The following column appeared in the Thursday, Aug. 29, edition of *The Abilene Reporter-News* and we wanted to share it with you. Bill Hart wrote the article, entitled "Winning can be an acquired trait for some." And it was about Cisco's Teddy Patton.

The article follows:
"Teddy Patton is a good example that not all athletes develop in high school and that good players don't always come from successful football programs.

"Patton played offense and defense at Cisco High School as a junior and senior, and both years, he was named to the all-district team—only as honorable mention. But, then, the Lobos won only two games his junior year and five his senior season.

"He was 6-4, 200 pounds, and not many colleges talked to him. Oh, he did get a letter or two from North Texas, a few other Division I-AA schools and a few junior colleges. But when it came time to offer scholarships, only Cisco Junior College came through.

"I still don't think I got a fair shot on those all-district teams because my stats were just as good as those guys who made the teams," he said. "But, that's life, I guess."

Patton had gained 15 pounds by the time he started playing for CJC Wranglers. He was sharing time with Tim Pybus, now at West Texas State, as a freshman until Pybus broke a wrist against Trinity Valley Community College. Once he got into the starting lineup, no one was able to dislodge him.

"Then last year, up to 232 pounds, Patton had a great

year for Cisco. He made 71 tackles, had eight quarterback sacks, two fumble recoveries and blocked a kick. Not only was he All-Texas Junior College Athletic Conference, but he was named to the National Association first team All-America. You won't find any of those high school all-district players on that team.

"When CJC coach Rick Frazier saw Patton play in high school, he saw a potential that other coaches didn't. And he turned out to be right, although at first, he thought about playing the youngster on offense. It didn't take long to find out he was much better suited at defensive end.

"Coach Frazier told me that if I would come to CJC and work hard, I would have a chance to go to a big school after I finished there. By then, I was resigned to attending junior college and I felt if I stayed home, some of the bigger schools in Texas might be interested in me."

"He put on his weight by being the first person in the CJC cafeteria every day and the last to leave. He put up with the wisecracks from other students about his eating habits, then he'd head to the weight room and work and work potential fat into muscle.

"I never did get fat, so no one in my family complained about my eating habits or gaining weight," he said.

"Where no one was seriously interested in him coming out of high school, it changed considerably after he used up his junior college eligibility. Among those who offered him scholarships were

BFI To Begin New Trash Collection Route Monday

Beginning Monday, Sept. 3, Labor Day, Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) will pick up all residential and commercial trash in Cisco. The City Council accepted the contract with BFI for solid waste collection and disposal at their July 10 meeting.

The company published a map of the city showing the division of the city and which days the trash will be picked up in *The Cisco Press* edition on Sunday, Aug. 26. The city has been divided into three pick-up days: Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The following rules and regulations are provided by BFI for the benefit of the residents of Cisco:

SCHEDULE OF SERVICES

Rates: Rates for a residence within the city limits of Cisco is \$8.85 per month for once a week service. The rate for a business which avails themselves of the commercial "hand load" rate provided by BFI is \$12.50 per month.

All refuse must be placed at curbside by 7 a.m. on day of collection in order to insure pick-up.

APPROVED GARBAGE BAGS

Plastic bags, with sufficient wall strength to maintain physical integrity when lifted by the top. Maximum capacity of bags will be 30 gallon. Limits: There will be a 12 (twelve) bag limit for residences and businesses which utilize the Hand Load service per collection day.

BRUSH COLLECTION

Brush collection will be provided when the brush is cut and bundled in four (4) foot lengths. Bundles are not to exceed 50 pounds each in weight.

BULKY WASTE

Free collection of bulky waste will be limited to one item a month per residential unit. (Bulky Waste is defined as waste generated by a single family residence which is too large, heavy, or bulky to pick-up on the regular collection day. Examples are: refrigerators, stoves, sofas, or other large items. Pick-up service of extra items will be provided by BFI subject to extra charge.

CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS

Construction debris is waste building material or waste resulting from construction, remodeling, repair, or demolition operations. Collection service for construction debris will be handled on an individual basis by the contractor contacting BFI for this service.

CISCO RATE SCHEDULE

Once Weekly Collection: Residential trash, 12 bag limit per residential unit, curbside pick-up: \$8.85 per month.

Once Weekly Collection: Commercial Hand Load, 12 bag limit per business, curbside pick-up: \$12.50 per month.

There is a toll free number, 1-800-683-4234, for customers to call with any questions or problems that may arise.

New Immunization Law

A new state immunization law was passed 6-30-90 that states all children 12 years old on or following Sept. 1, 1990 must have another MMR (mumps, measles, and rubella) immunization. Most Jr. High School children will need this shot.

Due to the fact that the immunization clinics will be so crowded this fall I would suggest if possible, that your child be taken to your family physician for this shot. However, if you cannot afford to go to your family doctor, have the child come to my office for a form to be filled out to be taken to the clinic.

