City council votes 3-to-1 to support dairy "loan" **By MARSHALL STINNETT** Journal writer

The recommendation of the Muleshoe Economic Development Corporation to the Muleshoe City Council agreed to offer a no interest forgivable loan to Beth and Jerry Osterkamp to help with the dairy they are constructing. Construction has already started on the former Joe and Darla Rhodes farm at the intersection of State Highways 1760 and 1731.

The dairy is permitted for 3,800 head and expected to employ 20 to 25 people.

The Osterkamps expect to began milking next spring.

The loan is to be forgiven at one third for three years based on production and employment.

The motion to make the loan out of the Economic Development Fund passed the council 3-to-1. Councilmen Juan Chavez and Clifford Black voted for the loan along with Mayor Victor Leal. Councilman Earl Behrends voted against.

Behrends told the Journal the money "is called a loan but its not." He said, "I realize the benefits of the dairy, but it's called a loan and it's not." He said he would have supported half the amount.

Council votes; result shows lack of confidence

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The Muleshoe City Council voted to deny to the police department the extra policeman the council had approved in the new budget in September.

At their Monday morning meeting, the council used the denial as a way of expressing their lack of confidence in the department.

The vote was 3-to-1 with Councilmen Earl Brehrends and Clifford Black voting to support the motion made by Juan Chavez to deny the new policeman. Mayor Victor Leal voted against the motion. Councilwoman Sharon Grant was absent.

Chavez said there was an agreement in the budget meeting not to hire a new policeman

"If things with the Police Department have not gotten better. I don't see any improvement".

Leal argued that denying the new policeman was to punish the police, but was really punishing the citizens by denying the additional police protection. Leal said, "The city deserves certain patrols and other protection."

Preparations begin for crisis pregnancy center


Compassionate Care Center of Muleshoe is getting closer to being ready to open their crisis pregnancy center.

The building for their center was donated by Marvin Davenport. This building used to stand on the lot where the new jail is being built, but has since been moved to a location behind the Rainbow Room on American Boulevard. The foundation has been poured and the building has been gutted in preparation for renovations.

"The center will be used to help pregnant women in crisis who do not have a source of help or income," said Pastor Steve Claybrook, "With the goal in mind of helping every girl save her pregnancy."

The center's purpose statement is to promote an atmosphere of loving concern for a woman as she deals with an unplanned pregnancy in her life. In this loving concern, she will find that there are options

available to her other than abortion, and people willing to help her make those options a reality.

There will be a phone number established for those in need. The center will provide counseling and referrals to other agencies that will aid pregnant women in different ways.

"We want to provide options and sources for these women so they don't feel that abortion is the only answer," said Claybrook. "We want to give them alternatives."

The organization is planning a "Tea and Christmas Gala" fund-raiser on December 6 from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Family Life Building at First Assembly of God (521 S. First Street). Cost for adults will be \$5 and cost for children will be \$3. The "Gala" will feature Christmas carols and theme deco-

votes to support **CofC ad budget**

The Muleshoe City Council voted 2to-0 to give the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce Merchant's Committee \$5,000 from the City's Hotel/Motel Fund to establish a retail advertising coop fund.

Councilpersons Sharon Grant and Juan Chavez were not present at the time of the vote and Mayor Victor Leal recused himself because his business might benefit from the advertising.

The advertising will be matched by the merchants and is designed to draw business from out of town for Christmas shopping. The money would also be used to attract shoppers on Valentine's and the annual July 4th celebration.

The council also approved the receipts of the Comite Patriotico for 16th of September celebration.

In other business, the council heard a review of the Emergency Operation Plan for Muleshoe and Bailey County by Management Coordinator Tony Scolley.

The council agreed to a Mutual Aid Agreement with Regional Councils of Governments for mutual cooperation in time of a disaster.

Christmas is around the corner and the annual Christmas Card Project is under way. This project was started in the mid 1970s by the Hospital Auxiliary.

"It began with a group of women who decided that instead of mailing local Christmas cards, they would donate the money to make improvements for residents at the hospital or nursing home," said Joyeline Costen, current chairperson of the project.

Costen has been in charge of the project since around 1990. She recruited Lona Embry to be her co-chairperson at that time.

