J.D. grew up near Eastland County, at Natty Flat, Texas (that's over near Santo). He is looking forward to being in Cisco to help celebrate Homecoming.

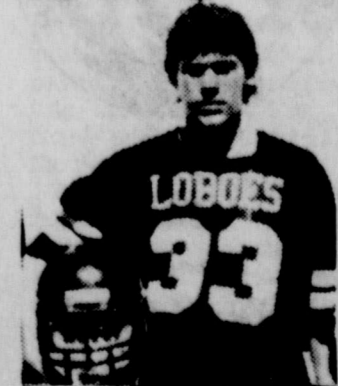

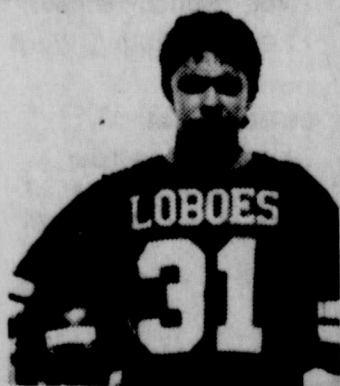
BRIAN WAGON

the ball on the 6 yard line with 4th down and 3 yards to go, but Cisco was able to keep them from making a first down and the ball was turned over to Cisco. On the first play of the Loboes Brian Wagon was handed the ball and ran 95 yards for a touchdown with 37 seconds left in the 2nd quarter. A 2 point conversion for the Loboes was no good and the score at the end of the first half was 13-to-12 in favor of Roscoe.

With 1:53 left in the 3rd quarter, Roscoe's Hilly Williams ran in 4 yards for a touchdown. Their P.A.T. was no good. The score was 19-to-12.

Cisco quarterback Shelby Nixon threw a pass to Billy White from the 31 yard line and Billy ran in from the 5 yard line for a touchdown for Cisco with 10:22 left in the fourth quarter. The P.A.T.

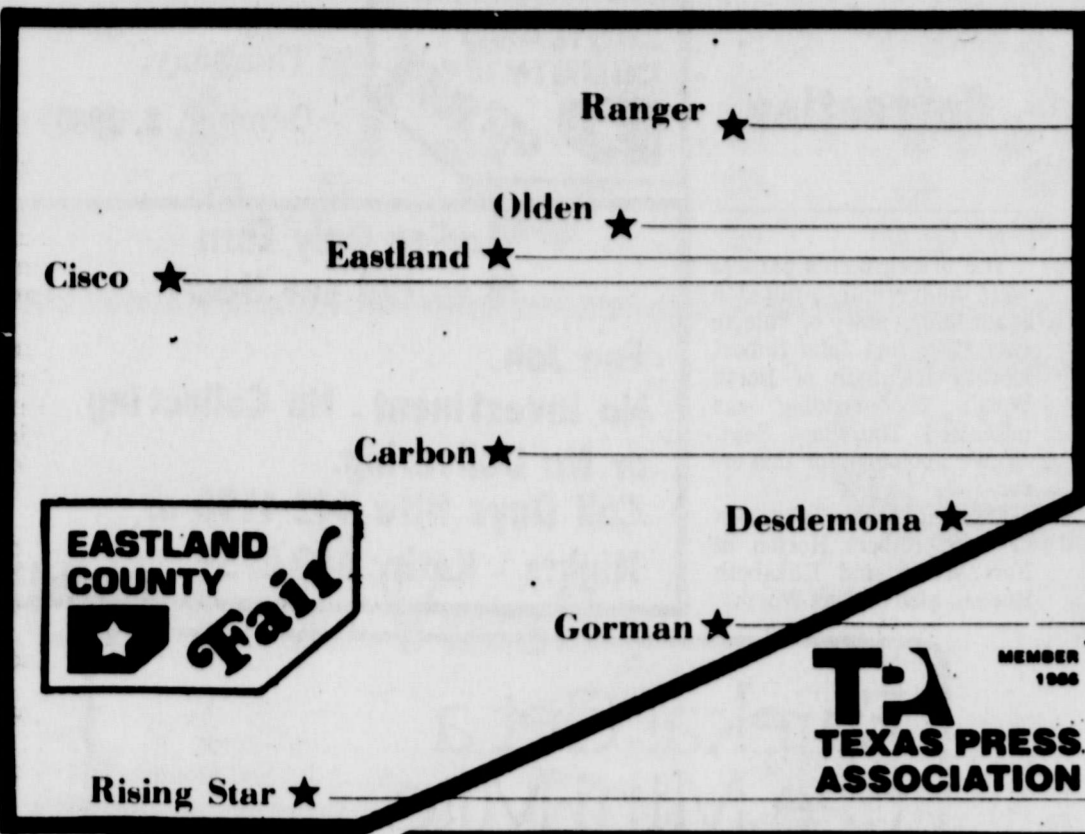

What looks like a final bill for Yellow Page Advertising but is actually a direct mail solicitation is being sent and possibly paid by unsuspecting businesses in the 13 county area being served by the Better Business Bureau.

