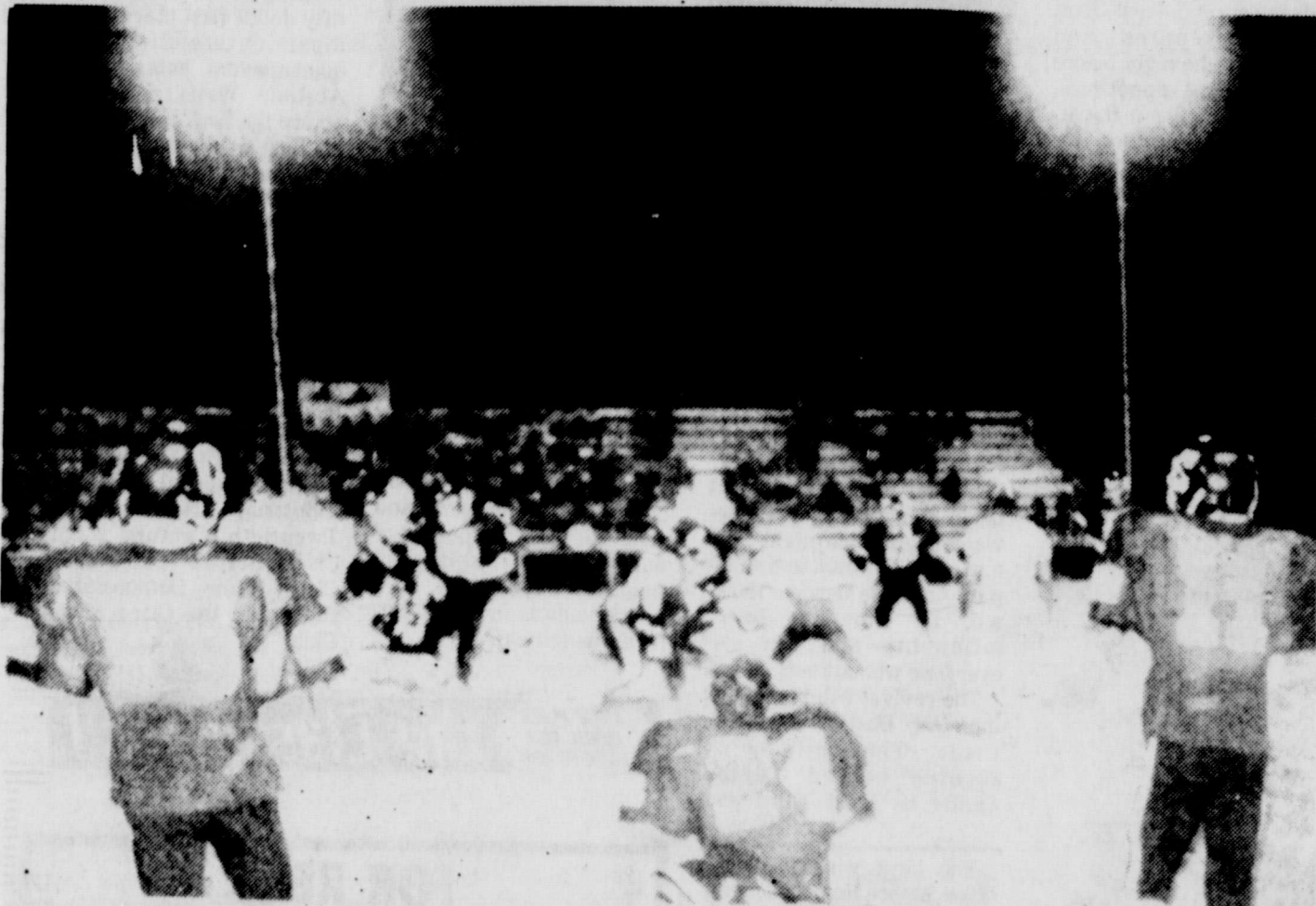

High School Loboes Defeated In Last Friday Nights Game Here

The Cisco Lobo Varsity football team was defeated by the Merkel Badgers last Friday with a score of 6-to-26. The Loboes are scheduled to play Early there next Friday night with the game beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Cisco received the kick-off by winning the toss before the game. Cisco's captains were Shelby Nixon, Steve Abbott, Billy White and Pete DeLeon. Captains from the Merkel team were Tim Harris, Mark Aldrete and Justin Amerine.

