To Fleming Foods Charlie Maulden of Previously Thrift Mart had

Granbury, Grocery and Non-Food Supervisor of Thrift Mart Stores, stated this week that Thrift Mart is now purchasing wholesale grocery items from Fleming Foods Division in Fort Worth.

purchased grocery supplies from Affiliated Foods Grocery Warehouse, also in Fort Worth. But Affiliated Foods declared Chapter 11 Bankruptcy about two weeks ago, as reported by Metroplex newspapers. The company is continuing in operation, however.

Affiliated was a wholesaler for more than 500 stores in Central and West Texas, distributing products under the Shurfine Brand. The TV brand is used by Fleming Foods which is the largest wholesale grocery distributor in the United States.

"We want the public to know that Thrift Mart stores in the area will continue with good service and full shelves with groceries, meat and produce," says Maulden. "About all you will notice is the gradual changeover to the TV brand of products. Of course we will continue to carry the other leading brand names you have grown to expect."

Maulden said he felt that Affiliated Foods would be able to continue, but the change in wholesalers was made so Thrift Mart "would have no possible interruption of service to the public."



County Judge Scott Bailey said that the end of debt service (payments on the jail) and the Road and Bridge Tax being set at zero helped make the lower tax rate possible.

He noted that the Road and Bridge Fee citizens pay with car license tags is not the same as the Road and Bridge Tax,


BE YOURSELF...There are many people who go through life not knowing who they really are. They go throught life imitating other people and never really live up to their own innate abilities and talents.





Why Should Women Have A Screening Mammogram?

One out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her life. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast

Ninety percent (90%) of breast cancers are diagnosed. by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50% five year survival rate. Conversely, a woman diagnosed as having breast cancer before a lump can be felt has a 97% 5 year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer very small even before it can be felt.

WHO SHOULD HAVE A SCREENING MAMMO-GRAM?

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography.

Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Acadamy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. The

II. 40-50 years asymptomatic women should have a mammogram every 1-2 year depending on breast type and

risk factor until age 50. III. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age should have annual physical examination and annual mammo-

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with signficant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. Risk factors listed below are an example.

a. Previous breast can-

VI. Symptomatic women will not be seen at the Screening Clinic. A women with any of the above symptoms should call her physician or make an appointment for a complete breast study at the Regional Breast Care Center in Odessa.

WHAT IS A SCREEN-ING MAMMOGRAM?

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast on women who have no symptoms of disease, (asympto-

A screening mammogram utilizes extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers in unsuspecting women.

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HOW CAN A WOMEN GET A SCREENING MAMMOGRAM?

The Regional Breast Care Center of Women's & Children's Hospital and Odessa Radiology Group are co-sponsoring a Moblie Breast Screening program.

The Mobile Breast Screening Unit will be in most towns in West Texas.

The Mobile Breast Screening Unit will work by appointment as well as nonappointment. You may make your appointment by calling your local hospital or the Regional Breast Care Center at (915) 334-8888.

WHAT HAPPENS AF-TER A WOMEN HAS MADE AN APPOINT-MENT?

When the Mobile Breast Screening Unit is in your city please report approximately 5 minutes prior to your appointment time for registra-

The charge for the screening mammogram is between \$45.00 and \$75.00 depending on location and payment must be made at the time of service. The clinic accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Typically, the exam takes less than 15 minutes. Wear separates (skirt/blouse; slacks/blouse) to allow easy disrobing from the waist up. Also, avoid overuse of deo-

A female technologist will perform the examination and teach you how to do breast self-examination.

In some cities the local Radiologist will interpret the films and forward the results to your physician. If the local Radiologist does not interpret the films, the films are returned to the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital. There they are interpreted by a Radiologist from Odessa Radiology Group. The results are then forwarded to your phy-

You will be instructed when to call or see your physician for the results of your study. If you have no physician, we will provide you with names of local physicians who have agreed to take new patients.

You and /or your physician will be mailed a reminder when it is time for further check-ups.

WHAT IF MY SCREEN-ING MAMMOGRAM IS POSITIVE?

