Dear Editor:

Regretfully, over the past several months, there has been a steady decline in the participation by parents and students in Parents For Teens. The dances are no longer well attended. Perhaps the kids are no longer interested in the dances. Our concern, however, is that there are students getting permission to go to the dances and going elsewhere.

At the street dances, students as young as junior high age are let out at the intersection. Some of these students stand on the corner to be picked up by older kids and drive off. Some of them simply walk off. Eventually, some of them return to the dance; some do not. The lack of bathrooms and telephones makes it impossible to have a secure situation at a street dance. While all parents are welcome, very few come by even for a few minutes.

Although the dances held indoors are easier to secure, many kids leave early. Are parents aware of this? While chaperones can control the students at the dance, they can not be responsible for those that leave.

The very best way to know where your child is and what your child is doing would be to help chaperone some of these dances. There have been only a hand full of people willing to serve as Parents For Teens chaperones, because they care about the children in this town. Since we have virtually no recreational facilities, the dances have been a safe fun entertainment. However, if the teens and parents are not willing to participate in the program it may cease to function.

In August an open Parents For Teens meeting will be called. We would encourage all parents of high school or even junior high students to attend this meeting. At this time we will assess our goals for the upcoming school year, acquaint newcomers to the program and consider ways to improve on our activities. If you can donate an evening of your time to chaperone, to decorate, or to serve refreshments, we need you at this meeting. Perhaps, you can set aside a few minutes to talk with your teenager, and see if there is any interest in continuing the dances or how they feel the dances can be improved.

 At the end of the Revolutionary War, America found itself locked in a struggle with the Indians which wore on for some twelve years until the signing of the Treaty of Greenville in 1795. The token force which had been left over from the Regular Army at the end of the Revolution had proved inadequate to combat the Indians along the frontier, and so Congress, in 1790, authorized the creation of a militia force to supplement the small standing army, the militia itself standing down shortly after the signing of the Treaty.  
 This book is a compilation of the records of the militia organizations which were authorized and paid by the federal government to fight the Indian wars from 1790 until the year 1796, shortly after Anthony Wayne's legendary victory at the Battle of Fallen Timbers. More specifically, it is a transcription of the muster rolls and payrolls of the state militia troops who were paid to protect the frontier or who fought along-

side federal troops in the various frontier campaigns. In addition, it contains data on some of the militia troops called out to quell the Whiskey rebellion, the infamous western Pennsylvania tax revolt of 1794.  
 From the records of the Adjutant General's Office located in the National Archives, Murtie June Clark has compiled data from the surviving federal records of the following states and territories: Kentucky, Ohio Territory, Southwest Territory (modern Tennessee), Virginia, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Georgia. Named in these records, with dates of enlistment, rank, and other items of information are militia troops participating in St. Clair's defeat in the Northwest territory, Anthony Wayne's expeditions, the Whiskey Rebellion, the Battle of Fallen Timbers, and a host of campaigns in areas north of the Ohio River, in the Miro District of Tennessee, on the Holston and Cumberland Rivers, and in innumerable skirmishes along the Oconee in Georgia and in various other places.  
 The importance of this information to the genealogist is at once apparent: it identifies settlers on the dangerous

shifting frontier at a period of time before other settlement records were maintained! In this it is obviously unique. ## Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

**New Wording For Fishing Regulations**  
 Slot limits, aggregate limits and possession limits are just a few of the terms Texas fishermen need to be familiar with before heading to the lake.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said some of the basic terminology found in the agency's fishing regulations guide continues to be misinterpreted or misunderstood by some anglers. The following are just a few of the phrases that may be troublesome to some anglers.

**Aggregate limit:** aggregate means a combination, so when the regulation says "five largemouth smallmouth and spotted bass in the aggregate," it means the angler can retain five bass in any combination of the three species. This could be all five of one species, or a combination such as three largemouth, one smallmouth and one spotted.

