2. Entrants must pay a \$1 registration fee in order to cover the cost of the sidewalk chalk. Group entrants are limited to 5 participants; registration for group entries is \$1 per person.
3. Categories will be determined by age: 6 yr. and under; 7-12 yr.; 13-17 yr.; 18 yr. and over; groups of 5 persons or less.
4. The sponsoring organization reserves the right to limit entries to pictures considered in good

taste for a family-oriented activity.

5. No spray or liquid sealers may be used to seal or enhance the chalk pictures.
6. Winners will be determined by impartial judges. Prizes for each category will be announced at a later date.
7. In the event of heavy rain, the contest will be held at a later date.
8. Entrants will be asked to sign or initial their pictures.

Cisco VFW Chapter Is Honored By National Commander-In-Chief

The recently organized Cisco chapter of Veterans of Foreign Wars was praised by VFW Commander-in-Chief Walter Hogan recently at a meeting in Sweetwater.

Hogan, of Greenfield, Wis., noted "The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States would have an even stronger voice in government if it had more members with the spirit of those in Cisco and District 8."

Noting that Post 10782 in Cisco was chartered only last August, Hogan was joined by Texas State Commander James E. Nier in declaring its post commander, Bob Turner, an "All-State Commander" for already signing up more than 100 members.

Task Force Arrests Three In Drug Raid

The West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force and Ranger Police arrested three people in a drug raid about 5 p.m. Tuesday in Ranger.

Two Ranger men and a Ft. Worth woman were being held in the Eastland County jail. One man, who had been out of T.D.C. a week or two on probation and had also spent time in the county jail in the past year, and the woman had their bonds set at \$25,000, for possession of illegal drugs. The other man's bond was set at \$35,000, for possession with intent to deliver.

As the result of an investigation by the Task Force, Sheriff's Office, and Ranger Police, officers obtained a warrant to search a Ranger residence.

The three were outside the residence when officers arrived and one tried to throw away drugs in his possession but was prevented by an officer, according to an officer at the scene, who also said that a quantity of drugs was found in the residence along with drug paraphernalia.

A Cisco Police Officer brought a dog which also assisted in the search.

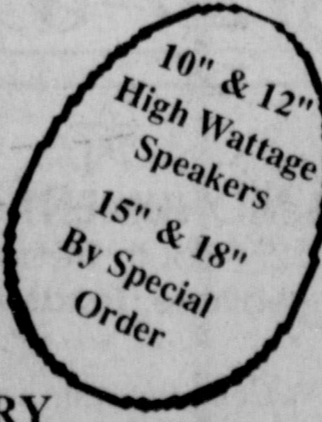
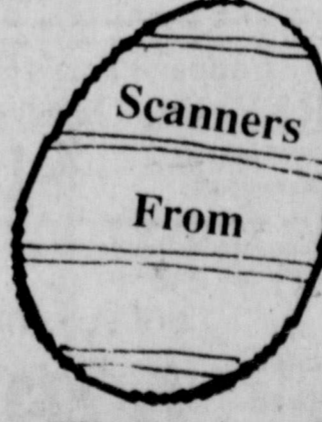
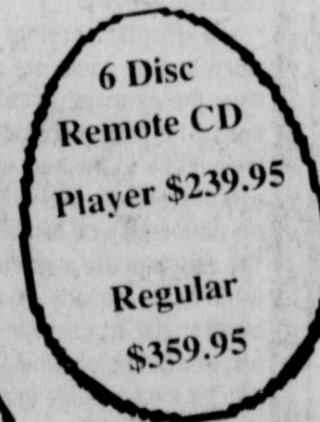
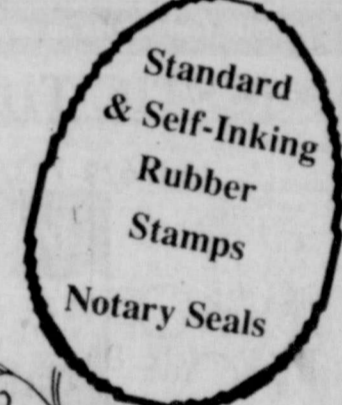
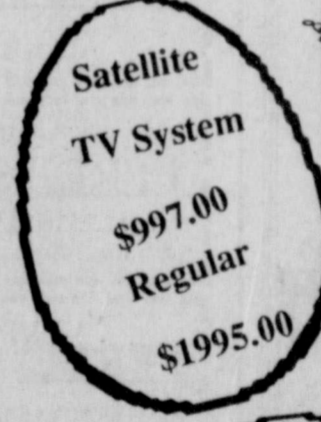
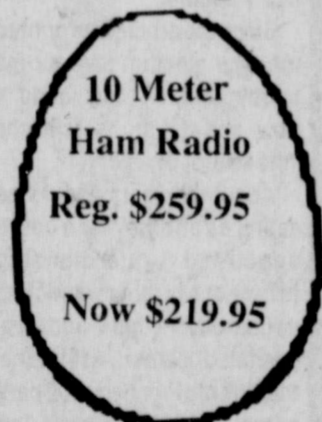
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NOTES TO NORTHVIEW

The following facts about mental retardation came from the Association for Retarded Citizens: One in every 10 Americans has a family member who is mentally retarded. In the United States about three percent of the population, or 6.7 million individuals, will be identified as mentally retarded at some point in their lives. Mental retardation is four times more common than rheumatic fever, nine times more prevalent than cerebral palsy, and affects 15 times more people than blindness.

