The Military Postal Service Agency has announced that mail service is operating for U.S. military personnel currently deployed to Saudi Arabia as part of Operation Desert Shield.

Currently, first class mail is taking about 10 days to reach Saudi Arabia. Due to the current deployed situation, personal mail service is limited to first class mail of less than 12 oz., this includes audio tapes. This restriction applies to all APO mail and some Marine FPO mail going to U.S. service people in Saudi Arabia.

In addition, normal Saudi Arabian customs restrictions must be adhered to. Information on these customs restrictions are available at U.S. post offices. Those wishing to send mail to deployed service members should use the provided APO/FPO number, if one has been assigned. If the

APO/FPO number is not known, or if one has yet to be assigned, the mail should be sent to the service member's address prior to the deployment. It will be forwarded as quickly as possible.

Should individuals or organizations desire to send "any service member" mail to service members serving the region, the Department of Defense and the U.S. Postal Service have established the following addresses for the general public to send mail not addressed to a specific service member. For the Army, Air Force and Marine Corps in Saudi Arabia:

"Any service member" mail is subject to the 12 ounce first class mail and Saudi Customs restrictions. "Any service member" mail sent to any other addresses may encounter significant delays and may be returned.

Texas Custom Fabrication Inc.; Ready For The Future

Sometimes events seem to converge on a company and give it a real stake in the future.

Consider Texas Custom Fabrications Inc. of Cisco, which manufactures oil field equipment. For several years, this small company has been turning out quality products, including steel and fiberglass storage tanks.

Then almost overnight there are new environmental concerns, more government regulations on the handling of oilfield products, increased fuel storage needs, and renewed oil exploration. No wonder that the market for Texas Custom items is expanding.

Evidence of this expansion is noticed from the time you reach the Plant, located on Highway 183 just northeast of Cisco at the site of the old Boss Glove Factory.

Between the Highway and a complex of metal buildings are rows of products manufactured by the company - large dark fiberglass storage tanks, several "gun barrels" with flanged heads, and other oilfield equipment.

Pickups and trucks are parked nearby, and workmen

occasionally step out from building used for welding and other manufacturing work.

On the east side of the complex the tall steel frame of another building rises above other structures. Bobby McCoy, President and General Manager of Texas Custom Fabrications, explains that the 38 ft. tall building is being constructed so they will have a place large enough to manufacture the latest product line - a Supertank which can be built to hold up to 20,000 gallons.

This tank is being built on a franchise from Trusco Tank Inc., whose head office is in San Luis Obispo, California, McCoy says. These Supertanks are doublewalled and made of steel fiberglass - designed for underground storage, and of course to meet all the latest requirements of the E.P.A.

McCoy is a young man, dark-eyed, with a sort of kinetic energy. He has a desk in an office but, obviously spends most of his time out in the shops on the yard with products.

He says that Texas Fabrications began in Albany, but moved to Cisco in 1986. It first located near Cisco on I-

20, then moved to the present site in 1987.

The Company is owned by a group of stockholders, with David Carr of Albany as Chief Executive Officer. McCoy manages the plant, and Linda Kayga is office manager.

Shirley Gary is Secretary, and Randy McCoy is shop foreman.

The company has 14 employees, with a payroll of approx. \$5,000 weekly. The work force is expected to be up to 23 by the end of the year.

"We owe Dick Wooley and the First National Bank of Cisco a lot of appreciation for helping us locate here," McCoy says. "They have been really helpful. This is a great plant location, and Cisco is a good place to work. We have good employees here."

