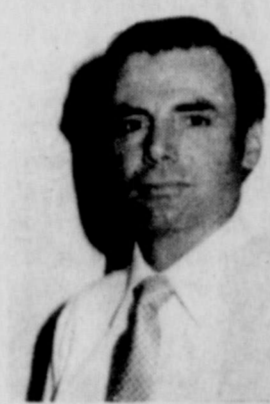
Because this effort is strictly done on a volunteer basis, the bake sale will solely depend on the baked contributions from the community.

### Party Conventions Planned For March 31; Delegates Named

Democratic Precinct Chairmen met at polling places in Eastland and Cisco after the March 13 Primary election. In Eastland 27 delegates were elected to attend the County Convention, with Saul Pullman as Chairman.

Cisco Democrats elected 43 delegates to the County Convention, with June Hicks Chairman. The Cisco Democrats passed this Resolution: That all Democrats will support the elected tickets.

There were no final details of meetings at other Democratic Precincts around the County.

Republicans report that all their Precincts held meetings after the polls closed.

The County Conventions for both parties will be held in the Commissioners Courtroom on Saturday, March 31. The Republicans will meet at 10 a.m. and the Democrats at 2 p.m.

The turnout of voters for

the Party Primaries on March 13 was less than half the registered voters in the county. There are around 11,000 registered voters, and the reported total of all votes was 4943.

### Billy Rains Resigns As Cisco Chief of Police

Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains has resigned that position, effective at 5 p.m. Friday, March 23, according to an announcement by Cisco City Manager Michael Moore.

Mr. Rains, who has been Cisco police chief since June 6, 1983, will be attending the Department of Public Safety

school in Austin.

Cisco Police Sgt. Larry Jernigan has been appointed interim chief until a new police chief is hired. Mr. Moore said.

The city will be advertising for applications to fill the position soon, Mr. Moore added.

### No Runoff In District Attorney's Race; Two Others In County

Mary Bailey, County Chairman of the Democratic Party, said today that a canvass of the votes for the office of District Attorney found no errors in the totals. So the results will stand as reported, with Leslie Vance declared the nominee.

There will apparently be only two Run-offs in Eastland County races on the April 10 Democratic Party Ballot, according to information from election officials.

One will be the 91st District's Clerk's race, with Kathy Trout Hallum and Bill Mears on the ballot.

The other will be the race for County Commissioner, Pct. 4, Cisco between Billy Bacon (incumbent) and Reggie Pittman.

There will be several State Run-offs on the Democratic ballot: Governor, Ann W. Richards and Jim Mattox; State Treasurer, Tom Bowden and Nikki Van Hightower; and two Court races.

The Republican ticket will

have no County Run-offs, according to Jim Keffer, County Chairman. State Republican candidates in the April 10 Run-off will be for the State Commissioner of Agriculture: Rick Perry and Richard McIver, and another Run-off for Commissioner of the General Land Office.

Candidates who wish to withdraw from the April Run-off elections must do so by March 23.

Voters are reminded that they must vote in the Run-off

of the same Party they voted for in the March 13 Primary Election. Those who did not vote in the Primary Election may choose any party they wish in the Run-off, however. Polling places will be at the same locations as the March 13 primaries.

Absentee voting for the April 10 elections will begin on April 2 and end April 9. This early voting will be in the County Clerk's office, First Floor of the Courthouse, from 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m.

### Little League Registration Continues; Try-Outs Saturday

Also, registration forms will require a parent or guardian signature and name of your hospitalization insurance company.

Tryouts will be held at the Little League field on Saturday, March 24. All 8 and 9

year old players will begin at 9 a.m. All 10, 11 and 12 year old players that did not play in the major leagues last year will begin at 1 p.m. There will be no tryouts for 6 and 7 year old players.

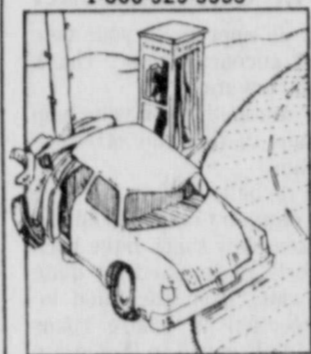

## Bicyclist Circles Country For M.S.

There is a lack of understanding about multiple sclerosis, says cabinet maker Robert Carney, who is traveling around the United States by bicycle encouraging people to donate to the Rhode Island Chapter, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, 1255 Oaklawn Ave., Cranston, RI, 02920.

