We were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees and the PILL. We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens. Before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes... and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be? In our time, closets were for clothes, not for "coming out of." Bunnies were small rabbits, and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer jeans were scheming girls named Jean, and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during lent, and Outer Space was the back of the Riviera Theatre. We were before house husbands, gay rights, computer dating, duel careers and computer marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electronic

typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt and guys wearing earrings. For us, time-sharing meant together... not computers or condominiums. A chip meant a piece of wood. Hardware meant hardware, and software wasn't even a word.

Back then, "Made In Japan" meant junk and the term "making out" referred to how you did on your exam. Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. We hit the scene where there were 5 and 10 cent stores, where you bought things for five and ten cents. Sanders or Wilsons sold ice cream cones for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy coupe for \$600... but who could afford one? A pity too, because gas was 11 cents a gallon!

In our day, grass was mowed, COKE was a cold drink and POT was something you cooked in. ROCK MUSIC was a Grandma's lullaby and AIDS were helpers in the Principal's office.

No wonder we are so confused and there is such a generation gap today. But, WE SURVIVED!!! What better reason to celebrate?

Clyde Evatt Hired As Head Coach By CISD

Clyde Evatt, who was head football coach at Cisco High School from 1977-79 and an assistant from 1981-83, has been hired as the head football coach by the Cisco school board.

Evatt succeeds Buddy Sharp who resigned recently as coach but remains as athletic director.

Superintendent Ray Saunders said Evatt was hired last week after the school board interviewed

four applicants. More than 100 applications for the job were received, Saunders said.

Evatt has been an assistant coach and social studies teacher since 1988 at Lamar Consolidated School District near Houston. Mr. Saunders said it is hoped the Evatt will be able to assume his duties here by May 1.

Absentee Balloting April 2-6

County Clerk Joann Johnson states that Absentee balloting for the April 10 Run-off Elections will be for one week only - Monday, April 2 through Friday, April 6. Voting will be in the County Clerk's office from 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. You do not have to give a reason to vote Absentee.

Voters are reminded, however, that they must vote on the same Party's ballot that they voted on in the March 13 Primary Election. Those who did not vote in the March 13 Primary may support which party they wish in the April 10 Run-off.

There will be two Run-offs in Eastland County on the Democratic Party Ballot April 10. One will be the 91st District Clerk's race, with Kathy Trout Hallum and Bill Miers on the ballot. The other will be the race for County Commissioner (Pct. 4) between incumbent Billy Bacon and Reggie Pittman.

Runoffs on the Democratic ballot for state offices include the races for Governor, Treasurer and two places on the Courts.

The Republican ticket will have no run-offs for county offices. State offices in the Republican Party run-offs include the Commissioner of Agriculture and Commissioner of the General Land Offices.

Annual Clean-Up Campaign Is Set For Week Of April 9-13

At their meeting on Tuesday, March 27th, the City Council designated the week of April 9th through April 13th as the Spring Clean-Up Week for the City of Cisco. During this week the City will be running trucks throughout the city collecting limbs, brush and other large debris set out by city residents. The landfill will be open all day, every day during the clean-up week.

As normal, residents are requested by City Hall to stack their trash and brush on the curb by the street and to have limbs cut to a size which can be handled by one man. City personnel will not go on private property to haul off trash on limbs. Also, residents are asked to please have their trash and brush out for pick-up no later than Tuesday, April 10th, so the collection of the debris can be completed by the end of the week.

City Hall will be maintaining a special "work order list" for this trash and brush pick-up effort, so any resident who has large items of trash, limbs or brush to be picked up during the clean-up campaign can call City Hall at 442-2111. Please remember in order for the work crews to complete all the collections during the

clean-up week, these special "work orders" should be called in as soon as possible. City Hall cannot accept the special pick-up requests after 5 p.m., Thursday, April 12th.

"The City Council also wanted to thank all citizens for their participation in this special and important clean-up effort", said City Manager Michael Moore.