Joe Flores caught the kick-off on the 27-yard line. On the first play Cisco received a 5-yard penalty for off-sides. Cisco gained 3 yards in the next two plays and then Merkel received a 15-yard penalty for face mask which gave the Loboes a first down on the 38-yard line. Shelby Nixon kept the ball and ran

to the 44-yard line where he was tackled. But Cisco had 3 incomplete passes on the next 3 plays and had to kick to Merkel. Brian Wagon kicked the ball to Merkel on their 32 yard line.

On the second play Merkel fumbled the ball but recovered it but they lost 5 yards. Merkel lost another 5 yards when Cisco tackled the ball carrier behind the scrimmage line and forced Merkel to kick.

Roy Boykin caught the ball on Merkel's 25 yard line and ran to Cisco's 40 yard line. On the next play Merkel was penalized for a personal foul giving Cisco 15 yards.

Joe Flores carried the ball in for a touchdown but it was called back for a flag on the play. Cisco was penalized 15 yards for a personal foul that placed the ball on the 45 yard line. Roy Boykin carried the ball 32 yards and then

Merkel received a personal foul that gave Cisco 15 yards that placed the ball on the 18 yard line. Cisco made 3 yards in the next four plays and gave the ball to Merkel on the 15 yard line.

Merkel lost a yard when they fumbled but gained 15 yards when Cisco received a face mask penalty. Merkel kicked to Cisco after four plays and Cisco recovered it on the 27 yard line.

Cisco passed to Kody Wallace and then to Billy White on the next two plays giving them another first down on the 40 yard line. Joe Flores, Shelby Nixon, Roy Boykin and Steve Abbott ran in the next four plays to give Cisco another first down on the 30 yard line. Roy Boykin ran to the 15 yard line to give

Cisco another first down and that was the end of the first quarter and teams switched sides. Cisco pushed ahead 2 yards and then Joe Flores carried the ball to the 5-yard line. Merkel received a penalty which put Cisco on the 3 yard line. On the third down Steve Abbott carried the ball for a touchdown. The PAT was no good which made the score 6-to-0 with 9:10 left in the second quarter.

Merkel caught the kickoff on the 34 yard line. Cisco received a face mask penalty giving Merkel a first down on the 43-yard line. During the second play Merkel threw a pass to Ramon Moreno and ran to the 30 yard line but Cisco received

Cisco Wranglers Will Play In Cisco This Saturday

The home football season for Cisco Junior College will begin at 2:30 p.m. Saturday as the Wranglers take on Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College at Chesley Field. Both teams have 2-0 records as each has won their first two contests.

The Wranglers, who scored a 27-to-16 victory over Blinn JC in a game last Saturday night at Gatesville, began preparations for the Oklahoma game in a long workout Monday. Plans called for scrimmage sessions through Thursday.

At Gatesville, the Wranglers struck with three touchdowns in the first period and coasted to the victory. QB David Dacus hit Running Back James Dixon with a 79-yard pass play to score the first touchdown. Dacus then passed to Randy Boone, wide receiver, for 29 yards and a score, and Todd Akers plowed over from the one. Eric Edwards hit all three extra points for the 21-0 lead.

In the second period, Blinn made two field goals on shots of 28 and 37 yards by Jeff Walker. Edwards hit a field goal from 36 yards for Cisco in the second quarter. Edwards made another 36-yard field goal in the third period to end Cisco scoring.

Blinn scored twice in the third quarter - on a 19-yard field goal and on an eight-yard pass, Brown to Fayad. Walker added the extra point.

Standing out on defense for Cisco were Sam Dudley, Mark White and Andre Horton.

Dacus had a good night at the throttle, passing 30 times with 20 completions for 327 yards. He played most of the game.

Cisco had 16 first downs to Blinn's 10. Cisco gained 83 yards on 20 running plays while Blinn had 74 yards rushing and 24 yards passing on nine completions.

The Oklahoma team, which defeated Cisco last year, have won over Oklahoma State and Missouri State junior varsities.

Coach Rick Frazier reported that Tiger Mack,

Wrangler free safety, suffered a knee injury in the Blinn game and that he probably will need surgery to repair the damage. He was scheduled to see specialists in Abilene Monday afternoon.

