City Raises Rates At Tuesday Meet

An ordinance raising rates charged for users of water in excess of 12,000 gallons per month to encourage conservation was approved on first reading at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council at City Hall last Tuesday night.

The measure will become effective Sept. 15, 1986, according to the ordinance.

The minimum for the first 2,000 gallons will remain \$12, and the charge for the next 10,000 gallons will remain at \$1.50 per thousand gallons. The next 28,000 gallons will cost \$1.60 per thousand as compared with the present \$1.50. The next 150,000 gallons will cost \$1.75, up from \$1.25 per thousand. And those who use over 200,000 gallons will pay \$2 per thousand for the excess instead of \$1.00 per thousand.

The Council appointed a committee composed of Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Allen Masters, Joe Wheatley and Burl Chambers to contact industrial users and others, including the schools, who use large amounts of water and seek their cooperation in conservation

City Manager Mike Moore told the Council that action seems necessary due to the condition of Lake Cisco where the water level is near a five-year low. Lake Cisco is the city's only source of water, he said, "and the time has come for strict conservation." He added that the only alternative would be to find a

new source of water. A voluntary rationing program has been in effect for the past two years. The rate increase can be regarded as the city's first step in mandatory rationing as it seeks to encourage waste prevention, Mr. Moore said.

In other action, the Council

approved on second and final reading an ordinance prohibiting the posting of signs on utility poles and public property, defining same, providing for abatement, providing exceptions and establishing a penalty. The ordinance will become effective after publication twice in a local newspaper.

The Council rescheduled the regular Sept. 23rd meeting for Thursday, Sept. 25, as the city manager is scheduled to appear in Austin at a meeting where action is expected of the city's application for a grant of federal funds to finance improvements in east Cisco. The Austin meeting will be held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 23. The city has applied for more than \$400,000 as a grant for the work on streets and other facilities.

Former Ciscoan

Receives Award

(Editor's Note: The following article from the Sanford, Fla., Evening Herald concerns Jesse S. (Red) Cleveland, who grew up in Cisco.)

Jesse S. "Red" Cleveland, director of Aviation for the Sanford Airport Authority, was honored with the prestigious John S. Krider Memorial Topper Award by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce at an awards dinner at the Sanford Civic Center.

Bringing his wife Eloise forward with him as he accepted the award, Cleveland said modestly. "This should be a team award, because I owe a dept to all those who have helped over the years."

The award, presented by George Touhy, a past Topper Award winner, was given in recognition 'outstanding leadership, distinguished and unselfish

service to this community.' There were 350 persons in attendance at the annual event, including 40 chamber scholarship winners and their parents. Ron Dycus, 1985 chairman of the chamber board, was master of ceremonies. He was presented with a plaque of appreciation for his service by board chairman Shirley Schilke

In 1969 after a distinguished career in the U.S Navy, Commander Cleveland was looking for a "challenging assignment in a commercial complex affording ample opportunity to demonstrate management abilities" in the civilian world.

He found in the job of operating and developing the 1,685-acre Sanford Airport after it was deactivated by the navy and deeded to the city of Sanford for \$1.

Cleveland was well qualified for the job, having been executive officer of the Sanford Naval Air Station since 1966 until he retired in 1968 when it closed. He managed the installation, which had an annual operating budget of \$20 million. Sixty officers, 520 enlisted and 200 civil service personnel were assigned to the base

From 1963-65, he was air operations officer, staff, commander Naval Air Force, U.S Atlantic Fleet. He developed and directed the schedule of all naval aircraft assigned to the Naval Air Force U.S. Atlantic

Fleet. From 1943-65, as a naval aviator, progressing from pilot to air operations officer of a carrier operating in the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and as an operations officer managing an airfield of a shore installation. He did battle with the Japanese and the elements in the Pacific during World War II and received the Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medals. He was stationed on the USS Monterrey during a raging fire at sea that destroyed every plane aboard while in the midst of a typhoon.

Born July 13, 1922, in Cisco, Texas, his love affair with flying began for the kid from Cisco, Texas, when he

was riding herd on his father's ranch and had to round up the cattle spooked by low-flying Army biplanes. he said he decided then and there he was going to be the man who scattered cattle with a plane instead of one who had to round them up afterwards.

According to his brother, Buck, "Red's" first job for money was a bellboy at the town's Laguna Hotel where he delivered booze to big wheeler deelers from out of town for the local bootlegger. Cleveland set off for college in his old red Model T. which he purchased for \$25 and decorated with humorous signs. But, according to his brother, Cleveland's pranks proved too much for the president of the church-owned college, who told his father to come and get him and never bring

him back. He learned to fly at the age of 16 in the plane of a neighbor who was later killed while stunting.

