## Dr. Alexander Receives Fellowship In AAFP

Dr. B. B. Alexander of Eastland, has been named a Fellow of The American Academy of Family Physicians, the national medical association representing 69,000 family physicians and medical students.

The Degree of Fellow may be attained in either of two ways: Successful completion of 600 or more hours of accredited continuing medical study, or achievement of diplomate status in the specialty of family practice as a result of passing a certifying examination administered by the American Board of Family Practice. The AAFP also requires that Fellows be members for at least 6 years.

Fellowship entitles the conferee to use the title, "Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians," or "FAAFP." The degree was conferred October 9 upon more than 400 members of the Academy in conjunction with AAFP's Annual Convention and Scientific Assembly in Dallas.

Fellowship candidates wore academic robes and mortarboard caps. They were recognized according to state chapter, and the oath of Fellowship was recited en masse.

The AAFP, headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri, was instrumental in establishing the medical specialty of family practice in 1969. It was also a pioneer in continuing medical education (CME), requiring its members to maintain 150 hours of approved CME credit every three years.

## Time Is Ripe To Promote Propane

"In the search for a cleaner, inexpensive, effective and readily available alternative to gasoline, government and consumers alike should pay attention to what thousands of Texas pickup owners have known for a long time, and that is that propane can do the job," Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said.

Hightower made the comments at the Texas LP-Gas Association's annual convention at the Hyatt Regency in Austin.

"Today, pushing alternative fuels is more crucial than ever. On the one hand, Iraq's invasion and occupation of Kuwait has shown everyone that we can no longer take for granted the unlimited availability of cheap gasoline. On the other hand, science is letting us know that we must stop contaminating our world with high levels of ozone, carbon monoxide and other pollutants that come from automobile emissions.

Propane might not be the answer to our nation's alter-

native fuel dreams, but it clearly appears to be one of the answers: It's much cleaner than gasoline, it's already widely used, and we have plentiful natural gas reserves in North America. Texas alone produces more than one-third of the propane in the U.S.," Hightower said.

"Increasing the use of propane as a transportation fuel would also benefit the rural economy. Propane is produced by gas wells in rural areas. Most of it is processed in rural plants, sold by rural dealers and used by rural consumers.

"The time is ripe to promote propane and other alternative fuels such as ethanol and compressed natural gas. Public interest in clean, domestically produced alternative fuels has never been higher.

"Even government is getting involved. Texas recently passed legislation calling for all government agencies to begin converting their vehicle fleets to alternative, less-pol-

luting fuels. The Texas Department of Agriculture has already started the switch to alternative fuels. As I speak, mechanics are converting TDA vehicles to propane gas. By next week, the agency will have 14 such vehicles, one for each district," Hightower said.

Propane is in an excellent position to compete for that market. The infrastructure is already there - we have 2,000 refueling locations on our state alone, and over 30,000 Texas vehicles are presently running propane."

Hightower urged the industry to do more to promote alternative fuels by making it easier to convert gasoline-powered vehicles to propane, by offering financial incentives to car and fleet owners who might be willing to make the switch, by encouraging the state legislature to give tax breaks to anyone who uses alternative fuels, by stabilizing the price of propane, and by marketing propane more aggressively.

### Texas Orphans To Gather In Odessa

Over 4,000 orphaned, abandoned, homeless children were brought to Texas from New York City and Boston orphanages from the mid-1800s until as late as 1929. Children were brought in groups traveling with two or more adults in charge, and placed out with new families. Since the children came on trains, today this era in history is known as the "Orphan Trains Era" and stands out as the beginning of foster parent care in America.

During the 75 years of this mass movement of children in America, at least 150,000 children were relocated.

Odessa, Texas, has been chosen as a place for a one-

day gathering of these children who today are in their 70s and 80s. Wednesday, November 28th from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. Orphan Train Riders, families, friends and interested persons are invited to meeting and share information.

Austin, Texas, has been chosen as the site for a meeting the following Saturday, December 1, 1990.

Mary Ellen Johnson, a family historian as well as founder of the 785-member organization, Orphan Train Heritage Society of America (OTHSA) will be in charge of the meeting.

