## Public Invited Congressman Stenholm To Be Presented Stewart Bonze Bust

Everyone in Eastland County is invited to attend a rare, patriotic and most unusual event Saturday morning.

It will be the official unveiling and presentation of the bronze bust to Cong. Charles Stenholm.

The public event will be a brief and informal ceremony beginning at 10 a.m. at the Majestic Theatre in Eastland.

Cong. Stenholm and his staff will be present for this unusual tribute, commissioned by Eastland County Co-Ordinators and Friends, and done by Cisco Sculptor Dale Stewart who will assist in the presentation.

The unusual token of appreciation is believed to be one of the few such presentations ever made for a still-active official. Locals felt that it is better to show appreciation while the person is still alive and serving.

The life-size bust will be unveiled and presented to Cong. Stenholm on the stage of the Majestic. There will be no formal program but the Congressman will be given an opportunity to respond.

Co-Ordinators and donors were given an advance preview of the beautiful bust last Saturday at a Coordinator's Breakfast held at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall in Eastland. Sculptor Dale Stewart surprised the group by showing the bust which was cast ahead of schedule at the Dublin foundry which does many famous works.

The bust bears the artist's copyright on the back and this brief inscription: "From grateful Eastland County friends." All who viewed the work agreed that Stewart had captured the true likeness and bearing of Cong. Stenholm. The Congressman sat in two sessions for the artist to create the work.

The bust, done by the lost-wax process, is mounted on a hand-made walnut base, which will eventually also carry a permanent plaque listing all the donors to the Eastland County Project.

"In this unusually tense time," one local Co-Ordinator said, "it is especially fitting that we take the time to show our sincere appreciation to our truly conservative and nationally-respected Congressman."

"It is flag-waving time in America, and it could very well start in Eastland County, Texas," he added.

## NOTICE OF EFFECTIVE TAX RATE 1990 PROPERTY TAX RATES IN CISCO ISD

This notice concerns 1990 property tax rates for Cisco ISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