As stated earlier, a screening mammogram is designed to find very early cancers. If your mammogram shows any suspicious signs you will be asked to have further evaluations done.

These evaluations may be performed by your physician or by a complete diagnostic

breast center such as the Re-Women's & Children's Hos-

Should you be asked to have further studies done, DO NOT PANIC. This does not mean you have cancer, it simply means there is an area which needs further study.

If a mammogram shows a definite cancer, you will be advised of such.

If you require further evaluations and receive these evaluations at the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital, the fee which you paid for the screening mammogram will be discounted from the Complete Study charge.

BREAST SELF-EX-AMINATION

During your visit to the Breast Screening Unit you will be taught how to perform breast self-examination (BSE). Breast self-examination is very important tool to every woman. Any changes which may occur in your breast will be first noticed by yourself. These changes should be reported to your physician immediately.

Three steps which may save your life;

1. Regular check-ups by a physician.

2. Monthly breast self-

3. Mammography according to the American Cancer Society Guidelines.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 6, 1990**

OF PROPOSED

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

Homemaking Hints By Janet Thomas

TIPS FOR SHOPPING BY MAIL, TELEPHONE, **TELEVISION:**

Today there are many ways to buy products or services. Many consumers buy items through mail order or by telephone or even from television shopping programs.

Keep the following tips in

1. Be suspicious of exaggerated product claims or very low prices, and read product descriptions very carefullysometimes pictures of products are misleading.

2. If you have any doubts about the company, check with the U.S. Postal Service, your state or local consumer protection agency or Better Business Bureau before ordering.

3. Ask about the firm's return policy. If it is not stated, ask before you order. For example, does the company pay charges for shipping and return? Is a warranty or guarantee available? Does the company sometimes substitute comparable goods for the product you want to order?

4. Keep a complete record or your order; including the company's name, address and telephone number, the price of the items ordered, any handling or other charges, the date you mailed (or telephoned) in the order, and your

method of payment. Keep copies of canceled checks and/or statements.

5. If you order by mail, your order should be shipped within 30 days after the company receives your complete order, unless another period is agreed upon when placing the order or is stated in an advertisement. If your order is delayed, a notice of delay should be sent to you within the promised shipping period along with an option to cancel the order.

6. If you buy a product through a television shopping program, check the cost of the same item sold by other sources, including local stores, catalogs, etc.

7. If you want to buy a product based on a telephone call from the company, ask for the name, address, and

phone number where you can reach the caller after considering the offer.

8. Never give your credit or social security number over the telephone as proof of your identity.

9. Postal regulations allow you to write a check payable to the sender, rather than the delivery company, for cash on delivery (C.O.D.) orders. If, after examining the merchandise, you feel there has been misrepresentation or fraud, you can stop payment on the check and file a complaint with the U.S. Postal Inspector's Office.

10. You can have a charge removed from your bill if you did not receive the goods or services or if your order was obtained through misrepresentation or fraud. You must notify the credit card company in writing, at the billing inquiries/disputes address, within 60 days after the charge first appeared on your bill.

Aerobic exercise programs can actually dissolve clots in blood vessels, say researchers at the University of Washington in Seattle. Exercise raises levels of naturallyoccuring tissue plasminogen activator, the genetically engineered drug given to dissolve clots.

Marijuana interferes with memory, even making conversation difficult, researchers found in a study of teenagers at the Georgetown University School of Medicine in Washington, D.C.

Preliminary study at the National Cancer Institute found that low oral doses of isotretinoin, a synthetic vitamin A derivative, helped prevent the return of skin cancer. Test subjects had no new tumors during research, or fewer than previously.

Successful treatment for the depression and irritability associated with premenstrual syndrome was reported in the American Journal of Psychiatry. Women are exposed to bright fluorescent light for two hours a day during the week before menstruation.


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
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

Abilene Council on Alcohol & **Drug Abuse To Expand Services**

The Abilene Council on Alcohol & Drug Abuse received a grant for \$72,500 to expand its services into 8 surrounding counties. The award, announced August 15th by Senator Temple Dickson of District 24 is part of a \$4.4 million "Council Initiative" package offered by the Texas Commission on Alcohol & Drug Abuse to extend council services to under served counties.

