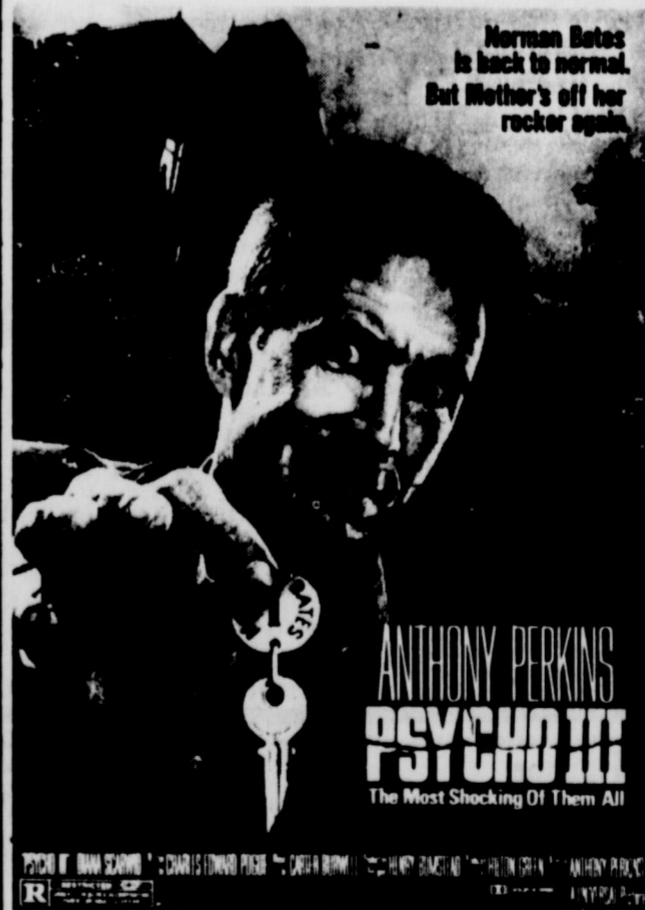
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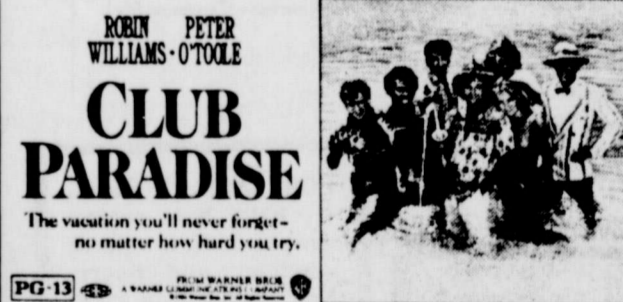


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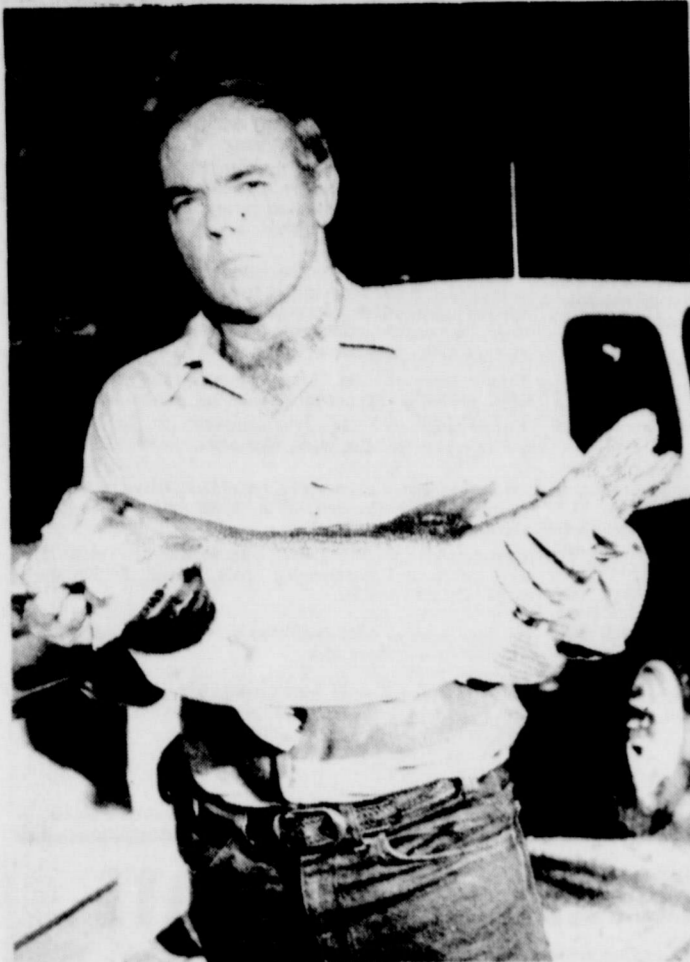