## Visitors In Hastings Home

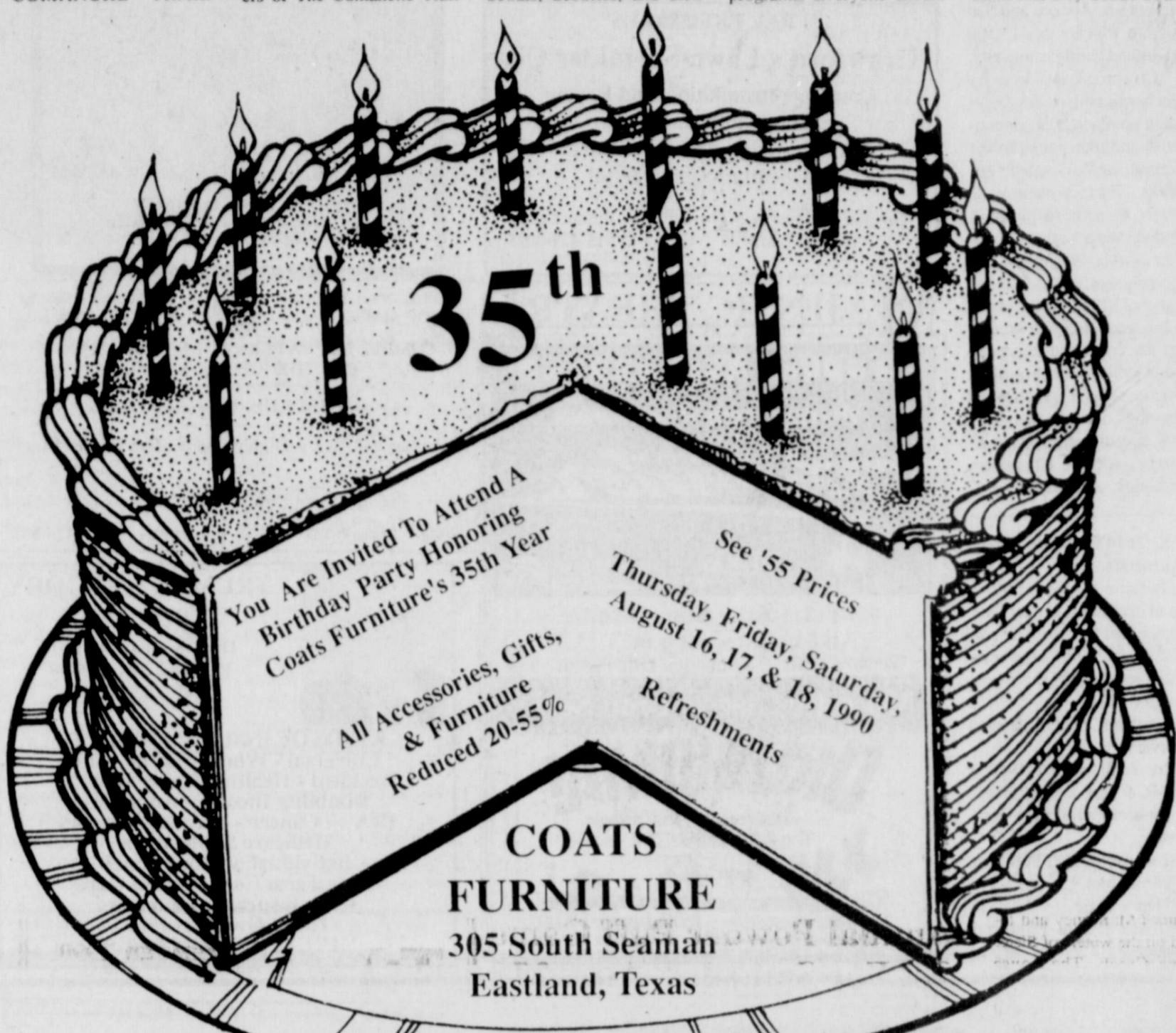





### What it means to sleepwalk

There is a sleep center in your brain, which regulates the sleeping and waking of your body. When this sleep center goes to work, it does two things: It blocks off part of your brain so that it goes to sleep and you no longer have the will to do anything; and, it blocks off certain nerves that bring outside messages to your brain, permitting your body to fall asleep. Usually, the sleep center of your brain and your body are connected but sometimes they become separated. When this happens, the brain sleeps but the body remains awake. People in this situation usually sit up in bed or stand near it. Some actually get out of bed and walk around, but they don't do much more than walk. A sleepwalker doesn't usually remember sleepwalking when he or she wakes up. Sleep walking is far more common in children than in adults.

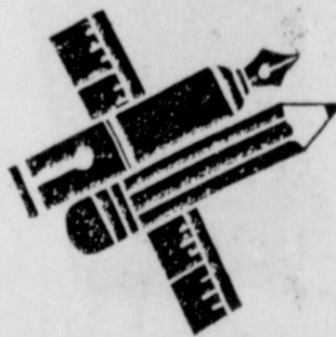

## Sales Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that sales taxes collected in April, May and June of this year showed a healthy increase over last year's collections. "This is further confirmation of a recovered Texas economy and of a state that's in economic expansion," Bullock said.

The Comptroller's office has sent \$148 million in sales tax rebate checks to cities and counties throughout Texas. This month's checks reflect taxes collected on June sale and reported in late July by businesses filing monthly returns. Also included in this month's payment are sales

taxes reported by quarterly filers whose collections reflect sales made in April, May and June.

**Horizontal Drilling Boom**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a boom in horizontal drilling production is bringing new vitality to the state's oil patch.

"Horizontal oil and gas wells are delivering some old-fashioned oil boom prosperity to several Texas counties and pumping hundreds of

millions of dollars into the state economy," Bullock said. "The current conflict in the Middle East has added even greater importance to horizontal drilling as one way to increase our domestic energy production to reduce our reliance on imported oil," Bullock said.

In the August 1990 *Fiscal Notes* publication, the Comptroller reports that the value of horizontal production between the beginning of 1989 and the end of April 1990 was about \$104 million. For every \$1 million in oil and gas produced, Texas gains an estimated 25 new jobs. That translates into about 2,600 new Texas jobs.

During the first four months of 1990, horizontal wells produced nearly 3.5 million barrels of oil and 3.2 billion cubic feet of gas. Bullock said those figures respectively are only 1.6 percent and 0.2 percent of Texas' total production, but horizontal drilling could stretch Texas' oil and gas reserves by as much as 30 percent in the future.

The "mini-boom" in drilling activity is concentrated in the Austin Chalk, a narrow crescent of rich oil deposits that sweeps across much of South and East Texas. Using a computer-guided drill to dig horizontally makes it possible for companies to recover three or more times the oil and gas that conventional, vertical drills produce in the Austin Chalk.

## Race Across America Comes Through Cisco Over Weekend

The 1990 Race Across America (RAAM), that began August 5th in Irvine, Ca. consisting of 33 riders doing 2,922 miles, pedaled through Cisco Friday and Saturday, August 10 and 11. The group was on their 1,674th mile when they went through Cisco.

Unlike traditional cycling events, as in the Tour de France, the RAAM riders cannot ride in packs or draft each other. They must maintain at least 100 meter splits, follow a prescribed route, and abide by all state vehicle code laws. In essence, each rider must "time trial" or ride solo the entire distance, which makes this race physically and mentally among the toughest

athletic events in the world. Each rider is accompanied by a personal support crew who follow in mini-vans and motorhomes. This eliminates the need to find restaurants and motels. However a RAAM rider has little use for such conveniences because eating in done on the bike and they only sleep 90 minutes to 2 hours per day. There are no required stops, so riders must plan their own riding and sleeping schedules. This grueling format requires quality support crew personnel. Many RAAM riders have dropped out of competition because of crew problems.

After riding through Arizona, Utah, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama they will end the race in Savannah, Georgia.