Cisco Schools Open With Fewer Students Registered

Cisco schools opened Monday with enrollment figures showing a slight decrease from the number of students registered last year, according to Supt. Ray Saunders.

A total of 854 students had enrolled on the three campuses, down from 880 last year. Cisco Elementary School's enrollment totalled 470 students, according to Principal Bob Lindsey. Classes were as follows: early childhood 12; kindergarden 60; first grade 60; second grade 70; third grade 74; fourth grade 66; fifth grade 66; and sixth grade 61.

Junior High School has 72 students in the seventh grade, and 54 registered for eighth grade, for a total of 126,

according to Jim Puryear, principal.

A total of 258 students were registered in Cisco High School, according to Principal Phil Warren. The largest class is the freshman class with 99 students. There are

61 sophomores, 56 juniors, and 42 seniors.

Cisco students will observe their first holiday Monday, Sept. 3, when classes are dismissed for Labor Day. Classes will resume at the regular time Tuesday morning.

Special Called Meeting Set For Cisco City Council

A special called meeting of the Cisco City Council has been called by Mayor Joe Wheatley for 6 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 4, in the auditorium of the Hilton Community Center.

Items to be considered are:
Item 1: Consider approval of an ordinance adopting the budget for the Fiscal Year

October 1, 1990, through September 30, 1990, for the City of Cisco, second reading.

Item II: Consider approval of an ordinance of the City of Cisco establishing the tax levy for the 1990-91 Budget Year of Cisco, Texas, second reading.

Census Figures Released: Population Down Here

Some preliminary figures on the 1990 census were released Wednesday, beginning discussions that will last for quite a while.

These figures will probably not be finalized until early 1991, after all objections have been reviewed. Civic leaders in various cities will look over census findings and attempt to determine if they are accurate.

In Texas the population shift seems to be away from the rural areas and into the cities. It should be noted that

many of the gains in the cities are by immigration and not birth, however.

There is a vast group of counties in West Texas - with Eastland County on one side - where the population has dropped since 1980. It can be stated that a lot of these counties are short of water, and that a slump in oil production has caused a number of people to leave them.

Eastland County was listed as having 19,480 people in 1980, and these 1990 preliminary findings are 18,452. This is a loss of 5.27 percent. But

the county fared better than one of its neighbors - Stephens County at -14.11 percent. Comanche County gained 5.79 percent, Erath County 23.83 percent, and Palo Pinto County 1.93 percent. Shackelford County lost 17.09 percent.

Of the area's largest communities only four - Abilene, Clyde, Dublin and Stephenville, show an increase from 1980 official counts.

Towns in Eastland County where figures are presently available are as follows:

Cisco - 1980: 4,517; 1990: 3,806.
Eastland - 1980: 3,747; 1990: 3,662.
Ranger - 1980: 3,142; 1990: 2,790.

It would appear that some of the rural areas in Eastland County has picked up population since 1980, or the county's overall loss of around 1,000 people would have been greater.

Naturally population figures do not deal with the quality of life for people in a given area. Some of that may come later - making people reflect whether they prefer dense living conditions in a city or a small town and rural environment.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-90-3

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS AMENDING SECTION 20-25 "SURCHARGE FOR WATER SERVICE OUTSIDE CITY"; SECTION 20-28 "DUE DATE FOR PAYMENT, LATE CHARGE", OF CHAPTER 20 "UTILITIES" OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

OF THE CITY OF CISCO; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

PART I: Section 20-25 "Surcharge for Water Service Outside City" of the Code of Ordinances be amended so that such section shall read as follows:

Customers residing outside of the city limits shall be charged the same rate as customers inside the city limits for water service, plus a twenty dollar (\$20.00) surcharge per utility per month. PART II: Section 20-28 "Due Date for Payment; Late Charge" of the Code of Ordinances be amended so that such section shall read as follows:

The monthly rates and charges for sewer, water and sanitation services furnished by the City shall be due and payable before the sixteenth day following the mailing of the monthly bill. If such charges are not paid on or before such date, same shall thereafter be considered de-

linquent, and a late charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) on the amount of that month's bill will be made.

PART III: Section 20-29 "Discontinuance of Service; Reconnections" of the Code of Ordinances be amended so that paragraph (a) shall read as follows:

(a) If utility service and/or delinquent charges are not paid on or before the expiration of ten (10) days from the date the charges become delinquent, the City, with just cause and upon notification, is hereby authorized to disconnect the water service furnished by the City. A fee of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) shall be charged for the re-connecting of such service. If disconnecting of water service because of delinquent charges of other such cause necessitates the removal of the water meter, a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be charged for the reconnecting of such service.

PART IV: Upon final passage and approval, these ordinance revisions shall become effective as of August 15, 1990.

INTRODUCTION AND APPROVED on first reading this 14th day of August, 1990. PASSED AND ADOPTED on second and final reading this 28th day of August, 1990.

Baylor, TCU, Houston, Tulane, Louisiana Tech, Stephen F. Austin and numerous small schools. He chose Baylor.