Other members of the Wrangler squad were expected to be ready for the Saturday night.

Eric Edwards and Bobby Dino were expected to divide kicking chores.

The Wrangler Band and Belles will be presented in a half-time show.

Gov. White Issues Request To Boston For Joe Perry

Acting on a motion for extradition of Joe Thomas Perry from Boston, Mass., to Texas for trial in the Garcia murder case, the governor of Texas has issued a formal request to the governor of Massachusetts, according to Special Prosecutor Bill Hart.

Perry, 46, was captured by the FBI in Boston early this month after a search of more than a year. He was placed in jail there and refused to voluntarily return to the state. The extradition procedure, which could take up to two months, was then started by Mr. Hart and District Attorney Emory Walton. Perry has hired an attorney to fight extradition.

Perry is the last of five people charged in the Garcia

case to be apprehended. Mrs. Garcia, a resident of Cisco, was murdered in November, 1981, and two men, Charles and Thomas LeFlore, are serving sentences in the state

penitentiary in the case. Mr. Hart said that a pre-trial hearing has been set for Oct. 15 and case against the five defendants is scheduled for the 91st District Court on Dec. 10th.

Cisco Man Arrested For Drug Possession

A Cisco man was in the Eastland County jail Monday after his arrest last Saturday morning on charges of possession of a controlled substance.

The man, Dale Brown, 34, was being held in lieu of a \$5,000 bond set by the Eastland Justice of the Peace. He was arrested at Hilton and 16th Street in his

car by Sergeant Frank Thumsuden and Patrolman Kenneth Preston.

Chief Billy Rains reported to police that a man pointed a shotgun at them in their car and threatened them earlier. A search of the Brown car later turned up the suspected drugs, he said. No weapons were found.

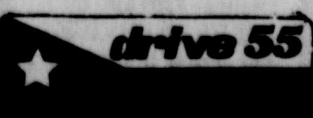

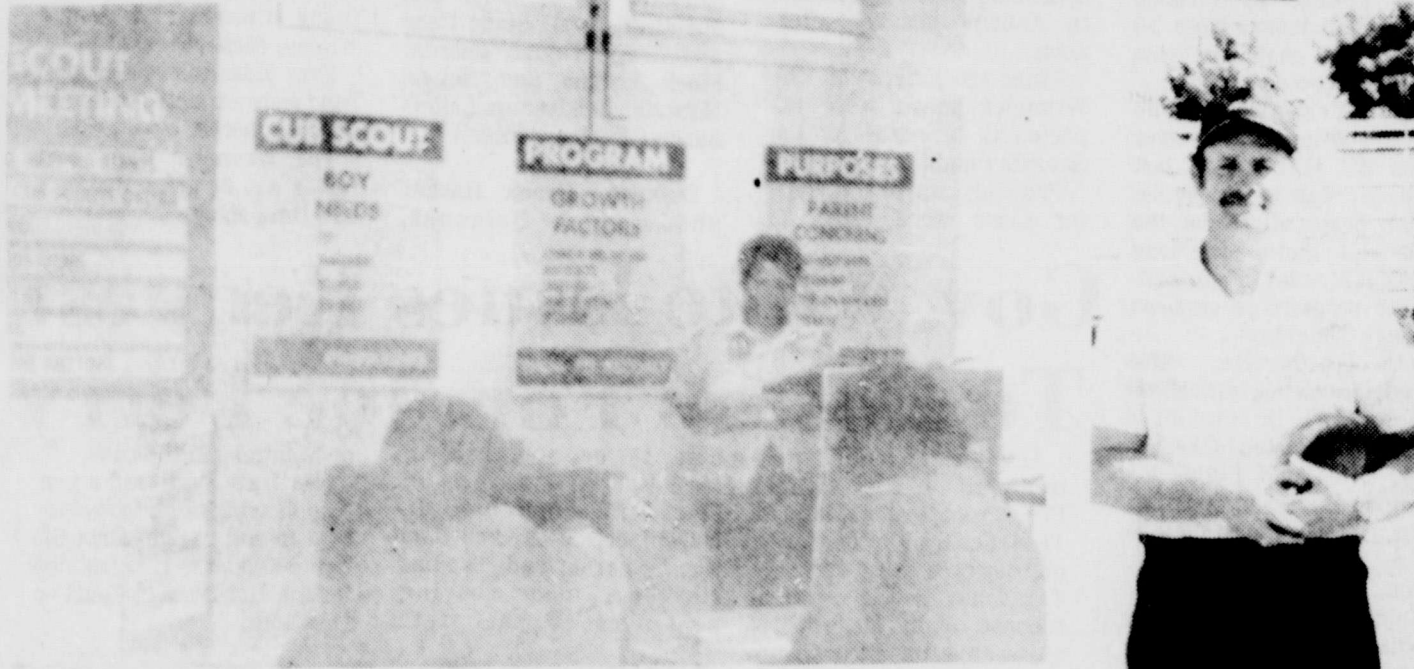
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THE SWEET EXPRESSIONS, a unique singing group whose members are from several Churches of Christ in the Austin, Texas, area, will present a 50-minute program of words,