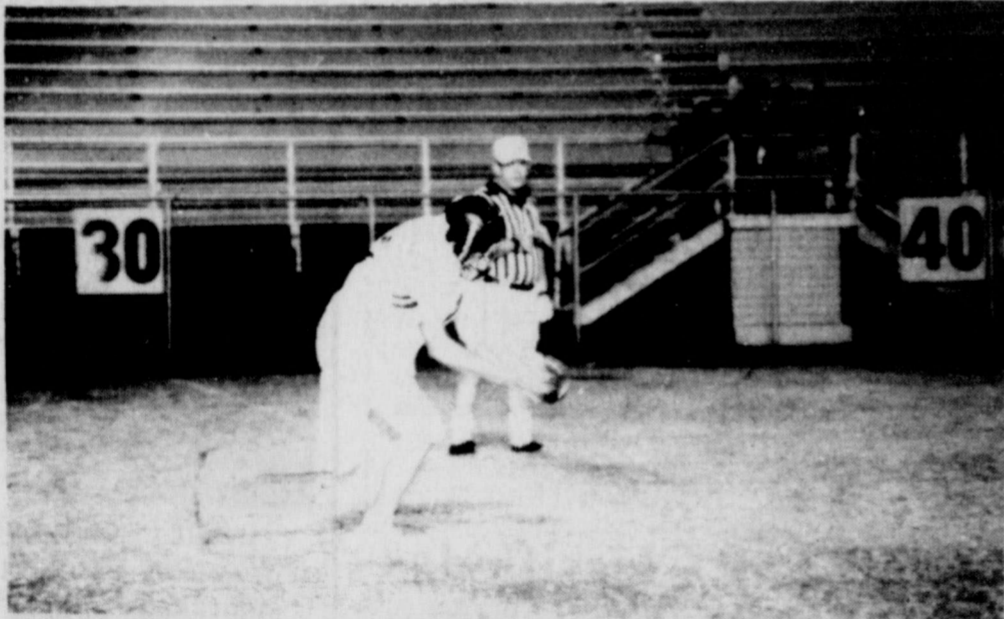
"We do a lot of welding in building these tanks, and are using a number of welders who used to work in the oil fields."

McCoy says that Texas Custom Fabrications delivers tanks to a number of places in Texas now, and purchasers also pick up equipment from the yard. The new Supertank is expected to be distributed all over the southwest - Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and other places.

McCoy says he feels the tanks being manufactured in Cisco are superior because of design, materials, careful workmanship, and because they are built to comply with all the latest government regulations.

"A lot of old leaky gasoline tanks are going to have to come up," he remarks, looking fondly at the shiny black cylinders out in the yard. "Then, some people may just want to have a tank to store clean water - or to store chemicals or just comply with government rules."

"Whether they want a small tank or a big Supertank - we're going to have it here," he says. "You ought to come back when this new building is finished, and see how the Supertanks are made! Those tanks will have a monitor well, a containment ring - go from 500 gallons up to the 20,000. They're really going to be something!"

Season Begins Friday For Loboes; Prove Tough In Hamlin Loss

The Cisco Loboes proved to be the Hamlin Pied Pipers that a Lobo bite can be harder than its bark. Cisco rolled up 252 yards offense, all on the ground, and scored two touchdowns against Hamlin in scrimmage Friday night. Hamlin, however, proved they were no pushovers in racking up 236 total yards and scoring three touchdowns.

The scrimmage, in Hamlin, consisted of 40 offensive and 40 defensive plays for both teams. The teams were then allowed to play in a more game-like situation. Officials placed 15 minutes on the scoreboard and the teams played as in a real contest.

Hamlin took advantage of those 15 minutes to score two of their three touchdowns while shutting down the Loboes everytime Cisco touched the ball. Hamlin's

first score came on a 59-yard run against the second Lobo defensive unit. The Pied Pipers' other scores came on runs of 5 and 34 yards respectively. Other than the score that came from the 5, Cisco never allowed Hamlin inside their 20.

Offensively, Cisco racked up several yards but found the yardage on Hamlin's end of the field hard to come by. Terrence Fletcher's 61-yard dash and Willie Sanchez's 3-yard plunge were the only scores the high octane Lobo offense could manage.

The Loboes displayed an aggressive style of defense in allowing Hamlin just 5 first downs. On Hamlin's first offensive series, the Lobo defense allowed one first down and only 33 yards of offense in shutting the door on the Pied Pipers. Ryan Duncan, Daniell Summers, Jay Nixon and Joel Prickett

sparked the Lobo defense throughout the contest.

Offensively, the Loboes were led by Terrence Fletcher who rushed for 84 yards on 12 carries. Willie Sanchez and Ryan Duncan played well in running for 67 and 40 yards respectively. The Loboes lost 2 fumbles and Hamlin lost 1.

Cisco's next game will be at home against the Millsap Bulldogs Friday night at 8 p.m. Millsap posted a record of 2-8 last year and returned 3 offensive and 2 defensive starters among 9 lettermen. This will be the public's chance to help the Loboes return to a winning tradition. Cisco has not reached the playoffs since 1983, which coincidentally was their last winning season. There are many things that make high school football and a high school football team great.