Better known as Captain Bob as he is qualified to sail boats and ships, and has his own boat, the "very young" 64 year old was reared in Florida.

multiple sclerosis, Carney wanted to do something to help. So he left Providence, Rhode Island, on September 23, 1989, to circle the nation by bicycle. He passes out literature about the disease and suggests donations.

On the first leg of his trip, Carney bicycled from Providence to Key West, Florida. He spent the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's holidays in Florida, and was taken on a side trip to the Bahamas by some people he met.

Back on the road with the

second leg of the trip running from Key West to San Diego, California, Carney ran into storms in the deep south. Rain and high winds soaked and shook the tent he usually sleeps in at night and his equipment.

A smaller trailer pulled by the bicycle hauls a tent, sleeping bag, something to drink, and other essentials, along with literature.

In Dallas, Carney's bicycle was stolen when he stopped for the night. But after his fate was broadcast in the city, a businessman sent him a new bicycle, which he is now using.

Arriving in Eastland County Tuesday, March 13, he camped in Cisco before continuing on to Abilene.

A veteran of World War II who has six daughters, Carney was longing for the flat areas of West Texas as he made his way up local hills. He is hoping to make it across the desert Southwest before the heat of summer.

The third leg of the trip is to take Carney from San Diego to Seattle, Washington, and the final leg is across the northern states back to Rhode

Island. Due to cold winter weather and steep mountains on the last leg, Carney doesn't expect to complete his journey before 1991.

After completing the long and hard trip, Carney suggests that he would like to retire and sail his boat from Australia to Greece. But the longest part of the trip is still ahead, about 15,000 miles.

Carney says that he has also had some radios and tapes stolen along the route while some people have taken him out to dinner and rented him a motel room. But he insists that you donate to multiple sclerosis, not him, and he gives God the credit for taking care of him on the trip.

## Special Tax Advice For Older Americans

If you're an older American, be sure you're not missing out on some important tax benefits, says the American Association of retired persons (AARP).

For example, there's the credit for the elderly or disabled. This credit could reduce the taxes you pay if you are age 65 or older, or if you are disabled. The credit is based on the taxpayer's income, filing status, age, and spouse's age (if the taxpayer is married). To figure this credit, use schedule R.

If you're 65 or older or blind and do not itemize deductions, the internal revenue service says you may be entitled to take a standard deduction amount

on your tax return for 1989 that is higher than the amount available to other taxpayers. The standard deduction table in the 1040 instruction booklet can help you determine your deduction.

As an older American you may not have to file a return. If you are single and age 65 or older, you generally need

not file a 1989 return if your gross total income was less than \$5,850. If you would ordinarily file a joint return, and both you and your spouse are 65 or older, usually no return is required unless your joint income for 1989 was at least \$10,400.

Are you thinking of selling your home? If you are age 55 or older, you may be able to take advantage of a once-in-a-lifetime \$125,000 exclusion on the gain from the sale.

Free tax assistance is available to low and moderate income older people through AARP's tax-aid program. Tax-aid volunteers are trained in cooperation with the IRS, and provide assistance from February 1 to April 15 each year. They can help you complete the necessary Federal, State and Local Tax Forms. To locate the tax-aid site nearest you, contact WALTER Knowlden, telephone (817)442-1715.

Canker sores of the mouth seem to heal faster with applications of a strong solution of tetracycline-one 250mg. capsule in 2 tablespoons water-applied directly to the ulcer, according to reports in the journal Emergency Medicine.

The Social Security Administration considers all of this to be misleading advertising - misleading because it attempts to take advantage of unsuspecting readers by suggesting that it is in some way connected with the Government or Social Security and misleading because it offers for a price information and services the Social Security Administration provides free, more accurately, and more quickly. People who receive mail asking them to pay for Social Security services should check first with the Social Security administration - they save their money and get better service!

H. E. B. Food Stores have joined the Lone Star Brewery, Jungle Labs Inc. and Honey Hole Magazine in sponsoring the state's operation Share A Lone Star Lunker Program.

Bill Rutledge, fish hatchery chief for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the grocery chain joined the program last week, and Mike de la Garza will represent the company on the Lone Star Lunker Foundations board of directors.