REPORT FROM AUSTIN:

A state religious publication has published the results of voting on the para-mutual betting proposal and states that State Sen. Bob Glasgow voted FOR para-mutual and State Rep. Jim Parker voted AGAINST.

THE TEXAS Research League BULLETIN sums up the first special session as follows:

The Special Session ended - not with a bang but with a whimper! For the legislators did not resolve any of the three fiscal issues that had brought them to Austin in the dog days of August.

* The projected shortfall in revenue for the 1986-1987 biennium remains at \$3.5 billion.

* The state continues to face a cash flow problem in December and early 1987 when it will not have sufficient funds on hand to pay its bills.

* Revenues from the existing tax structure for the 1988-1989 biennium are still projected to fall at least \$5 billion short of funding a no-increase budget.

The failure to resolve any of these issues resulted from an impasse between the House and the Senate over the nature, magnitude, and timing of the fiscal policy actions needed to deal with the situation.

Given the magnitude of the state's financial difficulties, and the speed with which they developed, it is not surprising that it has taken time to forge some type of consensus solution.

HOUSE FOCUSES ON CASH FLOW PROBLEM

From the outset, the House, led by Speaker Gib Lewis, took the position that the basic problem needing to be addressed was the cash flow issue. They sought to solve this problem by a combination of expenditure reductions and accounting changes that would prevent the state from running short of funds in 1986. This would leave the budget problems to be resolved in the regular legislative session beginning next January.

SENATE SEEKS TO REGAIN SOLVENCY IN 1986-1987

The Senate, led by Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, also took a consistent position from the outset, arguing that the state should act immediately to eliminate the 1986-1987 shortfall - an action that would also resolve the cash flow problem and go a long way toward resolving the 1988-1989 projected revenue shortfall as well. It was not possible to achieve sufficient savings by budget reductions. Therefore, a significant tax increase was proposed.

GOVERNOR PROPOSES MIDDLE ROAD SOLUTION

Governor White proposed a combination of expenditure cuts and a temporary tax increase to bring the 1986-1987 budget into balance. It would also have solve the cash flow problem, but would have left unaddressed the issue of the 1988-1989 budget.

OUTCOME -- A

STALEMATE

In the end, the Senate refused to enact budget cuts unless the House passed a tax increase. It accomplished this by attaching to its expenditure reduction bill a provision that required a new certification of the appropriation bill for the proposed cuts to become effective. For its part, the House refused to even consider a tax bill.

SECOND SESSION

The Governor has called the legislature back into special session on September 8. Hopes are that a compromise will emerge involving House acceptance of a tax hike in return for the Senate accepting more sizeable spending reductions.

Both agree that some accounting changes are needed to enable the state to avoid a serious cash flow problem. Moving the state payroll ahead to the first of the following month (effective for the December payroll) was approved. Under consideration are proposals to make required payments to the Teacher Retirement Fund in eight rather than twelve installments and to fund more of the Department of Public Safety from the Highway Fund.

Any compromise would have to involve agreement on a spending-cut package. Splitting the difference between the House (\$739 million) and the Senate (\$418 million) would mean budget cuts of about \$580 million. Both houses already approved elimination of the 3% state salary increase for FY 1986-87. At the close of the special session last week, House-Senate conferees had reconciled many of the spending cut differences. Other budget changes (delaying the state pay date, etc.) would add another \$353 million, bringing total spending changes to \$933 million.