Moore went on to remind the residents of Cisco that the "growing season" is upon us and because we have been blessed with early Spring rains, everyone will need to be especially mindful to

keep their yards mowed and their property maintained. Moore stated "When it comes to caring for our property and being responsible property owners, we need to remember that we all live together in Cisco and we must be considerate of our neighbors and our community. I believe everyone can and should show pride in their neighborhood and town by simply maintaining their individual properties."

Pittman Says Roads Are Neglected

Commissioner's court has a responsibility to provide safe and suitable jails, which are inspected by the Texas State Commission on Jail Standards, which is good.

But I feel we have been neglecting our roads long enough.

We need road work, gravel, ditch cleaning. Where is our road and bridge tax money going?

We need a commissioner's court to work together not only in court but in the field as well. The whole county could benefit.

Each precinct has about the same equipment. We could share the equipment and save money. Then we could get some road base or gravel or rock crusher which we badly need.


For instance, instead of each precinct having a \$25,000 or \$30,000 brush cutter we could all use one or two. That would mean that we could buy some good road material for our worn out roads, and then if we bought our supplies like tires, tubes, grader blades, from the same supplier we should be able to save even more money that we could use to put on our roads.

There has to be some way that we can get our roads to a better standard in Eastland County without raising our taxes.

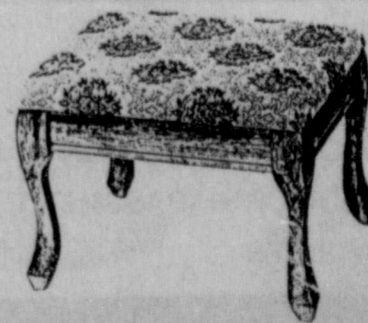

To the Editor:

I am writing to let the readers know that SAFE (Schools Are For Everyone) is launching a major letter-writing campaign in support of integrated public school programs for students with disabilities. The federal office of OSERS (Office of Special Education/ Rehabilitation Services) needs to hear that many people expect that office to take a leadership role. The state agencies need guidance in how to achieve an education that is best for all students, including those with disabilities.

SAFE is a national advocacy group that promotes the integration of students with disabilities into regular schools and classes.

That is why I am asking for your help and join in this campaign. This letter-writing campaign has the potential to make a difference in federal policy.

As a parent of a child with disabilities, integration is very important to me. My daughter is integrated into a regular kindergarten class and her teacher is very supportive. I believe most schools really want all students to receive the appropriate education on regular, age-appropriate

school campuses but it's not always that simple. Our children with disabilities need extra supervision, which puts extra work on our teachers. It takes extra money to provide special equipment needed, and money for extra aids to help in the regular classroom. If we work together and let our legislators know that we want students who are integrated to be provided with all the supports they need to be successful in regular settings and that **SEPARATE IS NEVER EQUAL**, we can make a significant difference.

One thing that has been learned from mainstreaming the handicapped child and the nonhandicapped child is that actually the nonhandicapped child benefits more through mainstreaming.

Among those are higher level of social empathy and tolerance, developing a friendship with handicapped people, develop an increased and more realistic self-esteem, develop skills as a tutor and learns use of unusual skills, such as sign language.

The handicapped child's benefits include learning more advanced social skills through imitation, development of friendships and the most important one is a greater and more realistic self-esteem. This one-on-one contact between these children breaks down the stereo type attitudes regarding people with handicaps.

So if you are a parent,

teacher or professional that lives or works with a person with disabilities or just believe that integration is the right thing, please help me and SAFE gain awareness by joining this letter writing campaign. OSERS needs to hear that we are the majority and like SAFE, we believe that integration should be approached as a value and underlying philosophy by which we educate all students. Regardless of disability, all students have the right to maximum opportunities for interaction with students that are without disabilities. After all, how can we meet the goal of integrated adult opportunities when we are still segregating our children?

The success of integration is dependent on the ongoing shared responsibility of parents, regular educators, & special educators.