Lone Star Lunker offers anglers the opportunity to lend 13-pound-plus largemouth bass to the department for use in research and hatchery production. The fishermen are rewarded with fiberglass replicas of their catch, provided by members of the Texas Taxidermy Association. The big fish normally are returned to their lakes of origin after spawning.

Rutledge said 15 big bass are already at the Tyler Fish Hatchery for this year's program, with more entries expected before the April 30 deadline.

### Terry L. Wilson Super Promoter Bill Carter and the Zebco 33 Changed Fishing Forever

There is hardly a fisherman alive today who doesn't recognize the name "Zebco," but how many really know that Zebco was like before it became a household word?

It certainly wasn't an overnight success that took the Zero Hour bomb Company—a maker of explosives used in oil production—to Zebco, the world's largest maker of fishing reels. Nor was success assured the day R. D. Hull walked in and unveiled his new invention. It took Herculean effort by many people to mold the Zebco story. But much of the early success of Zebco reels was due to a man named Bill Carter, an energetic tackle salesman whose enthusiasm is still vivid to newspaperman John Clift.

Carter, a tiny dynamo of a man, showed up at the *Denison Herald* office one day in the early 1950's and informed Clift that he faced a perplexing problem. Carter's father had recently died, and Bill and his brother, Frank, were taking over the reins of W. L. Carter and Sons, a well-known tackle rep firm. Frank wanted to continue to head the Southeast office in Atlanta, leaving Bill in charge of the Southwest office in Dallas.

"We are taking on a new reel called Zebco," Carter explained to Clift. "We both are starting out together, and I want to make my name known in the tackle industry so when I walk in on a client, they'll know who I am."

"I'd say your name is pretty well known already," Clift replied.

"That's the problem," Carter said. "People are accustomed to Dad calling on them—not me. I want you to help me change that."

Clift liked Carter and wanted to see him succeed. He agreed to help Carter and his brother any way he could.

Over the next two years, that task did not prove difficult. While Frank made the rounds of sports shows in the Southeast (casting a Zebco reel with golf clubs, tennis racquets and slingshots to prove how easy it was), Bill launched his campaign to conquer the Southwest. Routinely, Carter's promotional stunts astounded Clift, who soon discovered that although Carter was short in stature, he was long on fascinating ideas for promoting the new Zebco reels.

First, Carter acquired an old touring car and had the Zebco logo emblazoned on the front, back and both sides. When there was a parade anywhere within driving range, Carter and his "Zebcomobile" were sure to be there.

One time, Carter went to newly impounded Lake Texoma on the Texas-Oklahoma border and—with characteristic flair—dumped 21 tagged black bass into the lake. It was tagged and Carter dubbed it The Zebco Kid. He offered to pay \$5,000 to the person who caught it. As with everything he touched, Carter seemed to have fortune on his side. All 20 of the hatchery fish were caught within ten days and the anglers awarded a Zebco reel. But the Zebco Kid was never caught, so Carter never had to pay out the whopping grand prize.

On another occasion, Carter took a half-dozen of his favorite outdoor writers to Canada on a fishing trip. Another time, it was a fishing trip using lures made before 1900. He demonstrated the ease of using a Zebco reel by casting with boxing gloves on. He even went so far as to teach a chimpanzee how to cast a Zebco. But regardless of the gimmick Carter dreamed up, the reel in use was always a Zebco.

Gradually, Carter won acceptance for the new reels, but it was easier said than done. There was a lot of skepticism about the Zebco reels in the beginning. Avid bass fishermen of the day were still loyal to their old bait-casting reels—even if they had to pick out a backlash every fourth or fifth cast.

At first, these anglers called Zebco "the reel for kids and women." Real men, they said, would never use one.

But it didn't take long after seeing a fishing companion fish a Zebco all day long without a backlash for these purists to change their tune—especially after the Zebco users managed to hook and land more than their share of big fish.

Meanwhile, Clift was true to his word, regularly submitting photos of eight-pound bass caught on Zebco reels to fishing magazines all across the country. Soon, the army of converted Zebco users was

growing at an astounding rate. Finally, Carter was so besieged with inquiries from fishermen about the new reel, he had to go to Clift's office and ask him to turn off the publicity machine.