Clayton Williams A Texas Profile

From Boyhood Cotton Farmer to Republican Gubernatorial Candidate... Labeled the consummate Texan, he founded 26 companies; is an oilman, farmer, rancher, high-tech executive, financier, award-winning teacher and TV personality. His colorful and open style

gated cotton farm - gave him an edge when he later enrolled in A & M University.

"That farm was giving me a lot of headaches for a 14-year-old," Williams recalls. "The soil wasn't holding water and boll weevils were attacking my cotton. The hail came and I couldn't collect crop insurance, then my hands quit and I was working around the clock. So when I went to college, I went to learn how to be a problem solver."

Williams graduated from A & M in 1954 with a degree in animal husbandry and served three years in the U.S. Army. Soon after his military service, Williams used his abilities as a leader and a can-do problem solver to become one of the state's most successful entrepreneurs in the bedrock industries of Texas.

In 1957, with \$2,000 he'd saved selling insurance and waiting table in Mineral Wells, Williams founded May and Williams, an oil and gas company. Williams struggled with his infant business for two years before drilling his first successful oil well in 1959. Over the next 18 years he capitalized on his initial success, forming eight oil and gas companies in the state. Williams nurtured his most successful company, Clajon, founded in 1961, into the largest individually-owned gas company in Texas.

In speeches and interviews gained him popularity. His leadership during Texas' economic crisis earned him respect as a survivor and a man with tremendous tenacity and foresight.

At 14, Williams was learning the hardships of running one's own business. Williams says the venture - and irri-

transfers a year, he also oversees his high-tech alfalfa farm in Fort Stockton.

It was not until the mid 1970s that Williams achieved the financial status he is known for today. On New Year's Eve in 1975 his biggest strike, the Gataga well, blew out with such force that the nearby town of Mentone, in Loving County, had to be temporarily evacuated. Gataga, one of the biggest wells in the world, produced \$49,500 worth of gas each day.

Surviving the Wreck
By the mid-1980's, Williams' success was well-recognized. With companies in every major industry in Texas, FORTUNE magazine promptly labeled him a "micro-economy unto himself."

"I was in oil and gas, real estate, cattle, banking - everything that was losing money," Williams once joked. But his ability to "see a problem coming down the road," prompted Williams to cut back and consolidate his oil and gas interests in 1981, no matter how much it hurt his pride.

In the mid-1980s, with oil prices plummeting and seven banks breathing down his neck to reel in a \$500 million debt, Williams was again forced to make some tough decisions. To that end, he sold Clajon and gave his ClayDesta employees an across-the-board payout.

"That was a very difficult time for me and for my family," Williams remembers. "We had bankers literally on our doorstep ready to shut our businesses down. We had to retrench, consolidate, sell - but we survived."

Williams remains very active in oil and gas through the Williams companies, which operate more than 350,000 acres of oil and gas leases. After cutting back and unloading unproductive operations, Williams chose to diversify. In 1984 he started

ClayDesta Telecommunications, a Texas-based telecommunications company.

In an effort to establish the credentials of his fledgling operation - and because an actor was too expensive - Williams starred in the ClayDesta commercials himself, promising his customers "We're ClayDesta. We're going to do it for you and at the right price."

The commercials, most of which were filmed on his Alpine ranch, won an international award for excellence. In addition to the telecommunications company, Williams also started a bank, ClayDesta National Bank in Midland, and a 183-acre real estate development which includes a building with a six-story atrium that is 99 percent leased.

A Family In Crisis

In the wake of the economic turmoil within their businesses, Clayton and Modesta were hit with another problem when they discovered that their oldest son, Clayton Wade, then 15, was dependent on drugs and alcohol. "Luckily," Williams says, "we caught our son before he got way down the line like some of his peers who are now serving jail time."

The Williams' enrolled their son in STRAIGHT, a Dallas rehabilitation center, and, while Williams struggled to save his business, he and Modesta made bi-weekly trips to Dallas to counsel with their son.

Giving Back
Williams' diverse entrepreneurial career and his ability to laugh at and learn from his business failures, also make him a favorite with business students at Texas A & M, where he teaches an entrepreneurship class each spring. Williams' class received the Dean's Service Award for Teaching Excellence for his efforts.