A condition that hinders or interferes with intellectual development before or dur-

ing birth or in the early childhood years can be the cause of mental retardation. Although more than 250 cases are known, these account for only one-fourth of all identified causes.

A growing number of people with mental retardation are now living in group homes and receiving community-based services, according to statistics of the ARC. The population of state institutions is decreasing at a rate of 5,000-6,000 per year. The number of residents in all state institutions has decreased from a peak of 194,650 in 1967 to 117,160 in 1982, a 40 percent drop. Persons with mental retardation constitute one of the largest handicapped groups on America. Each year some 100,000 babies and young children are born with or acquire the condition. About 89 percent of children and adults with mental retardation are mildly retarded and in many respects, quite similar to people without retardation. They differ primarily in rate and degree of intellectual and in many respects, quite similar to people without retardation. They differ primarily in rate and degree of intellectual development. Mental retardation cuts across the

lines of race, educational, social, and economic background. It can occur in anyone. In fact, hereditary components are known to account for only a fraction of the cases of retardation according to the ARC. Malnutrition, German measles, glandular disorders and many other illnesses of a woman during pregnancy frequently result in the birth of a child with mental retardation. Physical malformations of the brain or other organs originating in prenatal life may also result in retardation.

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1990 Decennial Census Delivery Began March 23

The Postal Service began delivery of the 95 million census questionnaires on Friday, March 23. All delivery is to be completed by Tuesday, March 27.

The Bureau of Census is encouraging recipients to complete the questionnaire and return it in the postage-paid envelope as soon as possible. They hope to have all of them back in the mail by the first of April. The Postal Service will deliver a reminder note to all addresses on Friday, March 30.

The return envelope has been especially designed to facilitate handling by the Postal Service. A unique ZIP Code plus four digit add-on and a corresponding bar code will enable the Postal Service to sort the mail by means of our high speed automated equipment to Census district offices and processing centers.

The add-on ZIP Codes and barcodes will also allow sorting by long or short form, and single-family or multi-family address.

The Bureau of Census will reimburse the Postal Service for the operational and mailing costs amounting to approximately \$70 million.

The Postal Service adds its encouragement for everyone to participate in this extremely important event.

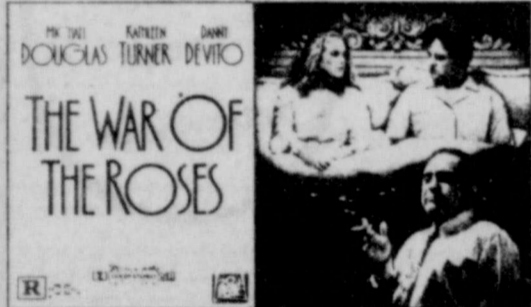
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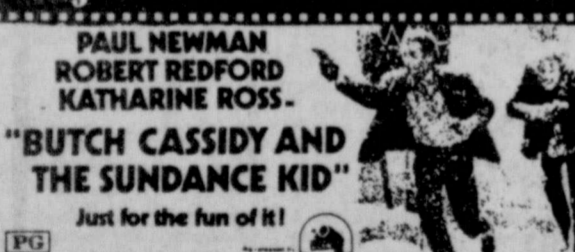

Dear Editor,
Please tell my side of the story.

Dear Citizens of Eastland County:

Many of you have heard Paul Harvey's "Rest of the Story." I would like to tell the rest of my story in response to the article in the Abilene Reporter News the Saturday before Election Day, which effectively sabotaged my campaign for the office of District Attorney.

The article reported that I had once received a reprimand from the Bar Association, and it was written in such a way as to plant seeds of doubt about my integrity, in the minds of many people.

Since the article was printed too near election time for me to respond, I'd like to do it now, and tell the facts in the "the rest of my story."

About ten years ago, I was acting as attorney for a court-appointed guardianship (where one brother was acting as guardian for his ill and incapacitated brother). At the time, the sick brother had a full partnership with a third party, in a business venture.

The guardian brother decided that he could not continue the partnership obligations of his ill brother, and that it would be to the best interests of everyone involved that the partnership be dissolved. The assets of the partnership were to be equally divided between the sick brother and his partner. The facts indicated it to be the equitable thing to do.

The guardian brother and the third party (the partner) agreed to what they considered to be a fair division of the assets. They put their agreement in writing and my office typed up the agreement.

