made to the original Durning home place in Van Alstyne, Texas north of Dallas. The Durning Family arrived in Philadelphia from Ireland in 1799. The grandson, Charles Steward Durning, came to Texas in 1851. After serving in the Civil War he returned to Van Alstyne and married Hester Ann Cole. He bought her this house in 1905. It was on the original survey granted to James McKinney and located on the waters of Sister Grove Creek. The house remained in the Durning family until 1983. It is still referred to as the Durning House. The "Durning House" has been restored and is established as a historical land mark where the Durnings enjoyed a special luncheon.

millions of dollars into the state economy," Bullock said.

"The current conflict in the Middle East has added even greater importance to horizontal drilling as one way to increase our domestic energy production to reduce our reliance on imported oil," Bullock said.

In the August 1990 Fiscal Notes publication, the Comptroller reports that the value of horizortal production between the beginning of 1989 and the end of April 1990 was about \$104 million. For every \$1 million in oil and gas produced, Texas gains an estimated 25 new jobs. That translates into about 2,600 new Texas jobs.

During the first four months of 1990, horizontal wells produced nearly 3.5 million barrels of oil and 3.2 billion cubic feet of gas. Bullock said those figures respectively are only 1.6 percent and 0.2 percent of Texas' total production, but horizontal drilling could stretch Texas' oil and gas reserves by as much as 30 percent in the future.

The "mini-boom" in drilling activity is concentrated in the Austin Chalk, a narrow crescent of rich oil deposits that sweeps across much of South and East Texas. Using a computer-guided drill to dig horizontally makes it possible for companies to recover three or more times the oil and gas that conventional, vertical drills produce in the Austin Chalk.

skyrocket in recent months,' Bullock said. "The frenzy of drilling activity has increased land lease prices from \$25 to \$35 per acre to the \$150 to \$400 range.'

"It may not bring back the days of Spindletop, but horizontal drilling holds the promise of boosting Texas oil and gas production for years to come," Bullock said.