"Everyone knows me now," Carter told Clift with a smile. "But let's come up with

one last stunt to go out in a blaze of glory!" The two went to lunch at a local cafe to discuss what they might try. As they ate, they listened to the conversation at other tables. Dennison was near lake Texoma, and there was an abundance of talk about fishing.

In the booth behind them, Carter and Clift overheard one fisherman bragging about how many casts he had made the day before. That bit of conversation was the only spark Carter needed.

"That's it!" Carter said excitedly. "We'll show how many times in a day you can cast a Zebco without getting backlash!"

Quickly, the plan took shape. The event was set up for the Fourth of July, 1954 at Island View Resort on the shores of Lake Texoma. Clift convinced the reigning Miss Texoma to be on hand to wipe Carter's brow and feed him lunch and snacks during the day. And Carter brought along his minister from Dallas as a scorekeeper.

"To make sure we have an honest count!" Carter said with a twinkle in his eye.

On the morning of the Fourth, a blackboard was set up by the Island View swimming pool. With a flourish, Carter began his stunt-to-end-all-stunts.

Over the years, Carter had learned to cast with either

hand. His ambidextrous casting ability—and the fact that the Zebco worked equally well with either hand—allowed Carter to keep casting without stopping to rest.

For over 14 hours, Carter kept casting his Zebco. First with his right hand. Then his left. Hour after hour. Every time Carter cast, the minister verified up the final total. At the end of each hour, Clift would dutifully go to a nearby telephone and report Carter's progress to the Associated Press.

Finally, 14 hours and 14 minutes after Carter began, the sun set on his career-crowning publicity stunt. As Carter basked in the attention of Miss Texoma, the minister verified up the final total. Even Carter was astounded by the results. During his casting marathon, Carter cast a new Zebco 33 an amazing 3,453 times—a world record that stands to this day.

Things have changed in the decades since the Carters helped launch Zebco on its way to becoming the world's largest fishing tackle company. From its once humble beginnings, Zebco now sells one of every three fishing reels sold in America and has spawned a host of imitators.

But it was Zebco and the imitable Bill Carter that blazed the trail for the rest of the fishing industry to follow.

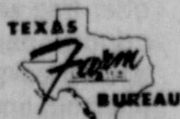

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**Work Incentives For Disabled People Who Want To Work**

People, who receive Social Security or supplemental security income (SSI) benefits because they are disabled or blind, who would like to try out working, don't have to wonder anymore whether or not trying to work would affect their eligibility.

There are provisions in the law to give disabled and blind people the opportunity to test their ability to work while keeping their eligibility.

Under Social Security, disabled people can have a trial work period of up to 9-months, which need not be consecutive, to test their ability to work and engage in substantial gainful activity. "Substantial gainful activity" means doing significant and productive physical or mental work for pay or profit.

Moreover, if after the trial work period the worker's impairment has not improved, even though he or she is able to work, there is a 36-month extended period of eligibility.

During this 36-month period, the employee can receive a check for any month in which earnings do not exceed the amount considered "substantial gainful activity" (\$500 for the disabled; \$780 for the blind in 1990.)

Medicare benefits continue for up to 39 months beyond the trial work period for people whose checks stop due to work activity but who are still disabled.

Impairment-related work expenses, such as medical devices, attendant care,

medicines, etc., can be deducted from total earnings when determining substantial gainful activity.

A Social Security or SSI beneficiary in an approved vocational rehabilitation program, who recovers while participating in that program, can receive benefits until the program ends.

If you receive disability payments under SSI, you can return to work or increase your level of work activity without losing your SSI eligibility. Payments reduced for your income can continue as long as your disability has not improved and you meet all other eligibility rules, including the income rules.

Impairment-related work expenses (e.g., a wheelchair, transportation costs, certain attendant care services, prostheses, and similar items) can be deducted from total earnings when determining income that counts. For blind people, any expenses reasonably attributable to their work, as well as transportation to and from work, meals during work hours, a guide-dog, etc., can be deducted from total earnings.

An SSI recipient can develop a plan to achieve self support, or PASS. Monday and resources can be set aside for in a PASS up to 48 months to accomplish a work goal such as education or training, purchase of work-related equipment, or setting up a business. The money or resources set aside will not count for SSI.