On about October 24 of that year they both signed the written agreement in front of me. At that time I began to prepare instruments in connection with their proposed division of the partnership, to be submitted for court approval of a final division of the partnership.

When such a guardianship is being administered, the Court MUST FORMALLY APPROVE all business transactions in connection with the

guardian estate. The aforementioned partnership division was one of those business transactions which MUST be approved by the court before it can become final.

The court had not yet had a chance to give approval of the partnership dissolution, before the ward (the sick brother) died on or about November 1st of that year.

On the death of the ward, the guardian had no more legal authority in connection with the estate. Another relative had been designated as "Executor" in the deceased brother's will.

I explained this to the parties, and advised them to contact the Executor and start over with plans to dissolve the partnership.

Among the papers we delivered to them was the letter agreement which they had both previously executed before me on October 24th. For some reason, they thought the letter agreement would seem more official to the executors, if it had been notarized. They asked me to affix a notary acknowledgment of their signatures on the letter. Since I had originally seen them sign the letter, I could see no legal harm in this, to anyone, by adding this acknowledgment to a document that had no legal effect. Since it had not yet been ruled on by the court, it had no binding effect on anyone. It was only to be used to submit to the executor, to apprise him of their previous agreement.

At the time, they considered any further delay in dissolving the partnership would decrease the value to everyone. The value had already decreased considerably because of the long illness of the other partner.

I prepared and executed the acknowledgment on or about November 4th of that year. Since it had originally been actually signed on October 24, I dated it October 24th. The accusation said that I had "backdated" an instrument. In fact I had backdated the letter, which had no legal effect, to the date it was actually signed. Both of the original signers were present.

Both personally requested that this be done. I believed that this was the correct date to put on it, and my opinion has been verified by other attorneys that I have since discussed it with.

IT WAS UNBELIEVABLE THAT ANYTHING WOULD EVER COME OUT OF THAT SIMPLE ACTION, WHICH DID NOT PROFIT ME OR ANYONE ELSE AND WAS NEVER MEANT TO.

Actually "the letter" agreement was later approved by the executor and the court, verbatim.

Unfortunately, through a twist of fate and circumstances, about a year later, a distorted interpretation of the events and facts was taken to the Grievance Committee. By that time I felt like "Brer Rabbit fighting the tar baby" in the attempt to go back and get the events and facts presented clearly and truthfully. The results were that I was given a reprimand, by a misinformed (in my opinion) judge. That is the "rest of the story."

I appreciate the friends who have come forth to offer trust and support.

In spite of the bitter ending, I enjoyed the months of my campaign. I was gratified at the positive responses, and felt that I was making new friends. My family felt the same way, when they were helping me. I am sorry the seeds of doubt were planted. I wish I could have seen you all personally to tell you the truth of the real story.

Thank you to all who ignored the "rumors" and voted for me anyway. I did not betray your confidence and will not.

Originally, I was directed by a fellow Christian lawyer to read the Bible in Psalms 37 and to follow its admonitions and for all this time, I have really tried to forgive and do not want to affect those misguided people, who have tried, in my opinion, personally to destroy me, and my family. Now I am rereading Psalms 35 and asking the Lord to plead my case.

Thank you for indulging me.

Area lakes are in the middle of some of the easiest yet most frustrating fishing of the year, the spawn. The middle of the spawn is frustrating to many anglers because even though they may be catching some small fish, the true lunkers always seemed to be caught elsewhere. Recent studies

have shown for the true trophies big baits, and deep water next to the spawning area are the two keys. Of course, 100% success is only something we dream about. Cover lots of water in your search near these areas.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said a regulation prohibiting the possession of hybrid grass carp is now in effect.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted rules during January affecting the fish which is a hybrid cross between a female grass carp and a male bighead carp. The fish has been used extensively to control nuisance aquatic vegetation.

Dr. Bill Harvey, research coordinator for the department, said the fish was prohibited because agency's research revealed problems, including genetic abnormalities that can result in high mortality of young and inefficient vegetation control.

Community Forum On Child Abuse To Be April 3

The problem is widespread and common, the problem is child abuse. Many think a child can turn almost anywhere for help. But where does a child turn if one parent is the abuser and the other does not believe them. If the child does get help they face a court system designed for adults. They must face those they have accused and are subjected to intense cross examination. They try desperately to understand how all this is suppose to help them.

Training is available to help professionals who investigate and treat child abuse in the state of Texas. A 40 Hour Basic Training Course deals with the issues of investigations, questioning the offender, the role of the criminal and civil courts, preparing a case, who to refer, and

many more issues. This Training Course, commonly known as MICSAIT (Pronounced MIC-sate) (Multidisciplinary Institute For Child Sexual Abuse Intervention and Treatment) is offered by Tarrant County Junior College Child Abuse Intervention Project. Initial funding for the project came from the Texas Department of Human Services.

Jane D. Bingham coordinates the project. She will be bringing the project training, with the help of the local Child Protective Services Unit of the Department of Human Services, the first week in April.