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City Council Meets In Regular Session Tuesday

An ordinance to prohibit the use of nets or traps in Lake Cisco and to enforce regulations of the state's freshwater fishing code was approved on first reading at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

The freshwater regulations provided that there will be no city fees or license required for fishing in lakes such as Lake Cisco and the City no longer requires the payment of an annual \$5 fee for fishing in the lake, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

The new ordinance makes unlawful "the use of any kind of bait, except live bait, or artificial lures and flies, or to set nets, traps, snares, or other devices for taking fish from the water of city lakes or reservoirs; or to use explosives, powder, firearms or drugs of any kind to kill fish in said waters." Commercial fishing is also prohibited. The ordinance will become effective after it passes at

the next meeting.

An ordinance revising rates charged water customers in apartment complexes was passed as an emergency measure of first reading.

The Council took under consideration a proposed rate hike for water under strict conservation if and when such a situation exists. Under the proposed rate, water would go up after the use of 12,000 gallons to \$1.60 per 1,000 (present \$1.25) and \$2 for all over 200,000 gallons (now \$1 per 1,000).

The city manager told the Council that consumption exceeded one million gallons per day during July. If consumption continues to be high without replenishing rains, the city will face a severe shortage situation in a few months, Mr. Moore said.

An ordinance to close the alley-way back of Calvary Baptist Church was approved on first reading. The action was taken at the request of the church, which plans a

building addition.

The Council voted to join Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas in efforts to encourage the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to require more stringent efforts in their clean water efforts over the state. The city approved contributing \$168 to a fund being raised to finance the effort, which will include court action.

A resolution authorizing the city to reimburse Lone Star Gas Company for relocation of a six-inch pipeline located in the new wastewater treatment facility area was approved. Lone Star has spent \$31,000 to move the gas line. The funds will come from money obtained for the project cost, Mr. Moore reported.

Councilmen Bobby Ingram and Roy Dennis showed picture slides made in the 1960s at Lake Cisco Park and Swimming Pool and discussed their committee's activities in exploring the possibilities of restoring the

park and part of the pool.

Mr. Ingram said they have visited with State Health Department officials and obtained information needed to reopen the concrete part of the swimming pool, which has been closed for years. The pictures showed the pool in operation along with a skating pavillion and activities in the park. The committee was applauded for its work and the Council asked that the study be continued.

During an executive session, the Council discussed plans for an extensive overhaul for street equipment and studied the need to purchase a piece of property for city use.

Mayor Joe Wheatley presided over the meeting. Present were Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Roy Dennis, Arlie Whitley and Burl Chambers. Also present were City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson, and City Attorney Bill Wright.

Danny was well known throughout the State Senate speaking many times for the rights of the handicapped.

He lived alone in Austin and died in his apartment March 24, 1983.

Danny was the son of Mr. & Mrs. Arnel McBeth of Mount Pleasant, Texas. He was a grandson of Mr. & Mrs. Emery and Willie (Curtis) McBeth, a great nephew of the late Mrs. Nute (Zelma) Hart, and a cousin to the McBeths in this area.

Mr. Martin comes to us from Houston, but has had some small town experience in Anson.

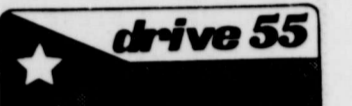
