## City Raises Rates At Tuesday Meet

An ordinance raising rates charged for users of water in excess of 12,000 gallons per month to encourage conservation was approved on first reading at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council at City Hall last Tuesday night.

The measure will become effective Sept. 15, 1986, according to the ordinance.

The minimum for the first 2,000 gallons will remain \$12, and the charge for the next 10,000 gallons will remain at \$1.50 per thousand gallons. The next 28,000 gallons will cost \$1.60 per thousand as compared with the present \$1.50. The next 150,000 gallons will cost \$1.75, up from \$1.25 per thousand. And those who use over 200,000 gallons will pay \$2 per thousand for the excess instead of \$1.00 per thousand.

The Council appointed a committee composed of Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Allen Masters, Joe Wheatley and Burl Chambers to contact industrial users and others, including the schools, who use large amounts of water and seek their cooperation in conservation efforts.

City Manager Mike Moore told the Council that action seems necessary due to the condition of Lake Cisco where the water level is near a five-year low. Lake Cisco is the city's only source of water, he said, "and the time has come for strict conservation." He added that the only alternative would be to find a new source of water.

A voluntary rationing program has been in effect for the past two years. The rate increase can be regarded as the city's first step in mandatory rationing as it seeks to encourage waste prevention, Mr. Moore said.

In other action, the Council

approved on second and final reading an ordinance prohibiting the posting of signs on utility poles and public property, defining same, providing for abatement, providing exceptions and establishing a penalty. The ordinance will become effective after publication twice in a local newspaper.

The Council rescheduled the regular Sept. 23rd meeting for Thursday, Sept. 25, as the city manager is scheduled to appear in Austin at a meeting where action is expected of the city's application for a grant of federal funds to finance improvements in east Cisco. The Austin meeting will be held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 23. The city has applied for more than \$400,000 as a grant for the work on streets and other facilities.

A resolution supporting a "National Energy Security and Conservation Policy" and establishing an oil import fee was tabled for further study.

Mayor Pro Tem Roy Dennis presided in the absence of Mayor Joe Wheatley, who was out-of-town to attend a funeral. Present were Councilmen Bill Roberts, Arlie Whitley, Allen Masters, Burl Chambers and Bobby Ingram along with City Manager Mike Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

## Council Calls Budget Meeting For Tuesday Night At City Hall

A tax rate of 54 cents per \$100 valuation was approved for the year 1987 by the City Council at their regular semi-monthly meeting at City Hall Tuesday night. The rate was set following a public hearing called to allow taxpayers to express their opinions.

The 54 cent rate is one cent lower than the 1986 rate of 55 cents but property values have been raised some \$2,500,000 and the new rate represents a tax increase of 2.85 per cent for property owners, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

The city's 1986-87 budget, which will be effective Oct. 1, will be considered by the Council at a special meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 16. If approved at that time, as is expected, the Council will consider an ordinance to adopt the budget on final reading at the Sept. 25th meeting.

Under the law, if taxes are increased more than three per cent, a public hearing must be held. If the increase exceeds eight per cent, an election can be required.

The 2.85 per cent increase will produce an additional \$7,700 for the year 1987, the city manager reported.

The public hearing attracted some 15 taxpayers and several spoke briefly to urge the Council to consider the general economic conditions of the area in adopting a new tax rate and budget. Those making talks included Mrs. Louise Allison, Chester Elswick, Paul Blaine, Dr. John Muller, Harold Adling, Mrs. Lawrence Ingram and P.M. Ray.

The speakers brought out that many taxpayers are senior citizens and widows who live on fixed incomes and whose ability to absorb added expenses is limited.

Members of the Council were invited to express opinions by Mayor Pro Tem Roy Dennis and they assured the audience that every effort would be made to have a budget that would provide adequate services and facilities at a minimum cost.

The 1986-87 budget as prepared by the city manager and at two work sessions of the body, notes that city valuations amount to \$56,210,278. This should produce income of \$303,536 but delinquent taxes usually average about 11 per cent, leaving a net of \$270,000.

Estimated revenue for 1986-87 was listed at \$1,007,805 from the general fund, including taxes and other revenues, in the amount of \$954,500, the utility fund of \$647,950 and the airport fund of \$5,400. No revenue sharing funds are anticipated and the 1985-86 budget anticipated \$101,200

from that source.

Expenditures for the coming year were budgeted as follows: general fund, \$954,500; utility fund, \$382,450; and airport fund, \$5,400. Total expenses for the coming year were budgeted at \$1,342,350 for operations and maintenance, \$265,500 for revenue and general obligation bonds. The budget total is \$1,607,850 as compared with \$1,672,350 for 1985-86.

