

Joe Hansen, a volunteer emergency medical technician was at his desk at Empire Federal Savings and Loan in Big Timber, Montana, when his pager blared, "Two-car accident on I-90. One driver trapped."

Joe sprinted to the ambulance garage down the street, and in minutes he was at the accident scene. With horror he viewed a tan Cadillac in a ditch with a 60-year old woman slumped against the wheel, her body mangled, her pulse weak. Her only hope of survival lay in the Sweet Grass Community Hospital in Big Timer, a one-story 15-bed facility. Hansen stood by in the emergency room as doctors and nurses sought to stabilize the victim, and as he watched life return to the frail body, he felt a deep satisfaction. Though the woman would be transferred to the large hospital in Billings, she could never have been saved had she been taken there at first. She owed her life to

Sweet Grass. Sweet Grass County, Montana, sprawls across more than a million acres where the Rocky Mountains collide with the Great Plains. Half the fiercely independent 3300 people reside in Big Timber. The local hospital plays a vital role in making the area feel like a community. Though bricks built the hospital in 1950, its mortar remains the people it serves. They donated the trees, bought chairs for the lobby, paid for an adjustable bed, and donated vases, curtains, and even whole rooms if furnishings. Many memories were tied up in the hospital. To younger residents it was their place of birth. To older people it was a place to go in

"It (federal money) is very important to the department," said Ted Clark, wildlife division federal aid coordinator. "The money we receive is based 50 percent on state land area and 50 percent on licensed hunters in relation to federal aid program has been all other states. "The Pittman-Robertson

Dr. Gary Matlock said his division probably will end up receiving closer to \$9 million. The preliminary figure allows states to let projects already underway, such as building new hatcheries, development projects and general projects, continue

'The people who hunt and fish and the equipment they buy comes back to the state at up to 75 percent reimbursement," he said. "We're not using a nickel of general revenue funds. When Texas sportsmen buy sporting goods and motor boat fuel, much of that excise tax money comes back to Texas. Their (sportsmen) money is coming back to them. It's a very good program.'

Wildlife money is derived from an 11 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, a 10 percent tax on pistols and revolvers and an 11 percent tax on certain archery equipment, according to USFWS officials. Half of the tax on handguns and archery equipment is available for state hunter education programs.

The sport fishing money comes from a 10 percent tax on fishing equipment and a 3 percent tax on electric trolling motors and sonar fish finders, officials said. The Wallop-Breaux expansion legislation of 1984 increased the tax base for sport fish restoration to include a portion of the federal motorboat fuels tax and import duties on fishing tackle and pleasure boats.

"To qualify for Pittman-Robertson or Dingell-Johnson funds, a state must put its license fee money into a special fund and it can be used for wildlife and fisheries conservation purposes. In our case that's Fund 9. This is a key provision," Clark said. "The