"The Council has never refused help to anyone from outside Taylor County," said Mary Busby, A.C.A.D.A. Executive Director, "but, because of this grant, we can now be available to the people of these counties on a consistent basis."

In addition to Taylor County, the Council service area will include: Callahan, Eastland, Haskell, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall and Throckmorton

According to Mrs. Busby, the A.C.A.D.A. has received a lot of support and approval from county officials when approached with the idea of the Council offering its services in their communities.

A survey conducted by the T.C.A.D.A. reported 15% of the population in the counties that will benefit from this grant has been identified as having one or more alcohol or other drug related problems. In the A.C.A.D.A's catchment area (including Taylor County) this works out to 32,388 people whose prob-

lems will affect an addtional 129,552 family members.

The A.C.A.D.A. services include educational programs for schools, churches and civic organizations. Employee Assistance Programs, evaluation and referral, a 24hour telephone information service, D.W.I. and Public Intoxication Education And is it coincidence or is

American Association Of Retired Persons Tax-Aide Program

The American Association of Retired Persons Tax-Aide Program is accepting applications of persons interested assisting the elderly with their Income Tax.

TAX-AIDE is a unique service which relies upon the efforts of volunteers to provide FREE income tax assistance to older persons and low income persons who are not able to afford professional help. TAX-AIDE is sponsored by the AARP in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service through its taxpayer educational program. The I.R.S. provides the training, instructions and all material to support volunteers with their income tax counseling.

The primary responsibilities of a Tax-Aide Counselor centers on helping older persons with their tax forms. This is accomplished by explaining special tax benefits that are available to them and preparing or advising of the tax forms. The counselor completes the forms but does not sign nor mail them for the taxpayer.

Persons volunteering to serve as income tax counselors should have a sincers interest in serving older adults.

They should also be willing to participate in an Internal Revenue Training course and agree to devote at least four hoursa week to provide counseling.

Volunteers need not be retired nor do they need to be a member of AARP. Persons of any age are welcome. Volunteers provide assistance without charge and are not legally liable for the information which they provide.

The training for becoming a Tax-Aide Counselor is provided by IRS tax trainers or by certified Tax-Aide Instructors and is provided free of charge. Training sessions will be held in January and usually completed within a five day period. All material will be furnished by the IRS.

Tax-Aide Counselors are reimbursed, after completing the training and serving season, for any expenses incurred in carrying out their program related activities.







continuing their trip were also at the airport when Williams arrived.

Williams and Perry were joined by the greeters in a parade led by a fire truck to the Majestic.

With Williams' visit to Eastland being the first major campaign event in the city by a candidate for governor, Saturday was declared Clayton Williams Day by Mayor Dub Hoffmann. And a large number of visitors traveled from area cities as far away as Decatur and Wichita Falls for the rally.

The Majestic Theatre, which seats more than 800, was nearly filled, and some late arrivals reportedly didn't find seats.

A group of girls and ladies from Wise County entertained with their clogger dance routines as Clayton and Modesta Williams shook hands with people on their way through the crowd. Rick Perry was joined by his wife Anita, his son and daughter, and his parents as he met the crowd.

The rally opened with a prayer and the crowd saying the pledge of allegiance to the flag. Jim Moylan welcomed everyone to Eastland and District Campaign Chairman Pat Patterson made the introductions. Mayor Hoffmann made a presentation and Williams responded that it was the first Clayton Williams Day ever.

Patterson briefly told how that Williams continues to do things that people say can't be done.

Perry, who is campaigning against Jim Hightower, said that encouraging some fruit stands in Texas is not enough. 'We produce agricultural products in Texas, so let's bring the processing back to Texas and produce market

ready products,' he said. Hightower was described as a hippie who is opposed by the agricultural producers of Texas. It was said that he is the only state agricultural commissioner which Washington will not trust to handle federal funds, which it was pointed out that the White House doors would be open to Perry.

Williams said that he didn't want to be 'Lonesome Gov' that when elected governor,

he would need the help of people like Perry. The polls show Williams leading in the race for governor.