In addition to teaching students at A & M, Williams

also committed \$2.5 million to underwrite the Association of Former Students Center, which bears his name.

Williams' family has a long history of community service. Williams' father served 12 years as Pecos County Commissioner and his grandfather, Oscar Waldo Williams, a Harvard Law School graduate, served as a county judge.

Williams is very involved with his home community where he founded Midland's 200 Club, which provides community and financial support to law enforcement officers who are injured or disabled in the line of duty.

Growing Up With Farm and Family

Williams, 57, was born in the small West Texas town of Alpine and grew upon a ranch in Fort Stockton where his mother, Chicora, 83, still lives. Williams' father, died in 1983. His sister, Janet Pollard, lives in Midland where Williams and his wife, the former Modesta Simpson, also live.

The Williams' have been married for 25 years and have three children - Clayton Wade, 19, who works as a cowboy; Jeff Wheat Gataga, 15, and Chim (Chicora Modesta) 13. Jeff and Chim attend school in Midland. Modesta, an avid hunter, is active in business, serving as vice president of ClayDesta Corporation and director of ClayDesta National Bank.

He and his family are well-known Eastlanders, and headquartering here will enable him to devote added attention to this and the Ranger store. Details are not available yet, but the company has some exciting plans for the stores here.

Area Mammography Service in Eastland Monday, Sept. 10

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services EASTLAND, TEXAS today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College

of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I would like to thank the over 440 citizens of Eastland, who voted against the sales tax increase. The Eastland Telegram's latest edition had a front page article about a "Map Distributor to Locate in Eastland." It seems that Proposition One may not have been a "Pig in a Poke tax" after all. It was intended to raise \$150,000 dollars. The good mayor explained that at least 10% (\$15,000) would be used for advertising Eastland County. Then the city manager announced that there were two businesses that could be brought to the county with this tax money. Suddenly a week or so after the tax increase failed to pass, the first business relocated to Eastland requiring only \$105,000 in loans. It is owned by a former Eastland resident. I wonder, what the city government was going to do with the other \$30,000?

Now the truth about the employment opportunities is beginning to become apparent. First the unfortunate people with the prison site in their backyard have been annexed by Abilene and will enjoy higher property taxes. Lately in the Abilene newspaper, it was divulged that an out of state contractor won the bid for the job of building the prison. This means that this money is leaving Taylor County (as well as Texas!). Possibly some of the smaller jobs or subcontracting will go to Abilene businesses, but these businesses would already be established and have their work force. Most larger general contractors as well have crews that move from site to site.

Eastland County residents should take pride in the fact that they are shrewd. They know a good deal. The two before-mentioned elections provide proof that Eastland County voters are smart, but there are some of its elected officials who are a bit lazy. In a recent town meeting held in Ranger concerning a rate increase to save its hospital, someone left the impression that when Clayton Williams is elected governor there will be no hospital dilemma. I

foresee Governor Williams drilling a well and sharing 50/50 with the city of Ranger. He keeps the oil and leaves Ranger the shaft.

The good people of Eastland County will allow him to hold his political rally here September 8. They are astute enough to recognize that Clayton Williams is no John Wayne.

After being a life long Republican, I found that they lacked a reciprocating involvement in me: my health insurance refused to reimburse me for over \$1,000 in medical claims. I contacted the insurer by telephone and by written correspondence. I began to seek assistance from by elected officials. The Republican Congressman (from Louisiana) "forwarded" my letter. I continued writing officials and agencies. I received a letter from Representative Charles Stenholm's office that aided me in obtaining a VA Pension that I was unaware I was qualified to acquire, because my pa-

ralysis is not service connected. He sought me out and I have been a loyal Democrat ever since.

To many, \$1,000 may not sound like much, but when you are 100% disabled, confined to a wheelchair, and living on a 40% pension from the New Orleans Police Department, you need every cent. I have always wanted to perform public service and did not have enough after nine years on the street ending my career as a senior field training officer.