Bob Test, president of the B.B.B. cautioned business people to be on the look out for a McAllen Texas firm that is using deceptive advertising practices. Although this company is not breaking the law, they seem to be working in a very gray area with their mail advertisements. They use a logo that is very similar to the traditional "Let Your Fingers Do The Walking" Yellow Page campaign, and use bold type statements like Final Notice and Telephone

Directory to intimidate Eastland County business people to pay the \$95.00 charge immediately. Test said that this company, although referring to itself as U.S. Yellow Pages, it is really "United States Builders and Contractors" and has been asked to modify its advertising to conform to Better Business Bureau standards.

If Eastland County businesses receive an item like this be aware that the \$95.00 ask for goes for a Builders Trade Directory, not telephone Yellow Pages. Business people are asked to call toll free 1-800-688-6818 if they have questions or comments to the Better Business Bureau.

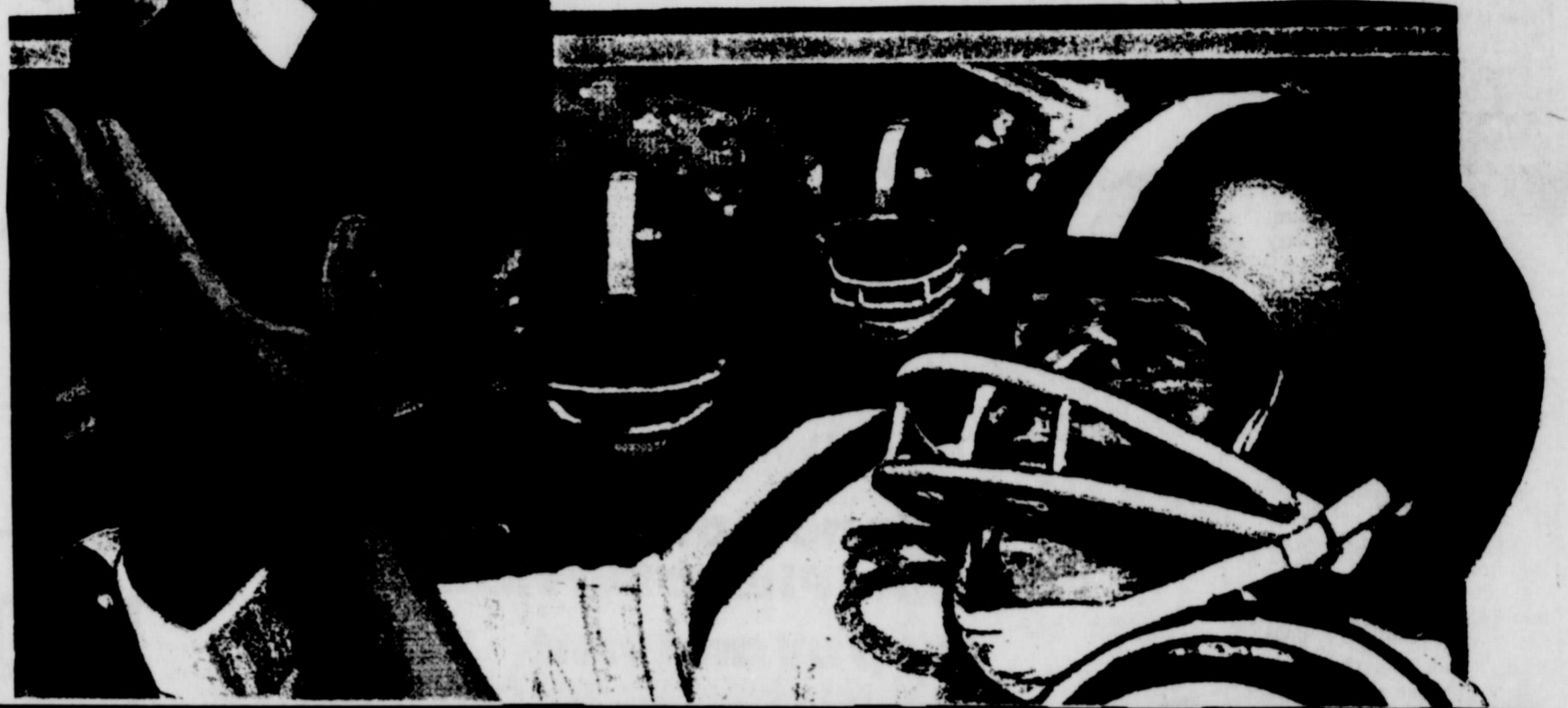

Prescription For Parents

THE GREATEST THING WE CAN DO FOR OUR CHILDREN

"And walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweetsmelling savour." Eph. 5:2

Everyone at one time has asked himself, "What is the object of desire, the gift to covet?"