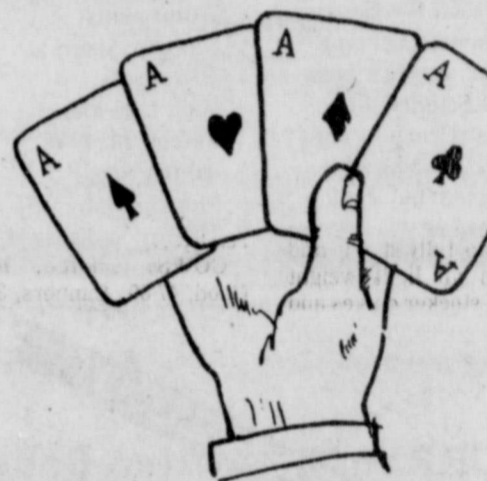

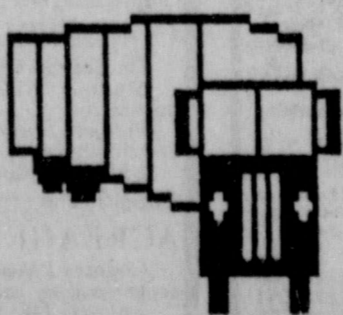

Checks Have 1 Year Limit Now

The checks people receive now from Social Security will be void if they are not cashed within 1 year. Glyn

Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today.

A change in the Federal banking laws effective October 1, 1989 set the 1-year limit on cashing checks. All checks issued by the U.S. Government, including Social Security and supplemental security income (SSI) checks, are affected.

Hammons said. The new checks have the notation "VOID AFTER ONE YEAR" printed on the front. People have until September 30, 1990 to cash existing U.S. Government checks.

Most people will not be affected by this change because they cash their checks right away. People

who are inclined to misplace checks and forget about cashing them should consider switching to direct deposit of their benefits, Hammons said.

Safe Boating Is For Everyone

Boaters in Texas need to be aware of boating safety regulations, both new and old, if the state is to reduce the 456 lives lost in water-related accidents last year.

Capt. Dexter Harris, boating law administrator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., said people who would not think of driving a car without prior training and knowledge of traffic laws often operate powerful motorboats with little knowledge of boating regulations.

Inexperienced boaters should enroll in a boater education course, or at least read the rules and regulations contained in Texas Water Safety Digest before operating a boat.

Harris noted that recent changes in regulations include increased penalties for operating a boat under the influence of alcohol, and additional rules for operation of personal watercraft such as jet skis and wet bikes.

Since most boating accidents could have been prevented by better awareness of safe boating procedures, Harris offers the following checklist of rules that can save lives.

One Coast Guard approved life preserver, in good condition, must be readily accessible on board the boat for each person. Additionally, boats over 16 feet in length must have at least one Coast Guard approved throwable lifesaving device. All chil-

dren under 13 years of age must wear a life preserver while the boat is underway. Ski belts are not Coast Guard approved life preservers and are not acceptable. Harris said all persons should wear a life vest while boating.

All motorboats are required to have navigation lights operated between sunset and sunrise. This consists of a combined red and green light in front and a 360 degree white light in the rear. Larger craft, over 26 feet in length, are required to have other lights.

A rear-view mirror is required while towing skiers. The mirror must be at least four inches across from left to right and top to bottom, and should be permanently attached. Recent legislation allows an observer in lieu of a mirror. The observer must be someone other than the boat operator and must be at least 13 years of age. Both an observer and a mirror would be a good practice even though only one is required, officials said.

Fire extinguishers are required on boats, if one or more of the following conditions exists: closed compartments where portable full tanks may be stored; double bottoms not sealed to the hull or which are not completely filled with flotation material; closed living spaces; closed storage compartments in which combustible or flammable materials are stored; and permanently installed fuel tanks. All motor boats 16 feet to

26 feet must have a horn or whistle that is audible up to one-half mile. Boats 26 feet and longer must have both a bell and a horn or whistle.

Chester Burdett, director of law enforcement, reminds boat operators to check the weather before each outing. "Especially in spring, the weather can change quickly, bringing strong winds with little warning," Burdett said. "Check the local weather forecast before you go. Check all your safety equipment, be extra cautious on the water and wear your life preserver."