**Slot Limit:** This is a relatively new concept in fishery management, designed to protect valuable middle sized black bass while allowing harvest of bass in the smaller and larger size classes. The 14-21 slot is in effect on only seven Texas Reservoirs. Under the slot limit, anglers are allowed to retain only bass shorter than 14 inches or longer than 21 inches. Thus, fish between the 14 and 21 inch size are said to be in the protected "slot." Slot limit lakes have a daily bag limit of three bass.

**Minimum and Maximum lengths:** Some fish species, such as spotted slatiout, have only a minimum length limit. Anglers can retain 10 spotted slatiout per day, and all those retained must be at least 15 inches long. For other species such as red drum, there is both a minimum and maximum length limit. Anglers are allowed to retain three red drum per day, and all those retained must measure longer than 14 inches but less than 30 inches. This type of limit is designed to protect smaller, immature fish and also the larger individuals that are valuable spawners.

**Possession Limit:** The regulations say "possession limit" means the maximum number of a species that may be possessed at one time.

**Length Measurement:** A fish must be measured lying on its side on a flat surface with its jaw closed and the tail fin squeezed together or turned in a way to obtain the maximum overall length.

Another matter to be aware of when checking the department's fishing regulations is a chart showing statewide bag and size limits for all game fish. Be sure to check the list of exceptions because reservoirs have special limits that are different from statewide limits.

Officials remind anglers that fishing licenses expire August 31 each year. The 1990-91 licenses and regulations guide will be available from department offices across the state during August.

## Peanut Growers Assoc. Meeting To be Held Aug. 27

The 1990 Annual Meeting of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will be held in Ardmore, Oklahoma on Friday, July 27. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. at the Holiday Inn.

SWPGA President Bill Boswell points out that it is very important for peanut producers to be present at this meeting, since 1990 is a Farm Bill year. He appeals to peanut growers throughout the

area to either attend the meeting or encourage their local and county leaders to be present.

Boswell says that everyone knows this is a crucial time for peanut producers, with this Farm Bill awaiting floor action in both the House and Senate. A program challenge is expected to come in the House from Congressman Dick Arme.

The main emphasis in this year's meeting at Ardmore will be on the 1990 Farm Bill, with particular attention to the Peanut Title. The peanut industry also continues to watch developments from the International Sessions - especially the world agricultural trade agreement through the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). That subject will also be addressed by speakers at the meeting.

Producers in North Texas and Oklahoma will have a rare opportunity to hear an effective spokesman for agriculture and a strong peanut program. He is third-team Congressman Bill Grant of Florida.

Congressman Grant is a Republican serving on both the House Agricultural Committee and the Subcommittee for tobacco and peanuts. His leadership on the current Farm Bill is considered outstanding.

Larry Meyers, Washington grower/consultant, will also be a featured speaker. He will provide timely reports on the sequence of events surrounding the Peanut Title of the Farm Bill as well as the bill's current status and outlook.

A brief business session with annual reports of the SWPGA fiscal year ending June 30 will be completed prior to the general program. Fiscal reports and others will be provided by Assistant Manager Dale Curb, followed by general wrap-up of the SWPGA year by manager Ross Wilson. Results of mail balloting in districts 1 and 2 in Texas will be announced. The meeting will conclude with a luncheon at noon.

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

of peanuts is artificially high - nearly two bucks for a medium jar the size of a pencil sharpener and nearly \$3 for a big jar. You'd think it was face cream at that rate.

The price is high because of the government's peanut program. Peanuts are the worst-case scenario of government farm programs gone awry.

It's about time that peanut butter became a scandal. Peanut-gate. With the government as chief culprit.