Paul tells us "If I have all faith, so that I can remove mountains, and have not love, I am nothing. He deliberately contrasts, "Now abideth faith, hope, love and without hesitation says, "the greatest of these is love."

Doctors know what love does. Love, properly applied, could virtually empty asylums, prisons and hospitals. Love is the root of psychiatric treatments. Love can be fostered, extended, used to eliminate hate and cure illnesses. Christ gave the commandment - love. Where love is, there is God.

I would like to discuss with you 8 ingredients of love. These make up the supreme gift. These are not set apart from our everyday lives. These are a part of many acts which make up the sum of every day. The very way our children see these ingredients practiced in our lives will be the way they learn to put them into action in their own lives.

Patience - This is the normal attitude of love. Love is calm, ready to do its work when the time comes but meantime, wearing the ornament of a quiet spirit. Love understands and therefore waits.

Kindness - Have you ever noticed how much of Christ's life was spent in doing kind things? Look over the life of Christ with that in mind and you will find he spent a great proportion of His time simply making people happy. Do we teach our children how to make others happy?

Generosity - "Love envieth not". Whenever you do good work you will find others doing the same kind of work and probably doing it better. Don't envy them. Teach your children that they have their own special work to do for the Lord.

Humility - Put a seal on your lips and forget what you have done.

Courtesy - Love in little things. Love cannot behave itself unseemly. You can put the most uneducated person into the highest society and if they are filled with God's love, they will not behave themselves unseemly.

Unselfishness - Half the world is going down the wrong track in pursuit of happiness. They think happiness consists of getting and being served by others. "He that would be greater among you, let him serve."

Good temper - "Love is not

easily provoked." We speak of it as a family trait, an infirmity not a thing to take seriously and yet, the Bible teaches it is most destructive. No form of greed, not drunkenness itself does more to destroy, to break up families and relationships, for devastating homes, for devouring men, women and children. In short, sheer misery producing this influence stands by far the greatest. What are your children learning about this from you?

I believe in that day of judgement we will be asked not how often did you attend meetings or how did you fit into society, but "How did you love?" Our final test won't be "What have I achieved", not "What have I believed?" but "How have I shown love?"

Where love is, God is. He that dwelleth in love,

dwelleth in God. God is love - therefore, love, without procrastination. Lavish it upon the poor, where it is easy, lavish it upon the rich, who often need it most. Lavish it upon our peers, where it is very difficult.

This is - prayer that I have had several years. You may want to keep it as a reminder as I have, that we are constantly being imitated. What kind of child are we forming by our example?

PARENT'S PRAYER
O Heavenly Father make

me a better parent. Teach me to understand my children, to listen patiently to what they have to say, and to answer all their questions kindly. Keep me from interrupting them or contradicting them. Make me as courteous to them as I would have them be to me. Forbid that I should ever laugh at their mistakes or resort to shame or ridicule when they displease me. May I never punish them for my own selfish satisfaction to show my power. Let me not tempt my child to lie or steal. And

guide me hour by hour that I may demonstrate by all I say and do that honesty produces happiness. Reduce, I pray the meanness in me. And when I am out of sort, help me, O Lord to hold my tongue. May I ever be mindful that my children are children and I should not expect of them the judgement of adults. Let me not rob them of the opportunity to wait on themselves and to make decisions. Bless me with the bigness to grant them all their reasonable requests and the courage to deny the privilege I know will do them harm. Make me fair and just and kind and fit me, O Lord, to be loved and respected and imitated.

Gordon Spot

Texas farmers bid another 819,308 acres of highly erodible farmland into the government's Conservation Reserve Program during the latest sign-up period.

That puts more than 1,127,000 acres of Texas farmland into the program, which evolved from the 1985 farm bill as an effort to curb erosion losses on fragile farmland and at the same time reduce the production of already surplus crops.