Major renovations at the hospital and old nursing home which have been financed through the project include furnishings for the dining room, new carpet, a sound system, and a kitchen remodel. More recently, donations to the project were earmarked for a major contribution made to Park View when it was first opened — beauty shop equipment and supplies. The project has also paid for a gazebo to be built on the lawn at Park View. Currently, the project is paying for Jesse Castorena of Castorena Carpentry to install display shelves in each of the residents' rooms.

"We try to get things that benefit every one of the residents," said Costen.

According to Costen, their is no minimum amount to donate to the project.

"Even 50 cents can add up. Every amount counts and we can use every penny," she said. "No one knows how much anyone donates and every name will



Glen Scott had 14 knockdowns, 14 pancakes, ten 5-yard blocks, 18 chops and four blocks down field. In a season shortened by injury, Kory Atwood had

10 knockdowns, 17 pancakes and 14 chop blocks. Juan Nuñez had eight knockdowns, 28 pancakes, six 5-yard blocks, 19 chops and 10 blocks on kick-offs.

The Mule defense gave up a total of 2,347 yards. Teams rushed for 1,587 yards and threw for 760. J. Nuñez led the Mules with 111 tackles that included eight tackles for a loss, three sacks and nine quarterback pressures.

Black had 108 tackles and broke up seven passes while Marricle made 104 stops with 11 for a loss and caused six fumbles. King added 84 tackles with 14 for a loss, three sacks, four caused fumbles and 16 quarterback pressures.

Reyes returned 10-kick offs for 301 yards and two punts for 15. Campolla had 11-kick off returns for 288 yards and 11-punt returns for 93. Miguel Nuñez made 10-of-12 extra point kicks.

Tatom Heathington punted 20 times for 718 yards to average 35.9 yards. The Mules out scored their opponents 162-156

during the season.







You don't have to be an English major to be amazed by the power of words, but the English major under my hat is still amazed every time I open a really great book and find myself inside the head of a really great man. It's almost a miracle to be able to sit at the feet of men and

women who have long been gone but whose wisdom lives advantage of it.

One of the greatest men of the 20th century-and one of my personal heroes-was Winston Churchill. I've been reading the first sizeable volume (entitled The Gathering Storm) of his Nobel-prize-winning work, The Second World War. Published in 1948, this book is full of the perspective and the wisdom of a man with whom any would-be leader should become wellacquainted.

Roosevelt asked Churchill what he thought the war (World War II) should be called, Churchill replied, "The Unnecessary War." It was, according to Churchill, a war that would have been completely unnecessary if the winners of the First World War had held their ground and behaved wisely. Instead, war-weary and hungry for peace at any price, they slept at the helm while Hitler took over the ship. Early on, Churchill saw what was happening and with a few others tried to sound the alarm, but to no avail.

The world watched as Hitler gobbled up Austria and showed time and again a complete willingness to break his word and any number of treaties. Corporal Hitler was a very dangerous man, a very evil man.

England's prime minister, Neville Chamberlain, was, on the other hand, by all accountseven those of his political adversaries-a good and peace-loving man. He longed for peace and, three times, went to Germany to meet with Herr Hitler. Chamberlain led Europe in acceding to Hitler's demands, even at the price of the honor of Britain and France. When Hitler cast his eyes toward Czechoslovakia, Chamberlain encouraged France to ignore a treaty obligating them to defend the Czechs, on, if only we sit down and take which allowed Britain to sidestep for the time its own obligations to France. Czechoslovakia was thus sacrificed, parceled up, and thrown to the hounds like chunks of old meat. Hitler's appetite increased even as Chamberlain tried to avoid war "sweet reasonableness." by Sadly ironic is the fact that Hitler's generals were planning a coup against him that would likely have been successful but was put off (and never happened) because Chamberlain When President Franklin chose to come to visit Hitler on the very day the coup was to take place.

The Old Testament prophets



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warn us about those who say, "'Peace, peace,' when there is no peace." And Jesus himself tells us to be "wise as serpents" at the same time as we are "harmless as doves." Foolish doves live short and unhappy lives. Churchill has convinced me that this world has as much to fear from those who are utterly naive as it does from those who are utterly evil.

They then earned a "Being My Best" badge, filling their notebooks with good information. They performed skits on always being their best in many situations, such as not giving in to peer pressure regarding


drinking or drugs.