In effect, the federal government controls have forced the peanut-growing industry to stay where it was in 1941. The government, well-meaning as always, started a system of licenses in order to help Depression-dogged peanut farmers whose sales were sagging. In the half-century since then, no American

farmer was allowed to grow peanuts without first receiving the government license. That's right; if you wanted to grow peanuts right now, you would need permission from Washington, D.C., to do so. However, the Agriculture Department has not granted new licenses over the years, so you would probably have to find someone who already has one and buy it or rent it. The licenses (known as "poundage quotas") have been handed down over the years like a feudal inheritance. Today, half of the current owners do not even grow peanuts, but collect fees from renting their licenses. So where is the rationale for continuing the program? Why enforce a monopoly to benefit descendants of the original Depression-era farmers who needed help?

Rep. Dick Arme, R-Copper Canyon, has been asking that pertinent question, and members of Congress are starting to listen. Rep. Arme, who has made reductions in farm subsidies his new crusade, is proposing the "Peanut Program Modernization Act," along with Rep. Andy Jacobs, D-Ind. They have compiled some impressive evidence of inequities in the peanut program:

- By holding down production, the peanut program creates an artificial scarcity, which forces consumers to pay higher prices for peanuts. Without the quota system, consumers could save as much as 40 cents on the cost of an 18-ounce jar priced at \$1.79.

• Because of a two-tier price

system, the price is kept high for peanuts sold inside the United States, but is lowered for any "additional" peanuts that are sold overseas. That brings the price down to more competitive market levels abroad - but it means Americans pay 45-50 percent more here at home.

• The price support for peanuts under the quota system has increased 13 percent since enactment of the 1985 farm bill, while support levels for all other major crops have decreased.

• At present, peanut production is frozen where it was a half-century ago. Consider the difference between peanut farming growth and soybean farming growth: In 1930, the U.S. harvested 1.1 million acres each of peanuts and soybeans. By 1980, the peanut acreage had grown to 12.4 million acres, which looks acceptable until you look at soybean acreage. Soybean acreage expanded to 68 million acres.

As Rep. Arme put it, "The peanut program has done to the peanut industry what central planning has done to Eastern Europe."

His proposal would simply replace the antiquated peanut program with a price support system similar to other crops. That's still not a free-market system. Even so, it's going to be like rolling a you-know-what uphill to get the proposal out of the Agriculture Committee, where it faces strong opposition from agriculture lobbies. But it deserves the chance to be brought to a vote on the House floor.

One of the many ironies in this legume boondoggle is that when George Washington Carver began promoting peanut butter to encourage more peanut farming, he did so not only because peanut butter is a good source of protein and tastes great with bread and jam, but because it is environmentally helpful and replenishes the soil when used for crop rotation. Peanut butter could be a win-win situation, with more money for more farmers and lower prices for consumers, if Congress would face up to this, um, sticky issue.



## VIDEOTAPERS... THE HILTON NEEDS YOUR HELP!!

Persons in or around Cisco who have had videotape recorders over the past few years, and have taped certain programs, could be of valuable assistance to the Hilton Community Center, Board President Eris Ritchie has stated.

Ritchie said that the Hilton board is now in the process of completing programming work on a permanent video exhibit that will become a part of the Hilton's attractions in late summer or early fall. 2. The "Big Country Reporter" program about the "Santa Claus Bank Robbery" done in November or December of 1984, broadcast by KTAB-TV, Abilene, Channel 32.

3. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1977, broadcast by NBC Television.

4. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1981, broadcast by NBC Television.

5. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1984, broadcast by NBC Television.

6. KTAB-TV news coverage of Hilton Community Center dedication on October 13, 1986.

Mr. Ritchie stated that he has all of the above videotapes in his possession, but most of them are recorded at extended play (very slow) speeds. For purposes of the video permanent exhibit, tapes are needed that are recorded at normal speed. The tapes are also dated so far back that the Abilene television stations do not have them on file.

"Anyone having one or more tapes of these programs could be of tremendous assistance to us in the development of this project," Ritchie said. We need only to borrow the tapes, and they can be returned to the owner unhampered in anyway.