Summary of expenses by department for the coming year were listed as follows: administration and legislature, \$202,700; police and municipal court, \$241,100; fire department, \$78,900; street and shop, \$284,500; parks and recreation, \$31,500; sanitation, \$116,050; water, \$511,925; wastewater, \$106,225; utility billing, \$29,800; and airport, \$5,400.

Anticipated revenue for

the coming year includes \$270,000 from taxes, \$38,000 from delinquent tax collections, \$180,000 from sales taxes; \$85,000, from franchise taxes; \$30,000 from the municipal court; \$105,000 from sanitation; \$12,000 from lake lot leases; \$12,000 from interest on bank accounts; \$50,000 from financial administration; and \$115,000 from oil and gas royalties.

The new budget provides for no pay increases for city employees. The street improvement program for the coming year has been allocated \$12,000 as compared with \$25,000 for the past year.

The utility fund anticipates water sales of \$440,000 - down \$10,000 from the past year. Sewer fees are expected to total \$180,000. The airport expects income of \$5,400 and expenses of a like amount.

This person has not been arrested and indicted, but also is serving a 65-year prison term in Huntsville State Prison.

The local Crime Stoppers Association encourages you, as citizens, of this community, to be alert to any unusual activities in your neighborhood, city and county, which may provide information which would help solve local crimes.

The Cisco Crime Stoppers Association will be working closely with local law enforcement agencies and will pay rewards for information that leads to the arrest and indictment of anyone committing crimes in our area. When anyone sees a crime in progress, they should contact their LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT agency, NOT Crime Stoppers. There will be crimes listed weekly in the newspaper, and anyone calling on the crime listed will receive a reward when the crime is solved and the suspect is arrested.

PTO parents have been contacting local businesses about purchasing memberships. However, if you have not been contacted, you may call Marcia Blackwell at 442-4157 to purchase one.

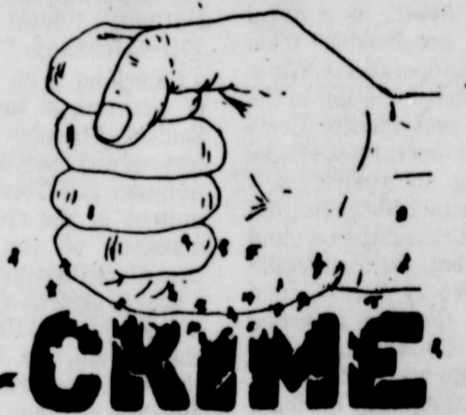
The PTO supports local schools by assisting in planning social functions and by raising funds to purchase equipment and other items for the schools.

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# Former Ciscoan Receives Award

(Editor's Note: The following article from the Sanford, Fla., Evening Herald concerns Jesse S. (Red) Cleveland, who grew up in Cisco.)

Jesse S. "Red" Cleveland, director of Aviation for the Sanford Airport Authority, was honored with the prestigious John S. Krider Memorial Topper Award by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce at an awards dinner at the Sanford Civic Center.

Bringing his wife Eloise forward with him as he accepted the award, Cleveland said modestly, "This should be a team award, because I owe a debt to all those who have helped over the years."

The award, presented by George Touhy, a past Topper Award winner, was given in recognition of "outstanding leadership, distinguished and unselfish service to this community."

There were 350 persons in attendance at the annual event, including 40 chamber scholarship winners and their parents. Ron Dycus, 1985 chairman of the chamber board, was master of ceremonies. He was presented with a plaque of appreciation for his service by board chairman Shirley Schilke.

In 1969 after a distinguished career in the U.S. Navy, Commander Cleveland was looking for a "challenging assignment in a commercial complex affording ample opportunity to demonstrate management abilities" in the civilian world.

He found in the job of operating and developing the 1,685-acre Sanford Airport after it was deactivated by the navy and decided to the city of Sanford for \$1.

Cleveland was well qualified for the job, having been executive officer of the Sanford Naval Air Station since 1966 until he retired in 1968 when it closed. He managed the installation, which had an annual operating budget of \$20 million. Sixty officers, 520 enlisted and 200 civil service personnel were assigned to the base.

From 1963-65, he was air operations officer, staff commander Naval Air Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. He developed and directed the schedule of all naval aircraft assigned to the Naval Air Force U.S. Atlantic Fleet.

From 1943-45, as a naval aviator, progressing from pilot to air operations officer of a carrier operating in the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and as an operations officer managing an airfield of a shore installation. He did battle with the Japanese and the elements in the Pacific during World War II and received the Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medals. He was stationed on the USS Monterrey during a raging fire at sea that destroyed every plane aboard while in the midst of a typhoon.

Born July 13, 1922, in Cisco, Texas, his love affair with flying began for the kid from Cisco, Texas, when he

was riding herd on his father's ranch and had to round up the cattle spooked by low-flying Army bi-planes, he said he decided then and there he was going to be the man who scattered cattle with a plane instead of one who had to round them up afterwards.