Also, scholarship or grant money spent on fees, tuition, books, stationery supplies, and related expenses of obtaining an education, are not counted as income under SSI.

Medicaid can continue for disabled and blind people who cannot afford to replace services including medical, available to SSI recipients, and would be unable to work without Medicaid.

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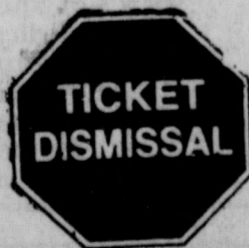
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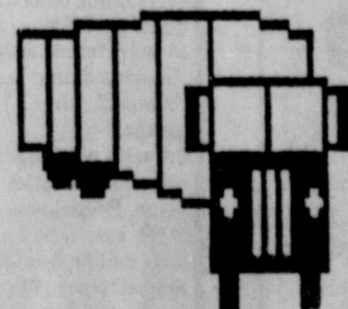

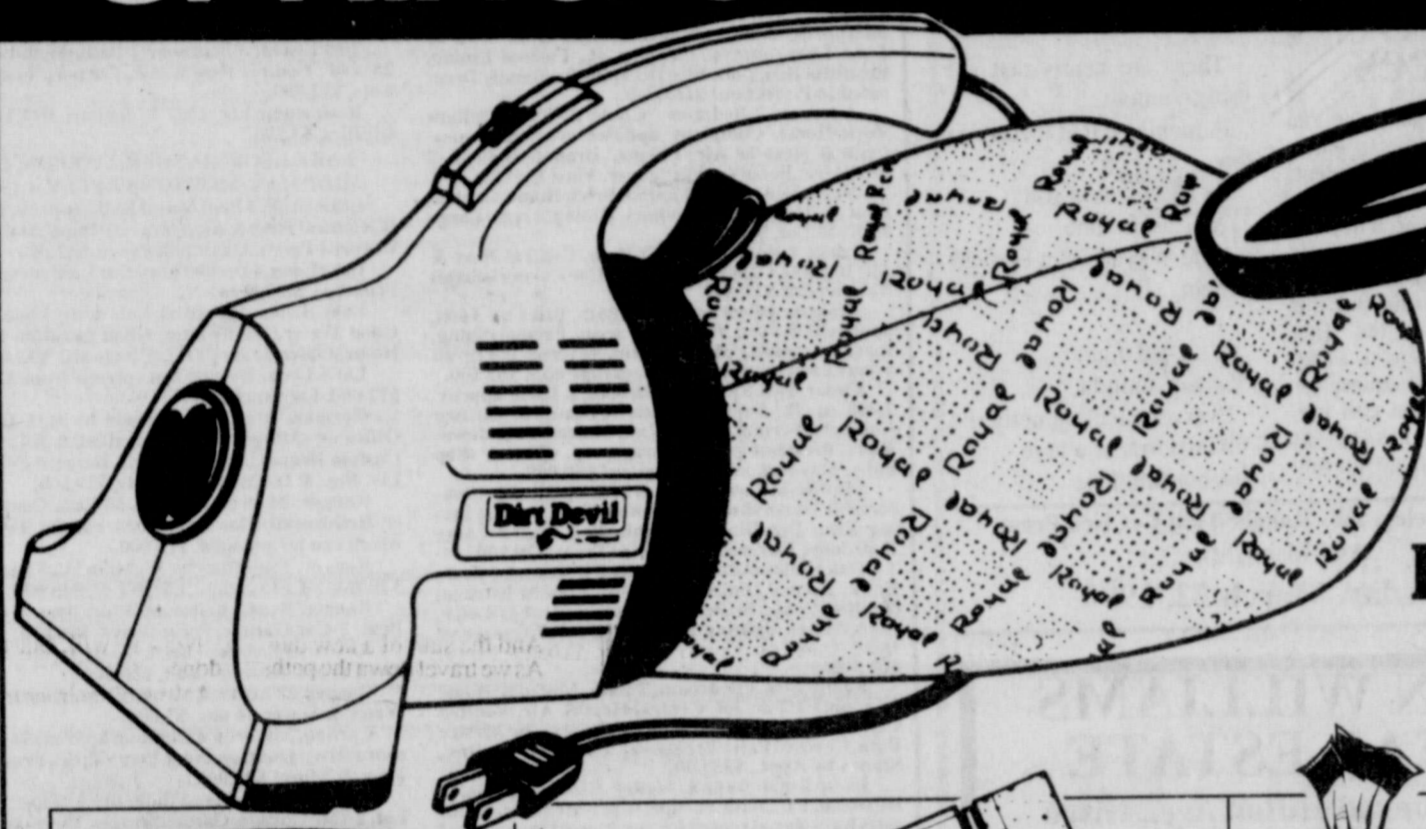

owners wishing to sign up for 1990 property tax exemptions and/or special land valuations may obtain the necessary application forms at the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District in Eastland, Texas. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse.