Agreement on a tax bill may be more difficult to achieve. If it were to occur, it likely would involve a (temporary?) hike in the state sales tax rate from 4 1/8% to 5 1/4% perhaps combined with a \$.05 increase in the motor fuels tax rate. That would increase revenue by about \$852 million.

Together, those two actions would solve about \$1.8 billion of the current budget problem. That combined with a delay of the payments into the Teacher Retirement Fund and interfund borrowing would see the general revenue fund through into 1987.

PARTIAL SOLUTION

It is apparent that whatever actions are taken in the second special session, they will at best resolve the cash flow problem and address only part of the 1986-87 revenue shortfall. If tax action is taken, it would of course provide some additional revenue for the 1988-1989 biennium, unless it is adopted on a temporary basis (as is likely). Clearly that would leave a significant challenge for the legislature when it meets next January. A later League Public Finance

Attorney General Clarifies Open Record Act of 1984

Attorney General John Hill in 1984 issued a lengthy decision (Open Records Decision No. 127) dealing with the applicability of Section 3(a) (8) (the law enforcement exception) of the Open Records Act to various records. The opinion was requested by two city attorneys, a chief of police, a county attorney and the director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Attorney General concedes that the recent Supreme Court opinion (Houston Chronicle Publishing Co. v. City of Houston) indicates that a question remains as to some of the information held to the public by the Court of Civil Appeals. However, Hill said the "opinion of the latter court is the most authoritative judicial interpretation of section 3(a) (8) of the Open Records Act available, and this office will follow that interpretation."

Hill's staff prepared the following summary of the decision of the Court of Civil Appeals as applied to specific records and information:

CISCO
A tax rate of 54 cents per \$100 valuation for 1987 was approved for the next fiscal year by the City Council at a regular meeting. The rate was set following a public hearing called to allow taxpayers to express their opinions. This rate is one cent lower than the 1986 rate of 55 cents, but property values have been raised some \$2,500,000. The new rate represents a tax increase of 2.85% for property owners, City Manager Mike Moore reports.

An ordinance raising rates charged for users of water in excess of 12,000 gallons per month has been enacted. It became effective Sept. 15. City Manager Mike Moore told the council that action seems necessary. At Lake Cisco the water level is near a five-year low, and the lake is the city's only source of water. "The time has come for strict conservation," Moore said. He added that the only alternative would be to find a new source of water.

Plans are being made for the Cisco High School Homecoming Parade, which will be held Friday, Oct. 3. "The funding is in the amount of \$36,813 and will be used to reduce the number of low-income elderly persons

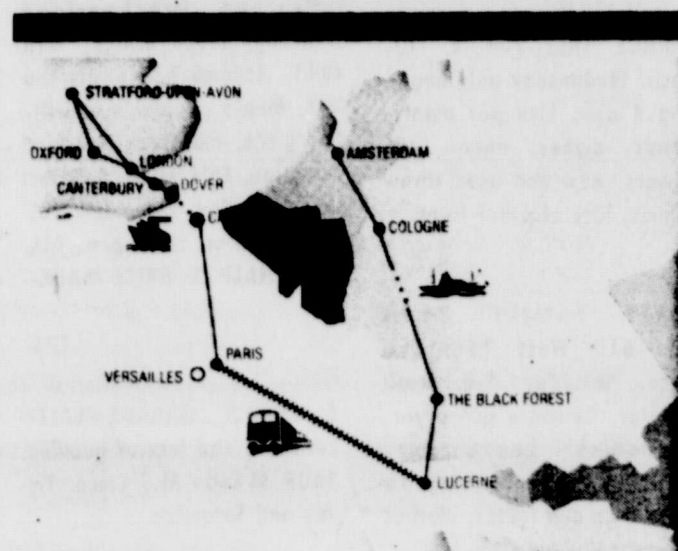
on waiting lists to receive home-delivered meals and also provide meal assistance to elderly persons recently released from hospitals," stated Senator Glasgow.