Johnson travels around the country speaking to groups such as the National Foster Parents Association and historical/genealogical societies about the Orphan Trains. Gathering and preserving

Orphan Trains history is the purpose of OTHSA. Johnson also assists the Orphan Train Riders and their descendants with family research.

A quarterly publication, CROSSROADS, gives useful information in seeking biological family and has three or more Orphan Train Riders stories per issue. Subscriptions are available.

New uses for old drugs: a widely used acne drug -- 13-cis retinoic acid -- seems to block the growth of new tumors in patients who have had smoking-related cancers of the mouth and throat. Research was initiated at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Boston. \*\*\*  
Medicine used against high blood pressure -- amiloride - can slow the lung damage that threatens cystic fibrosis patients, according to a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine. New form of the diuretic drug, a spray inhalant, was used to treat adults in the test. \*\*\*  
And another high blood pressure drug -- spironolactone -- has turned out to be effective against acne. Tests at Boston University School of Medicine show that the drug inhibits the hormone activity that triggers the output of the sebaceous oil glands. \*\*\*  
To treat mild bladder cancer, the Food and Drug Administration has approved the use of a live bacterium used in tuberculosis vaccines. Flooding the bladder with the germs seems to destroy the cancer cells. \*\*\*

# Fishing Outdoors

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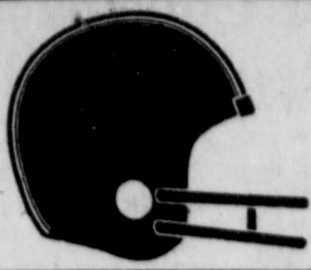
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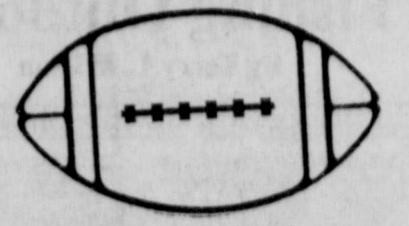

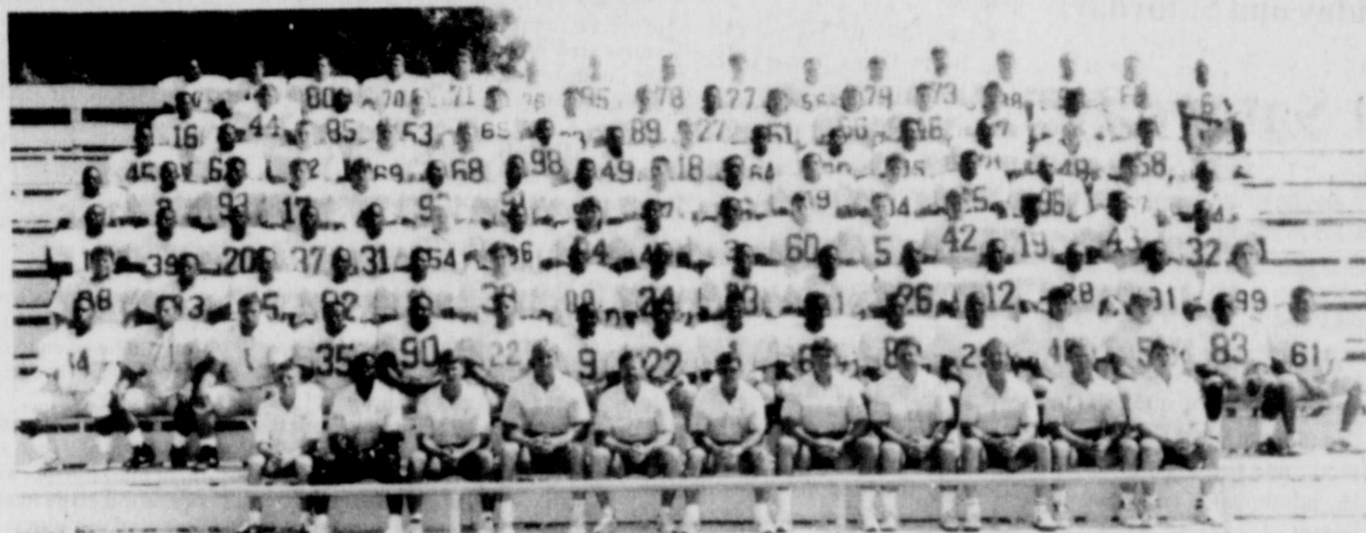

## Sloan: biblical message holds key to commentary scholarship

Depending on the situation or even the time of day, Robert Sloan is a New Testament scholar, father of seven children, Little League baseball coach, school board member and/or interim pastor.