The completed application form must be timely filed with the Appraisal District by May 1, 1990 if it is to be considered timely filed for the 1990 year.

There are numerous exemptions and/or special valuations available through the State Property Tax Code. A partial list of these is shown at the end of this article. If a property owner has a question as to his or her eligibility, they should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance.

Homeowners can take advantage of the partial homestead exemption which is available. This exemption must be applied for before May 1, 1990. It is emphasized that this residential homestead exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If the residential homestead owner still resides in the same house for 1990 that he or she lived in for 1989; they would have to file again if they received the exemption for the residence for 1989. An exception to this would be the homeowner who turned 65 years of age during the 1989 year or who had never signed up for the additional exemption which is available to Over-65 homeowners.

If you have any doubt as to whether you are receiving a homestead exemption or as to your eligibility, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance. The telephone number is 629-8597.

Partial exemptions or valuations available: Residential Homestead, Over-65 Residential Homestead, Disability-Residential Homestead, Disabled Veteran, Special Land Valuation (Ag Use).

## Rescue Line For Women

Q. My husband has an alcohol problem and sometimes he is abusive. Can you help me to understand this problem better and offer some suggestions for recovery?

A. Alcohol abuse and spouse abuse are a complex and volatile combination. They often intensify each other and create a vicious cycle that is hard to break. What are shared characteristics of these two problems?

They are denial, blame, role confusion, broken promises, role reversal, conflict, and depression. Both problems are often passed from generation to generation. Co-dependency is transmitted a cross generations within families.

There are some steps that can be taken toward recovery. First of all, don't feel that you have to hold in everything and not let anyone know what is happening to you. But who can you trust is the next question?

It is usually better to go to a professional to seek help. Quite often the abused woman does not want her friends or family to know. This can be critical if she hopes the relationship can be saved.

A church pastor or other professional counselor may be the best choice for a listener. Of course, it should be someone you trust will not spread the details of your problem.

With the counselor you may work out possible coping strategies such as keeping a calendar of events - sometimes abuse happens in cycles or over certain recurring problems.

You may receive help from organizations such as Alcoholics Anonymous or abused women support groups.

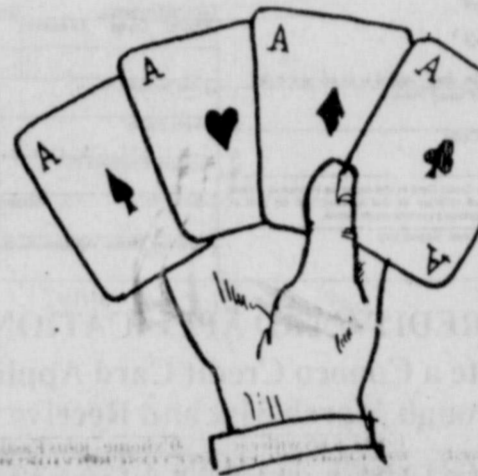

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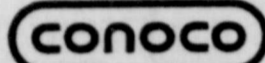

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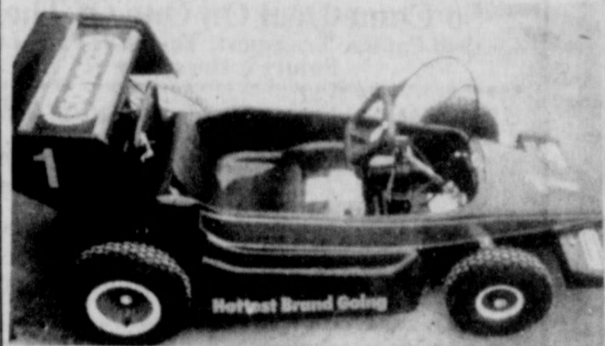