Nationwide, 8,902,889 acres are now enrolled in the CRP. Some 45 million acres are targeted for the program over a five-year sign-up period, with 11.5 million of those being in Texas.

To participate in the CRP, a farmer or landowner must first determine if his land is highly erodible as classified by the Soil Conservation Service. Then he must submit a bid to the Agricultural

Stabilization and Conservation Service on the amount of payment he feels is justified based on the land's production history.

The maximum bid price on land accepted into the CRP has varied across Texas, ranging from \$40 per acre on the High Plains to \$55 per acre in the Rio Grande Valley. During the most recent sign-up period, the average acceptable bid for Texas was \$29.53 per acre.

Land accepted into the program must be kept out of production for 10 years and must be planted to grass or trees to control wind and water erosion. Costs of establishing conservations measures are split 50-50 with the government.

Additional rules are now being proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture relating to the management

of highly erodible lands and wetlands and to conservation compliance that ties conservation efforts to commodity programs. This means that farmers cultivating highly erodible land or converting wetlands and not complying with locally approved conservation plans would be denied commodity program benefits such as price and income supports, disaster payments, crop insurance, and related payments. In addition, cost-sharing funds for conservation practices would not be allowed on lands in violation.

Since these provisions have far-reaching implications, farmers and landowners are encouraged to submit comments to the Director of Cotton, Grain and Rice Support Division, USDA/ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington D.C. 20013, or to the local ASCS office, no later than October 25.

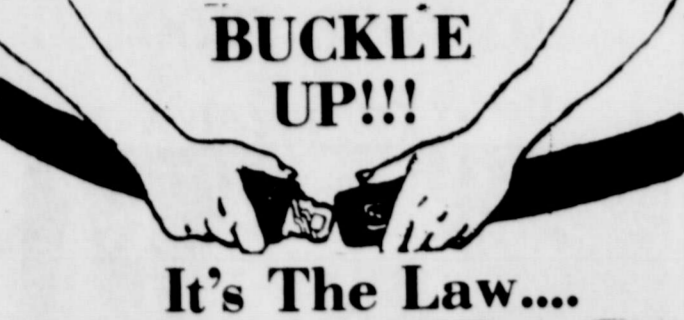

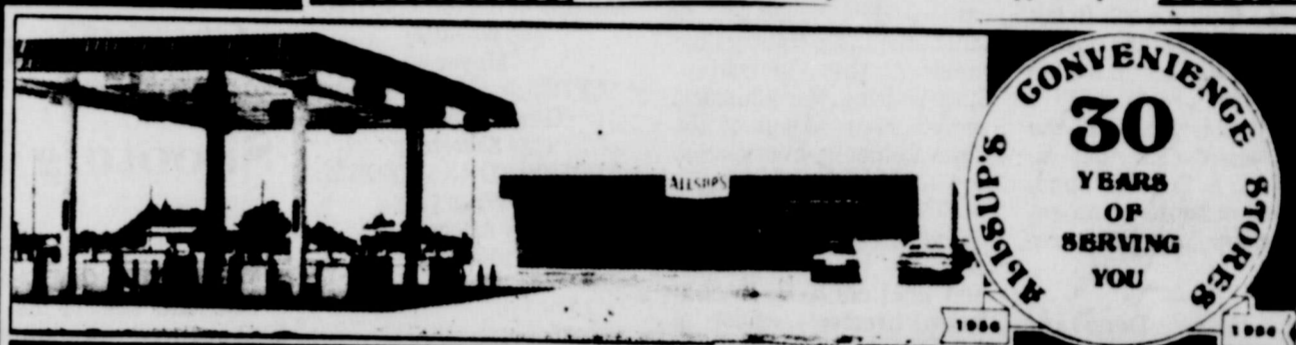

All over 200,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons	2.00

Hot Checks Fee To Be Increased

Of late, the City has been overloaded with an influx of hot checks turned over to the Municipal Court for collection. To reinforce the City's efforts in collecting these hot checks for Cisco businessmen, effective October 1, 1986 the Municipal Court has established a new and increased fee structure. In collecting hot checks if a warrant must be issued, the following fines and fees will be assessed: \$1-\$100, \$130.67; \$101-\$200, \$175.56; and \$200 or over, \$210.67. These fines and fees are in addition to the amount of the check. Judge Fry stated that "to avoid these court costs, it is highly advisable not to write hot check in the City of Cisco and if you do, take care of them before they are turned over to the court for collection."

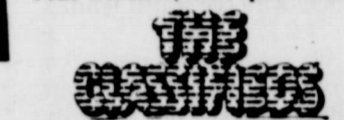