In all things, however, Sloan claims, "I am Baptist with my head and my heart."

Sloan, 41, is professor of New Testament in Baylor University's department of religion, where he holds the George W. Truett Chair in Evangelism.

He also is a consulting editor for The New American Commentary, a project of the Sunday School Board, and will be the author of the volume on Romans.

The New American Commentary will be a 40-volume set released between 1991 and 1997. A primary goal of the project is to present a scholarly, conservative view of scripture which affirms the divine inspiration, total truthfulness and complete authority of the Bible.

ACADEMIC respect for Baptist scholarship and a dedication to share the message of the gospel are driving forces for Sloan in writing and teaching.

"Baptist scholarship has been thought of as something of an oxymoron," Sloan charged. "I don't think that is true."

"Our Baptist theological traditions are credible in terms of historical scholarship, and I want our traditions of Bible and theology to be subjected to honest scrutiny," he said.

"The challenge is to produce a commentary that is faithful both to the insights of biblical scholarship and to the Bible as the word of God," he added.

SLOAN is a graduate of Baylor University and received the master of divinity degree, magna cum laude, from Princeton Seminary. He did post-baccalaureate research in church history at the University of Bristol in England and received a doctor of theology degree from the University of Basel.

A 20-minute drive away from Baylor University takes Sloan to a large country farmhouse where attention to scheduling becomes vital for all the Sloans, including Charissa, Bryan, Eraina, Michael, Alatha, Sophia and Paul, who range from three to 16 years old. Sloan and his wife, Sue, hold an impromptu huddle regarding the evening's responsibilities as soon as he

arrives, while a budding young musician practices the piano in the background.

THE ACADEMIC world is somehow relegated to the back seat for the evening while family matters receive priority attention. There will be time later in the evening or tomorrow for attention to focus on New Testament scholarship, commentaries and the classroom.

As Sloan reads manuscripts in his role as a consulting editor of The New American Commentary, special attention will be given to theological content, historical and exegetical accuracy and readability.

Over the course of the seven-year project he will read all of the New Testament manuscripts with additional consideration given to application and potential usefulness of the commentary for pastors, students and church leaders.

"Theological exegesis is not philosophical hair-splitting," Sloan said. "I hope we can avoid extremist word and tense study because this is not a theological abstract. We want to produce a holistic commentary that looks for larger points and purpose."

"OF COURSE, we will do grammar and word study, but not as an end in itself," he said. "The goal is to get to the message so that after reading the commentary you won't remember a word study but a sense of the whole."

"We will seek to establish the historical message of the text within the framework of the author's intent and the broader, social and cultural environment."

"The question always with us is how to apply the text. But there is not a final answer," he said. "The message is adapted and applied to our own situations. Therefore, we need a new commentary for our generation that is faithful to the Bible as the word of God."

"We want the commentary to be useful for sermon insights, but not to be a collection of sermon outlines," he said. "So, the structure of the commentary will be dictated by the message of the text."

"AS I PREPARE to write a commentary on Romans, I will try to learn everything I can about the society and culture of the time when Romans was written," Sloan said. "I want to understand Paul's message to the household churches in Rome."

"Then, pastors and teachers can teach the message of Romans and all of us can more nearly conform our lives to that message," he added.

The first volume of The New American Commentary, which will be published in June 1991, will be Philippians, Colossians and Philemon, written by Richard E. Melick Jr., professor at Mid-America Seminary in Memphis, Tenn. Sloan's volume on Romans is scheduled for release in 1992.

The commentary will be written and edited according to the doctrinal guidelines of the Baptist Faith and Message statement, and the Chicago Statement on Inerrancy will be the operating definition of biblical inerrancy. The New International Version of the Bible will be the standard translation for The New American Commentary. (BP)