He joined the Navy in 1942 and earned his wings at Corpus Christi NAS. He did his first tour of duty at NAS Sanford in 1943. He was stationed here three different times and Cleveland called Sanford "the most sought-after duty on the East Coast." He decided in the 1950s he would retire here and bought a

The Sanford Airport was officially opened April 4, 1969 and became licensed as a civilian facility in May. As airport manager, Cleveland processionally guided the fledgling airport and industrial park through political struggles and debates over who was going to have control over the operation.

Cleveland prepared a master development plan for a 20-year operation which gained the approval of the Sanford Industrial Commission and the FAA the same year. Under his leadership the airport became selfsupporting and the facilities have continued to expand. With its two major runways, it accommodates general aviation, private aircraft, helicopters and charter service: About 150 pusinesses and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department operate in the airport's industrial park. In 1985 the airport received a \$716,000 grant from the Federal Aviation Authority.

He attended the University of Missouri 1947-48 and Bethany -Penial College, 1941-42 Bethany, Okla.

Cleveland is on the board of directors of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and serves on the Aviation and Tourism committees of the chamber. A member of the Sanford Breakfast Rotary Club, he is a past president of that club and the Sanford Rotary Luncheon Club. He is a Paul Harris Fellow. He has been active in its many charitable projects and worked with the club to put on several air shows featuring the Navy's Blue Angels.

He is past president of both the Southeast and Florida Airport Managers associations. He is a member of the

Retired Officers Association and the Caterpillar Club.

He is a member and former elder of First Presbyterian Church of Sanford.

He is married to the former Eloise Collins. He has a son, Dr. Stewart Cleveland of Cisco, Texas and daughter, Virginia "Ginger" Cox of Gaffney, S.C., by his first wife, the late Elizabeth Pippin Cleveland, a Sanford native.



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

"The most important element of encouraging your child in spiritual matters is to develop a good relationship with him. Billy Graham did a survey of 1,000 churches to find out why people came to church. He found

"If these facts are true, then one could assume that THEY DEPEND ON YOU the major outreach tool of the church is relationship with people. A child will respond more readily to the person whom he knows loves him unconditionally and seeks his best welfare.'

"Secondly, a child can be encouraged in spiritual matters by watching your example. Children respond more to what adults do than what

they say.' "Thirdly, a child can be encouraged in spiritual matters by serving others. As a family, you could have a monthly service project. Perhaps there is an elderly person who is unable to mow his lawn living near you. Or





Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were donw 5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September check amounts reflect a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Eastland County's one-per cent sales tax rebate from the state is down only 6.54percent through August, compared to a year ago.

That's standing stronger than neighboring comparable counties which report bigger drops. The five cities in this coun-





Homemaking Hints From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent -

As you buy and select your new fall wardrobe, no doubt you will often see the word 'Ramie' on the fiber content label. It looks like linen, feels like linen, but isn't

Ramie is a natural fiber that has been around for hundreds of years but has only recently found a place in fashion apparel and home furnishings. Its first recorded use was for cloth to wrap Egyptian mummies. Also called China Grass, ramie is obtained from nettle plants and is a relative of the flax nettle from which linen is obtained. Nettle plants grow well in China, Taiwan, and the Philippines.

Because ramie and flax are closely related, the two fibers have man similar characteristics. Ramie is a white to off-white fiber that is absorbent, lustrous, and strong. Like other plant fibers, ramie absorbs dyes readily but also tends to release them when washed. Ramie wrinkles easily unless given a durable press finish and is brittle, making it subject to splitting if creased sharply. Ramie can be used to con-

struct a variety of fabrics from soft sweater knits to heavier woven upholstery fabrics. Often, it is blended with cotton, linen or other. natural fibers to add strength and luster to the fabric. Because ramie is relatively coarse fiber, fabrics containing ramie tend to have a nubby 'homespun" look that appeals to many people. Ramie is comfortable to

wear because it is very absorbent and, like cotton and linen, is used extensively for warm weather wear. Ramie/silk blends and ramie/wool blends hve durability and comfort characteristics · that allow them to be worn year around. Ramie is also used as a substitute for linen when an inexpensive fiber is desired. Ramie can be harvested three times a year, making it less expensive then flax, which must be pulled up when harvested.

Ramie has had to overbecause of a pilling or abrasion problem in the past. The cause of the problem was discovered to be the process used for dying the fiber. The dying systems used today have eliminated the pilling problem on ramie is gaining popularity quickly because characteristics.

The care requirements for ramie depends on a number of factors. Read labels for specific information. Ramie is strong and can withstand washing, drying and ironing with high temperatures if not treated with dyes or finishes which can change its natural characteristics. Ramie is not harmed by most cleaning agents, but again, the dyes and finished may be. Ramie is resistant to mildew, rot and insects, but can be damaged by strong bleaches and by rubbing or scrubbing.