It is clear that Clayton Williams knows nothing about government or the position for which he is running. I suppose that I am most offended by this "nose picking" (his words, remember "they can see my Aggie ring, ever time I pick my nose") contemptible mouth, yahoo and picturing that he could someday represent the state of Texas. (He is already the biggest Texas Aggie joke across the state line.) He has been paradoxically portrayed

on HBO's news satire. It was his joking about rape that caught my attention. Having to investigate them is bad enough, like the woman with the side of her face peeled off after being beaten by the base of a table telephone. Also during my first marriage my five year old step daughter was the rape victim, she did not "relax and enjoy it," but is scarred emotionally for life.

My present wife and I moved back to Texas because her family lives here and we were hoping that they would relieve her as I had been hospitalized repeatedly. I served part of my enlistment at Ft.

Hood and was aware of the kindness and generosity of Texans. I was too debilitated to travel further and had been compelled to remain. It was an undemanding decision. We both liked it here.

To those of you who have read this letter and are still attending the Clayton Williams barbecue, I wish to offer a bit of advice. Shake his hand, after you eat.

Fans of detective movies will especially enjoy this one.

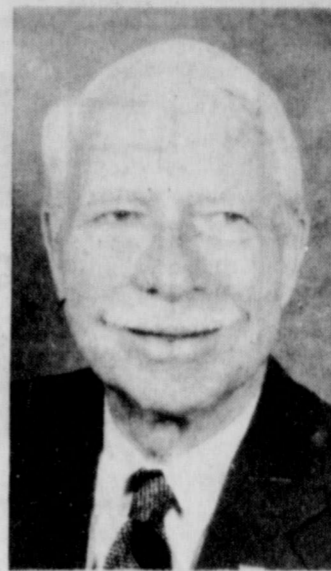

Former Ciscoan Receives One Of World's Top Photographic Honors

Melvin M. Lawson, a retired U.S. Army colonel of Arlington, Va., and an internationally known stereophotographer, received one of the world's top photographic honors Saturday, Sept. 1, when he was named a Fellow of the Photographic Society of America (PSA) at a dinner closing the Society's weeklong conference of photography in Nashville, Tenn.

The honor goes only to highly skilled photographers who also have demonstrated exceptional leadership in conducting PSA's educational and other volunteer services. Only about 350 of PSA's some 10,000 members hold the fellowship.

Col. Lawson, whose stereo pictures have won numerous awards, is a leading figure in administering and publicizing organized stereo photog-

raphy. He was cited for his "international involvement" in promoting stereoscopic photography.

Col. Lawson twice was president of the Potomac Society of Stereo Photographers, and was four times chairman of the Potomac International Exhibition of Stereo Photography. He was co-chairman of the International Stereoscopic Union's 5th Congress in Washington in 1985, and has been the PSA Stereo Division's councillor to the ISU since 1976.

Col. Lawson also is the North American representative to Great Britain's Third Dimension Society, and twice has been the National Stereoscopic Association's convention program chairman.

He has edited stereo newsletters and contributed articles to national and international stereo and photographic magazines. He has judged international stereo exhibitions across the country and has given programs on his specialty to camera clubs and community groups.

Col. Lawson also is a past president of the Greater Washington Council of Camera Clubs. A PSA member for 18 years, Col. Lawson was its Stereo Division chairman for four years, and was a PSA area membership representative for seven years.

PSA membership is open to all photographers, from novice to advanced and professional, with activities di-

rected to developing photography as an art and science. The Society coordinates the work of camera clubs throughout the United States and in about 40 other countries, establishes standards and maintains records on some 140 international exhibitions worldwide, and provides a wide range of teaching and program materials for clubs and individuals.

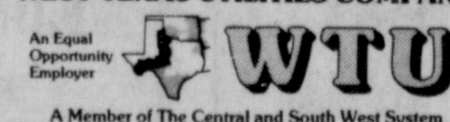

Protection Pointers

Q. What can I do to protect my teeth from injury?

A. The most important protection you can provide for your teeth is to refrain from using them as a "tool". Don't open bobby pins with your teeth. Don't bite thread from the spool; use scissors. Never crack nuts between your teeth, or bite down on hard candy. Avoid holding items such as nails, straight pins, pens or pencils with your teeth. Use dental floss or a toothpick with a rounded end to remove food stuck between your teeth; never use a pin or other sharp object! Any of these "don'ts" can result in chipped or fractured teeth or fillings, and that means a visit to your dentist and a repair bill.