This is my second visit to Eastland, I visited here while in the army and stationed at Mineral Wells, said Williams, who described himself as an athlete growing up in a Christian family in Fort Stockton. He first became a farmer and later started his own gas company. People said he couldn't succeed, but he became a millionaire. He had to improve efficiency to do it, he pointed out.

Williams said that he would travel to foreign countries to recruit more business and develop more markets for


Workman's Compensation, high regulated shipping costs, and liability where the judges hearing suits receive large contributions from those bringing the suits, were named as problems which are driving industry away from Texas and where changes are

'We have good teachers,' said Williams, 'but our educational system is failing. We need to return the control of our school system to the local school boards.' He also promised to veto unfunded requirements. He proposed bidding out services, raising teacher pay, establishing respect for principals, and throwing out both the career ladder and **Education Commissioner Bill** Kirby. Let parents decide which school to send their children to, he continued.

When students get kicked out of school, they so often become drug pushers. Let's provide a boot camp for them instead and teach them to work. My son got on drugs, but with treatment overcame the habit. Let's provide treatment for those who can't afford it, and let's spend some money to find a cure.

Let's double the prisons and add enforcement officers to hurt the drug dealers, and enforce the death penalty. We also need to make users pay for their offenses. Give users and first time offenders a second chance, in a 90 day boot camp. Give them some pay for their work. If they learn to work, stay away from drugs, and go straight, clear their records and let them get jobs. If they are unwilling, put them in prison, Williams

suggested. Of course, what I have



ers expense, Williams said. Williams reminded voters that he is not a politician or lawyer, that he is a successful businessman.

Let's give our young people some incentive to stay in school, he continued. If they have good behavior, let's help them go to college or teach them a trade.

Contrary to what he has been told, Williams insists that he can ride a horse into the 20th century, if that horse happens to be honesty, integrity and using the Bible as a

Clayton Williams said that he would start by defining the objectives and using good people. Some of his objectives are to veto an income tax, or any new tax, to stop bureaucractic growth, and to take Texas back from the system so that the people rather than bureaucrats will control the state. He says that he believes in a day's work for a day's pay, and that he wants to give the people the highest rate of political return if he is elected Governor of

In answer to a question, Williams said that both guns and autos controlled by people kill people. And that he is not in favor of doing away with either, but is in favor of doing something about criminals who use guns. He also insists that victims, and not just criminals, should have rights.

There was more handshaking, and as a tired Clayton Williams returned to the airport for a flight to Alpine and some rest, he commented that he was impressed by Eastland and how friendly people are

heaven He declared Jesus to be His beloved Son, and the Holy Spirit revealed Himself VISUALLY by "descending like a dove and alighting on Him " (Matt 3:16).

The above is a sample of how the teaching of the Holy Trinity occurs in the Bible not as a finely formulated doctrine (as in the Apostles' Nicene, and Athanasian Creeds), but in widely separated statements: in the above story, in Old Testament declarations (for example, in Numbers 6:24-26); (Isaiah 42:1), in the apostolic benediction as recorded in 2 Cor. 13:14, where Paul says: "May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all."; in Jesus ' utterances that the Father had sent Him and that He and the Father would send the Holy Spirit, the Counselor; and especially in the Great Commission.

God is both one and three. This is not a "new math" but the Biblical truth that God is one in three, and three in one. First, He is one essence, one undivided being: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God is one Lord" (Deut. 6:4). Second, He is them in the name of the Father sent the Son, Jesus Christ, to die for our salvation and for the forgiveness of our sins, and rise again from the dead, and that the Father and the Son continue to send the Holy Spirit to lead us to keep us in the saving faith in our Savior Jesus

The Cisco Hospital District will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1989 by 256.25 percent. Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property.

The public hearing will be held on Thurs., Sept. 20, 1990 at 6:00 p.m.

The statement above shows the percentage increase the proposed rate represents over the rollback tax rate that the unit published on August 12, 1990. The following table compares taxes on an average home in this taxing unit last year to taxes proposed on the average home this year. Again, your individual taxes may be higher or lower, depending on the taxable value of your property.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by \$65.79 or 253.62 percent compared with last year's taxes.

Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$.35865 per \$100 of taxable value or 253.73 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.