When ramie is blended with other fibers the care procedures required are often those needed to prevent damage to the other fiber. For example, ramie/wool fabrics must not be exposed to high temperatures in order to avoid damaging the wool in the fabric.

How the fabric is used also determines the care requirements. Garments that contain interfacing and linings often require dry cleaning no matter what the fiber content. Dry-clean-only articles may show water spots if they become wet from spills or from attempts to remove stains.

Like cotton and linen, ramie shrinks unless stabilized or preshrunk. Progressive shrinking can be a problem with poorly finished



No Opinion From State **Attorney General**

Bob Mercer, Chief Dispatcher of the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch, reported to the Board of Directors Wednesday that no opinion has been received from the State Attorney General's office as to whether the logs of the Dispatch are expected under the Public Open Records

The issue of the right of public access to these logs surfaced several weeks ago when, according to Mercer, Radio Station KVMX "Wanted to look at the Dispatch Radio Logs".

The Chief Dispatcher said that afterward a Committee which included Police Chiefs from various towns met and discussed the matter.

News media personnel from two radio stations and one newspaper were initially barred and then given access to this meeting. They were advised that the Radio Logs would not be open to the public - that they would need to contact police departments in each town to obtain law enforcement information.

Mercer said that on Aug. 25 a letter addressed to Charlie Garrett, Chairman of the County Dispatch Board, was received from Buddy Moser, General Manager of Radio Station

KVMX. It basically stated two points, that he (Moser) did not believe the Dispatch Radio Logs were expected under the Open Records Laws, and that Station KVMX had information from the Attorney General's Office stating that the Dispatch had 10 days under the law to comply with the Open Records Law; or send copies of the Logs to the Attorney General's Office. There a determination would be made as to what items could be expected under the

Mercer reported that a special meeting of the Dispatch Board was called on Aug. 26. The members decided to send a letter to Austin requesting an opinion from the State Attorney General's office. No reply had yet come.

The Chief Dispatcher listed procedures the public would need to follow to get information from the Logs. First, he would have to be contacted and informed of the date of the information wanted. Next, a police officer would need to make certain that the Log of that day did not contain confidential information. If it did not, copies of the Log could be purchased at \$2 per page.

In other business during Wednesday's meeting the Directors adopted a budget of \$93,352 for the 1986-87 fiscal year.

An appropriation of \$4,000 was included for a 37.180 frequency radio. Any leftover funds from this are to be kept for the future purchase of teletype equipment.

Cisco Lions Club Hears Reverend Garvin Speak

That was an opinion expressed by the Rev. Harry Garvin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. He was presented by Truman Kirk, the program chairman.

Rev. Garvin noted that this country was settled and developed by resourceful, God-fearing people--people with "can do" spirit who believed in unity and hard work and who prayed a "give us this day our daily bread" sort of prayer.

"We need to learn to dream again," he said. "We need dreamers and achievers like the Wright Brothers, the Edisons, Mc-Cormicks and the Fords. We automobiles, refrigerators, television and

revival of the "neighborly spirit." He urged trading at home, more compassion for the unfortunate and more "be kind to one another" ac-

Rev. Garvin spent 16 years as a Baptist missionary, mostly in Uganda, before moving to Cisco about a year ago. He is a native of Lueders where he grew up on a cotton farm.

That is the substance of Texas Attorney General's Opinion Number 127, dated March 23, 1984.

Excluded from public records are the inside pages of offense reports, certain labortory, ballistic, lie detector information and other data pertaining to investigations in progress.

Also excluded are arresting officers opinions, information on witnesses, family background on the suspect, etc.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-86-13 AN ORDINANCE OF THE ESTABLISHING THE TAX LEVY FOR THE 1986-87 BUDGET YEAR OF CISCO, TEXAS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That for the budget year 1986-87 there is hereby levied on all of the property located in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the first day of January, 1986 and not exempted from taxation by the Consitution and statutes of the State of Texas, an ad valorem tax of \$.54 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property for the purposes listed below, such tax to be apportioned as follows:

\$.54 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the current expenses thereof.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law

SECTION 3. The City Council, in order to provide adequate time to prepare tax statements for 1986-87, declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.



3. No person shall post any signs upon or within private property other than his own without the consent of the owner or occupant of such premises or building.

PART III: Abatement. To abate this nuisance, employees of the City of Cisco and all utility companies are hereby authorized and instructed to remove all illegally posted signs.

PART IV: Exception: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to regulatory and informational signs belonging to and posted by the City of Cisco or applicable utility companies.

PART V: Penalty. Violations of provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor. Any person who violates this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined in accordance with Section 1-11 "General Penalty" of the City's Code of Ordinances. 
