The slate of officers presented at the October neeting will be voted in for December installation.



She stated that our veterans were poorly served, experimented on, operated on by inexperienced interns, etc. Furthermore, she thought that the mobile homes at Camp Walters should be moved up near the Dallas V.A. hospital so the vets family members could be near their loved ones being treated (though letter infered mistreated). To the uninformed it might sound logical to provide the best for the former defenders of the nation and even a disgrace that it wasn't being done. Her letter probably prompted a few angry letters to

The cold facts are (I have been in that hospital more times than I like to remember) viewed by one with experience quite different.

Yes, like all major medical facilities, V.A. hospitals have interns and much of the work done on me was by interns. Opening by stub arm and scraping the bone where infection had set in was done by a couple of interns. It was no big thing threating life much. Still, a expert was at their elbow during the procedure. Likewise, an intern worked on the only eye I have and

Region 4 Clinic

To Charge Fees

The Eastland clinic announced today that the clinic as well as all public health clinics in the forty-four county Texas Public Health Region 4, will begin collecting fees from patients December 1, 1986.

Payment will be based on the patient's abilities to pay, allowing for income, family size, and types of treatment needed.

Because the Texas Department of Health's funds for distribution to public health clinics have been limited, and because the number of patients has increased while health care costs have soared, those patients who can afford to contribute to the costs of their services will be asked to do so.

Charing small fees for clinic services is a way patients can help the state pay for the minimum costs of services, and it is a means of ensuring continued services to all who need health care.

No one will be denied service at the clinic because they do not have money. Those who do have some resources need to help pay for the services they receive, and allow us to use the limited funds available to keep on serving everyone. Anyone who can afford private health care is urged

to see a family physician. Fees will be collected using a sliding scale. Many patients are already familiar with one or all of the programs, so a sliding scale as simple as the one designed should be easily understood.f Bilingual information is to be handed out to paitents, and the staff is trained to answer any questions pa-tients might have about the new system.

Every cent of the patient's contributions will go toward defraying the growing costs that have threatened the clinic's ability to continue serving all persons who need did four by-pass surgery on my heart. Always the experts were right there. In fact, the young men's hands might be steadier on the knife than some older doc's.

The mortality record for V.A. is much lower for heart surgery than the average for other hospitals. If our exservice men were indeed being used as guinea pigs as the lady charged that simply wouldn't be reflected by low

Probably unknown by or forgotten by most people is the fact that medical experimentation is strongly restricted by law. While experiments were formerly done in prisons and mental institutions, laws were enacted forbidding coersion, requiring concent by family, rejecting concent forms signed by the mentally impaired, and requiring review to prevent abuses. You are now more likely to receive medication which has not been absolutely tested from a local doctor than from V.A. In such a fish bowl as they work, a malpractice would hardly go unreported for

Ah, yes, they are kept waiting for longer periods. One vet sitting beside me said they wasted time asking the same old questions every time he came in and he was going to tell them they already had all that written if only they would read the record. I told him that my record was probably as thick as a dictionary and that I didn't want to wait while they searched through all

A minutes reflection and he decided he would answer those same old questions. Certainly we wait, but the cost of maintaining staff for instant service would be

And while considering cost I turn to those empty mobile homes at Camp Walters. The land purchase required to locate them near V.A. in Dallas would be frightening even if there were no budget problems and cleaning, police protection and record keeping V.A., would have to provide would be prohibitive. The best we can say about the letter the lady wrote is tht with her man in serious condition her thought processess were temporarily malfunctioning. The rub is in that others might react in sympathy to her outcry.

I know of a case in Bryan, Texas where a doctor neglected a man who has not been drinking at all but was struck by a beer bottle while passing a taven. He left 11 children fatherless.

Back to Dallas, I was once held over three weeks because a routine chest X-ray showed a suspicious cleft in the vertibray. They had to wait that long to get the top bone specialist flown in from AnnArbor, Michigan to check it out because they did not know what to make of it. > The first test run was fueled by oil, but coal will be burned in future tests as the boilers are brought up to full load. An on-site supply of low-sulphur coal has been building up since July, when the first coal train arrived from Gillette, Wyo.

longer depend on just one source of fuel," said Walter Meller of Abilene, WTU's Manager of System Produc-

"This new feul mix means cheaper energy for all our customers in the long run," he siad. "And in the short run, the more stable fuel costs will help offset higher base rates that will be necessary to pay for the new plant.

WTU officials say an application for an increase in base rates will be filed after the plant becomes commercial, although details have not been worked out. WTU has not raised its base rates in over two years, and has lowered its fuel charges and made fuel cost refunds four times to its retail customers.

The Oklaunion Power Station is by far the largest in the WTU system. Construction began in 1982 and all equipment is the most modern available, including state-of-the-art pollution control facilities.

From the beginning, ownership was shared by two other companies in the Central and South West Corp.-Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co. Since construction began, PSO and CPL have sold portions of their shares to the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority and the City of Brownsville. WTU remains majority owner and operator of the station.




