

Put a circle around Saturday. May 2, because it's an important date, according to George Slaughter, chairman, state AAA committee.

On that date, the nation's wheat farmers will vote on marketing quotas for the second consecutive year. To be in effect on the year's crop, quotas must be approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting. Last spring, farmers approved quotas by an 81 percent majority, the chairman said.

Slaughter said, "because we have enough wheat on hand now to supply our needs well into 1943."
Further increases in wheat production also will disrupt transportation and clog storage facilities already filled to capacity, he added.

It does not, however, protect farmers from losses due to poor farming practices or use of inferior seed.