According to his brother, Buck, "Red's" first job for money was a bellboy at the town's Laguna Hotel where he delivered booze to big wheeler dealers from out of town for the local bootlegger. Cleveland set off for college in his old red Model T, which he purchased for \$25 and decorated with humorous signs. But, according to his brother, Cleveland's pranks proved too much for the president of the church-owned college, who told his father to come and get him and never bring him back.

He learned to fly at the age of 16 in the plane of a neighbor who was later killed while stunting.

He joined the Navy in 1942 and earned his wings at Corpus Christi NAS. He did his first tour of duty at NAS Sanford in 1943. He was stationed here three different times and Cleveland called Sanford "the most sought-after duty on the East Coast." He decided in the 1950s he would retire here and bought a home.

The Sanford Airport was officially opened April 4, 1969 and became licensed as a civilian facility in May. As airport manager, Cleveland professionally guided the fledgling airport and industrial park through political struggles and debates over who was going to have control over the operation.

Cleveland prepared a master development plan for a 20-year operation which gained the approval of the Sanford Industrial Commission and the FAA the same year. Under his leadership the airport became self-supporting and the facilities have continued to expand. With its two major runways, it accommodates general aviation, private aircraft, helicopters and charter service. About 150 businesses and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department operate in the airport's industrial park. In 1985 the airport received a \$716,000 grant from the Federal Aviation Authority.

He attended the University of Missouri 1947-48 and Bethany Penial College, 1941-42 Bethany, Okla.

Cleveland is on the board of directors of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and serves on the Aviation and Tourism committees of the chamber. A member of the Sanford Breakfast Rotary Club, he is a past president of that club and the Sanford Rotary Luncheon Club. He is a Paul Harris Fellow. He has been active in its many charitable projects and worked with the club to put on several air shows featuring the Navy's Blue Angels.

He is past president of both the Southeast and Florida Airport Managers associations. He is a member of the

Retired Officers Association and the Caterpillar Club.

He is a member and former elder of First Presbyterian Church of Sanford.

He is married to the former Eloise Collins. He has a son, Dr. Stewart Cleveland of Cisco, Texas and daughter, Virginia "Ginger" Cox of Gaffney, S.C., by his first wife, the late Elizabeth Pippin Cleveland, a Sanford native.

# Prescription For Parents

I would like to share with you an article written by Claudia Bulgerin, from Trinity Christian Schools. She gives excellent suggestions on the spiritual well being of a child. "My concern is for the spiritual well-being of my child. What can I do to encourage him in spiritual matters?" "The most important element of encouraging your child in spiritual matters is to develop a good relationship with him. Billy Graham did a survey of 1,000 churches to find out why people came to church. He found that: 6-7% Attended because the church had good programs 2-3% Attended because they liked the pastor 001% Attended because of an evangelistic crusade 67% Attended because of a relationship they had developed with someone at the church." "If these facts are true, then one could assume that the major outreach tool of the church is relationship with people. A child will respond more readily to the person whom he knows loves him unconditionally and seeks his best welfare." "Secondly, a child can be encouraged in spiritual matters by watching your example. Children respond more to what adults do than what they say." "Thirdly, a child can be encouraged in spiritual matters by serving others. As a family, you could have a monthly service project. Perhaps there is an elderly person who is unable to mow his lawn living near you. Or

there may be an opportunity for you to prepare a meal for a needy family. Each of these activities stress the Christian attitude of serving." 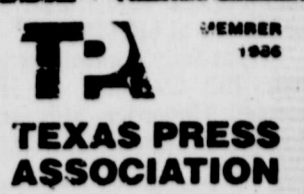

# Sales Taxes Down 6.54% In County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September check amounts reflect a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Eastland County's one-percent sales tax rebate from the state is down only 6.54 percent through August, compared to a year ago.

That's stronger than neighboring comparable counties which report bigger drops.

The five cities in this county have been paid \$486,743.23 compared to \$520,826.95 for the same eight month period last year.

Stephens County is down 7.73 percent.

Collections are as follows: (figures in parenthesis are comparable last years figures);

Cisco, \$8,303.70; (\$10,049.04); \$122,988.78 to date this year; (\$131,681.19); down 6.60 to date.

Eastland, \$20,926.57; (\$21,275.22); \$245,122.10; (\$250,961.73); down 2.33.  
Gorman, \$1,263.49; (\$1,269.66); \$18,951.45; (\$19,898.55); down 4.76.  
Ranger, \$5,450.50; (\$7,571.35); \$80,376.56; (\$101,936.48); down 21.15.  
Rising Star, \$1,117.75; (\$1,394.33); \$19,304.34; (\$16,349.00); down, 8.08.

Houston's check for \$8.6 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$108.3 million, down 5 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$6.3 million for a 1986 total of \$79.8 million, a 5 percent decrease.