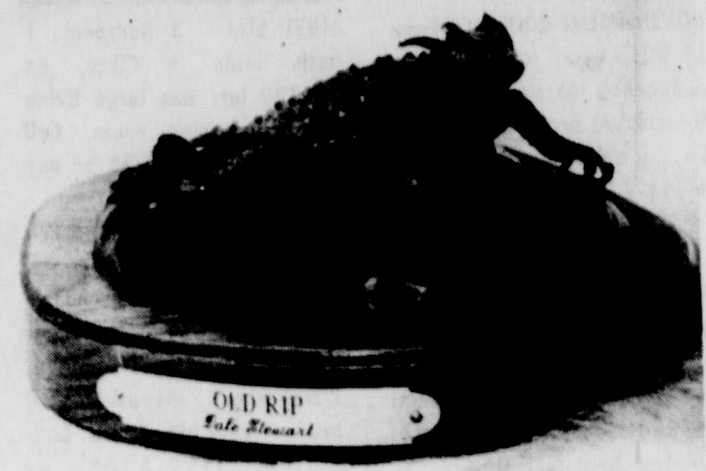

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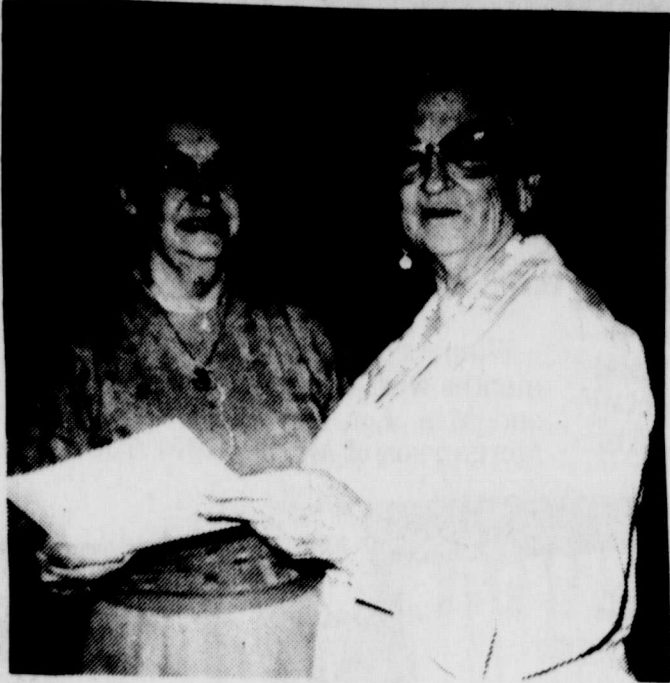

Gordon Spot

Cool weather signals rye planting time. Many homeowners overseed lawns or barren areas without established turf with rye to prevent erosion of topsoil during fall and winter. Of course, rye enjoys cold temperatures and remains green and growing throughout the winter when bermuda and St. Augustine are dormant.

Because many nurseries are selling rye grass, gardeners should understand that annual rye grass used for lawns is not the rye which should be planted in gardens. Rye grass remains small; cereal or Elbon rye grows much taller and provides much more organic matter. Neither of these ryes should be seeded before cool temperatures arrive since germination of rye in hot soils is practically impossible.

After several years of testing, cereal rye has proven to be the fastest growing, most cold-tolerant, annual grass available. Gardeners can plant cereal rye in late fall and have a thick mat of grass about 10-15 inches high in late winter. Shred this grass with a lawn mower or flexible string trimmer and till it into the soil so that it can rot before spring planting. Shredding and tillage one month before planting allows for adequate decomposition.

Planting cereal rye offers many advantages. Cereal type rye beautifies the garden area with greenery. It will add the best organic matter available to the

garden soil, and this type of "green manure" crop decomposes rapidly. As if these benefits were not enough, cereal rye roots serve as a "trap crop" for nematodes.

Once nematodes enter cereal rye roots, they cannot escape and will perish. When cereal rye decomposes, as does most organic matter, it releases organic acids which tend to help reduce soil alkalinity.

Cereal rye can be planted by merely seeding directly on top of the garden soil and raking in. Apply seed at the rate of one pound per 100 square feet of garden area to insure good coverage. Raking may not even be necessary. Be sure to water rye regularly (once a week) and fertilize for maximum growth. Always shred rye before it forms seed heads since sprouting rye seed in early spring may become a nuisance. Rye seeded in the fall will not become a weed problem in the spring since rye plants cannot withstand hot temperatures and will die.

OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 4, 1986

**PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a

bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a premium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled.

The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

Testimony began Tuesday in 91st District Court with Judge Jim Wright presiding, in a trial in which a 15-year-old is being tried as an adult for murder.

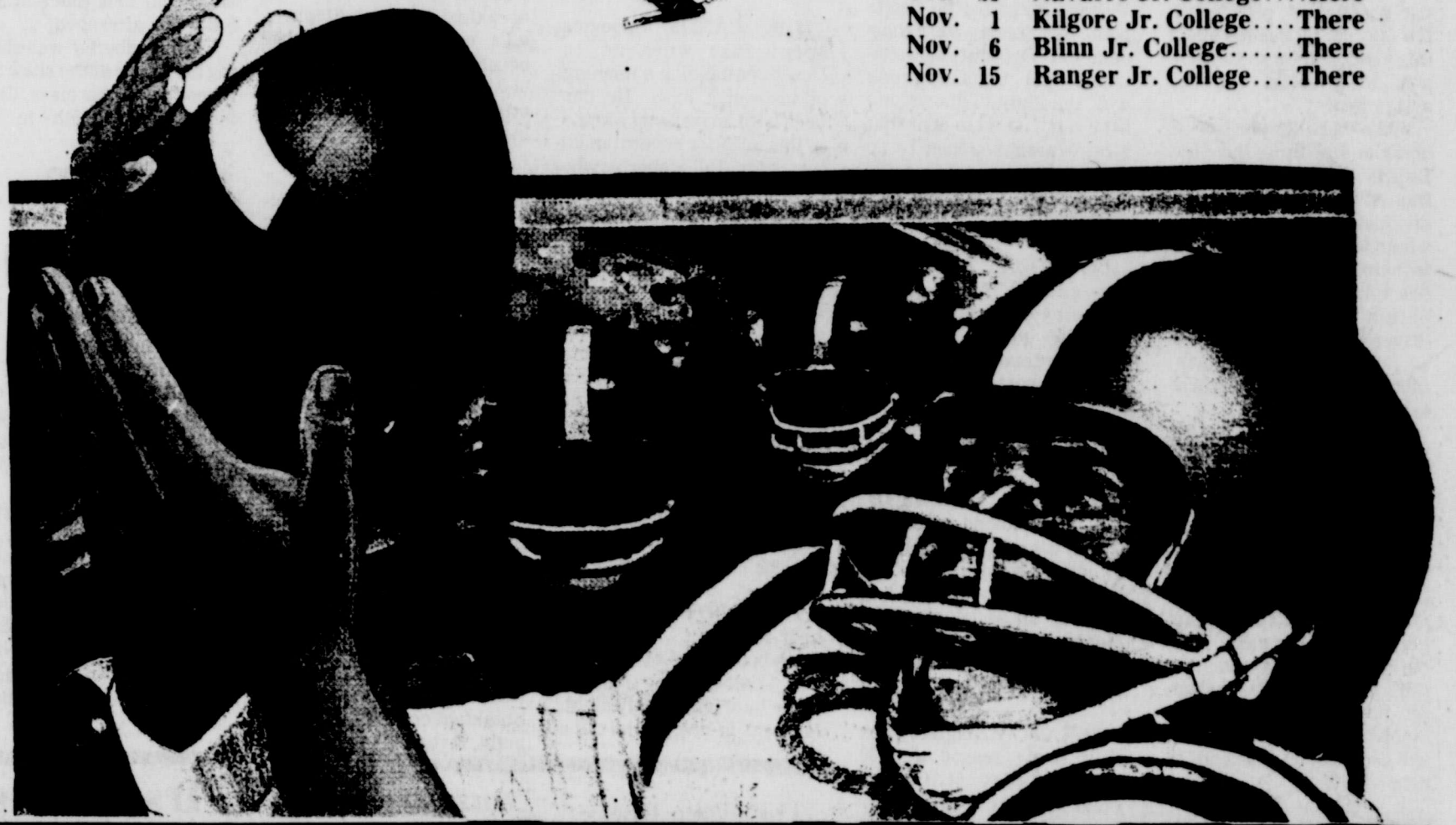