"I liked the coaches, and the few players I met when I visited the campus and I just liked the school," he said of his decision.

"But there's a big difference between high school, junior college and Southwest Conference football—as Patton found it out in a hurry. "The biggest adjustment I faced last spring was that the Baylor coaches wanted everything we did to be perfect," he said. "It took me about two weeks to learn their system, thanks to help from Coach (Robert) James and one of the graduate assistants. I think I've also learned the proper way to get off the blocks, too, and how important that first step can be."

"Patton finished the spring as No. 1 defensive end, but this fall, Coach Grant Teaff moved defensive tackle Santana Dotson to that spot, wanting more experience for Nebraska.

"I understand (the move), and it doesn't bother me," Patton said. "It will take me a couple of games to get that experience and besides, the coaches are rotating four of us at the two end spots, so I should get to play."

"John Godfrey, another defensive end, is currently academically ineligible, but could rejoin the team by the time SWC play begins. Dotson then may be moved back to tackle.

"Regardless, Patton has already been quite a success story, and he's hoping more good things will come his way before his career is over.

"He still sees surprises on faces of his former high school teammates who find it hard to believe that this one-time skinny kid stands 6-5 and weighs 240 pounds.

"They may find it hard to believe when they see him wearing a Baylor letter jacket in future years, too."

Exclusive Statement From Clayton Williams

To North Central Texas:

Jerry Stephenson Attends State Inservice Program

Jerry Stephenson a vocational home economics teacher at Cisco High School participated in the State Inservice for the professional development of vocational home economics teachers in Dallas August 13-16, 1990, at the Hyatt Regency DFW Hotel. More than 2800 teachers from school districts all across the state attended the three-and-one-half day conference.

The conference focused on research and strategies to maximize performance expectations of students and teachers. It was coordinated by the Vocational Home Economics Division of the Texas Education Agency. Twenty-four concurrent sessions provided teachers the foundation to effectively include the new concepts in all areas of instruction in home economics education. Emphasis was placed on effective ways in which to help students build healthy self-esteem, youth leadership, teaching the gifted and talented, educational practices that are effective in teaching special populations students, and entrepreneurship. Other sessions addressed current trends in families, particularly the aging family member. Teachers previewed new videos on how to help students develop a healthy self esteem and on developing youth leadership. The videos were developed by the Home Economics Curriculum Center at Texas Tech University.

Nationally known experts highlighted the four general conference sessions. Dr. Patricia Moody from the University of South Carolina

keynoted the conference with "The Ten Commandments for Teachers" in which she discussed maximizing the teacher's effectiveness in the role of teacher. Marilyn Harris, of Cincinnati, Ohio, a food consultant, columnist, radio personality and author addressed the changing societal patterns and how home economics skills and professionals will impact innovation and change to the advantage of individuals, families and society.

Sara Weddington, well-known attorney, writer, lecturer, former member of the Texas House of Representatives, and former assistant to President Jimmy Carter spoke about the opportunities and methods for developing leadership among today's students.

Leading off the third general session, Dr. Eddie Collins, University of North Florida, focused on the theory of increasing the effectiveness and results of education by creating a school environment that invites students to realize their relatively boundless potential. Also appearing during that session was Kaye Johns, Executive, Director, The Center for Slower Learners in Richardson, Tx, who outlined how curriculum can be modified for the slower learner without "watering down" education.

Dr. Victoria Bergin, Deputy Commissioner for Curriculum and Professional Development, Texas Education Agency, closed with conference Thursday morning with "Who Will Rock the Cradle?" Bergin addressed the many demands facing family members today in their home lives as well as in their roles as members of the community and world of work.

"Vocational home economics hardly resembles the

homemaking classes of just a few years ago," said Dr. Eleanor Rogers, president of the Vocational Home Economics Teachers Association of Texas (VHETAT). Rogers said that today's vocational home economics includes courses in life management skills, advanced food science and nutrition, apparel design, consumer economics, interior design, family finance, parenting education, child development, to name a few of the areas of instruction. In addition, vocational home economics teachers train students to enter the working world by giving them skills in jobs such as fashion design, hospitality services, child care, and entrepreneurship. Students also learn how to manage the dual role of wage earner and homemaker. "Vocational home economics teaches "skills for a lifetime," said Rogers. A video by the same title, "Skills for Lifetime" has been produced by the association to help the public better understand that home economics for the '90's is a new curriculum.

Protection Pointers

Q. What can I do to protect my teeth from injury?

A. The most important protection you can provide for your teeth is to refrain from using them as a "tool". Don't open bobby pins with your teeth. Don't bite thread from the spool; use scissors. Never crack nuts between your teeth, or bite down on hard candy. Avoid holding items such as nails, straight pins, pens or pencils with your teeth. Use dental floss or a toothpick with a rounded end to remove food stuck between your teeth; never use a pin or other sharp object! Any of these "don'ts" can result in chipped or fractured teeth or fillings, and that means a visit to your dentist and a repair bill.