San Antonio received \$3.4 million, pushing 1986 payments to \$42.7 million, up 2 percent over 1985. Austin's check for \$2.5 million brought total payments this year to \$31 million, a 3 percent decrease.

Fort Worth's payment was

\$2 million, bringing this year's total to \$26.2 million, up 3 percent. El Paso's September check for \$1.4 million pushed total payments to \$16.7 million, up 7 percent over 1985.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$25 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment of \$10.2 million brought 1986

totals to \$125.7 million. Dallas' DART check was for \$9.2 million, a total of \$119.6 million for 1986. Austin's Capitol Metro received a \$2.6 million check for a yearly total of \$31.7 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.8 million, increasing this year's payments to \$23.4 million. Fort Worth's MTA check for \$494,670 brought

the city's total this year to \$6.2 million. Corpus Christi's MTA check was for \$473,628, bringing total payments for the year to \$4 million.

September checks represents taxes collected on sale made in July and reported to the Comptroller's Office by August 20.

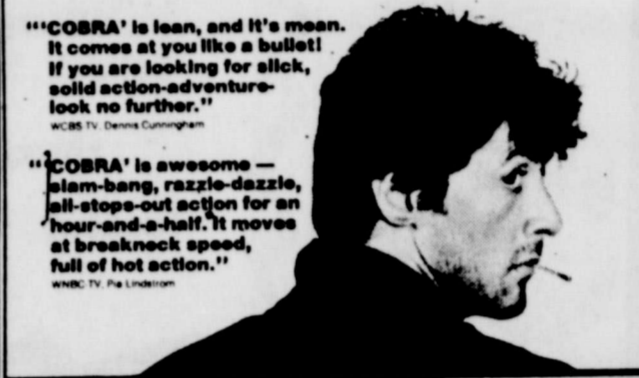

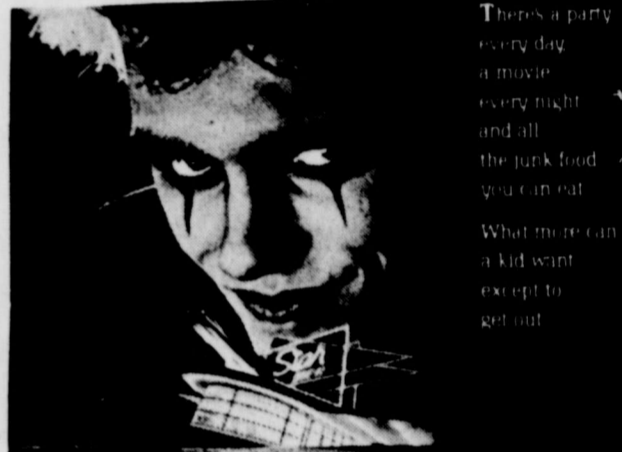

ever. The usual tie-breaker shoot-off in the silhouette match had to be held again this month. The match winners were:

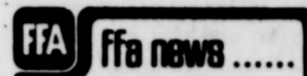

## Wiley Cox Attends P.O. Meeting Recently

Cisco Postmaster Wiley Cox recently returned from a four day postmaster's meeting in San Antonio, Texas. He was among the 4,000 who attended the 82nd Annual Convention of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States (NAPUS).  
Hugh Bates, Clanton, Alabama, who is National President of the NAPUS Organization which represents approximately 30,000 postmasters nationwide, expressed sympathy for all to the families of the 15 postal employees who lost their lives in Edmond, OK. Mr. Bates sent a telegram to the Edmond Post Office on behalf of NAPUS expressing condolences and offering help in any way. A moment of silence was held by everyone at the convention in conjunction with the nationwide postal memorial observance for the families of their fellow workers.

The statement "It was a tragedy that served no purpose" was echoed many times throughout the four day meeting. Harry Pentella, Southern Regional Postmaster General, announced during his address to the convention that the Postal Service has given medical assistance where needed and a team of psychologists who worked on the slayings at a McDonald's in San Ysidro, CA, have been hired to assist for as long as needed.

David Hyde of Massachusetts was elected National Secretary-Treasurer of NAPUS during the convention and will assume office January 1, 1987. President Bates is in his first year of a two-year term.  
Also attending the convention were Postal and Congressional Officials who included John McKean, Chairman, Postal Board of Governors; Fletcher Acord, Associate Postmaster General; Jackie Strange, Deputy Postmaster General; Congressman Frank McCloskey; and Representative Gene Taylor.

Postmaster Wiley Cox attended the management seminars on Function Four, and Communication Skills and worked 25 chairmen of the Golf Tournament Committee while at the convention. He also won a trophy in the golf tournament with a closest to the pin contest on a par three 185 yard hole. (A 6-iron 183 2/3 yards just 4 feet short).
